The Superintendent welcomed the 60+ parents, children and community members coming before the Board; he said that he understood their concerns dealing with serious disciplinary matters. He also stated that we all could learn, become more cognizant of possibly institutionalized racism and that it was most imperative that we all become partners in solving issues of this nature.

The parents requested that district policies regarding student discipline be reviewed and possibly amended. The request stemmed from stated and perceived

disciplinary injustice toward members of both the families present and other unrepresented families.

The Board thanked the parents for their courage and dignity. Dr. Escarce remarked that any investigatory force must include parents, community, staff and members of existing district advisory committees; he also stated that policies can have disparate impact and that every effort must be made to ensure equitable application and enforcement of all district policies. Board member Leon-Vazquez suggested that staff look into the mediation program that is enjoying such good success at Malibu High School, with an eye to initiating it at other district schools.

The Superintendent concurred, stating that investigations would be made and a task force would be formed to address the challenges, it is hoped before the start of school in September. It is his intention to include students on the task force.

Ms. Lukk registered anger at the seemingly arbitrary apportionment of space-available permits. She indicated that she was prepared to hire an attorney to defend her position.

Marnie Glass, Santa Monica - requesting Board intervention on a permit issue pertaining to her children who have been reassigned to a district school different than the one which

they currently attend due to her family's change of residence. The Superintendent asked Ms. Glass to contact him personally regarding her concerns.

Brian Quincy Hutchins, Santa Monica - relative to the history of US - presumably a reference to the title of a recently adopted textbook, A HISTORY OF US: MAKING THIRTEEN COLONIES 1600-1740, second edition, by Joy Hakim. (6/6/02)

Robbie Jones, Santa Monica - relative to the district's ongoing anti-discrimination work, requesting that the district make a concerted effort to utilize the rich resources available in the Malibu and Santa Monica communities.

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.15

It is recommended that the Board adopt the attached Resolution Number 01-23, proposing an new Parcel Tax and calling for an Election for Voter Approval (New Parcel Tax 2002).

COMMENT:

As noted previously, current case law has established strict standards with regard to the specificity of ballot language. When adopted, the language of the full resolution will have been reviewed by the District's legal counsel. The new resolution meets all the requirements of current state law.

Section 8 of the resolution contains proposed ballot language, both in condensed form and full text. Members of the Parcel Tax campaign committee have reviewed this language, as have District staff and the consultant who conducted voter surveys on behalf of the District. The condensed version of the ballot measure for the voting machine and sample ballot must not exceed 75 words (Election Code Sec. 13247).

SANTA MONICA-MALIBU UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT AND SAFETY ACT OF 2002

To provide academic achievement and safety for school children, shall the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District be authorized to levy a special tax limited to \$300 per parcel per annum for a 12 year period, adjusted annually using the CPI-U? Revenues will be used to improve access and raise achievement for all students, attract outstanding teachers, reduce class size, provide materials, equipment, and well-maintained safe schools, with citizens' oversight and annual financial audits.

BALLOT TEXT

"SANTA MONICA-MALIBU UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT AND SAFETY ACT OF 2002"

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE

TITLE AND PURPOSE

The revenues raised by this Measure, the "Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Academic Achievement and Safety Act of 2002," are to be used to provide programs in promotion of academic achievement, necessary classroom and school-site materials and equipment, and the operation of safe and well-maintained school facilities for the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District ("District").

2. DEFINITION OF PURPOSE

- A. The revenues raised by this special tax shall be exclusively used for the following purposes.
 - i. To improve student achievement;
 - ii. To attract and retain outstanding teachers and improve teacher skills through professional development;
 - iii. To reduce class size;
 - iv. To provide safe and well-maintained facilities;
 - v. To enhance athletic, music and arts programs;
 - vi. To reduce costs associated with athletic, music, arts and other programs in order to improve accessibility for all students, regardless of their ability to pay;
 - vii. To upgrade computer technology and instruction in classrooms and school libraries;
 - viii. To improve student career and academic counseling services;
 - ix. To improve access for all students to rigorous, challenging course work;
 - x. To provide increased access to early childhood, family support and afterschool programs; and
 - xi. To protect the taxpayer's investment in education by providing financial oversight and accountability for District spending.

B. The revenues raised by this Measure shall be deposited into a separate account in accordance with Government Code Section 50075.1 (or applicable successor law) and shall be expended according to a plan developed annually by the District staff and adopted as approved by the Board of Education of the District (the "Board").

3. THE TAX LEVY

- A. <u>Tax Base</u>. The special tax shall be levied on each parcel of land within the boundaries of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District. The special tax shall be in the amount of up to \$300 per parcel per annum, subject to adjustment as hereinafter set forth. The Board of Education of the District may periodically set the amount of the special tax at a lesser amount per parcel than is authorized hereunder.
- Cost of Living Adjustment. Prior to levying of the special tax for any given tax B. year, the Board will conduct a public hearing on the matter on or before January 31 of the prior tax year. Notice of the time, date and place of hearing shall be published in accordance with applicable laws, posted at least twice in a newspaper of general circulation in the District, posting shall commence at least fifteen (15) days prior to the hearing. Within one month following said hearing each year, the Board shall adopt a resolution establishing the amount of tax to be raised for the following tax year and the rate per parcel, not to exceed \$300 per year for each parcel adjusted annually on a cumulative basis for inflation in accordance with changes to the CPI-U. CPI-U as used in this Measure shall refer to the Consumer Price Index or All Urban Consumers (Los Angeles-Riverside-Orange area), base year 1982-84 = 100, or its equivalent should this Index be revised or cease to exist in its current format. The annual CPI-U adjustment shall be a percentage calculated by reference to the increase in the CPI-U during the full calendar year which precedes the tax year for which the calculation is being made. Any tax levied shall become a lien upon the properties against which taxes are assessed and collectable as herein provided.
- C. <u>Term.</u> This special tax shall be authorized to be levied each year for twelve years, beginning in the tax year commencing on July 1, 2003.
- D. <u>Constitutional Apportionment Limit</u>. Pursuant to Section 4 of Article XIIIB of the California Constitution, the apportionment limit of the District is hereby increased in each of the four tax years commencing with the date of approval of this Measure by the levy of this special tax, and the Board shall increase the District's appropriations limit as necessary in each year during which proceeds of this special tax are available, to ensure that proceeds of this special tax may be spent for the authorized purposes, pursuant to Section 7902.1 of the Government Code, or any successor thereto.
- E. <u>Collection</u>. The District may request that the special tax be collected by the County of Los Angeles, or other lawfully designated agency. The collection of taxes under this Measure, including the imposition of penalties, additional fees and interest

upon persons who fail to remit the special tax imposed by this Measure, or who fail to remit any delinquent remittance, shall be subject to and governed by the rules, regulations and procedures authorized by law. Every penalty imposed and such interest as accrues under the provisions of this Measure shall become a part of the tax herein required to be paid.

F. Savings Clause. The provisions of this Measure shall not apply to any person, association or corporation or to any property as to whom or which it is beyond the power of the District to impose the tax herein provided. If any sentence, clause, section or part of this Measure or any tax against any individual or any of the several groups specified herein is found to be unconstitutional, illegal or invalid, such unconstitutionality, illegality or invalidity shall affect only such clause, sentence or part of this Measure and shall not affect or impair any of the remaining provisions, sentences, clauses, sections or other parts of this Measure. It is hereby declared to be the intention of the Board and of the electorate that this Measure would have been adopted had such unconstitutional, illegal or invalid sentence, clause, section or part thereof, not been included.

4. PLANNING, PUBLIC INFORMATION AND COMPLIANCE REVIEW PROVISIONS

- A. Annual Plan. An expenditure plan (the "Annual Plan") shall be developed annually for the succeeding fiscal year by District staff with input from the citizens' Financial Oversight Committee. The Annual Plan will recommend expenditures of the tax proceeds that are consistent with the intent of the Measure. The assumptions associated with the recommended expenditures shall be included in the Annual Plan. The Plan shall be presented for Board action each fiscal year in conjunction with the District's annual budget adoption process for the following fiscal year. To facilitate public discussion, the recommended Annual Plan shall be made available for public review two weeks prior to Board action.
- B. Oversight. The citizens' Financial Oversight Committee was constituted by Board action on August 10, 2000, to evaluate the financial resources and uses of resources by the District; and to monitor the formulation and completion of a strategic plan with long-term action steps as well as recommendations for short-term specific and measurable operational changes and functions in the District. The Committee is further charged with a regular review and evaluation of the District's financial management. The charge of the committee shall be expanded to include review of the District's administration of and compliance with the terms of this Measure. The Annual Plan together with regular Financial and Audit Reports shall be promptly distributed to the citizens' Financial Oversight Committee.
- C. <u>Public Comment Process</u>. Members of the public may comment on the plans, reports and conditions of the Measure during the public comment period of any citizens' Financial Oversight Committee meeting and any Board meeting.
- <u>Financial Reports</u>. The District shall make available to the citizens' Financial
 Oversight Committee and the public, updated budget and financial expenditure

reports concerning the separate account holding the proceeds of this special tax in conjunction with the regular interim budget reporting required by the State. As part of this reporting, the chief fiscal officer of the District shall file a report with the Board and the Committee at least once per fiscal year clearly identifying the amount of funds collected and expended pursuant to this Measure, together with the status of any project required or authorized to be funded hereunder. All of the foregoing reports shall be organized to display clearly how the expenditures relate to the Annual Plan approved by the Board.

E. <u>Independent Auditors Report</u>. Each year, an independent auditor retained by the School District shall review District records to determine that funds generated by this Measure have been maintained and expended in compliance with the Annual Plan and that other conditions of this Measure have been satisfied. Said audit shall be conducted in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, the Standard and Procedures for Audits of California K-12 Local Educational Agencies and this Measure.

The independent auditor shall transmit a "Finding of Violation" to the Board if:

- (1) Funds raised by this Measure have been spent for Purposes other than those specified in Section 2.
- (2) Other conditions of this Measure have not been satisfied.
- F. <u>Civil Remedies Available at Law</u>. The above provisions are in addition to civil remedies available at law for assuring compliance with the terms of this Measure.

RESOLUTION NUMBER 01-23

RESOLUTION NUMBER 01-23 OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE SANTA MONICA-MALIBU UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ORDERING AN ELECTION, ESTABLISHING SPECIFICATIONS OF THE ELECTION ORDER AND REQUESTING CONSOLIDATION WITH THE STATEWIDE ELECTION TO BE HELD NOVEMBER 5, 2002.

- WHEREAS, the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District ("District") has been inadequately funded by the State for a period of years to the detriment of its educational programs; and
- WHEREAS, the District has engaged in a variety of efforts to generate funds for the educational program, including advocating in the State Legislature, local fundraising efforts, and cost-cutting measures, including employee layoffs and cutting budgets, and these efforts have not produced sufficient revenues to raise the quality of education, to implement, protect and maintain important special programs, and to maintain the facilities of the District; and
- WHEREAS, Section 4 of Article XIIIA of the California Constitution and Government Code Section 50075 et seq. authorize a school district to levy a Aqualified special tax@ to raise funds for the purpose of conducting their business upon approval of two-thirds of the electorate voting on the measure; and
- WHEREAS, Government Code Section 50077 and Education Code Section 5304 authorize this District to order an election to allow the electorate to determine whether such special tax shall be levied after notice and a public hearing, and
- WHEREAS, Education Code Section 5322 authorizes this Board to make the specification of the election order; and
- WHEREAS, following the giving of such notice and holding of public hearing on June 27, 2002, this Board has determined that it is in the best interest of this District to submit to the voters a special tax measure; and
- WHEREAS, the Board of Education by this Order and Resolution requests that said special election be consolidated with the General Election to be held on November 5, 2002;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Education of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District, Los Angeles County, California, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, ORDER AND REQUEST as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to Education Code Section 5304, the Board hereby orders the Los Angeles County Superintendent of Schools to call a special election to be held within the boundaries of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District on November 5, 2002, for the purpose of submitting to the electors of the District, the SANTA MONICA-MALIBU UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT AND SAFETY ACT OF 2002, which is attached and incorporated herein, marked as Attachment A.

Section 2. The Clerk of this Board is ordered, not later than July 15, 2002, to deliver certified copies of this Resolution and Order to the Los Angeles County Superintendent of Schools, to the Registrar of Voters of Los Angeles County, and to the Clerk of the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors.

Section 3. The Los Angeles County Superintendent of Schools is hereby requested to prepare and execute a Formal Notice of Special Tax Election in compliance with Section 5361 of the Education Code (the "Formal Notice"), and call the election by causing the Formal Notice to be posted in accordance with Section 5362 of the Education Code no later than August 5, 2002, or to otherwise cause the notice to be published as permitted by law. The Clerk of this Board, on behalf of the Los Angeles County Superintendent of Schools, is authorized to cause all notices required by law in connection herewith to be published and posted, as the case may be.

Section 4. The Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County is hereby requested to order the consolidation of said election with the General Election to be held on the date specified in Section 1, and to canvass the returns of the election pursuant to Section 10411 of the Elections Code.

<u>Section 5</u>. Pursuant to Section 5303 of the Education Code, the Registrar of Voters is requested to take all steps to hold the election in accordance with law and these specifications.

<u>Section 6</u>. The Registrar of Voters is hereby requested to use the "Ballot Summary" appearing in Attachment A hereto as the abbreviated statement of the measure to appear on the ballot.

<u>Section 7</u>. This Resolution shall become effective immediately upon its adoption, by approval of two-thirds of the members of this Board.

In September 2001, the Board of Education chartered a Design Team to lead the development of a strategic plan for the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District. This Strategic Plan will be a living document to be adopted by our Board of Education in June 2002.

In developing the strategic plan, the Design Team involved a broad range of community members, including parents, students, district employees and board members, in a series of activities to assess, discuss, and develop the outcomes to create the classroom of the future. As a result of these activities (including interviews, questionnaires, meetings, and a strategic planning conference), we have focused on seven very important initiatives described below. Abundant Resources

Outcomes:

- 1. Increased revenues of at least \$30 million over the next 6 years by raising the parcel tax and increasing funding from our cities, the State of California and private donors.
- 2. Improved use of volunteers through recruitment, training, utilization and coordination of human resources.
- 3. Improved financial capacity to build and/or maintain outstanding learning facilities for our children.
- 4. Effective communication of our District's message.

Strategies:

- Campaign for an increased parcel tax going from \$101 in 2002 to \$360 by 2006.

Curriculum

Outcomes:

- 1. A standards-based instructional system is implemented in every learning environment across the district.
- 2. Critical content standards per subject area and grade level are identified and implemented consistently throughout the district.
- 3. The definition of core curriculum for SMMUSD Pre-K to 12 is expanded to include: world languages (including sign language), fine arts (dance, music theater, and visual arts), technology, multi-cultural studies, environmental studies and ethics.

Differentiated Learning

Outcomes:

- 1. Individualized Learning Plans (ILP) and Portfolios are implemented for every student.
- 2. Teaching integrates a wide variety of learning and teaching modalities and "real life" situations, to accommodate learning style differences in students.
- 3. Individualized instruction opportunities are enhanced, so that students receive responsive instruction that is tailored to their needs.
- 4. Integrated curricula are part of every school.

Strategies:

- Offer intensive training on differentiated teaching techniques to teachers, and follow up on that training with teacher coaches whose job it is to see that the training is put into practice.
- In the classroom, offer students choices of what and how to demonstrate knowledge, and offer a variety of instructional modalities.
- Develop a process for implementation of Individualized Learning Plans and Portfolios.
 Agree on methods to identify students' learning modalities and on ways to assess students
 for purposes of developing an ILP. Reach agreement with site administrators and faculty
 representatives on how teachers, once trained, will have the time to develop and pursue ILPs
 for every student.
- Individual sites determine their own structural preferences for individualizing instruction:
 - a) Looping (keeping students with the same teacher for more than one year).
 - b) Multi-age classes.
 - c) Reduction in class size.
 - d) Block scheduling and other methods to extend instructional time for students.
- Extend program offerings for GATE students, in compliance with the recommended state program standards for gifted students
- Each school site identifies and develops curriculum areas that can be integrated.
- Explore ways to offer powerful incentives for schools and teachers, to motive them to undergo training and offer differentiated teaching techniques in their classrooms.

Universal Access to Quality Early Childhood Education, Family Support Programs and After School Care

Outcomes:

- Children age 3 and up have access on a voluntary basis to full-inclusion preschool programs
 that meet recognized standards for fostering education and school readiness along with
 social, emotional and physical development in a safe environment.
- 2. Students in preschool through grade twelve have access on a voluntary basis to organized, full-inclusion after school programs that augment or enrich the student's educational experience in a safe environment.
- 3. SMMUSD partners with other community organizations to establish communication with all families in the district that have children age 0 to 5 to educate them about the importance of early childhood education and the availability of educational and family support programs and services provided by SMMUSD and others. This process will ensure a constructive pathway for each child that takes him or her from birth to kindergarten.

It is recommended that the Board of Education ratify the Memorandum of Understanding on matters related to Student Support Specialist at Santa Monica High School reached with the Santa Monica-Malibu Classroom Teachers Association.

COMMENT: During negotiations, which began in the Spring of 2001/02, matters related to the reorganization of Santa Monica High School, specifically, the establishment of twelve (12) Student Support Specialist positions were negotiated. On June 19, 2002, the District and the Monica-Malibu Classroom Teachers Association Santa (SMMCTA) negotiation teams tentatively agreed to a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) related to those positions pending official ratification by both SMMCTA and the Board of Education.

Memorandum of Understanding

The Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District (District) and the Santa Monica-Malibu Classroom Teachers Association/CTA/NEA (Association), upon completion of negotiations regarding Student Support Specialists at Santa Monica High School, agree as follows:

- Effective the 2002-2003 school year, the District shall implement twelve (12) positions titled "Student Support Specialist" (Specialists) at Santa Monica High School. The Student Support Specialists shall be members of the SMMCTA bargaining unit.
- 2. The duties assigned to the Student Support Specialists shall not include management responsibilities nor shall the Specialists evaluate other district employees.
- 3. The duty day for the Specialists shall be eight and one-half (81/2) hours in duration, including a one-half (1/2) hour lunch. The work year for the Specialists shall be 195 working days. The unit member and his/her principal shall mutually agree on the dates that will fulfill the extended work year requirement. The work year may include weekends, dependent on the requirements of the position. Each Specialist shall be entitled to accrue eleven (11) days of sick leave per work year.
- 4. Whenever administratively practical and whenever the District's financial resources allow, the District shall make every effort not to exceed a 275:1 caseload ratio for each Student Support Specialist.
- 5. Specialists' salary shall be reflected in the Student Support Specialist salary schedule set forth in Appendix 4 of the collective bargaining agreement. The Specialist schedule shall be calculated on the 183 day Certificated Teachers' Salary Schedule, plus \$10,000 per annual cell. The Specialists shall be paid in 11 equal increments.
- 6. The Association and the District shall execute this memorandum upon ratification of the tentative agreement by the parties. The Association and the District recommend ratification of this MOU and the enclosed tentative agreement.
- 7. Enclosed herein are the terms of the tentative agreement, which, upon ratification, shall be reflected in the current collective bargaining agreement.

TENTATIVE AGREEMENT

The following is the tentative agreement reached between SMMCTA and SMMUSD regarding the implementation of a Student Support Specialist position. All terms of the collective bargaining agreement remain unchanged except for the following, which are indicated in bold and underlined font.

Article I - Recognition

A.1. Included: All contract certificated employees ... ROP teachers, <u>Student</u> <u>Support Specialists</u>, substitute teachers, temporary teachers, ...

Article VI - Assigned Days and Hours of Work

- A.1. The number of working days in the work year shall be <u>183</u> for all unit members except Child Development teachers, newly employed unit members, <u>Student Support Specialists</u>, and secondary counselors.
- A.1.c. Student Support Specialists' work year shall be 195 working days, which may include weekends, dependent on the requirements of the position. On an annual basis, the unit member and his/her principal shall mutually agree on the dates that will fulfill the work year requirement.
- B.1.d. Student Support Specialists at Santa Monica High School shall work a eight and one-half (8 1/2) hour duty day, which includes a one-half (1/2) hour lunch.
- B.5.a. Add new last sentence: Student Support Specialists at Santa Monica High School are guaranteed a one-half (1/2) hour lunch each day.

 Whenever possible, the Student Support Specialists' lunch period shall not be at a time when the students are scheduled for lunch.

Article VIII - Class Size

A.3. In calculations of the above ratios and limitations, the following individuals shall be excluded: counselors, categorically funded positions, nurses, . . . special education teachers and the additional secondary teachers (above the 27:1 ratio) who are hired to teach ESL and to reduce class size for ESL students, and Student Support Specialists at Santa Monica High School. Whenever administratively practical and whenever the District's financial resources allow and facilities allow, the District shall make every effort not to exceed the following levels in special education: . . .

New A4. Whenever administratively practical and whenever the District's financial resources allow the District shall make every effort not to exceed a 275:1 caseload ratio for each Student Support Specialist.

Renumber current CBA subsections A4 and A5 to A5 and A6

Article IX – Leaves of Absence

- B.2. Each unit member in a ten (10) month assignment shall be granted ten (10) days leave of absence for illness or injury per year, and each unit member in an eleven (11) month assignment shall be granted eleven (11) days leave of absence for illness or injury per year, for service of one (1) full contract year as a full-time unit member. . . .
- G.1. Full-time unit members in a ten (10) month assignment may use not more than ten (10) days of sick leave each year for necessity leaves. Full-time unit members in an eleven (11) month assignment may use not more than eleven (11) days of sick leave each year for necessity leaves.

Appendix 4 - Student Support Specialist Salary Schedule

The Specialist schedule shall be calculated on the 183 day Certificated Teachers' Salary Schedule, plus \$10,000 per annual cell.

CERTIFICATED JOB DESCRIPTION STUDENT SUPPORT SPECIALIST, SANTA MONICA HIGH SCHOOL

DEFINITION

Under direction of the Associate Principal or designee, it is the role of the high school Student Support Specialist to build and sustain effective academic, behavioral, career, and vocational support systems for students; to assist students in identifying and understanding social, emotional, academic and vocational challenges and finding appropriate solutions; to serve as a resource to students, parents and staff; and to do other related functions as required.

DISTINGUISHING CHARACTERISTICS

This position classification requires knowledge, experience and skill in the areas of curriculum and instruction, special education, child welfare and attendance, student discipline, laws related to minors, post secondary options and student support systems. The position classification performs decision analysis and makes decisions of considerable consequence, requiring the application and interpretation of data, facts, procedures, and policies. The incumbents meet frequently with school administrators, teachers, other staff, and parents to communicate information, data, and alternative problem solutions. This a sedentary position classification and performs light work involving sitting a considerable portion of the time, but does require walking and standing for extended periods. This position requires accurate perceiving of sound, near and far vision, depth perception, providing oral information, and handling and working with instructional and assessment materials and objects.

Reasonable accommodation may be made to enable a person with a disability to perform the essential functions of the job.

EXAMPLES OF DUTIES

- Assess and evaluate student learning needs.
- Develop an individual learning plan for all students on his/her caseload.
- Develop long-range learning plans (post secondary/career) for all students.
- Connect students (and their parents as needed) with appropriate support services and referrals.
- Resolve conflicts that may arise between students, teachers and/or parents.
- Facilitate parent/student/teacher conferences.

- Write letters of recommendation.
- Monitor and intervene in student attendance issues.
- Administer first-level student discipline.

- Supervise co-curricular activities.
- Provide before school, lunch and after school supervision
- Administer career assessments.
- Provide parent education opportunities.
- Monitor student achievement.
- Analyze transcripts; create and implement student issue forums.
- Attend IEP meetings.
- Monitor the implementation of modifications for students with IEPs or 504 plans.

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider for future adoption the following language arts textbooks for use as basic instructional materials in District classrooms grades K-8.

BACKGROUND:

After considering available data, and examining approved series, staff finds the recommended materials to be particularly strong in the following elements:

- Effective strategies for teaching reading comprehension skills
- Assessments
- Teacher support

The process used for selecting basic text instructional materials to recommend to the Board of Education for adoption is a comprehensive one, and involves the participation of a broad-based group of individuals. The essential steps in the process include:

1) Initial Screening - Using specific criteria, staff

- systematically examines state board adopted materials to determine appropriateness of use District classrooms.
- 2) Publishers' Presentations Representatives from the publishers of materials that pass the initial screening phase are invited to present their materials to interested staff and parents.
- 3) Consensus for Recommendation Staff examines feedback from the publishers' presentation attendees to determine if there is a clear choice, that emerges. If there is a clear choice, the recommendation is then made to the Board of Education. If, however there is more than one series that is still deemed appropriate for use, volunteer classroom teachers from each site pilot the materials. Feedback from piloting teachers is then used to develop consensus for recommendation.

It is an open process that systematically examines, analyzes, and evaluates materials thoroughly.

COMMENT:

When the former Director of Child Development Services retired last year, the position was renamed Coordinator of CDS, though the job description did not change. Two Multi-site Supervisors remained to oversee the school-age program and full-day preschool program. After the Head Start program was funded, a new Multi-site Supervisor was hired to administer the Head Start/State Preschool program.

Now, one of the remaining school-age Multi-site Supervisor is leaving the District at the end of the current school year and must be replaced to ensure proper oversight of the school-age program. Due to the complexity of the Head Start programs, CDS has been encouraged by Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE), our Head Start funder, to add an additional Head Start Administrator and LACOE has agreed to fund 75% of the new position and is recommending increased funding for Head Start beginning July 2002.

The proposed administrative changes will result in an increase in salary and benefits expenditures, but most of the cost will be covered by the increase in Head Start funds. The net increase in the non-Head Start budget is under \$20,000. This amount can be covered within our proposed 2002-03 budget.

AGENDA NOTE:

The Superintendent indicated that the Head Start program generated a great deal of adminsitrative responsibility (tracking, reporting, family support, parent training, coordination, etc.) and was deserving of its own coordinator. He was fully supportive of this reorganizational change.

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the District's application for The Linking Education, Activity and Food Pilot (LEAF) grant for the 2002-2004 school years. The grant program is funded through the California Department of Education, Nutrition Services Division.

The amount of the grant is \$750,000. This would provide funds for the assessment, development and implementation of a model nutrition/physical activity program at John Adams Middle School, Lincoln Middle School and Malibu High/Middle School.

COMMENTS: The intent of the grant program is to implement strategies and intervention in partnership with The Food and Nutrition Services Department, Physical Education Department and Health Champions to improve student health and fitness through increased physical activity and healthy eating. The program develops and implements school nutrition and physical activity policies that link education, activity, and food to promote children's health and a healthy school environment. The LEAF Pilot Program will link public education, nutrition and physical activity through the implementation of policies and nutrition standards.

> Specifically, the funds will be used to collect and analyze data to compare and measure outcomes, and to revise and create policy and programmatic changes. This plan would address the District's need to aid in the general health of students by increasing their physical fitness levels, fitness and health awareness, promoting healthy foods and implementing new programs and evaluation of their effectiveness.

The program would support District Goals for both Physical Education and Nutritional Education. The grant will be awarded for a two-year period and funds will be used to award local assistance grants from July 1,2002 to June 30,2004.

Because of funding limitations, certain acoustical improvements to the hall could not be incorporated into the current scope of work. The Restore Barnum Hall Committee has considered this situation and believes it is important that this acoustical improvement be included with the work that is currently under contract with Jacobs Facilities, Inc.

Jacobs Facilities has negotiated a change order with the contractor to perform the necessary work. The change order amount is \$144,350. \$48,991 of this change is to be funded by Work To Be Determined, the associated construction contingency amount is \$10,595 and the associated Jacobs Facilities program construction management fee is \$23,359. The total additional cost associated with this work is \$129,313. The following page is a summary of the costs associated with BLA #3, incorporating this proposed amendment.
