A regular meeting of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District's Board of Education was held on April 11, 2002, in the Board Room of the District's Administrative Offices, 1651 16th Street Santa Monica. Following Roll Call, at 5:00 PM the Board moved to **CLOSED SESSION**, for reasons listed in Section III, below. The Board reconvened in **OPEN SESSION** at 7:16 PM in the Board Room.

IV BOARD OF EDUCATION - COMMENDATIONS/RECOGNITIONS

NOTE: Pursuant to a special request, McKinley PTA President, Miriam Billington, presented the school report out of sequence. Mrs. Billington reported on the use of API funding; she indicated that the school has been dedicated to literacy and language arts for the past six years and, although, those academic areas were not falling by the wayside by any means, the thrust of academic endeavor at the school is now Math. Center X coaches (from UCLA) are meeting with staff by grade level to develop and implement appropriate curricular activities; ongoing workshops with artists from the community and the Music Center instruct the Performance Arts components of the McKinley program. It is the dream of the McKinley PTA to fund an Artist-in-Residence to enrich and enhance the lives of students and staff. The entire McKinley learning team is struggling with the issue of time: time for teachers to work together, time for teachers to share ideas and lessons, time to celebrate successes. Finally, Mrs. Billington thanked Principal Wendy Wax for her untiring devotion to McKinley; Ms. Wax returned the thanks indicating that the PTA was a tremendous force in the continuing success of the school.

VIII PUBLIC COMMENTS

Addressing the Board were the following speakers:

Diana Englemann - Dr. Englemann distributed a copy of her remarks to the Board; it is attached hereto and made a part hereof of these original Minutes. Dr. Englemann, a professor at Santa Monica Colleges requested a revision of the new district permit policy which currently disallows her 7th grade child to enter the district. She requested that the Board advise her of their decision.

Rick Gates - 33rd District PTA representative addressed the Board quite late in the meeting because he came to the meeting directly from the airport following PTA's annual Sacramento Safari. Mr. Gates brought news from the capitol that the state budget deficit was now being calculated at \$17 billion and rising; he also reminded the Board that they might want to consider the need for a new facilities bond to provide matching funds for the big state bond that is anticipated for the November, 2002, election.

X COMMUNICATIONS

A. Student Board Member Reports -

Gabriela de los Santos, Olympic High School: Ms. de los Santos proudly informed the Board that Olympic teacher Harlan Tarbell had been named California Teacher of the Year by the CCEA, the professional organization for continuing education; he will be feted at the April 27th meeting of the group in Costa Mesa. Gaby also discussed the poetry class at Olympic, the city-funded art project which will open its doors at Santa Monica Place on May 7, the school's Cesar Chavez celebration, and the basketball team, which is exhibiting great spirit and tenacity (they have a 1-1-and1 record)!

Chris Gary, Santa Monica High School: Mr. Gary reported that the Samohi has garnered over \$8 million in scholarships for the Class of 2002. This is a delightful first. Samohi ASB is diligently working with other high schools in its geographical area to craft a Student Bill of Rights based on Samohi's document, which enumerates general rights such as having textbooks and materials of sufficient quality and quantity and being taught by certificated teachers. Chris also discussed the student rally in support of the workers at the DoubleTree Hotel, held earlier in the day. The Superintendent interjected that he felt the rally was thoughtful and respectful, a true example of mature student behavior. Mr. Gary concluded with a report that the Samohi CIF Football champs had received their rings at the football ring ceremony, that the tardy sweeps were really making a difference in classroom attendance and that he was going to Georgetown.

- C. SMMCTA Report Marc Sanschagrin reported in Harry Keiley's absence. Mr. Sanschagrin reported that everyone should join in celebrating May 8th, the National and California Day of the Teacher, that there would be a meeting relative to the PAR grant Monday, April 22, 2002, and that Mr. Keiley on behalf of the SMMCTA constituents was sending a letter to all appropriate district parents regarding preparation for STAR 9 testing. He also thanked Linda Gross and the Santa Monica-Malibu Education Foundation for their on-going crusade to enrich and enhance the academic lives of district students. Finally, he requested calrificiation of the total fee being paid to NCPE (the National Center on Public Education and Prevention and Social Policy), as specified in Agenda Item A.20. Superintendent Deasy confirmed that the fee was not to exceed \$125,000.00 per year for a minimum of three years.
- D. **SEIU Report Keryl Cartee, Chief SEIU Steward for the district,** reported that May 20-24, 2002, was Classified Employee Week in the State of California. She also reported that communications with the district are going very smoothly due, in large part, to the excellent working relationship SEIU constituents enjoy with the Superintendent and Deputy Superintendent. Finally, Ms. Cartee reported that there are three new stewards, all from Samohi, Frank Estrada, Pete Patterson and Terese Portillo.
- E. PTA Council President Report - Cheri Orgel, PTA President, reported that the next PTA Council President's meeting was in Malibu April 16 – she reissued her invitation for any three Board members to attend. She reminded everyone that the annual installation breakfast is scheduled for May 21. Mrs. Orgel sincerely thanked Harry Keiley for sending the STAR 9 letter because, in addition to alerting parents about the test dates, Mr. Keiley included specific strategies for successful test taking and for parent support during testing periods. Mrs. Orgel noted that the Annual Sacramento Safari was taking place today (4/11/02) and that many SMMUSD PTA representatives (parents, teachers and students) attended. She reminded everyone that, while the PTA prides itself on supporting teachers and district staff, the state PTA (and subsequently local chapters) were against the decision-making clauses included in AB2160, which is currently pending passage in the State assembly. Mrs. Orgel concluded her remarks by indicating that she and her fellow PTA'ers were very much looking forward to working with the new administrative officers that are being appointed.

X SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Preparation for Budget Planning - Anticipated Shortfalls - Fiscal Years 2002-03, 2003-04, 2004-05 and Beyond: Mr. Deasy stated that he "would begin where Cheri (Orgel) left off." He indicated that he would be bringing recommendations to the Board over the next few meetings for the following administrative appointments: as Chief Education Officer (CEO) of Santa Monica High School, Dr. Ilene Straus, and as Principal of John Adams Middle School, Lise Reilly. The Superintendent indicated that it was his top priority to fill the vacancies at the school sites first then to fill the central office vacancies. He also stated that the searches for coordinators, directors, principals and the Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services were on-going, geographically wide spread and very intense.

Mr. Deasy then reported that he would be sending a memo to the Board of Education regarding preparation for upcoming budget planning. The document he intends will support three avenues of approach to address the anticipated budgetary shortfalls for fiscal 2002-03, 03-04, 04-05 and beyond. The Superintendent will propose three possible options:

- large budget cuts that would dramatically curtail the district's ability to provide program
- a reversal of course relative to class size reduction, which would increase revenues, and
- 3) increasing revenues by increasing the existing parcel tax.

Mr. Deasy indicated that the memo would be delivered to Board on mid-week, the week of April 15, and would be posted to the web, under the *From the Superintendent* section, its entirety on the same day it was delivered to the Board. Mr. Deasy stated that he anticipated and welcomed a great deal of community dialog. Finally, he stated that the memo would be brought before the Board as a discussion item on the meeting of April 25.

The Spring enrollment projection shall serve as the benchmark in determining available spaces for new enrollees the following school year. A random, unbiased selection process for the admission of new enrollees from outside the school's attendance area shall be established.

The Board of Education retains the authority to set guidelines for racial/ethnic balance at district schools. As specified in the Board Policy 5145.3, D.I.1, Desegregation Plan, it is the goal of the board to insure that no school shall have a higher minority enrollment than 20 percentage points above the District average.

A. ENROLLMENT PRIORITIES

- 1. Students residing within a school's attendance areas shall have first priority for attending that school.
- 2. No student currently residing within a school's attendance area shall be displaced by another student.
- 3. The Board of Education retains the authority to set guidelines for racial/ethnic balance at district schools. As specified in the Board Policy 5145.3, D.I.1, Desegregation Plan, it is the goal of the board to insure that no school shall have a higher minority enrollment than 20 percentage points above the District average.
- 4. Once enrolled in a school through this open enrollment policy, students living outside the school's attendance area shall be considered to be residing in the school's attendance area.
- 5. Students placed in any school requested through this open enrollment policy no longer have first priority rights to enroll in the school of the attendance area in which they reside. Students who wish to return to the school in which they reside may apply for such enrollment without first priority rights.

B. SELECTION PROCEDURES

- The Superintendent or designee shall identify those schools which may have space available for additional students.
 Intradistrict Open Enrollment applications will be available at the District office and all school sites.
- 2. All students are eligible to submit an Intradistrict Open Enrollment application for their school of choice by date indicated on the application.
- 3. Enrollment in a school of choice shall be determined by a random, unbiased selection process from the eligible applicant pool, and a waiting list shall be established to indicate the order in which applicants may be accepted as more openings occur. Late applicants shall not be added to the waiting list. The selection process will be conducted by the staff of the permit office under the supervision of the Director of Pupil Services. Edison and SMASH will continue existing enrollment procedures.
- 4. The priority for granting intradistrict permits from the eligible applicant pool will be as follows: siblings of students on intradistrict permits, followed by new intradistrict permits, Students will be selected as a family unit if space is available. Interdistrict permits will be granted if space is available after eligible intradistrict permits have been granted.
- 5. Special Education students will continue to be placed through the IEP Team process on a space available basis. Applications will be referred to the Director of Special Education.
- 6. The Superintendent or designee shall inform applicants by mail prior to the end of the school year as to whether their applications have been approved, denied or placed on a waiting list. If the application is denied, the reasons for the denial shall be stated.
- Applicants who receive approval must confirm their enrollment within two weeks after the date on the notification letter.

- 8. Admission to a particular school shall not be influenced by a student's academic or athletic performance except insofar as academic standards are required for admission to specialize schools or programs such as programs for gifted and talented students. Such standards shall be uniformly applied to all students. (Education Code 35160.5)
- 9. Any complaints regarding the selection process should be addressed to the Superintendent or designee.

C. NOTIFICATIONS

Parents/guardians shall be notified each school year of available attendance options including:

- 1. Residency requirements for school attendance.
- 2. A description of any special district program options.
- 3. A description of the procedure for application for alternative attendance areas or programs.
- 4. A district application form for requesting a change of attendance.
- 5. The explanation of attendance options under California law as provided by the California Department of Education.

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Resolution No. 01-13 - CalPERS 457 Deferred Compensation Program.

COMMENT:

With the passage of the Economic Growth & Tax Relief Act of 2001, an enhanced opportunity for additional tax deferred savings has been provided for K-12 school districts' employees.

Among its provisions, the new legislation allows school districts to establish 457(b) tax deferred savings programs for their employees. These programs will allow those employees to contribute pre-tax amounts, above the 403(b) limit, which is currently \$11,000. It will allow for an additional \$11,000 in deferrals into a 457(b) program.

The California Public Employees Retirement System is offering the CalPERS 457 Deferred Compensation Program. Participants in the 457 Program select from a broad array of high-quality investment choices or "styles" that range from passive to actively managed approaches. These investments include: Money Market, Stable Fixed Income, Bond, S&P Equity Index, Active Large-Cap Equity, Russell 2000 Equity Index Fund, Active Small-Cap Equity, International Equity, Fund A-Conservative, Fund B-Moderate and Fund C-Aggressive. Other investment options include FDIC-Insured Certificates of Deposit, FDIC-Insured Money Market Account, and Self-Managed Account. The Self-Managed Account allows participants to select investments from over 350 mutual fund families to build their own customized investment portfolio.

There is no cost to the District to adopt this program, and there are no transfer fees, surrender charges or restrictions.

COMMENT:

In our continuing efforts to ensure extraordinary achievement for all students, the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District will implement the HiPlaces Assessment Survey. The goal of this survey is to provide schools with reliable, systematic information for use in planning and monitoring school improvement efforts.

The assessment consists of five separate surveys directed toward Administrators, Assistant/Associate Administrators, staff, students, and parents. The survey's objectives include:

- √ helping schools to understand the relationship between the implementation of practices that are part of the improvement plan and student success in the school
- √ providing schools with specific, reliable data concerning the extent to which the changes, practices, and processes that are targeted in schools's improvement plan are being implemented

√ providing schools, local and state agencies, grant funders and policy makers with critical information on the value and impact of bringing our school improvement plans to life.

It is anticipated that there will be minimal disruption to teachers and students as the comprehensive data is collected, providing a mechanism for making important decisions by raising key questions. The data will serve as a structure for continued discussion of the improvement process.

* Although this project was not initially included in this budget, there are sufficient funds carried over from last year to fund it.

MEETING

NOTE:

The Superintendent briefly described the process surrounding these surveys, indicating that making them part of the district's accelerated self-review offered an unusual opportunity to garner a rich and complex array of data based on the perceptions of students, parents, teachers and administrators. This particular data collection instrument allows a very short turn-round period, approximately eight weeks.

Mr. Deasy further explained that the conformational and disconformational data will help us in defining our ability to be good planners.

Surveys are voluntary and completely anonymous. Time will be given to teachers and students to complete their portions of the surveys.

Mrs. Brady asked if there were money in this and successive budgets to fund the staff development needed to properly understand and apply the information. The superintendent assured her that, the \$2.7 million shortfall aside, we would be able to absorb the cost.

Speaking for the Board, Mrs. Brownley expressed excitement, support and enthusiasm for the on-going program.

The HiPlaces Assessment

The goal of the *HiPlaces Assessment* is to provide schools with reliable and systematic information for use in planning and monitoring school improvement efforts.

The *HiPlaces Assessment* helps address several issues affecting schools' ability to gather information/data and use it effectively in planning for the future. These issues include:

- The limited amounts of time schools have for data gathering and careful reflection.
- ◆ The need of schools for rapid feedback to determine the extent to which their improvement efforts are "on course" and to ensure that improvements continue to gain momentum. The HiPlaces Assessment is designed to inform schools about the effects of those improvements on their students.
- The need of staff to use the knowledge gained from the HiPlaces Assessment for both short and long-term school improvement planning. The HiPlaces Assessment provides a mechanism for making important decisions by raising key questions that lead to deeper engagement of all staff in a school's transformation.

The HiPlaces Assessment addresses all of these issues. Schools that have used the assessment have gained rich and comprehensive data collected with minimal teacher and student disruptions. Most of the data are gathered through machine scannable forms that can be analyzed and returned to schools relatively quickly. The results from the HiPlaces Assessment serve as a structure for continued discussion of the improvement process.

Given these general goals, the *HiPlaces Assessment* has a few specific objectives. These include:

- 1. Helping schools to understand the relationship between the implementation of practices that are part of their school improvement plan and student success in their school
- 2. Providing schools with specific, reliable data concerning the extent to which the changes, practices, and processes that are targeted in their improvement plan are being implemented at the school, grade, and classroom levels. For example, teachers are asked to indicate how often certain teaching practices (e.g., small group teaching and learning



strategies, integration of health concepts into thematic units) are used in the classroom.

Providing schools, local and state agencies, and other policy makers with critical information on the value and impact of bringing their school improvement plans to life.

The categories featured in all versions of the *HiPlaces Assessment* are designed to assess the current status of the school community and its inhabitants in each of the areas that the research literature has identified as critical to the teaching and learning process. The assessment is also designed to fulfill the goal of effective education for all students. Examples of categories featured in the assessment are: classroom/curriculum practices and routines; cross-teacher and course content and instructional integration; advisory and guidance programs; teacher preparation and staff development needs assessment; governance, decision-making practices and structures; family and community involvement and linkages; and comprehensive health and adolescent development promotion.

What does the HiPlaces Assessment look like?

The HiPlaces Assessment consists of a set of surveys to be answered by principals and other administrators, classroom teachers, students and parents. In addition, as part of the assessment one individual at the school gathers certain archival data. Most of the survey questions are multiple choice. Completing the HiPlaces Assessment is a simple process: Read the directions for each section and then fill in the appropriate answer. Currently there are five surveys:

The Administrator Survey:

The Administrator Survey takes about two hours to complete and includes a special section on demographics and school structure (e.g., enrollment at each grade level, class sizes) as well as a separate School Health Survey.

The Assistant/Associate Administrator Survey:

The Assistant/Associate Administrator Survey is shorter and takes about 45 minutes to complete.

The Staff Survey:

The staff survey takes approximately 75 min. to complete and can be completed either during planning periods or at home.

The Student Survey:

The Student Survey usually takes one 60-minute period to administer. To ensure that reading levels do not influence students' ability to fill out the surveys reliably, it is recommended that teachers read the surveys to their



students. The student survey and instructions for teachers reading the survey are available in English and Spanish.

The Parent Survey:

rated.

The parent survey is ideally sent to the parents of all students and takes between 10 – 15 minutes to complete. Parents are asked to return the completed survey to the school or send it directly to NCPE. The Parent survey is available in five languages: English, Spanish, Portuguese, Cambodian and Laotian.

Additionally, there is a **Teacher Student Rating Scale (TSRS) Questionnaire**: The TSRS requires that a teacher spend about 3-4 minutes rating each student. The number of students rated depends upon the number of students enrolled in each grade being surveyed. It is recommended that the TSRS is completed by core teachers or teachers who are very familiar with the students being

When your assessment is completed, we arrange for your surveys to be returned to NCPE for machine scanning and analysis.

When is the best time to complete the HiPlaces Assessment?

The initial phase of the assessment process should optimally take place in the middle of the school year. This time frame reflects two important concerns. First, both teachers and students should have had sufficient time within the academic year to be able to report their experiences and practices at a level that truly represents the current year, rather than the previous ones. Second, a six-week time frame is necessary for data analysis and initial feedback to be returned to the school. The earlier a school schedules the assessment, the sooner it can expect to receive feedback to assist planning and decision-making with data current to that school year. Further, early feedback provides schools the opportunity to request more focused data analyses that can have immediate effects on the current school year. Therefore, schools should identify the dates for the assessment as early as possible, place these dates on the school calendar, and attempt to keep the assessment time frame constant from year to year. Teachers need a small amount of preparation to administer the student surveys. This preparation should optimally take place several weeks prior to the administration of the surveys so that teachers have time to review the materials and all questions can be answered.



How do we connect knowledge to action?

Once schools return the completed surveys to NCPE, the Center can provide feedback as early as Mid-February through Mid-May (recall the 6 week turnaround). This initial feedback provides schools with an assessment of the current levels of use and attainment of each of the practices under each of the implementation categories assessed.

Teachers and administrators are also given feedback on their perceptions of significant obstacles to implementing their school improvement plan, as well as on school/work climate, classroom climate, cultural pluralism, burnout and stress, job satisfaction, commitment to the school, teacher and administrator role functions, role clarity, and practices/duties.

Feedback of the student results will be provided with information related to students' perceptions of school climate, expectations and aspirations, stresses experienced, and socio-emotional strengths and distress including self-esteem, depression, fear, anxiety, and health behaviors and attitudes (examples include basic health practices such as sleeping, alcohol and tobacco consumption, drug use, exercise, eating patterns, and nutritional/health knowledge).

When schools have been in the project for more than a year, they are also given feedback on the levels of change in each of the categories on the *HiPlaces* Assessment.

In the past, upon receiving initial feedback, schools have been able to narrow their concerns or identify new questions highly relevant to their needs and particular contexts. To address these specified needs, schools sometimes request additional analyses of their assessment data. NCPE is always pleased to discuss further analysis with individual schools to address their' needs and aspirations. NCPE has also developed a system for schools to use the assessment information as the basis for strategic planning and decision-making. Schools will receive this assistance at times that are mutually arranged. The goal of the additional training is to give schools the capacity to manage ongoing monitoring and planning that is based on comprehensive, current information.

When schools have been in the project for more than a year, they are also given feedback on the levels of change in each of the categories on the HiPlaces Assessment.



What about Confidentiality?

For purposes of confidentiality, no data from any <u>individual</u> will be identified or shared with anyone. Only aggregate data from individuals will be reported. Data from individual schools is similarly protected unless funding agencies or State or District requirements override these individual school protections.

In Summary

The *HiPlaces Assessment* is intended to help schools make sound planning decisions based on reliable, up-to-date information. The *HiPlaces Assessment* is not a high stakes evaluation of schools. The assessment process is an opportunity for schools to gauge the status of their efforts so as to make systemic, comprehensive change effective and enduring.

COMMENTS: In order to remediate the concentration of mold discovered at the Santa Monica Alternative School House (SMASH)/John Muir Elementary School sites, the District needs to hire a specialty contractor. The specifications for remediation were written by Executive Environmental Services Corporation as a subcontractor to the Alliance of Schools for Cooperative Insurance Programs (ASCIP), our property and casualty JPA.

> A request for performance proposal was sent to three specialty contractors. Their certification and ability to perform mold remediation has been verified by our consultants. The contractors are required to follow the General Specification which covers the furnishing of all labor, materials, facilities, equipment, services, employee training and testing, transportation, disposal, permits and agreements necessary to perform the work required for fungal remediation for the project owner at the project site. This work for fungal remediation shall be performed in accordance with these specifications, the EPA, OSHA, Cal/OSHA Regulations and NIOSH recommendations, State of California Regulations, Guidelines on Assessment and Remediation of Fungi in Indoor Environments (New York City Department of Health - Bureau of Environmental & Occupational Disease Epidemiology) and any other applicable federal, state, and local government regulations. conflict or overlap of the above references, the most stringent provisions are applicable.

This is a partial description of work scope. Fully detailed specifications are available for public review in the Office of the Assistant Superintendent for Fiscal and Business Services, and a copy will be available for public review at the Board Meeting.

MEETING

NOTE:

The Superintendent thanked Ken Bailey and Wally Berriman and their staffs for the outstanding work being done on the mold remediation at the Muir/SMASH site.

Mr. Jordan asked if there were a way to alert parents to the district's continuing efforts to provide a safe, healthy environment for its students, especially in light of emerging mold issues recently reported in the national media. Mr. Deasy responded that district staff is on perpetual patrol, constantly performing visual inspections and ordering immediate testing if there is visual detection. "If we suspect, we test." Mr. Bailey added that all rooms at the Muir/SMASH site will be tested and that remediation on the affected rooms will be complete by the week 4/15/02.

Mr. Bailey answered that the district is working hand-in-hand with its insurers, JPA and ASCIP and their approved contractors, a forensic architect, and that we are strictly following federal and state mandates. Attorneys will have been contacted and ASCIP will work with the district to prepare a case.

The attached policy is new to our District and is recommended by the California School Board's Association (CSBA) to specifically address alternative pathways toward the attainment of credits for high school graduation.

Additionally, this policy addresses the issue of "concurrent enrollment" in which students who are currently enrolled in the district may simultaneously enroll in another approved educational program and earn credit toward graduation.

In terms of placement within the policy manual, if adopted this revision will be added to the 6000 series of policies and will be placed immediately after BP 6146.1, High School Graduation Requirements.

Instruction

Alternative Credits Toward Graduation

In order to meet individual student needs and encourage all students to complete their high school education, the Board of Education desires to provide flexibility in the completion of prescribed courses in accordance with law.

As an alternative to completing the course requirements for high school graduation, students may fulfill one or more of the course requirements through:

- 1. Practical demonstration of skills and competencies
- 2. Supervised work experience up to 40 semester periods in accordance with 5 CCR 1635, or other outside school experience
- 3. Vocational education *and/or Regional Occupational Program (ROP)* classes offered through our high schools *district*.
- 4. Courses offered by regional occupational centers or programs
- 5. Independent study
- 6. Credit earned at a postsecondary institution (Pursuant to 5 CCR 1630)
- 7. Private instruction (Pursuant to 5 CCR 1631)
- 8. Military service and training in accordance with 5 CCR 1634
- 10. Correspondence instruction from a California university or college accredited for teacher training (Pursuant to EC 51740)

The district shall accept for credit any coursework satisfactorily completed by students while detained in a juvenile court school or county or state-operated institution. District students who successfully complete district graduation requirements while so detained shall receive a diploma from the school they last attended. (Education Code 48645.5)

- * Students may receive physical education credit for participation in district interscholastic athletic programs carried on wholly or partially after regular school hours when such participation entails a comparable amount of time and physical activity.
- * Students using interscholastic athletics participation to fulfill physical education requirements may be graded on this participation, provided that a teacher credentialed to teach physical education supervises this participation and assigns the grade.
- * The Board directed that current policy (policies) relative to Physical Education and interscholastic athletic programs be both referenced here and included as past of the information about this policy.

The Superintendent or designee shall determine whether a student has satisfactorily met course requirements through any of the above alternative means.

A. Concurrent Enrollment

Concurrent enrollment means enrollment in any non-SMMUSD course during the school year or during the summer by a regularly enrolled SMMUSD student. <u>Concurrent enrollment is an alternative means by which students may obtain credit toward graduation while being simultaneously enrolled in both the school district and another approved educational program.</u>

Students must obtain signed pre-approval for any concurrent enrollment course or program from the school eounselor. <u>principal or designee</u>.

Concurrent enrollment may be approved for "make-up", "acceleration", and/or "enrichment" purposes.

Courses eligible for concurrent enrollment include

- 1. Any course offered at Santa Monica High School, Malibu High School, Olympic High School or the SMMUSD Adult School, either during the school year or during the summer.
- 2. Courses offered at any <u>accredited</u> <u>public or private high school</u>, community college, <u>public or private college/university</u>
- 3. Courses offered by the UC Extension Program

Students who demonstrate that the courses they want to take are not available at their high school, may, with the pre- approval of the principal, take courses at accredited high schools other than the schools mentioned above.

DISCUSSION No. D.2

It is recommended that the Board of Education discuss, for future adoption, the *English Language Development Standards for California Public Schools*, as adopted by the California State Board of Education for English Language Development, grades Kindergarten through Grade Twelve.

BACKGROUND AND RATIONALE

When the State introduced standards two years ago, each district had to decide whether to simply accept the State standards, or to establish their own set of standards. At that time, it was unclear how extensively the State would include the standards in a state-wide assessment.

The culture of the SMMUSD has been engaged in thoughtful dialogue on all aspects of school reform and to make decisions in the best interest of students, guided by the belief that "one size does not fit all." The District had historically used a process of analysis and discussion to make district-wide decisions, and therefore, this same course of action was taken.

A district Standards task force was formed, under direction of Aida Diaz, former Coordinator of Muticultural/Bilingual Programs, consisting of English Language Development (ELD) teachers from every school; and an intensive review of the new State standards was begun in the fall of 2000. The review included not only analyzing the State standards, but also the standards from other districts in California. This analysis of standards was a valuable process in that many standards was a valuable process in ELD teachers became familiar with what standards and how standards guide curriculum, assessment and instruction. One planned result was accomplished: A core group of teachers developed a knowledge base about standards in English Language Development. This group of teachers was prepared to educate others across the district on this important topic.

NEW INFORMATION

Recent development at the State level have changed the picture on standards, causing school leaders and teachers who were engaged in the English Language Development Standards Task Force to revisit the decision which led to the work on the District standards.

These developments have made it necessary for our recommendation to adopt the State English Language Development Standards. These changes include:

 Development of the California English Language Development Test;

 Development of supplemental materials bridging the State Adopted English Language Development Standards to the Stated Adopted English Language Arts Standards, and

 New emphasis on adoption of texts and instructional materials which are keyed to the State Standards.

NEXT STEPS

In the 2001-2002 school year, the following timeline will be in place:

• Submit the English Learners Master Plan for adoption.

• Submit Administrative Regulations and Board Policy for English Learners for adoption.

Obesity, inactivity and how walking and bicycling for transportation can improve and maintain emotional, intellectual and physical health. How health can improve when exercise becomes a part of daily life instead of being a scheduled, organized activity.
- 2. A walk/bicycle path through Santa Monica High School on former Michigan Avenue right-of-way. Why it should be a part of the Civic Center Plan. Its connection to the proposed sports fields, Safe Routes to School, schools as open space, Expo Rail Bike Way, skeleton bike route system for all of Santa Monica ... (How do we) help entice people to get out of their cars?

Building a bridge to health and sustainability

My name is Barbara Filet. Kent Strumpell and I represent two advocacy groupsCycle Santa Monica and Livable Santa Monica. We have requested this

time on your agenda to tell you about an important opportunity for the school

district and the city to collaborate on making Santa Monica a healthier, more active and sustainable community. We are especially interested in working with

you to create safe routes to school.

The biggest challenge we face in making Santa Monica more sustainable is auto

dependency - relying on our cars for most of our trips. The biggest challenge to public health, next to tobacco use, is inactivity? which is also related to auto dependency.

Churchill said"We shape our buildings; thereafter, they shape us." It is

also true that how we design our city shapes us, including our bodies.

The solution is to create a city where it is easy and desirable to circulate

without a car, on foot or bicycle. Transportation planning has a huge impact

on the way we live. While some parts of Santa Monica are good for walking and bicycling.

especially near the beach, most of Santa Monica has been designed to be easy to

traverse only by car. We have not given enough thought to how we can make

safer, more attractive and convenient to walk, bicycle or take public transit

instead of drive. We struggle with the public health consequences of auto-related inactivity.

We have heard there is a call for building more car parking for students at

Santa Monica High School. As a resident of the Pico neighborhood, I am intimately

aware of the pressures that increasing numbers of student drivers are creating. While we can all sympathize with the frustration of parking shortages, I believe that accommodating our students' desires to drive to school would take us in exactly the wrong direction for several important reasons.

First, this runs contrary to our city's sustainability and student health goals; it would impact the environment and public health in only negative ways. It would also be an unwise use of scarce funds and scarce land. Our city is small and funds are tight. It is much cheaper to reduce the demand

for parking by creating a range of sustainable alternatives. Parking is a car magnet. Encouraging students to drive only adds to our growing congestion and pollution problems.

Driving is a passive activity that has absolutely no health benefits. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention recommends that people take 10,000 steps per day. This equates to about four or five miles of walking.

We need to find more ways to work this into our daily travels and routines.

The Sound Body, Sound Mind Fitness Center has just opened at the high school. Fitness for life is one of the goals for students in the Santa Monica-Malibu

School District because it improves both academic performance and health. This is a

wonderful goal and we commend you for identifying the important role fitness

plays. But it is only one piece of the picture. Competitive team sports, as

well, are not for all kids and require special facilities that use lots of land. And not many students will continue these games into adulthood.

It would be great to offer non-traditional physical education classes in activities that kids could continue to participate in for their whole

lives. Classes in bicycling, yoga, hiking, jogging or walking could start them on

life-long fitness routines.

If we truly want to start students on routines that will keep them fit for life.

the very best way to do this is to get them walking or bicycle riding as transportation?

for utilitarian trips and to work and school. This is how most adults get their excercise.

I get to work by bike and bus. Perhaps students could get PE course credit for walking or bicycling to school.

That means we need a city where that is not only possible but safe, convenient and pleasant.

Many people do not consider cycling or walking to school in Santa Monica safe options for children.

We need to start to remove the many barriers to safe, attractive, convenient

walking and bicycling for people of all ages. We especially need a network of connecting

routes to our schools and other destinations to give young people a chance to roam about,

which stimulates their brains and develops independence. Ironically, one of the most significant

barriers to biking and walking in the western part of the city is Santa Monica high school.

This closed campus is as big a barrier as the freeway or coast highway to traveling on foot or bike.

We need more connectivity and linkages throughout our city, but the high school stands as a barrier.

The two alternatives for going around the high school are unsatisfactory. Since the high school presents blank walls to Pico, the sidewalks are narrow and the street

is full of traffic, walking there is not pleasant. And the car lanes on Pico are too narrow

to comfortably share when you are on a bike. Many bicyclists ride on the sidewalks on Pico,

but this is illegal in Santa Monica.

On the north side of the school, Olympic Boulevard is a one-way road and freeway offramp? it is a barren, scary place and unsuitable for walking or bicycling.

Pico Boulevard and Olympic Boulevard are both designed to principally accommodate cars.

There are many good ideas for integrating schools into the community found in

the city document, the Open Space Element. I hope we will continue to work in this direction.

We are at an important point in our history because we are making long-range plans for the

Civic Center as well as for the arrival of the Exposition corridor light

and bike path in about 2008. The bike path is planned for construction well

in advance of the light rail, perhaps in the next few years.

The Civic Center

The school and community members have asked for playing fields in the civic

center. One drawing recently in the news illustrates ways this could happen.

Included is a bridge over Fourth Street for easy student access to the proposed sports fields. Such a bridge may be the key to integrating the school with the community.

Another way this bridge could be used is to include Barnham Hall into the civic

center complex. The present civic center may be too small to host large conventions. The option of including Barnham Hall for special events may open up lucrative possibilities for the city as well as the school. To accommodate visitors comfortably - and sustainably - we need to create ways

like this bridge to access important destinations without cars. A city where walking and bicycling are a delight will appeal to tourists.

Santa Monica Place, which was built in the late 70s, is now being studied to

see how it could be better integrated into the civic center. It is also considered to be a barrier to the free flow of foot and bike travel to the civic center. It may be torn down and built up from scratch. Yet Santa Monica Place is only one quarter the size of the high school campus. We believe the high school should also be integrated into the fabric of the city.

Exposition Corridor Light Rail and Bikeway

The same bridge that serves the sports fields and Barnham Hall could continue

east, linking to what will become our backbone bike/walk trail on the Exposition corridor. This will connect the eastern part of the city to the

civic center, and link the central city parks and other destinations to each

otherMemorial Park, Bergamot Station, Virginia Park, Civic Center, the beaches. Plans for the Expo bike path have it ending at 17th and Olympic. It could continue west to 14th and Olympic, south on 14th across the freeway

and west on Michigan Avenue. Michigan is already well-utilized by pedestrians

and cyclists, including many high school students.

Michigan Avenue used to continue west past Lincoln all the way to Fourth Street, until the 70s. A need for this original alignment for pedestrians and bicyclists still exists.

Certainly concern for student safety is critical. But security needs must be balanced with community connectivity needs and there are important reasons

to search for ways to do both. We believe a good dsign could meet both needs.

We would like to see the school explore ways to reactivate this important corridor

for walking and cycling? but not for autos.

The school is built on a hill with a 6 to 15 foot drop in elevation. The path

itself could be elevated to control access to the campus, if necessary,

the bridges over the coast highway. The path could be seen as a design opportunity, doubling as a shade structure for the student lunch area. The students could help to design the look of it. The path could have a ramp down to Barnham Hall and the tennis courts/ball fields. Then it could continue on to the civic center, across Fourth Street.

Because it would give neighborhoods to the east access to regional attractions such as the beach, these kinds of paths may qualify for environmental justice funding from Caltrans and other sources.

Summary

The biggest challenge to sustainability is auto dependency. Pedestrians and

bicyclists are the indicator species of a sustainable city.

The biggest challenge to public health, after tobacco use, is inactivity and

a sedentary lifestyle, often related to automobile dependency.

Solution

Create a city where it is attractive to circulate without cars, by foot, bike and public transit. Create a bridge to the community. Follow UCLA's example and arrange for free bus passes for students, teachers and staff.

Actions for the school board for sustainable schools

Include as part of your strategic planning process working with the city to

build bridges to the community as part of the civic center redesign. Integrate the campus with the civic center.

Do not build a parking structure or additional parking for students.

Create safe routes to school and ways to travel without cars. Cycle Santa Monica and Livable Santa Monica would love to work with you on this.

Allow limited public access now by keeping high school gates open at Michigan and Fourth Street after school hours.
