- 1. <u>SAVING CDS:</u> SEIU Rally in support of keeping the SMMUSD Child Development Services in house. SEIU opposes the privatization of the child care program and the layoff of classified employees. SEIU supports the Board of Education in seeking new and increasing streams of revenue directly to the CDS program. SEIU is planning to lobby and speak in Sacramento this month for the support of SB993 (Figueroa). Leadership Training for employees to speak in Sacramento is being provided by SEIU on Thursday, April 12, 2001 from 6:00 to 7:30 PM in the Board Room.
- 2. <u>SEIU's ANNUAL SCHOOLS' CONFERENCE</u> The conference was held in Los Angeles at the Wilshire Grand Hotel from March 22nd through the 25th. The conference was very enlightening on state and federal politics and impact of those politics on educational dollars. There were political workshops to support increased federal funds for education and school employee industry workshops for all classified employees.



#### **MEETING NOTES**

#### Meeting Notes March 27 Bullying Workshop

We had a great turnout; over 70 people. There were many new faces and the kids who attended were great new voices. We were very gratified that each of Malibu's public school principals were in attendance .I will attempt to highlight the meeting and state our goals for our next meeting on April 24<sup>th</sup>.

Each of our guest presenters spoke on the different aspects of bullying on campus:

- Kathy McTaggart, community liaison for the school district, voiced support for the community approach we are utilizing to address these issues. She emphasized that no one group can change the culture on our campuses without the support of the others. Parents, teachers, administrators, staff, students and community members all have to be speaking the same language and be consistent in their message. She assured the group that the District was there as a resource and to call her at 450-8338 with any questions. She urged that careful thought be put into researching solutions.
- Dylan Ross, a 9<sup>th</sup> grader at Malibu High School spoke of being a victim of ongoing bullying at school. Of feeling somehow he was at fault and of going for help too late to prevent physical abuse from his tormentors.
- Phyllis Steinberg, mediation expert, spoke of what works in conflict resolution and how kids need to feel safe in order to find the tools to deal with bullying and related issues. She spoke of the importance of learning how to listen. She spoke of the importance of having a mediation "table" and of staff and students getting appropriate training to deal with finding to solutions for conflict on campus. She said that the campus culture needs to shift in the way people treat each other and that disciplinary measure often provide nothing more than band aids to the deeper issues.
- Sophie Stern, a 10<sup>th</sup> grade student at Malibu High School talked of how the current programs Mentor Program, Peer Mediation, and Smart Moves provided ways of kids helping kids. She spoke of the importance of continued support for these programs. She pointed out that kids think it is "cool" to tease other kids as a way to gain peer acceptance. She also said that younger kids tend to hear advice from older kids on issues where parent's messages fail. She told the parents that it is important to listen to your kids and their requests.
- Roy Ettenger spoke from a psychologist's perspective and detailed ways that parents could better listen when kids spoke about being victims of bullies. He

pointed out signs of kids being bullied such as having stomachaches and not wanting to go to school. He also said the victims first thought is often, "what am I doing wrong?" He also spoke of how parent's behavior could influence kids to be bullies and emphasized the importance of not brushing over signs of bullying and not being in denial that it could be happening to your kid.

- Irene Ramos, vice principal at MHS, detailed some ways that Malibu High School is currently listening and responding to student concerns. She also voiced a commitment to include ways of helping the bullies overcome their behavior and make positive changes. She detailed existing programs in prevention and intervention, including "Dialogues" starting this week in the 6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, and 8<sup>th</sup> grade to gain understanding on student concerns.
- Scott Robinson, Director of the Teen Center, explained that the philosophy of the Boys and Girls Club is to provide a safe haven for all kids. He said that through the different opportunities that the Club provides that all members get to experience success and achievement outside of academics. He spoke about the Kids at Hope program being implemented by the Middle School and the Teen Center which will give a "report" on achievement in areas other than academics.

After the presentations there was a lively question and answer period with participation by all four Principals, the presenters and by Kathy Ravenbourg who heads the Council program at Malibu High School. This program is in the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grades and promotes listening and respect between peers. Kathy also had resource information for family mediation and counseling. She also spoke of the code of silence among kids and how to address it.

Action Plan- The goal is to change the climate on our campuses by creating a "whole school approach" where every adult, every student and every parent will commit to the same code of conduct and be aware of the consequences of not living up to it. In this way we can create a better learning and teaching environment.

An advisory group was formed including parents and teachers and has begun to gather research and information to formulate and implement an action plan for all four Malibu public school campuses.

The main research areas are:

- Forms of bullying: definitions and consequences
- Cliques and biases: creating the "outcast".
- Safe school atmosphere: what are the components that make a campus conducive to learning and teaching.
- Prevention: what programs currently exist on our campuses.
- Discipline: what works and how on campus and on a legal level.
- Intervention programs: currently existing and available resources.

#### Implementation areas:

- Parent education
- Training for staff, teachers, administrators
- Student programs

#### **Evaluation:**

• To take place next spring 02 after a full school year has been given to coordination of the action plan.

## **Bullyproofing Our Schools**

To eliminate bullying, first we must agree not to tolerate it

"Bullying exacts a terrible toll on children." [pull quote]

Another bullied and tormented boy brings a gun from home and commits murder at school. Another dazed community spokesperson stands up in front of television cameras and says, "We didn't think it could happen here."

Santana High and Columbine have forced adults to focus on bullying. But in truth, bullying has always had serious ramifications. And the consensus among leading researchers such as pediatric psychologist Dorothea Ross is that bullying today is more frequent—and much more vicious—than it was 10 to 15 years ago.

If we adults continue to insist that bullying is a normal part of growing up, even a "character building" experience, then, to be blunt, we have never listened, I mean *really* listened, to a child who has been victimized by persistent bullying. For children who are constantly picked on, ridiculed, threatened, harassed, or robbed, school becomes torture. As a teenage girl from Naperville, Illinois reported in NEA's recent Safe Schools Now television program, the bullying can get so bad that you yearn for death because "then it will stop."

Let us dispel, once and for all, the myths.

Bullying exacts a terrible toll on children. Their school work suffers, their physical and mental health suffers, and the scars can last a lifetime.

Bullying is also bad for the bullies because they never learn about consequences. Sixty percent of the boys identified as bullies in middle school had one criminal conviction by age 24, according to psychologist Dan Olweus in his groundbreaking work, *Bullying at School*.

Another revealing study, reported by Dorothea Ross, takes us inside the minds of the bullies. When high school seniors in a Virginia school were asked why they had relentlessly persecuted much younger boys, one of them said: "Pick on people? We do

that all the time. We pick on the little guys. We don't leave them alone. Why do I do it? To have fun. To really have fun."

Other troubling discoveries also emerge from Ross' research.

One is that the child who is being bullied often does not tell his or her parents. They are too afraid, ashamed, or discouraged.

Secondly, when parents complain to the schools about bullying, "generally, little is done to correct the problem and school officials react with total indifference, although sometimes they go as far as to blame the victim."

In the wake of the recent school shootings, however, this may be changing and not a minute too soon.

Not only do schools need to set up procedures for conscientiously dealing with individual instances of bullying, they must also create a whole school approach.

A single school assembly will not solve the problem. Every school, elementary or secondary, needs to create a formal code of conduct. And every adult in the school, every student, and every parent should be well briefed in the code as well as the consequences for not living up to it.

What's more, students, teachers, and school support staff must be trained in how to intervene effectively. Eliminate the silent bystanders, and we go a long way to eliminating bullying.

Every time an adult does not speak out or intervene when witnessing the bullying or harassment of a student, they are complicit in that abuse.

Another theme from the research is that bullying can become particularly virulent if the victim is thought to be gay or lesbian. We must incorporate this knowledge into our anti-bullying efforts.

Bullying may be as old as the hills, but resources exist today from NEA and other organizations to help adults prevent it. In fiction, Harry Potter possessed magical powers to silence his bully—the abominable Dudley Dursley. In real life, children don't have such magic at their disposal. Caring adults and concerned communities are all that kids have to protect them.

#### RECOMMENDATION NO. A.7

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the attached resolution authorizing participation by the District in the 2001-02 Pooled Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes (TRANS) Program sponsored by the Los Angeles County Schools Pooled Financing Program for an amount not to exceed \$15,000,000.

COMMENTS: By passing the Resolution, the District will have the opportunity to participate in the Cash Reserve Program sponsored by the Los Angeles County Schools Pooled Financing 2001-02 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes Program. For 2001-02, the District has elected to participate in the 15-month TRANS issue offered by the Los Angeles County Schools Pooled Financing Program, which will result in more interest for the District.

TRANS are short-term debt instruments issued by school districts throughout the State to create an additional reserve to the General Fund - Unrestricted. In this District, the reserve will act as a cushion to the General Fund - Unrestricted in the event that the District experiences temporary cash flow needs. These cash flow needs may occur as a result of the timing mismatch between the receipt of revenues and the expenditure of General Fund - Unrestricted monies.

The Cash Reserve Program involves each district issuing a Tax and Revenue Anticipation Note. These notes are then sold to investors by the Program's underwriter. The notes have a maturity length of 15 months and are sold in the marketplace to investors who purchase tax-exempt securities. The proceeds of the notes are reinvested in taxable investments (although only in the highest credits - AA or AAA rated entities) with a corresponding maturity length. The notes are sold at interest rates that are below the rate at which the proceeds are reinvested.

Since both the interest cost and reinvestment rates are

guaranteed, the District is not exposed to any market risk of ups or downs in interest rates during the term of the issue that may affect the economics of the transaction. If the investment rate on the note proceeds does not exceed the interest and issuance costs, the District is under no obligation to participate nor obligated for costs of issuance.

Adoption of the Resolution does not obligate the District to participate in the Program. It simply moves the process forward by delegating to the administration the ability to "OK" the rates on the issue at the time of sale.

For the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District, this involves approximately \$1.9 million dollars. SB 6 calls for the elimination of this factor from the funding formula, which in turn would provide \$1.9 million dollars more of unrestricted funds to this School District.

# RESOLUTION 00-13 IN SUPPORT OF SB 6 (O'Connell) Eliminate the PERS Revenue Limit Reductions

WHEREAS, In a funding shift created to help mitigate the state's fiscal crisis in 1982-83, the State of California recaptured from school districts and county offices of education any "savings" resulting from annual reductions in the employer contribution rate to the Public Employees Retirement System (PERS) for classified employees.

WHEREAS, This antiquated "one-time" PERS reduction has become a permanent feature of K-12 revenue limit calculations, and the amount has escalated as the PERS savings has grown to over \$500 million.

WHEREAS, State law requires that the PERS reduction in a school agency's revenue limit apportionment equals the school agency's PERS savings in that year.

WHEREAS, Statewide, school districts lose over \$500 million a year due to the State's continued offset and it is estimated that in 2000-01, that amount is expected to be close to \$550 million. These are unrestricted dollars that school agencies would otherwise be able to use to address local priorities.

WHEREAS, All other public (non-school agency) employers were able to reduce expenditures when the PERS employee rate declined down to zero, and so are able to spend the savings on local priorities. By contrast, school employers have an offsetting revenue loss and receive no net savings -- in effect, a backdoor tax on public education and an inequitable situation between school agencies and other local governmental agencies.

WHEREAS, the PERS Reduction creates a fiscal disincentive for school agencies to hire classified employees since a school agency must "contribute" 13.02% to the State of its classified employee payroll.

WHEREAS, SB 6, (O'Connell) would eliminate the PERS Reduction, thereby freeing up to \$550 million to school districts and county offices of education to spend on local priorities;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the governing board of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District supports SB 6, (O'Connell) which provides local educational agencies with local control by eliminating the PERS Reduction.

COMMENTS: The following resolution authorizes the sale of the remaining \$4 million of Proposition X General Obligation Bonds. The resolution has been prepared by the District's bond counsel, O'Melveny & Myers LLP.

The resolution refers to the following additional documents:

- 1. Preliminary Official Statement This document contains information about the bonds being offered, the issuer and the sources of repayment of the bonds offered. In addition, the document highlights risks of which a potential investor should be aware. The Preliminary Official Statement is an offering circular used by the issuer and the underwriter to inform the marketplace of the terms of the bonds being issued prior to the determination of interest rates and purchase price in a negotiated sale. Prepared by Financial Advisor, Sutro & Co.
- 2. Bond Purchase Agreement In a negotiated sale, the Bond Purchase Agreement is an agreement between an issuer and an underwriter or a group of underwriters (a syndicate or selling group) who have agreed to purchase the issue at a negotiated price set forth therein. The Bond Purchase Agreement generally contains: (I) certain terms of the bonds, such as interest rates, maturities and redemption provisions; (ii) the circumstances under which the underwriter may cancel its obligation to purchase the bonds; and, (iii) the conditions to the closing of the issue, which often include documents,

certificates and opinions which are to be delivered on the closing date. Prepared by Financial Advisor, Sutro & Co.

## RECOMMENDATION NO. A.11

It is recommended that the Board of Education (1) approve the following resolution to apply for the Lower Emission School Bus Replacement and Retrofit Program and (2) allocate, from the 2001-02 District budget, \$32,234.92, as the District's match requirement, if the SCAQMD awards the District a grant for an alternative fueled school bus and further, the Board supports Rule 1195 as currently proposed by the SCAQMD.

#### Comments:

The State of California has allocated \$50 million to the California Air Resources Board (ARB) to fund a Lower-Emission School Bus Replacement and Retrofit Program. The program is designed to replace older, in-use, high-emitting diesel school buses with lower-emission new buses.

To be eligible for funding from this program, districts are required to pay up to 25% of the cost of a new bus, or a maximum of \$25,000. In addition, the districts must pay the cost for vehicle upgrades to meet specific district requirements. As part of the grant application, Board approval to apply for the grant must be given by April 30, 2001; and the Board must commit the required local matching funds in order for the grant application to be accepted for consideration.

Grant funding is available for replacing 1987 buses or older. The District currently has five (5) buses that would qualify for the grant. One (1) of the buses is scheduled for replacement within the next two years. The remaining four buses are in good mechanical condition and will provide reasonable operating service for at least the next five years.

Based on the District's bus specifications, the District's cost for a Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) school bus would be \$32,234.92, and the SCAQMD would pay the remaining \$110,394.90 of the purchase.

As an alternative to the CNG fuel, a green diesel engine (low sulfur) was certified for this program last week. The green diesel engine bus is so new that no purchase price has been established. The District is anticipating that the purchase price will be comparable to the CNG price. Staff is applying for both a green diesel and a CNG powered bus because it is unknown how the grants will be awarded. By applying for both, the District may have the option to choose which vehicle to purchase. If given the opportunity, the School District should elect to purchase the green diesel powered bus, because it has a greater driving range than a CNG powered bus. This is an important consideration for this school district because of extended distance field trips and "emergency" route lengths when PCH is closed.

In addition to the school bus replacement program, the School District is also applying for the Particulate Matter Retrofit Program, and a Fueling Infrastructure Grant.







over January 1998 to February 2001 Los Angeles Fuel Prices Averaged




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

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# Rear-view regulators

**Pollution:** School bus engines must be cleaned up, but there is a sensible way to do the job.

o-called clean diesels, using low-sulphur fuel and filters, produce fewer emissions than engines burning compressed natural gas (CNG). They also cost less. So why, then, are local regulators trying to force schools to buy CNG buses?

They must be looking in a rear-view mirror. Old diesel buses are dirty, and the sooner they are gone the better. There is no question that CNG would be a great improvement.

The problem is that CNG buses cost up to \$30,000 more than the new clean diesels, plus the cost of expensive new fueling systems needed to keep them rolling. And, as clean as CNG buses are, they produce up to 10 times as much carbon monoxide as a high-tech diesel.

This is not theory, it is fact. San Diego schools have been using clean diesels for a year, and in Europe clean diesels have been operated for up to 300,000 miles without maintenance or performance problems. Clean diesels have been endorsed by the federal Environmental Protection Agency and the state Air Resources Board. An attorney for the Natural Resources Defense Council has said that in the council's view, clean-diesel technology will be the biggest air-pollution advance in a generation.

Yet on April 20, the South Coast Air

Quality District board intends to approve an edict known as Rule 1195, which would give school districts no choice in the matter. Henceforth, schools would be required to buy only CNG buses. No clean diesels.

The agency says it will make exceptions for school districts that can't find public funding for the more costly CNG buses. But it offers no help in paying for CNG fueling systems, which could cost a school district hundreds of thousands of dollars that otherwise would be spent on education or on cleaning up old bus engines.

Retrofitting, incidentally, is where the smog agency could make a real difference. For only \$6,000, dirty diesels can be outfitted with a filter that will dramatically reduce harmful emissions. For the price of one new CNG bus, 20 old ones can be cleaned up.

Replacing the 9,337 school buses within the South Coast district alone with new CNG buses would take many years and cost a billion dollars. So far, the state has offered a one-time allocation of only \$50 million for all of California, and even that has been frozen because of the billions being spent on the energy crisis.

The smog agency people may mean well and they certainly have accomplished much in helping to cleanse Southern California's smoggy skies. But when it comes to buses, they should look at present technology, not the past; set standards, not fuel specifications, and give school officials enough latitude to make wise choices.

The obvious choice is clean diesel.

Dear Mr. Burke:

We are pleased to submit the enclosed petitions, signed by 44 representatives of 31 school districts and 2 school bus contractors from throughout the South Coast Air Quality Management District (four petitions, one for each county within the District). We respectfully request that Proposed Rule 1195 be amended to allow school districts to purchase any new buses that qualify under the California Air Resources Board's guidelines.

As currently written, Rule 1195 will require school districts to purchase only CNG-powered buses, unless certain ambiguous exemptions are met. Under this scenario, AQMD will be forcing schools to divert scarce dollars from the classroom to transportation. This will have the unintended consequence of actually keeping a greater number of older, dirty diesel buses on the road longer.

We appreciate staff's attempts to address the education community's concerns through recent revisions to the draft rule. But the financial exemptions provided for the incremental purchase price and infrastructure are woefully inadequate to cover the true expenses that must be incurred by school districts to support even a small number of CNG buses, both in the short term and over the life of the fleet. The infrastructure exemption based on \$8,000 per bus is not enough and does not cover, for example, the installation of refueling facilities or maintenance facility upgrades if only a few buses are replaced at a time. Other uncovered costs include but are not limited to: practical, permanent refueling stations (which may or may not include land costs); garage modifications essential for safety reasons; increased maintenance and training costs; and skyrocketing CNG fuel costs.

The additional money will have to come from somewhere. That "somewhere" will be books, computers, teachers' salaries, building repairs and other important expenses.

CARB recently voted to allow school districts to choose either CNG or clean diesel buses, allocating funds equally between the two technologies in its Lower-Emission School Bus Replacement Program. A key factor in that decision was CARB staff's conclusion that for the same amount of money, school districts could purchase a significantly higher number of CARB-certified clean diesel school buses and achieve substantially greater emissions reductions than if the funds had been spent on CNG (see attached bar graph).

We are not alone in our opposition to Rule 1195 as written. The Association of California School Administrators (ACSA), the School Transportation Coalition, and dozens of other education officials and school districts are all on record advocating that Rule 1195 be fuel-neutral.

We share a common goal: getting the maximum number of old, high polluting buses off the road as quickly as possible and replacing them with cleaner, safer buses. The surest way to achieve this goal is to give local school districts the flexibility to choose the most cost-effective, practical technology that meets their individual needs, provided CARB's emissions guidelines are met.

Please help us achieve the cleanest possible air in the shortest amount of time for our students and communities. Amend Rule 1195 to give local districts the same choices allowed other by CARB.

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

The purpose of this alert is to notify you of two issues related to the South Coast Air Quality Management Districts' (AOMD) clean school bus program.

## AQMD School Bus RFP

The AQMD has released its RFP for the clean school bus program. The program is the local administration of state funds allocated last year for clean school buses. Applications are due no later than April 3. An authorizing resolution from your board approving the matching funds must be included with the application. Copies of the application can be obtained at www.aqmd.gov/hb/attachments/010212b.doc.

Note: Funding for this program has been temporarily tied up due to the ongoing energy crises. The Governor recently withheld state funds for temporary use to offset energy costs. We expect funding to resume in the future. Nevertheless, the AQMD is holding to it's April 3 deadline - so you want to make sure your hat is in the ring.

## **Proposed Rule 1195**

The AQMD recently issued proposed rule 1195. PR 1195 is set for a vote by the AQMD board on April 20. ACSA, along with the school Transportation Coalition, is opposed to PR 1195. We urge you to:

- 1. Write and/or contact the AQMD regarding your opposition to the
- 2. Contact your local AQMD board representative directly re: your opposition.

ACSA is opposed for the following reasons:

 AQMD's proposed rule is not fuel-neutral. It places too much emphasis on natural gas vehicles. This will ultimately cost districts millions in additional procurement, facilities and maintenance costs. The AQMD's proposed rule should mirror that of the California Air Resources Board.

- AQMD's proposed regulation would force districts to buy more costly buses and
  equipment. At present, the only place to get such funding is from the classroom. It is
  important to note that even if public funds are available for the actual purchase of CNG
  buses, they will not begin to absorb the cost of turning over the entire fleet, nor will they
  significantly defray the increased infrastructure, maintenance and operating costs
  associated with CNG.
- Rule 1195 will deprive school districts of the flexibility to balance environmental, safety, and economic considerations for their students and personnel. It will hinder south coast school districts from replacing their aging school bus fleets.
- In view of the current energy crisis and the associated impacts on our classroom budgets, it is more important than ever that districts have the option to make the most cost-effective and practical transportation choices for their particular needs.

You may have received information from the National Resources Defense Council regarding this issue. We believe that the NRDC's information does not reflect all sides of this issue. ACSA'S opposition to PR 1195 remains steadfast.

# Proposed Rule 1195. Clean On-Road School Buses

## a. Purpose

For public and private fleets of school buses operating in the South Coast Air Quality Management (District), this rule requires, that when adding or replacing school buses in their fleet, public and private school bus fleet operators acquire alternative-fueled school buses when procuring or leasing new school buses or to retrofit used or existing school buses with a California Air Resources Board (CARB) approved control device(s) to reduce air toxic and criteria pollutant emissions.

# b. Applicability

This rule applies to those school bus fleets with 15 or more school buses, operating in the District by public and private entities. This rule shall not apply to vehicles or services pursuant to subdivision (e) or to school bus fleets located outside of the District that transport passengers that reside outside of the District into the District for purposes of field trips or other student-related events.

#### c. Definitions

For purposes of this rule, the following definitions shall apply:

- 1. ALTERNATIVE-FUELED ENGINE OR SCHOOL BUS means any engine or school bus that uses compressed or liquefied natural gas, propane, methanol, electricity, fuel cells, or other advanced technologies that do not rely on diesel fuel, and has been certified by the CARB.
- 2. APPROVED CONTROL DEVICE(S) is an exhaust control device(s) that is verified or certified by CARB to reduce particulate matter and possibly other precursor emissions. For the purposes of this rule, a new school bus equipped with approved control devices means that the engine family has been certified by CARB. A pre-owned school bus equipped with approved control devices means that the device has been verified or certified by CARB. To be considered fitted with an approved control device(s), all diesel exhaust from the vehicle must be vented through such a device(s) that has been fitted at the time of vehicle purchase. The vehicle equipped with such a control device must use diesel fuel with a sulfur content no greater than 15 ppm by weight.
- 3. HEAVY-DUTY VEHICLE means any vehicle having a gross vehicle weight of at least 14,000 pounds.
- 4. LOW-EMISSION VEHICLE (LEV) means any vehicle certified to lowemission standards set forth in the "California Exhaust Emission

Standards and Test Procedures for 1988-2000 Model Passenger Cars, Light-Duty Trucks, and Medium-Duty Vehicles" and "California Exhaust Emission Standards and Test Procedures for 2001 and Subsequent Model Passenger Cars, Light-Duty Trucks, and Medium-Duty Vehicles," as incorporated by reference in Sections 1960.1(k) and 1961(d), Title 13, California Code of Regulations.

- 5. MEDIUM-DUTY VEHICLE means any vehicle having a gross vehicle weight of more than 6,000 pounds and less than 14,000 pounds.
- 6. PUBLIC OR PRIVATE SCHOOL BUS FLEET OPERATOR is a person who owns, leases, or operates substantially school buses in the District. A person is any public or private entity responsible for administering and managing school bus transportation services.
- 7. <u>RETROFITTED-REPOWERED</u> SCHOOL BUS means an existing, preowned school bus that has been converted to run on an alternative fuel or repowered with a new alternative-fueled engine.
- 8. SCHOOL BUS means any vehicle used for the express purpose of transporting students through Grade 12 from home to school as defined in California Vehicle Code Section 545. For the purposes of this rule, a school bus can be a Type A (A-I or A-II), B, C, or D school bus. A Type A or B school bus typically runs on either gasoline or diesel fuel and is considered a medium-duty vehicle. A Type A school bus is a conversion or body constructed upon a van-type or cutaway front-section vehicle with a left side driver's door with a gross vehicle weight rating of more than 10,000 pounds (Type A-I) or a gross vehicle weight rating less than 10,000 pounds (Type A-II). A Type A school bus is capable of transporting 10 to 24 passengers. A Type B school bus is a conversion or body constructed upon a van or front-section vehicle chassis, or stripped chassis, with a gross vehicle weight rating of more than 10,000 pounds. A Type C school bus is a heavy-duty vehicle with a front mounted engine and is capable of transporting 42 to 72 passengers. A Type D school bus is a heavy-duty vehicle with a rear mounted engine and is capable of transporting 66 or more passengers.
- 9. ULTRA-LOW-EMISSION VEHICLE (ULEV) means any vehicle certified to ultra-low-emission standards set forth in the "California Exhaust Emission Standards and Test Procedures for 1988-2000 Model Passenger Cars, Light-Duty Trucks, and Medium-Duty Vehicles" and "California Exhaust Emission Standards and Test Procedures for 2001 and Subsequent Model Passenger Cars, Light-Duty Trucks, and Medium-Duty Vehicles," as incorporated by reference in Sections 1960.1(k) and 1961(d), Title 13, California Code of Regulations.

10. VEHICLE means any self-propelled, motorized device that is permitted to operate on public roads through Department of Motor Vehicle registration.

# d. Fleet Requirements

Beginning 60 days after adoption of this rule,

- 1. For public or private school bus fleet operators with 15 or more school buses upon adoption of this ruleFor purchases or leases of newly manufactured school buses, all additions to an existing fleet, or formation of a new fleet, by a public or private school bus fleet operator with 15 or more school buses shall be by purchase or lease of:
  - A. For <u>newly manufactured</u> Type A or B school buses that are considered medium-duty vehicles, certified by CARB as equivalent ULEV or cleaner non-diesel powered school buses, when adding or replacing vehicles to their vehicle fleet.
  - B. For <u>newly manufactured</u> Type B, C or D school buses that are considered heavy-duty vehicles, alternative-fueled school buses, when adding or replacing school buses to their vehicle fleet.
  - C. For existing, pre-owned Type A or B school buses that are considered medium-duty vehicles, certified by CARB as equivalent LEV or cleaner non-diesel powered school buses, when adding or replacing vehicles to their vehicle fleet.
  - D. For existing, pre-owned Types B, C or D school buses that are considered heavy-duty vehicles, repowered school buses or alternative-fueled school bus, when adding or replacing school buses to their vehicle fleet.
- 2. Public or private school bus fleet operators with 15 or more but less than 50 school buses may begin compliance with the provisions of Paragraph (d)(1):For purchases or leases of existing, pre-owned school buses, all additions to an existing fleet, or formation of a new fleet, by a public or private school bus fleet operator with 15 or more school buses shall be by purchase or lease of:
  - A. Beginning July 1, 2002 if the operator equips 25 percent of the school buses in the existing fleet with approved control devices no later than March 1, 2002. The diesel-powered school bus must be equipped with an approved control device if the school bus relies on diesel fuel. The school bus fleet operator may apply for external funding if available, to cover the cost to equip the school bus. For Type A or B school buses that are considered medium-duty vehicles, certified by CARB as equivalent LEV or cleaner non-diesel powered school buses, when adding or replacing vehicles to their vehicle fleet.

B. Beginning July 1, 2003 if the operator equips an additional 25 percent of the school buses in the existing fleet with approved control devices no later than January 1, 2003. The diesel-powered school bus must be equipped with an approved control device if the school bus relies on diesel fuel. The school bus fleet operator may apply for external funding if available, to cover the cost to equip the school bus. For Types B, C or D school buses that are considered heavy duty vehicles, retrofitted school buses or alternative fueled school bus, when adding or replacing school buses to their vehicle fleet.

# e. Exemptions

The provisions of this rule shall not apply to the following:

- 1. A public school bus fleet operator may purchase a Type A or B school bus that is not certified by CARB as ULEV or cleaner; or a Type C or D school bus that is not an alternative-fueled school bus as required under subdivision (d) if of this rule, if sufficient grant funding or external sources of funding beyond that of the school district's fiscal budget is not available to fully offset the differential purchase cost of an alternative-fueled school bus that complies with subdivision (d) compared to the cost of a new [or, pre-existing if the purchase is considered under subparagraph (d)(2)] conventionally-fueled diesel-powered school bus equipped with an approved control device. The operator shall purchase an "cleaner intermediate diesel school bus" as defined in the latest version of the Statewide Lower-Emission School Bus Program (adopted by CARB December 2000) if funding is available for such a purchase. The cleaner intermediate diesel school bus must be certified by CARB as part of the Statewide Lower-Emission School Bus Program. If funding is not available, the operator shall consider the viability of a gasoline-powered school bus and submit supporting documentation as to the reasons for the need to purchase a diesel-powered school bus if the diesel-powered school bus is the final choice. The diesel-powered school bus must be equipped with an approved control device if the school bus relies on diesel fuel.
- 2. Notwithstanding subparagraph (e)(1) and prior to January 1, 2004, if a public school district does not receive external funding (beyond the public school district's financial budget) of at least \$8,000 per alternative-fuel school bus purchased to build a new alternative-fuel refueling station and to upgrade an existing maintenance facility to required standards to handle alternative-fueled school buses, the public school bus fleet operator may purchase a diesel-powered school bus. For the purpose of this provision, any external funding other than funds to cover the incremental cost of the purchase of the alternative-fueled school bus or offered by a publicly-funded incentives program, shall be considered to be available to cover the cost of a new alternative-fuel refueling station. If the school bus is diesel powered, the school bus shall be equipped with an

- approved control device if external funding beyond the public school district's financial budget is made available.
- 3. <u>Upon demonstration to the Executive Officer that an alternative-fueled or gasoline-powered engine/chassis/body configuration is not commercially available in a specific bus size or could be used on a specific fixed bus route, a diesel-powered school bus equipped with an approved control device may be purchased in that specific bus size or as needed for the specific fixed bus route.</u>
- 4. Prior to January 1, 2004 or implementation of any state or federal regulations requiring retrofitting of existing school buses, whichever occurs earlier, a private school bus fleet operator may purchase a Type A or B school bus that is not certified by CARB as ULEV or cleaner; or a Type C or D school bus that is not an alternative-fueled school bus as required under subdivision (d) if this rule, if sufficient grant funding or external sources of funding beyond that of the private school bus fleet operator's fiscal budget is not available to fully offset the differential purchase cost of an alternative-fueled school bus that complies with subdivision (d) compared to the cost of a new [or, pre-existing if the purchase is considered under subparagraph (d)(2)] diesel-powered school bus. To purchase such a school bus, the private contractor shall:
  - A. <u>equip the new school bus with an approved control device at the</u> expense of the private school bus fleet operator; and
  - B. install on at least 15 percent of the diesel-powered school buses in the existing fleet with approved control devices on a yearly basis until the existing fleet consists of rule-compliant vehicles. Funding for the installation of approved control devices shall be at the expense of the private school bus fleet operator; however, the private school bus fleet operator may apply for external funding to offset the cost of the approved control device. To the extent that external funding is made available that would allow a private school bus fleet operator to install approved control devices on more than 15 percent in any given year, the private school bus fleet operator shall install such devices.
- 1. A public or private school bus fleet operator may purchase a pre-owned school bus that does not meet the requirements of subdivision (d) if the oldest school bus in the operator's existing school bus fleet is scrapped or otherwise removed permanently from operation. The pre-owned school bus must be no older than five (5) years at the date of purchase. The pre-owned school bus shall be equipped with an approved control device at the expense of the school bus fleet operator. However, the school bus fleet operator may apply for external funding to offset any additional costs if such funding is available.
- 2. If during the year that school is in session, a public or private school bus fleet operator needs additional school buses due to unforeseen circumstances to operate during that school year, the operator may lease

the needed quantity of school buses that do not comply with the provisions of subdivision (d) for the months necessary to purchase or lease school buses compliant to subdivision (d), not to exceed the remaining portion of the school year, if a demonstration is made that the rule-compliant school bus cannot be deployed by the school bus fleet operator within one month from the date of order.

3. For purposes of this rule, a private school bus fleet operator is not deemed to have purchased, leased, added to, or formed a new fleet if the private school bus fleet operator, as part of a purchase or merger with another private school bus fleet operator that provides contracted school bus transportation services, transfers ownership of school buses that are already operating in the District at the time of the purchase or merger.

4. Contract agreements signed prior to the date of adoption of this rule for the purchase or lease of school buses. Diesel-powered school buses purchased under this provision shall be equipped with approved control devices to the extent that external funding is available for the approved control device. This provision shall not apply to unsigned options to be executed at a future date under the contract agreement.

5. Prior to January 1, 2003 and upon demonstration to the Executive Officer that an alternative-fuel refueling station for alternative-fueled school buses is not available within five miles of the vehicle storage or maintenance yards and the private school bus fleet operator has not received external funding (beyond the private school bus fleet operator's fiscal budget) of at least \$8,000 per alternative-fueled school bus purchased to build a new alternative-fuel refueling station, a public or private school bus fleet operator may purchase or lease school buses that are not alternative-fueled school buses as required under subdivision (d) if this rule. The operator shall purchase an "cleanerintermediate diesel school bus" as defined in the latest version of the Statewide Lower-Emission School Bus Program (adopted by CARB December 2000) if funding is available for such a purchase. The cleanerintermediate diesel school bus must be certified by CARB as part of the Statewide Lower-Emission School Bus Program. If funding is not available, the operator shall consider the viability of a gasoline-powered school bus and submit supporting documentation as to the reasons for the need to purchase a diesel-powered school bus if the diesel-powered school bus is the final choice. The diesel-powered school bus must be equipped with an approved control device if the school bus relies on diesel fuel.

6. For the purpose of transporting passengers on field trips outside of the jurisdiction of the District and when the remainder of the fleet consists of school buses that meet the requirements of subdivision (d), no more than 10 percent of the school buses or five (5) school buses for school bus fleets with less than 50 school buses, that do not meet the requirements of Subdivision subdivision (d) of this rule may be part of the fleet at any given time. Such vehicles shall be equipped with approved control

- <u>devices</u> if the vehicles are <u>diesel-powered</u> and external funding is available.
- 7. For purposes of this rule, a private school bus fleet operator is not deemed to have purchased, leased, added to, or formed a new fleet if the private school bus fleet operator, as part of a purchase or merger with another private school bus fleet operator that provides contracted school bus transportation services, transfers ownership of school buses that are already operating in the District at the time of the purchase or merger.
- 8. Contract agreements signed prior to the date of adoption of this rule for the purchase or lease of school buses. Diesel-powered school buses purchased under this provision shall be equipped with approved control devices to the extent that external funding is available for the approved control device. This provision shall not apply to unsigned options to be executed at a future date under the contract agreement.
- 9. (2) Prior to January 1, 2003 and upon demonstration to the Executive Officer that an alternative-fuel refueling station for alternative-fueled school buses is not available within five miles of the vehicle storage or maintenance yards and the private school bus fleet operator has not received external funding (beyond the private school bus fleet operator's fiscal budget) of at least \$8,000 per alternative-fueled school bus purchased to build a new alternative-fuel refueling station, a public or private school bus fleet operator may purchase or lease school buses that are not alternative-fueled school buses as required under subdivision (d) if this rule. The operator shall purchase an "eleanerintermediate diesel school bus" as defined in the latest version of the Statewide Lower-Emission School Bus Program (adopted by CARB December 2000) if funding is available for such a purchase. The cleaner intermediate diesel school bus must be certified by CARB as part of the Statewide Lower-Emission School Bus Program. If funding is not available, the operator shall consider the viability of a gasoline-powered school bus and submit supporting documentation as to the reasons for the need to purchase a diesel-powered school bus if the diesel-powered school bus is the final choice. The diesel-powered school bus must be equipped with an approved control device if the school bus relies on diesel fuel.
- 10. (3) For the purpose of transporting passengers on field trips outside of the jurisdiction of the District and when the remainder of the fleet consists of school buses that meet the requirements of subdivision (d), no more than 10 percent of the school buses or five (5) school buses for school bus fleets with less than 50 school buses, that do not meet the requirements of subdivision (d) of this rule may be part of the fleet at any given time. Such vehicles shall be equipped with approved control devices if the vehicles are diesel-powered and external funding is available.

# f. Compliance Auditing and Enforcement

1. The fleet operator shall provide at the request of the District any files and/or records created to comply with subdivision (d) including fleet-

specific information, such as a list of official Department of Motor Vehicles registrations, principal vehicle location, and manufacturer, model-year, model, and fuel type of each fleet vehicle. This provision shall not apply for records that have been in existence for more than one (1) year.

2. Any fleet operator seeking an exemption under subdivision (e) shall supply proof that their vehicle or fleet is exempted from this rule when

requested by the District.

3. Any fleet operator seeking an exemption under those portions of subdivision (e) that pertain to external funding availability shall apply for external funding or to external funding sources, identified annually by and with the assistance of the Executive Officer and demonstrate that funding is not available prior to the purchase or lease of school buses as allowed under subdivision (e).

g. Severability

If any provision of this rule is held by judicial order to be invalid, or invalid or inapplicable to any person or circumstance, such order shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this rule, or the validity or applicability of such provision to other persons or circumstances. In the event any of the exceptions to this rule is held by judicial order to be invalid, the persons or circumstances covered by the exception shall instead be required to comply with the remainder of this rule.

Proposed Rule 1195. Clean On-Road School Buses

a. Purpose

For public and private fleets of school buses operating in the South Coast Air Quality Management (District), this rule requires, that when adding or replacing school buses in their fleet, public and private school bus fleet operators acquire alternative-fueled school buses when procuring or leasing new school buses or to retrofit used or existing school buses with a California Air Resources Board (CARB) approved control device(s) to reduce air toxic and criteria pollutant emissions.

b. Applicability

This rule applies to those school bus fleets with 15 or more school buses, operating in the District by public and private entities. This rule shall not apply to vehicles or services pursuant to subdivision (e) or to school bus fleets located outside of the District that transport passengers that reside outside of the District into the District for purposes of field trips or other student-related events.

## c. Definitions

For purposes of this rule, the following definitions shall apply:

- 1. ALTERNATIVE-FUELED ENGINE OR SCHOOL BUS means any engine or school bus that uses compressed or liquefied natural gas, propane, methanol, electricity, fuel cells, or other advanced technologies that do not rely on diesel fuel, and has been certified by the CARB.
- 2. APPROVED CONTROL DEVICE(S) is an exhaust control device(s) that is verified or certified by CARB to reduce particulate matter and possibly other precursor emissions. For the purposes of this rule, a new school bus equipped with approved control devices means that the engine family has been certified by CARB. A pre-owned school bus equipped with approved control devices means that the device has been verified or certified by <u>CARB.</u> To be considered fitted with an approved control device(s), all diesel exhaust from the vehicle must be vented through such a device(s) that has been fitted at the time of vehicle purchase. The vehicle equipped with such a control device must use diesel fuel with a sulfur content no greater than 15 ppm by weight.
- 3. HEAVY-DUTY VEHICLE means any vehicle having a gross vehicle weight of at least 14,000 pounds.

- 4. LOW-EMISSION VEHICLE (LEV) means any vehicle certified to low-emission standards set forth in the "California Exhaust Emission Standards and Test Procedures for 1988-2000 Model Passenger Cars, Light-Duty Trucks, and Medium-Duty Vehicles" and "California Exhaust Emission Standards and Test Procedures for 2001 and Subsequent Model Passenger Cars, Light-Duty Trucks, and Medium-Duty Vehicles," as incorporated by reference in Sections 1960.1(k) and 1961(d), Title 13, California Code of Regulations.
- 5. MEDIUM-DUTY VEHICLE means any vehicle having a gross vehicle weight of more than 6,000 pounds and less than 14,000 pounds.
- 6. PUBLIC OR PRIVATE SCHOOL BUS FLEET OPERATOR is a person who owns, leases, or operates substantially school buses in the District. A person is any public or private entity responsible for administering and managing school bus transportation services.
- 7. <u>RETROFITTED REPOWERED SCHOOL</u> BUS means an existing, preowned school bus that has been converted to run on an alternative fuel or repowered with a new alternative-fueled engine.
- 8. SCHOOL BUS means any vehicle used for the express purpose of transporting students through Grade 12 from home to school as defined in California Vehicle Code Section 545. For the purposes of this rule, a school bus can be a Type A (A-I or A-II), B, C, or D school bus. A Type A or B school bus typically runs on either gasoline or diesel fuel and is considered a medium-duty vehicle. A Type A school bus is a conversion or body constructed upon a van-type or cutaway front-section vehicle with a left side driver's door with a gross vehicle weight rating of more than 10,000 pounds (Type A-I) or a gross vehicle weight rating less than 10,000 pounds (Type A-II). A Type A school bus is capable of transporting 10 to 24 passengers. A Type B school bus is a conversion or body constructed upon a van or front-section vehicle chassis, or stripped chassis, with a gross vehicle weight rating of more than 10,000 pounds. A Type C school bus is a heavy-duty vehicle with a front mounted engine and is capable of transporting 42 to 72 passengers.   - C. For existing, pre-owned Type A or B school buses that are considered medium-duty vehicles, certified by CARB as equivalent LEV or cleaner non-diesel powered school buses, when adding or replacing vehicles to their vehicle fleet.
  - D. For existing, pre-owned Types B, C or D school buses that are considered heavy-duty vehicles, repowered school buses or alternative-fueled school bus, when adding or replacing school buses to their vehicle fleet.
- 2. Public or private school bus fleet operators with 15 or more but less than 50 school buses may begin compliance with the provisions of Paragraph (d)(1):For purchases or leases of existing, pre-owned school buses, all additions to an existing fleet, or formation of a new fleet, by a public or private school bus fleet operator with 15 or more school buses shall be by purchase or lease of:
  - A. Beginning July 1, 2002 if the operator equips 25 percent of the school buses in the existing fleet with approved control devices provided funding beyond the School District's fiscal budget is available, no later than March 1, 2002. The diesel-powered school bus must be equipped with an approved control device if the school bus relies on diesel fuel. The school bus fleet operator may apply for external funding if available, to cover the cost to equip the school bus. For Type A or B school buses that are considered medium-duty vehicles, certified by CARB as equivalent LEV or cleaner non-diesel powered school buses, when adding or replacing vehicles to their vehicle fleet.

B. Beginning July 1, 2003 if the operator equips an additional 25 percent of the school buses in the existing fleet with approved control devices provided funding beyond the School District's fiscal budget is available, no later than January 1, 2003. The diesel-powered school bus must be equipped with an approved control device if the school bus relies on diesel fuel. The school bus fleet operator may apply for external funding if available, to cover the cost to equip the school bus. For Types B, C or D school buses that are considered heavy duty vehicles, retrofitted school buses or alternative-fueled school bus, when adding or replacing school buses to their vehicle fleet.

If during the year that school is in session, a public or private school bus fleet operator needs additional school buses due to unforeseen circumstances to operate during that school year, the operator may lease the needed quantity of school buses that do not comply with the provisions of subdivision (d) for the months necessary to purchase or lease school buses compliant to subdivision (d), not to exceed the remaining portion of the school year, if a demonstration is made that the rule-compliant school bus cannot be deployed by the school bus fleet operator within one month from the date of order.
- 3. For purposes of this rule, a private school bus fleet operator is not deemed to have purchased, leased, added to, or formed a new fleet if the private school bus fleet operator, as part of a purchase or merger with another private school bus fleet operator that provides contracted school bus transportation services, transfers ownership of school buses that are already operating in the District at the time of the purchase or merger.
- 4. Contract agreements signed prior to the date of adoption of this rule for the purchase or lease of school buses. Diesel-powered school buses purchased under this provision shall be equipped with approved control devices to the extent that external funding is available for the approved control device. This provision shall not apply to unsigned options to be executed at a future date under the contract agreement.
- 5. Prior to January 1, 2003 and upon demonstration to the Executive Officer that an alternative-fuel refueling station for alternative-fueled school buses is not available within five miles of the vehicle storage or maintenance yards and the private school bus fleet operator has not received external funding (beyond the private school bus fleet operator's fiscal budget) of at least \$8,000 per alternative-fueled school bus purchased to build a new alternative-fuel refueling station, a public or private school bus fleet operator may purchase or lease school buses that are not alternative-fueled school buses as required under subdivision (d) if this rule. The private operator shall purchase an "cleaner intermediate diesel school bus" as defined in the latest version of the Statewide Lower-Emission School Bus Program (adopted by CARB December 2000) if funding is available for such a purchase. The cleaner intermediate diesel school bus must be certified by CARB as part of the Statewide Lower-Emission School Bus Program. If funding is not available, the private operator shall consider the viability of a gasoline-powered school bus and submit supporting documentation as to the reasons for the need to purchase a diesel-powered school bus if the diesel-powered school bus is the final choice. The diesel-powered school bus must be equipped with an approved control device if the school bus relies on diesel fuel.
- 6. For the purpose of private operator's transporting passengers on field trips outside of the jurisdiction of the District and when the remainder of the fleet consists of school buses that meet the requirements of subdivision (d), no more than 10 percent of the school buses or five (5) school buses for

- school bus fleets with less than 50 school buses, that do not meet the requirements of Subdivision subdivision (d) of this rule may be part of the fleet at any given time. Such vehicles shall be equipped with approved control devices if the vehicles are diesel-powered and external funding is available.
- 7. For purposes of this rule, a private school bus fleet operator is not deemed to have purchased, leased, added to, or formed a new fleet if the private school bus fleet operator, as part of a purchase or merger with another private school bus fleet operator that provides contracted school bus transportation services, transfers ownership of school buses that are already operating in the District at the time of the purchase or merger.
- 8. Contract agreements signed prior to the date of adoption of this rule for the purchase or lease of school buses. Diesel-powered school buses purchased under this provision shall be equipped with approved control devices to the extent that external funding is available for the approved control device. This provision shall not apply to unsigned options to be executed at a future date under the contract agreement.
- 9. (2) Prior to January 1, 2003 and upon demonstration to the Executive Officer that an alternative-fuel refueling station for alternative-fueled school buses is not available within five miles of the vehicle storage or maintenance yards and the private school bus fleet operator has not received external funding (beyond the private school bus fleet operator's fiscal budget) of at least \$8,000 per alternative-fueled school bus purchased to build a new alternative-fuel refueling station, aA public or private school bus fleet operator may purchase or lease school buses that are not alternative-fueled school buses as required under subdivision (d) if this rule. The **public** operator shall purchase an "cleaner intermediate diesel school bus" as defined in the latest version of the Statewide Lower-Emission School Bus Program (adopted by CARB December 2000) if funding beyond the School District's fiscal budget is not available to fully offset the cost of required refueling infrastructure as determined by the school district, to include training of staff and other related improvements needed to the repair facilities, for such a purchase. The cleaner intermediate diesel school bus must be certified by CARB as part of the Statewide Lower-Emission School Bus Program. If funding is not available, the public operator shall consider the viability of a gasolinepowered school bus and submit supporting documentation as to the reasons for the need to purchase a diesel-powered school bus if the dieselpowered school bus is the final choice. The diesel-powered school bus must be equipped with an approved control device if the school bus relies on diesel fuel.
- 10. (3) For the purpose of transporting passengers on field trips outside of the jurisdiction of the District and when the remainder of the fleet consists of school buses that meet the requirements of subdivision (d), no more than 10 percent of the school buses or five (5)ten (10) school buses for public

school bus fleets with less than 50 (100) school buses, that do not meet the requirements of subdivision (d) of this rule may be part of the fleet at any given time. Such vehicles shall be equipped with approved control devices if the vehicles are diesel-powered and external funding is available.

11. When funding is made available through State grants or bonds that fund clean diesel technology, public and private operators within the jurisdiction of the District will be allowed to apply for such funds, and be consider in compliance of the rule.

## f. Compliance Auditing and Enforcement

- 1. The fleet operator shall provide at the request of the District any files and/or records created to comply with subdivision (d) including fleet-specific information, such as a list of official Department of Motor Vehicles registrations, principal vehicle location, and manufacturer, model-year, model, and fuel type of each fleet vehicle. This provision shall not apply for records that have been in existence for more than one (1) year.
- 2. Any fleet operator seeking an exemption under subdivision (e) shall supply proof that their vehicle or fleet is exempted from this rule when requested by the District.
- 3. Any fleet operator seeking an exemption under those portions of subdivision (e) that pertain to external funding availability shall apply for external funding or to external funding sources, identified annually by and with the assistance of the Executive Officer and demonstrate that funding is not available prior to the purchase or lease of school buses as allowed under subdivision (e).

## g. Severability

If any provision of this rule is held by judicial order to be invalid, or invalid or inapplicable to any person or circumstance, such order shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this rule, or the validity or applicability of such provision to other persons or circumstances. In the event any of the exceptions to this rule is held by judicial order to be invalid, the persons or circumstances covered by the exception shall instead be required to comply with the remainder of this rule.

(SMC) at its sole expense shall have the right to make such alternations and additions to any part of its portion of the Premises as (SMC) shall desire, provided that (SMC) shall obtain (SMMUSD's) prior written approval, which approval shall not be reasonably withheld, of any structural alterations or additions and which consent shall be conditional upon (SMC) having:...(iii) submitted to (SMMUSD) a complete set of final plans and specifications relating to such work."

#### RECOMMENDATION NO. A.26

It is recommended that the Board of Education enter into authorize staff to discuss a partnership with (LACOE) Los Angeles County Office of Education for the purpose of providing Head Start Services to eligible families within the District effective July 1, 2001.

COMMENT: Head Start is a federal grant program with a long history of providing comprehensive child development and support services to young children and families with incomes at or below the poverty level. partnership will be beneficial to CDS for several reasons. First it will extend the educational experience for children who stand to benefit significantly from this opportunity. Second, it will make additional revenue available to support a program that at present is insufficiently funded by State Department of Education.

#### Part-day Preschools

Through this partnership with LACOE, additional funding will become available to extend the day for some of our part-day preschool children from three hours to six and one-half hours daily. In essence the preschool day and elementary day will be the same, thus creating a much longer day for our preschool children before entering Kindergarten. This decision is grounded in the knowledge that prevention and preparation at an early age can have a positive effect on long-term outcomes for young children. There is a direct link between early childhood programs and improved school performance. These programs will begin on July 1, 2001 at selected summer sites. The full implementation will commence on the first day of school in September 2001 and match the school-year calendar. The number of eliqible families will be determined based on the 2001 Family Income Guidelines.

#### Full-day Preschool

A partnership with LACOE will further enable us to change the funding for some our full-day preschools so that Head Start funding can be matched with State funding to cover a part of the operating cost of the full-day preschools. Our current level of State funding alone is inadequate. This partnership will be a seamless experience for children and staff. The program change will be effective July 1, 2001.

A detailed budget and final agreement will follow for Board approval.

#### BACKGROUND INFORMATION

With the assurance of school and community participation, governance councils are required to develop comprehensive school improvement plans. Improvement plans are also used by the California Department of Education (CDE) as a tool to monitor a district's compliance in their use of state and federal categorical funds. #### Parcel Tax

The voters of Santa Monica and Malibu have passed a special tax to be levied on each privately owned parcel of land contained in the School District. The revenue from this tax is to be used to support the programs of the Santa Monica Malibu Unified School District (taxing agency).

The County of Los Angeles, Office of the Assessor, is the tax collecting agency. The tax collecting agency is responsible for correcting any errors in the tax collecting process. However, only the taxing agency (SMMUSD) has the authority to waive the tax or make a refund in the event of an inequality.

The following is a list of recognized conditions in which the parcel tax is considered onerous:

- 1. *Minimal Valuation*. The assessed value of the parcel is less than or equal to the amount of the tax levied.
- 2. *Combined Parcels*. Two or more parcels of less than 5,000 square feet each are combined to form one residential site and the special tax is collected on all parcels.

If a property owner feels that his/her situation meets one of the above conditions, he/she must send a letter to the SMMUSD Fiscal Services Office requesting relief from the parcel tax. This letter must be received by June 1st of the current tax year. Retroactive tax relief will not be considered. A copy of the current tax bill and grant deed must accompany the letter. Fiscal Services will verify the data received and, if it meets the aforementioned criteria, will issue a refund check to the property owner for the current tax period and prepare a Direct Assessment Correction List (due in July) for the County of Los Angeles, Office of Auditor-Controller (tax computing agency) to waive future tax fees on the parcel(s).

Any requests for relief which do not meet the stated criteria will be directed to the Board of Education for consideration.

# Beepers, Pagers, Cellular Phones and Other Electronic Signaling Devices

The Board of Education recognizes that beepers, pagers, cellular phones and other electronic signaling devices have become commonplace in our community and that many families have come to rely on these devices as a means of communication.

Nevertheless, California Education Code specifically prohibits the possession and/or use of any electronic signaling device that operates through the transmission or receipt of radio waves, including, but not limited to, paging and signaling equipment, by pupils of the school while the pupils are on campus, while attending school-sponsored activities, or while under the supervision and control of school district employees, without the prior consent of the principal or his or her designee. No pupil shall be prohibited from possessing or using an electronic signaling device that is determined by a licensed physician and surgeon to be essential for the health of a pupil and use of which is limited for purposes related to the health of the pupil.

The Superintendent shall establish procedures whereby the possession and/or use of these devices may be permitted, but only with the prior approval of the site administrator or designee. Under no circumstances shall the possession and/or use of any electronic signaling device be permitted if such possession and/or use is disruptive to the educational process

While electronic signaling devices of all types may be useful for communication purposes, the Board of Education also recognizes the potential for distraction that these devices may cause in the classroom, on campus and at school activities. As a result, the Board highly discourages pupils from possessing and/or using electronic signaling devices, except where the use of such a device is essential for the health of a pupil.

Regulations require that the uses of the funds be proposed by each school's site council. The proposals must then be approved by the Board. If the site councils and the Board do not reach agreement on the use of the funds by May 1, 2001, then the disputed funds revert back to the State.

On March 15, 2001, all site block grant expenditure plans, with the exception of Santa Monica High School, were approved by the Board of Education. The following materials are presented for Board review and consideration:

- A. A listing of the 2000-01 Site Block Grant Allocation per school; and,
- B. Santa Monica High School's plan which is based on expending \$30.00 per pupil. Actual expenditures will be less, based on actual State appropriations. Santa Monica High School's Site Governance Council approved the plan on March 20.

The expenditure plan has been provided to Members of the Board of Education under separate cover, and is available for public review in the Office of the Assistant Superintendent for Fiscal and Business Services.

#### DISCUSSION NO. D.1

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt revised Board Policy 6161.1, Selection and Evaluation of Instructional Materials.

COMMENTS: BP 6161.1 (Selection and Evaluation of Instructional Materials) is being recommended for updating as part of the Board's on-going work to establish, revise and update Board policies. This particular policy, if adopted, would replace in entirety existing BP 6161 (attached). The revised policy is recommended by the California School Board's Association (CSBA) as meeting the provisions of all new laws and regulations. The CSBA recommended policy was last updated in July, 2000. The SMMUSD Board of Education last updated/adopted this policy on September 24, 1990.

Instruction

# Selection and Evaluation of Instructional Materials

The Board of Education desires that district instructional materials, as a whole, present a broad spectrum of knowledge and viewpoints, reflect the ethnic and cultural diversity of our society, and enhance the use of multiple teaching strategies and technologies. The Board's adoption of instructional materials shall be based on a determination that such materials meet criteria specified in law and are an effective learning resource to help students acquire facts, skills and opinions and develop cognitive processes.

To ensure that instructional materials effectively support the district's adopted standards and courses of study and meet current curricular goals, the selection of textbooks, technology-based materials, other educational materials and tests shall be coordinated with the overall development and evaluation of the district's curriculum and be aligned with State standes and the general education goals of the District.

# Adopted instructional materials shall:

- Be selected according to their alignment with the state frameworks and standard the Α. general educational goals of the district.
- В. Be appropriate for the age, interests, abilities, learning styles, social development, and maturity levels of the students.
- C. Represent the diversity of religious, ethnic, political, and cultural vales held in a pluralistic society.
- D. Illustrate the contributions made by various groups to our national heritage and the world.
- Ε. Illustrate historical and contemporary forces in society to enable users to recognize and understand social, economic, personal, and political problems.
- Provide various points of view about issues, including those considered to be F. controversial.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a process by which instructional materials shall be reviewed for recommendation to the Board. This process shall involve teachers, in a substantial manner and shall also encourage the participation of parents/guardians and community members.

Individuals who participate in selecting and evaluating instructional materials shall have no financial interest in the materials being reviewed, recommended or approved. Incompatible activities and conflicts of interest related to the selection and evaluation of instructional materials shall be clearly identified in administrative regulations.

All recommended instructional materials shall be available for public inspection at the district office for a period of two weeks.

Complaints concerning instructional materials shall be handled in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation.

## SELECTION OF INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS

The Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District recognizes the rights inherent in the First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States and supports the principles of intellectual freedom expressed in the Library Bill of Rights and in Access to Resources and Services in the School Library Media Program. It is the policy of the district to provide information and instructional materials in classrooms and library media centers in accordance with constitutional protection. The Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District supports a process for the systematic review of instructional materials through established procedures.

Legal responsibility for the operation of the district including the supervision of the selection of educational instructional materials rests with the Board of Education. The Board of Education delegates the authority for the selection of instructional materials to the professional staff employed by the district. It is the responsibility of the professional staff to select and use instructional materials to implement the educational program of the school district. Instructional materials must serve both the breadth of the curriculum and the needs and interest of individual students by accommodating a wide range of abilities and respecting diverse points of view.

Educational suitability is the major criteria for the selection of instructional materials. Professional staff are to use educational criteria and professional judgement rather than personal opinions, values, and beliefs in the selection of instructional materials.

# Instructional Materials should:

- A. Be selected according to their alignment with the state frameworks and the general educational goals of the district.
- B. Be appropriate for the age, interests, abilities, learning styles, social development, and maturity levels of the students.
- C. Represent the diversity of religious, ethnic, political, and cultural values held in a pluralistic society.
- D. Illustrate the contributions made by various groups to our national heritage and the world.
- E. Illustrate historical and contemporary forces in society to enable users to recognize and understand social, economic, personal, and political problems.

F. Provide various points of view about issues, including those considered to be controversial.

Certificated library media personnel and teachers should consider:

- A. Literary and artistic merit; technical quality; and physical condition appropriate to format and intended use.
- B. Scope, arrangement, and organization, relevance of information, special features, and overall value to the collection.
- C. Selection of instructional materials for specific courses to be consistent with the educational goals of the district, the objectives of the course, and the characteristics of the students.
