VIII PUBLIC COMMENTS (20 minutes)

Public Comments is the time when members of the audience may address the Board of Education on items not scheduled on the meeting's agenda. All speakers are limited to three (3) minutes. When there is a large number of speakers, the Board may reduce the allotted time to two(2) minutes per speaker. The Brown Act (Government Code) states that Board members may not engage in discussion of issues raised during "VIII, Public Comments" except to ask clarifying questions, make a brief announcement, make a brief report on his or her own activities, or to refer the matter to staff. This Public Comment section is limited to 20 minutes. If the number of persons wishing to address the Board of Education exceeds the time limit, additional time will be provided in Section XVI, CONTINUATION OF PUBLIC COMMENTS.

Chuck Allord, Santa Monica - Mr. Allord addressed the Board under this section because Item Number A.15, Approval of Santa Monica College's Request to Initiate Modification of the Madison Site, was pulled at staff request. Mr. Allord represented a group of Santa Monica citizens, Neighbors for a Safer Santa Monica; this group are concerned solely with the environmental impact of the proposed Madison site modificiations on the geographic area of Lincoln Boulevard east to 20th Street, and Santa Monica Boulevard south to the I-10 Freeway. He requested that the Board, using its authority as Lessor, require the college to submit its proposal to the City of Santa Monica Planning Commission prior to approving the suggestion modifications. There was no response from the Board.

- B. Student Board Member Reports

Alexis Bolter, Malibu High School - reported on Malibu High's making it to CIF finals in Track and Field, the Prom of May 25, 2001, completion of all SAT9 and AP testing, the Night with Eli Weizel spent by 10th graders who had watched a special viewing of Schindler's List. Finally, Ms. Bolter invited the Board to attend 1940's Radio Night, which is being held on Friday and Saturday at 7:30 PM on the high school campus.

Joe Green, Santa Monica High School - reported on school-wide state testing, the second student blood drive, upcoming ASB elections, the delightful student production of <u>Grease</u>, (tickets are still available and everyone is encouraged to attend) Samohi participation in the Academic Decathlon, and the upcoming Prom. Jane Kennedy, Olympic High School - Ms Kennedy was excused to attend a GEMS banquet at which she was honored for outstanding student success.

SMMCTA Reports - Harry Keiley, SMMCTA President, reported on a recent STRS workshop that discussed State Assembly Bill 260, negotiations with district especially in regard to the Peer Assistance Review piece: Mr. Keiley asserted that SMMCTA was committed to seeing PAR as aan assistance model and not as an evaluation model. Mr. Keiley also distributed a handout, "SMMCTA and Highstakes Testing," a copy of which is attached to the permanent Minutes.

- D. SEIU Reports None.
- E. **PTA Council President Reports** Cheri Orgel, new PTA Council President, reported that the Council was effecting a smooth internal transition from past President Rick Gates. She additionally reported that the 33rd District PTA presented the retiring Rick with a certificate for his passion, dedication and wit, that the annual PTA breakfast was May 23 (all were invited), she reminded everyone of the going away party for Dr. Schimdt at the Museum of Flying June 11, and of the welcome reception for Superintendent-elect John Deasy to be held in Juan's Garden at the Adult Education Center, June 18th from 4:30 to 6:30.

Roosevelt PTA - Debbie Mulvaney, outgoing PTA President, introduced Lynn Leavitt, incoming President. Mrs. Leavitt reported on the PTA effort to help build home libraries, the Share-A-Lunch program at Ocean Park Community Center, the school's receipt of a Green Team grant from the City of Santa Monica, the very successful Boys and Girls Club Homework Club, \$2100 raised by the school bike ride for the Glazer Pediatric Foundation, and \$2000+ raised for UNICEF. Mrs. Mulvaney stated that the PTA was working with other schools in seeking broad community support (as well as support from the Board and the District) for the continuation of the Assistant Principal positions.

- F. **Prop X Oversight Committee** Jean Gebman, Committee Chair, reported that the committee was working diligently with district staff to effectively monitor the breadth and depth of Propr X activities. He also reported that, in light of Dr. Cohen's pending retirement, the committee is considering putting forth a proposal to the Board to hire two additional supervisory staff OR to hire a firm to oversee Jacobs' work. Dr. Gebman indicated that such a proposal would encompass the transition period only, if the committee deemed it ultimately prudent.
- G. Santa Monica-Malibu Education Foundation Ralph Mechur, representing SMMEF, reported that there was only good news. The Foundation has over \$40,000 in net proceeds from the recent drawing all of which will be used district-wide for academic enrichment. He also indicated that the Foundation had received over \$30,000 in recent grants which, again, will be used for enrichment programs throughout the district. Applications for grants are available on the SMMEF website.

X Superintendent's Report (10 minutes)

The Superintendent and/or Assistant Superintendents may report on items not requiring action by the board but are of interest to the Board and public.

Dr. Schmidt reported the following:

- 1) videos of the recent Stairway of the Stars production are available for purchase on the district's website; easy ordering directions are furnished
- 2) As part of prescribed transition process, Superintendent-elect John Deasy will be in the district from Friday, May 25, 2001, through June 2, 2001
- Jane Kennedy, Student Board Representative from Olympic High School, was honored at the Santa Monica-West Los Angeles Soroptimists banquet May 16, 2001. Ms. Kennedy received the organization's Youth Award and a stipend of \$500. Boardmember Maria Leon-Vazquez was in attendance, representing the Board.
- 4) SMMUSD has received over \$2 million in grants for instructional technology during the past two years. Grant sources included the California Department of Education, California Technology Assistance Project, the Los Angeles County Office of Education and AT &T.
- 5) June 2, 2001, there will be an all-day California Healthy Families/Medi-Cal Enrollment and Immunization Fair at Will Rogers Learning Academy. It is cosponsored by SMMUSD, The City of Santa Monica Social Services Commissions, Venice Family Clinic, St. John's Health Center and the Westside Women's Health Center. All are welcome.

The only commitment for the District is to allow the Los Angeles Chapter of the American Theater Organ Society to hold two (2) concerts per year in Barnum Hall and be charged a reduced rental rate for the use of the Hall. Dear Dr. Cohen:

Last month *Restore Barnum Hall!* persuaded an organ technician/restorer to come out and look at the pipe organ that was installed in Barnum Hall shortly after it opened in 1937. His conclusion was that the organ console and mechanism were not worth restoring, that only the metal pipes still had value. He estimated that to connect a new organ to those pipes would cost \$350,000 to \$400,000. Because the Barnum restoration still lacks about a half million dollars to pay for much more basic improvements such as finishing the balcony area, raising that much money for an organ is impractical.

Music Department ChairTerry Sakow started surfing the Internet to find someone who might like to buy our organ pipes—or at least remove them from Barnum for us (some of them are 18 feet long). He didn't find any takers, but he did make contact with people from the Los Angeles chapter of the American Theater Organ Association, whose sole purpose is to preserve the Wurlitzer theater organs that were built in the 1920s to accompany silent films. There aren't many of these organs around, because their production halted abruptly with the advent of talking films.

The theater organ people immediately thought of a physician in Palos Verdes Estates, Dr. Malin Dollinger, who would like to donate a \$250,000 Wurlitzer theater organ—the whole system, pipes and all—to a nonprofit organization. He is moving out of his house, where he has installed the organ, and has found a theater in Tuscon that wants the organ. However, when he learned about Barnum Hall, he appreciated the chance to have the organ within visiting distance. He used to be associated with St. John's Hospital, so he has some connection to Santa Monica. Another main attraction of giving the organ to Samohi is to expose members of a younger generation to the organ in hopes of keeping interest in these rare instruments alive.

I've enclosed a letter from Dr. Dollinger describing his intent to donate the organ to the district and a copy of a newspaper article about him and the organ, as well as copies of a Wurlitzer expert's assessment and appraisal of the organ. This same expert, Lyn Larsen, flew here from Phoenix a few weeks ago to inspect Barnum to see whether or not the organ chambers and other space would accommodate Dr. Dollinger's organ. Mr. Larsen is reasonably sure the organ can be installed in Barnum, assuming the one unsafe chamber he couldn't enter is the same size as the one on the other side of the stage.

It will cost approximately \$150,000 to move the organ and reinstall it in Barnum. This is additional money *Restore Barnum Hall!* would have to raise. We believe it can be done, especially because these American Theater Organ people are friends with some very wealthy organ aficionados. The organ wouldn't be ready to move for six months, and could wait longer if necessary.

The Los Angeles chapter of the American Theater Organ Society will maintain the organ in exchange for the ability to hold two concerts a year at Barnum at a reduced rental rate. They understand that the high school's needs come first in scheduling. There will be secure areas in the new addition to Barnum where the organ console could be stored when not in use.

At its meeting this week, the Samohi Site Governance Committee gave its approval to accepting this donation.

What Dr. Dollinger needs now is a letter from the district stating that it will accept the donation of the organ at the appropriate time. He has agreed that we can state our intention to accept the donation PROVIDED that the necessary funds to move and reinstall it have been raised and that a more exact measurement of the space at Barnum determines the organ will fit. Even though I've already given him the district's tax I.D. number and the IRS code sections that state donations to a school district are tax deductible, he'd probably like to see all that in writing too.

This is really an exciting opportunity for Barnum and Santa Monica High School. All four music teachers are thrilled at the prospect of performing works written for band, orchestra, or choir and organ. To have this instrument—which is a better organ than the original one was, even new—in Barnum would add another historical, as well as musical, dimension to the hall.

I hope at their next regular meeting, the board can approve sending this letter of intent, so Dr. Dollinger will be able to stop considering other recipients. I can be at the meeting to answer any questions.

We spoke today on the telephone, and you asked me to send you specific information about the Wurlitzer Pipe Organ in my home, that I am considering donating to "Barnum Hall" at Santa Monica High School. You have given me the Federal Tax ID numbers, and appropriate IRS code citations.

Enclosed is the appraisal from Lyn Larsen. Although this gives a "technical listing" of the component of the organ, and their value, I have included with this letter certain descriptive material, which may also be of value to you. This pipe organ has been the "showplace" of this community for 25 years, and has been the location of many concerts and silent motion picture events over the years. It has been a "labor of love" on my part, and I wish to see that its eventual home will be a suitable facility where the public can enjoy the wonderful music that can be created. I enclose various newspaper articles as well, to give you a "flavor" of the installation here.

I have spoken recently with Don Near, of the Orange County Theatre Organ Society, which maintains a similar pipe organ in Fullerton High School. That venue appears to be a remarkably similar situation. I would invite you and interested parties to be my guest here at a convenient time, so that you could see and hear the organ, and imagine the wondrous sound it would create in your auditorium.

Henry Hunt has been very helpful in this undertaking, and as I have expressed to him, it would be my intention to consider donation of this instrument to your facility, assuming that our mutual discussions are favorable. The value of the organ, incidentally, is slightly higher than that listed in Mr.Larsen's appraisal. There is some (optional) equipment that is not listed, some additional organ components in storage (not listed) and there are additional electronic voices and equipment that I have recently purchased, to add additional voices to the instrument, primarily digitally sampled from church organs. This further increases the utility and usefulness of the instrument.

Some of the enclosed written material describes some of the special features, not described in the appraisal. A recording and playback system allows digital recordings to be made, so that any organist's concert can be played back later without the organist being present. I have hundreds of hours of such recordings, and would be pleased to demonstrate this for you and your associates. I am looking forward to important and fruitful further discussions.

APPRAISAL

March 2, 2001

This document presents an assessment and appraisal of the Wurlitzer pipe organ located in the residence of Dr. & Mrs. Malin Dollinger, 700 Via Somonte, Palos Verdes Estates, California, 90274.

This report was prepared by Lyn Larsen, who personally inspected all parts of the pipe organ on January 16, 2001, and then again on February 28, 2001. A resume of Mr. Larsen's experience and pipe organ background is attached at the back of this report.

The instrument is a "theatre-style" pipe organ, predominantly Wurlitzer brand, made up of combined parts from various organs. The organ is controlled by a four-manual "french-style" Wurlitzer console (originally from the Paramount Theatre in Brooklyn, New York) and is finished in a dark mahogany wood color. The console contains 315 stop tablets operated by Syndyne electric actions, and a large number of additional buttons, switches, and mechanisms.

The organ is installed in two sound chambers that open into the living room. These two chambers are named "Main" and "Solo." Contained within these chambers are the various pipes, windchests, percussions, and rhythmic instruments (or "traps") that produce the sound. The wind pressure for the organ is supplied by a 10 horsepower, 220 volt Spencer Organ Blower, that is located in the basement.

The electrical switching and control system for the pipe organ is a modern electronic version, built by the Trousdale Organ Company, Santa Ana, California. This is a complete, three-part system that provides an organ relay system, a combination action system (which controls the stop tablets in the console), and a digital playback system which is controlled by both a magnetic tape deck and a PC computer.

The pipe organ is currently installed and in normal playing condition in the Dollinger residence. A full inventory of all the components that make up the organ will be listed within this appraisal, and will be designated by their location. At the end of the inventory listing, the current market value of the organ will be stated, and a breakdown of the various figures will be given.

Sit all cost. And if any guest thinks he'll get only a short set of answers before hearing Malin Dollinger play it, he may soon find that he's in for much, much more.

Like any man speaking of his personal obsession, Dollinger tells the curious about his "10year grand project," which culminated in the presence of the mighty giant in front of his living room window. The story includes a tour of his 56year-old house, too, to show the changes it endured so as to contain the console and its spaceeating components.

Through it all flows Dollinger's commentary on his specimen of a nearly extinct musical instrument. It's a story told maybe five times a month, and Dollinger tells it best.

"There aren't more than 50 organs of this size left in existence," he isaid, "and probably not 'more than 20 in people's houses. I know of only two in Los Angeles in people's houses. Mine is one, and my teacher's is the other.'

To be specific, his is a console with four manuals and 26 ranks. That means it has four keyboards and 26 sets of pipes. 

COMMENT: Board policy states that any purchase over \$35,000 need authorization from the Board of Education prior to release of the order.

Permission is therefore requested to purchase: twenty seven (27) Gateway Solo 5300 laptop computers, forty six (46) Gateway E-3400 desktop computers, networking cards, and two (2) laptop wireless carts from Gateway Computers; twenty (20) Power MAC G4 desktop computers, four (4) Ibook laptop computers and extended warranties, from Apple Computers, for Santa Monica High School. These computers are being purchased by funds supplied by the High School Education Technology Grant which funds technology purchases to accomplish a computer to student ratio of 4.75:1. Santa Monica High School was granted the funds to purchase three hundred fifty six (356) computers. This order completes the balance of computers needed to fulfill the grant.

It is further recommended that the Board of Education approve the purchase of: twenty (20) Power MAC G4 desktop computers, four (4) Ibook laptop computers and extended warranties, from Apple Computer, for Educational Services. The computers are being purchased for staff development under the Technology Mentor Teacher Leaders Grant.

Gateway was declared a "Sole Source" provider of computer equipment for the District on 2/9/95 by the Board of Education. Gateway was declared Sole Source because they could only be purchased directly from the

manufacturer, were rated at the top of their market for quality, service, support and value. Most importantly, standardization was a necessity for service and support within the District. The computers will be purchased using Long Beach Unified's bid #LBUSD 21-0001/14.

Apple computers will be purchased using Glendale Unified's bid #P1693.(The SMMUSD and Glendale bids will be combined to maximize buying power.)

PUBLIC SPEAKER:

Brian Hutchins (Quincy), Santa Monica - Mr. Hutchins questioned whether the combined marketing power of Apple and Gateway constituted a monopoly thereby making the district's purchases less than legal. He also discussed zero virtual physics.

BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS:

Ms. Brownley questioned the purchase of the new computers in light of Ms. Gee's resignation; Ms. Brownley also indicated that she would like to have a brief report at an upcoming board meeting juxtaposing the purchase of computers for staff with the actual (curricular) technology component specified for computer use in schools. Staff assured Ms. Brownley that the computers being purchased for staff were necessary, indicating that uniform computers in the Ed Services Department would bring greater conformity, interaction and productivity. The funds used for the staff purchase are categorical and are being used appropriately.

Mrs. Gottfried asked if there were significant discounts in specifying Gateway as the sole source. Dr. Cohen indicated that there was a discount received by using a sole source vendor, but that the major discount came from pooling the bids with those of Long Beach Unified School District.

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve/ratify the attached Site Governance Council-approved budgets. The funds in the total amount of \$704,617 were awarded by the State Department of Education to each site based on Average Daily Attendance (A.D.A.) results from the 1999-2000 Academic Performance Index.

In order to be eligible for these awards the school site must meet or exceed its 5% growth target on the A.P.I. and the growth for significant subgroups must meet or exceed 80% of the school target. Elementary and middle schools must have 95% of the enrolled students participating in the SAT9. High schools must have 90% of the enrolled students participating in the SAT9.

Governor's Award A funds must go directly to the site. The Site Governance Council is responsible for determining a plan for expenditure of the money. Guidelines that were used when developing the plan include:

connecting the expenditure with School Improvement Plan;

* focusing on improving student learning;

* looking for ways to maximize the dollars; * keeping collective bargaining groups in mind regarding contract, salaries and working conditions, and

* concentrating on one-time expenditures, such as materials, supplies and equipment.

The Governing Board approves/ratifies the plan for expenditures. At this time, the funding is ongoing at the State level, but one-time at the site.

PUBLIC SPEAKER:

Andrew Denyer, Santa Monica - as an Edison parent, Mr. Denyer expressed concern that the current Edison administration does not deal with financial inequities that are caused by nonparticipation; he urged to Board to find ways to take positive steps to "right the wrong."

Board member Jordan stated that he felt it was incumbent on all district constituents to think out of the box, taking on the

responsibility of thinking of creative ways to rectify the financial inequity.

Staff reminded the Board that Edison, Olympic and SMASH all enjoyed an accountability system separate from the API Awards and that their curricular goals, objectives and measurement tools, by design, did not qualify their programs for inclusion in the state awards.

Dr. Schmidt indicated that Level B Awards offered the possibility of more site funding. Board member Jordan cautioned that the Board and staff should be careful not to communicate to the schools that the award money was going to be used to "backfill." Dr. Schmidt stated that the API funds are, in reality, being used to backfill -- to pick up programs that the district can no longer fund.

Board member Brady reminded everyone that the sites determine their own needs and that the only action the Board could take would be to uphold the site decision unequivocally, unless the specified allocation violated State mandates.

Board member Brownley stated that she felt the objectives were thorough, well-thought out and comprehensive. She indicated that if there were amendments to this budget item, the Board could approve them with proper rationale. Ms. Brownley joined other Board members in their praise for the hard work and dedication of all site governance committees.

Kirsten Hibert, co-principal at Santa Monica High School, indicated that the Samohi goals were being reviewed by the site governance council and would be presented at the Board meeting of June 7, 2001.

Attached for your review and discussion is a draft of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District /City of Santa Monica Elementary School Playground Community Access Plan (see ATTACHMENT #1) and an Elementary School Playground Community Access Plan School Community and Neighbor Information Meeting Schedule (see ATTACHMENT #2).

COMMENTS:

The attached Plan draft outlines the goals, proposed operating schedules, management and operational roles and responsibilities of the City of Santa Monica (City) and SMMUSD (District) for a new collaborative program that will provide targeted community access to selected Prop X improved elementary school playgrounds in Santa Monica starting in September, 2001. The school playgrounds are not being turned into public parks. Rather, in partnership with the City, we are planning for providing well managed access on weekends and holidays during the school year and during the summer break to selected new elementary school playgrounds for approximately 3000 hours of monitored youth sports physical activity programming as well as supervised unstructured physical activity and play time for children ages 5-12 and their families who attend our elementary schools or live in the community near them.

In return for access to these District school playgrounds the City agrees to provide:

* playfield monitors during Community Access hours,

* playfield grounds and maintenance services,

* funding for increased custodial services to be provided by District staff.

Under the guidance and supervision of the City Manager and District Superintendent, City and District staff will jointly direct the program, establishing new levels of communication and cooperation with schools, District and City staff.

Concurrent with the development of an agreement for community access to school playfields during non-school hours, District and city staff are updating the District/City agreement for the CREST program, a jointly operated after-school program at Santa Monica elementary schools. Proposed changes to this agreement, as well as to any program and facility agreement for the middle schools, will be brought forward to the Board in the future for action.

If both the Council and the District agree to this plan and, contingent upon City funding, a contractual agreement would then need to be written and acted upon.

Background

This concept was developed several years ago when the City embarked on a long-range open space planning effort designed to create additional open space and recreational opportunities for Santa Monica residents. One strategy supported by many community youth groups was for the City and SMMUSD to work collaboratively on expanding and improving school playgrounds, making them available to age appropriate youth and their families during non-school hours. The availability of Proposition X funding made this strategy possible. The Board of Education directed staff to develop and execute design and construction plans, which reflected the needs of the school and community for more active playfield and playground space to encourage physical activity for children.

Both the Board of Education and the City Council directed staff to work together to propose a community access program. It needed to be responsive to the needs of the schools for quality physical education, recess and after school sports facilities while also addressing the needs of the City and community youth sports programs and adjacent neighbors for more and better managed access to the school sites on weekends, holidays and summer times when the schools are not in session.

District staff has been working with school site communities, Jacobs Engineering and the City on the design and construction of the new playground facilities to accommodate all these needs. Furthermore, District and City of Santa Monica staff has worked for over 20 months together to develop this School Playground Community Access operating and management plan.

The attached Plan, developed from school site feedback and research on what other City/Districts are doing, will provide the basis for discussion and final decision making by the Board of Education and the City Council. Each school community, surrounding neighbors and the general public will have an opportunity to review these proposals prior to action by the Board of Education and the City Council in June. Key to implementing the proposal is the support of each school and its community. In addition, the City Council will be asked to provide the necessary funding to ensure adequate staffing as outlined in the attached plans.

We have attempted to design the proposed program plan with sufficient staff to ensure effective communication, maintenance and monitoring in response to issues articulated by school principals and site governance teams earlier in the planning process.

Rationale

This Plan proposes that after investing \$5 million in the Prop X Playground Improvement Projects due to be completed later this year, a new level of security and maintenance are needed to maintain the integrity of the school while insuring maximum access for youth sports groups, school and community children and their families. In order to better manage and protect this investment the Plan would require changes in Board Policy regarding public access to elementary school playgrounds. These "policy changes" fall into 3 categories:

1. The need for adjusting the Board's current "open gate" policy whereby schools leave a gate open at all hours for community access to the school site. This Plan calls for closing and locking elementary school playground gates after School Playground Community Access hours. We currently have no District supervision or security for elementary school playgrounds on weekends, vacation periods or holidays. School Principals and staff support the need for a policy change in order to:

a. Provide better security of school buildings and playgrounds;

b. Reduce maintenance needs of the schools resulting from illegal, inappropriate and unsupervised use of playgrounds;

c. Reduce District liability for injuries and accidents that are more likely to occur during unsupervised use of playgrounds;

This Plan will require a policy change to address the Plan's proposed "limited hours and users" policy. There is a history of substantial weekday evening and weekend illegal, unsupervised and inappropriate use of elementary school playgrounds by adults and teenagers participating in a variety of activities including: baseball, skate boarding, roller blading, roller hockey, tackle football in cleats, soccer in cleats, adult/teenage basketball and use of the playgrounds for dog walking. This type of use:

a. Discourages and often prevents elementary aged children from using the playgrounds at their school.

Damages the playfield and equipment due to the size and weight of adults and teenagers using elementary playfields.

Substantially increases the amount and cost of playfield/playground maintenance and renovation required to maintain minimum levels of safety.

d. Provides opportunities for vandalism and also causes a tremendous amount of trash and debris to left over after weekend / holiday use. Schools report finding everything from human and animal waste and used

condoms, broken beer bottles and car parts on our elementary school playgrounds.

Plan Goal and Objectives

The Plan is in alignment with our District's Physical Education program goal of increasing after school opportunities for children to be physically active. The goal of new Elementary School Playground Community Access Plan is to address the costly concerns describes above while initiating a new, "kid friendly" school playground user policy that would limit the age of youth sports and community users to 12 and under and their families at elementary sites. The objectives of this new plan and policy are to:

- 1. Add over 3000 hours of opportunities for adult monitored and/or supervised physical activity exclusively for the over 6000 children ages 12 and under age group who attend our elementary schools and/or live in our school community neighborhoods.
- 2. Decrease the physical damage, trash, and debris and field wear and tear we currently experience due to adult and teenage users on these playgrounds on weekends and holidays.
- 3. Improve playground safety and security.
- 4. Reduce District costs for scheduled playfield maintenance and renovation.

Next Steps

The Board will require feedback from the School Principals and Site Governance Teams, school neighbors and community. Opportunity for public input is also necessary for City Council's budget approval. Barbara Stinchfield, Director of the City Community and Cultural Services Department and Chris Corliss reviewed the attached draft of the Elementary School Playground Community Access Site Plan proposal with the principals from the School Playground Community Access sites: Rogers, Grant, Franklin, McKinley, Roosevelt, *Muir and SMASH on April 30, 2001. They reviewed each item of the Plan, clarified points and answered questions. There was agreement by all principals regarding the plan concept, organization and details as provided. Working together with the City, District staff has organized and scheduled Elementary School Community Playground Access Plan information meetings for each Plan school site out to inform and invite feedback from school staff, parents, neighbors and community members (See Attachment #2).

The City is printing Elementary School Playground Community Access Plan Information Meeting postcards and signs which will be distributed to schools for parents and staff notification and providing postage and mailing label prep to notify neighbors living within 500' of the campuses by mail.

The City will solicit feedback from community groups and public at the Park and Rec. Commission meeting on May 17 and later at the City Council meeting.

Other Site Specific Issues and Concerns

Edison Charter Language Academy: will not participate in this program during the 2001-02 year per the request of its Principal and Site Governance Team.

<u>Grant School</u>: will not be open on Sundays during the 2001-02 school year, per the request of their Site Governance, school and community neighbors.

Muir and SMASH Schools: are located adjacent to Los Amigos Park. Current use of the park by teenage SMASH students, history of use as a public park by the community and the fact that grounds and playground rest room custodial work is already being done by City may make inclusion in this particular plan superfluous. Principals, Patty Flynn and Mary Hubbell have indicated they'd like to have more trash and debris clean -up done there on weekends - prior to school opening on Mondays. The City has reviewed the schedule to increase custodial coverage on Sundays for that purpose.

BOARD MEMBER CLARIFYING QUESTIONS AND REMARKS:

Mrs. Brady requested a specific description of the site signage,

to include the hours, emergency phone numbers, and user-friendly, nonaggressive stipulation of the rules/ enforcement of Board policies as they reflect appropriate behavior and activity; she also questioned other practical items such as the number of trash cans/ recycle bins and accessibility by emergency response teams.

Mrs. Gottfried asked if the basketball hoops could be adjustable, not permanently lowered, so all ages could enjoy the play fields, as appropriate. She also requested more specific information on the quality and quantity of outreach/PR planned for community information.

<u>Dr. Jordan</u> asked about security measures, monitors and attendants with authority (some sort of supervisory personnel) and raising the general awareness of SMPD/SMFD to respond to school site needs. He also questioned the advisability of increased security depending on the age of the participants.

Ms. Brownley asked for further information regarding the use of school restroom facilities, maintenance, field maintenance and the possibility of opening the gates for earlier and later adult access.

<u>Dr. Escarce</u> requested that any additional or specific feedback from school principals be shared with the Board, he inquired if the program would impact permit fees received by the site (if so, he requested that a hierarchy of preference be written into the proposal/plan); he also expressed the opinion that use-preference be given to certain age groups (elementary students).

Mr. Green remarked that he felt all ages should have access to the play fields, that the space should not be restricted to elementary school-aged participants. Mr. Green suggested that increasing access to include area teens would similarly increase teen pride in the area as well as increasing peer pressure to maintain the properties. He asked that staff explore the possibility of training and using student interns to augment any monitor group that is formed.

PUBLIC SPEAKERS:

The following citizens addressed the Board:

Dona Block, Santa Monica Frank Schweitzer, Santa Monica Tricia Crane, Santa Monica David Cole, Santa Monica John Petz, Santa Monica

The concerns they raised included but were not limited to:

- does limiting the space by age disenfranchise a wide segment of the population
- 2) could the school sites and city create a volunteer force

to maintain the properties

3) is this an appropriate use of taxpayer dollars

- 4) if the space is restricted, what plans are being made by the school/city partnership to send the message to area teens that they are welcome and have special meeting places (do not demonize teenagers)
- 5) reconsider locking the gates (at all)

Barbara Stinchfield, representing the City of Santa Monica, and Chris Corliss, representing SMMUSD, were praised and congratulated for the terrific quality of the proposed program. Ms. Stinchfield took the opportunity to remark that the process has been invigorating, also noting that some of the same regulatory concerns will be inherited, regardless of the monitoring provisions made. She indicated that every effort is being made to include proper supervisory personnel to ameliorate as many of the concerns as possible.

Mr. Corliss reminded the Board that the primary use of the fields was (and would continue to be) education - weekdays, from 7AM to 6:30 PM. He also remarked that responsible adults would often be present at the sites.

Dr. Schmidt indicated that increased access and/or hours would necessitate increased funding.

The Board instructed staff to work closely with Mr. Corliss to ensure inclusion of the following points in the next version of the proposal:

- 1) "DUSK" is to be stipulated as the closing hour
- 2) proposals to address the security issues raised at this meeting, including specific monitoring duties, schedules and pay ranges, and monitoring of the restroom facilities
- 3) an indication of the planned community outreach
- 4) adhere to the following suggested timeline:

The Board further instructed staff to adhere to the following schedule, emergencies notwithstanding:

June 7 - bring the modified proposal back to the Board as a discussion item for the June 7, 2001, meeting June 12 - bring the revised proposal to the City Council for funding at its June 12, 2001, meeting June 27 - bring the approved proposal to the Board for approval Fall, 2001 - opening of the play fields

Procedure for Scheduling Permitted Use of Play Fields:

The City and District will mutually agree upon organizations to be issued permits for Saturday play field use at each site. Permits will be issued during agreed upon hours that balance use with sufficient field "rest time" and with renovation schedules. A seasonal reservation system will be used.

The development of the seasonal field use schedule will be coordinated with the field use schedules for City park play fields to ensure equitable distribution by type of sport, organization and age group. The issuance of permits will be consistent with policies established for the use of park fields and will be considered based on the following priorities:

- 1. Santa Monica-based youth sports groups (as defined in the City's field use policy) that are open to the general youth population, have open registration and implement policies that ensure that all participants have equal access to play.
- 2. Private and non-profit Santa Monica-based youth sports groups that are developmental and selective in selection of participants based on skill level.
- 3. Non-profit private Santa Monica-based schools.
- 4. Private for profit Santa Monica-based schools.

5. Adult groups and non Santa Monica based organizations or schools will not be issued field use permits on school sites.

The City's Community Programs Manager will submit information on organizations requesting permits and a proposed block of hours at each site to be given to the District's Sports and PE Coordinator who will solicit feedback from site principals. Upon approval of organizations and general hours, the City will formulate a seasonal permit schedule and provide copies to the District Sports and PE Coordinator and to the school principal, the physical activities supervisor and the CREST supervisor at each site. Schedule modifications will be distributed as above when needed. The Program's goals will be to make all schedules available on the City and District Websites to provide the broadest access to hours, group permit schedules and field condition updates.

Maintenance:

<u>CITY</u> - The City will be responsible for development and implementation of a seasonal maintenance schedule that will be provided to District staff (as detailed above for the permit scheduling). The City will provide groundskeeping services including supplies and equipment necessary to deliver those services indicated below:

Fields: Monday and Friday field inspections, weekly mowing

(April - November), bi-weekly mowing (December - March); irrigation repair and scheduling, aeration and fertilization (once monthly), renovation (sod and/or

seed once annually).

Exercise Path: Weekly inspections and repairs to decomposed

granite as needed, replacement of headers as

needed.

Litter Pick Up: Policing and clean-up as needed to be done by the

City Groundskeeper prior to Community Access hours and by the Field Monitor during Community Access

hours.

Trash Collection: Saturdays and Sundays - At the beginning of the day

and at the close of Community Access hours, removal of trash and replacement of trash liners at each site,

by the City Groundskeeper.

Refuse Containers: Purchase and replacement as needed (6 to 8 per

site).

Community Access

Signage:

Design, fabrication, installation and replacement as

needed.

Play Structures:

Weekday daily inspections with work order requests

to City as needed.

PE/Recreation

Buildings:

Daily; sweeping office, emptying of trash cans,

cleaning of windows, wet mopping of floor.

Restrooms:

Daily; cleaning of sink and toilets with disinfectant cleaner, picking up of all refuse and emptying of trash cans; wet mopping floor, wiping down walls, cleaning mirrors, cleaning door and handles. Restocking toilet paper, soap dispenser and paper towel dispenser.

Play Structures and

Play Areas:

Inspecting daily for hazardous materials and picking

up waste on play system and rubber mat.

Courts and

Hardscape: Inspecting daily for hazardous materials, conditions of

equipment, and picking up litter on playgrounds.

Field/Path: Inspecting field and exercise path for trash and

hazardous waste. Picking up debris and disposing in

trashcans.

<u>Trash Collection:</u> To be done at the start of each school day.

Graffiti, etc.: Daily inspections for graffiti and removal as needed

as soon as possible.

The District will also be responsible for the maintenance and replacement of play equipment in compliance with all applicable safety requirements and the preventative maintenance of the Recreation/Restroom buildings (contingent upon appropriation of funds by the Board of Education).

Security and Monitoring:

<u>CITY</u> - The City will provide Community Use Monitor coverage during the times of community access as specified below:

Saturdays 9am - 5pm 1 staff roving per three school

sites, total of 2 staff, with cell phones

Sundays and Holidays 10:00am - 3:00pm

Summer Weekdays: TBA – 700 total hours to be divided among the

elementary school sites

The responsibility of the Monitor will be to open gates and restrooms and supervise playground use during Community Access hours. The City will provide the appropriate regulatory signage in order to enforce all applicable District and City rules, regulations and laws.

The Monitor will also be responsible for securing the site at the close of Community Access hours each day including all gates, restrooms and the PE/Recreation and Restroom Building.

<u>DISTRICT</u> - The District will be responsible for security of the site including the specified Community Access areas for all time periods not specified in the Community Access Schedule.

Coordination with Sites:

To ensure ongoing communication with school sites, the Community Use Monitor, Groundskeeper and Custodians will complete a daily incident log and a maintenance/custodial checklist. This will be left in the Recreation Building in a designated file to be accessible to school staff. Within two weeks of the end of each quarter, City staff will compile a quarterly report for review by the District's Sports and PE Coordinator and each site principal.

Changes to the Community Access Schedule and Permitted Uses

The City's Director of Community and Cultural Services or designee and the District's Sports and PE Coordinator will meet semi-annually to review the status of the Community Access Program, its schedule and permitted uses. If changes are desired either by the District or City, recommendations will be made to the City Manager and Superintendent and changed by mutual agreement. If Community Access hours are reduced, the City may make commensurate changes to its level of grounds keeping, security staffing levels and to funding for District custodial services.

Dr. Cohen, in agreeing to Mrs. Gottfried's request, reminded the Board the purpose of the report was to present a holistic picture of where the district is now in light of future planning issues.

Mrs. Brownley requested that staff develop a policy to address Item #2, bringing it to the Board at a future meeting. The Board, by consensus, so directed staff.
