Martha Rotman - Pt. Dume School Parent, Malibu - addressed the Board regarding parental concerns about the ability of pupils to access asbestos at the school due to ongoing construction. Mrs. Rotman stated that there was no site staff assigned to oversee the area (s) in question and that correspondence to school administrators regarding the concern had gone unanswered. She also stated she believed this allowing this access was felonious.

Superintendent Deasy responded that any correspondence issues would be addressed immediately, that he would personally see that an independent overseer would be appointed, that he had zero-tolerance policy for not responding to parents and, finally, that Jacobs had evidently erred in not reporting the problem to the proper officials, an error that would be immediately corrected.

A. Student Board Member Reports

Greg Sands - Malibu High School - Mr. Sands reported that the football team was a very strong 0-3, that homecoming activities were progressing nicely and that the ASB had generated \$40,000 through various fund-raising efforts.

Because he is unable to stay at the meeting until the Discussion Items come before the Board, Mr. Sands requested permission to speak. That given, he stated that he represented many MHS students who were opposed to proposed revisions in the Board Policy 6145, Extracurricular and Co-curricular Activities. The reasons cited were: 1) SMMUSD was a model district that had the reputation of holding students primarily accountable for their education, not their athletic involvements and to lessen that commitment (no matter how much money the district might receive from sports' related donations) could lead to compromising students' educations; 2) there are grave concerns about the program would be monitored, and 3) there seems to be some poorly thought-out exemptions.

Mr. Gary was not present; a representative from Olympic has not yet been chosen.

B. School Reports

Malibu High School - Kate Ross, MHS PTA President

Mrs. Ross thanked the Board for coming to Malibu. She indicated that:

- 1) the PTA student/parent handbook would be distributed shortly, thanks to the diligent efforts of Colleen O'Beirne Brydon.
- 2) There will be two student "Round-Ups" October 8 and October 22.
- 3) Volunteers are putting homework assignments on the school's website

- 4) Parent Education forums are being planned and will be produced in conjunction with the Malibu Youth Coalition
- 5) the 19th Annual Malibu High School Tennis Tournament is coming up; information will be forwarded; all are invited to participate

SMMCTA Report

Harry Keiley, SMMCTA President - Mr. Keiley's report included information relative to:

- Agenda Item D.5 (RBP4111: Recruitment and Selection of Teachers) Mr.
 Keiley asked that membership be included in any task force determining schools of greatest need
- 2) SMMCTA has donated \$1,500.00 to the firefighters and police officers' union
- The executive committee believes the API bonus check distribution system is flawed, causing redirection of \$7500 from teachers to the Coalition of Education; he urged reform
- 4) 10/8/01 there will be a joint panel (unofficial) concerning PAR; all are invited
- 5) 10/18/01 will be a day of dialog between membership and the district; sun shining the proposal is on the agenda
- 6) 10/25/01 will bring a human rights forum at JAMS from 4-6 P.M.; the topic is school safety and bullying. All are encouraged to attend
- 7) PAR: Mr. Keiley introduced Jeanne Cariati, a recently retired MHS art instructor who is working in a mentoring capacity under the PAR auspices. Mrs. Cariati and her beginning then gave a demonstration encompassing the values of peer assistance.

D. SEIU Report - no SEIU report was given.

E. PTA Council President Reports

Cheri Orgel, Santa Monica-Malibu PTA Council President - stated

- that the PTA is extremely grateful for the Superintendent's recent letter concerning district standards; they are also grateful that new distribution techniques, including posting information on the district's website, are making important news readily available to the entire learning community;
- 2) on behalf of the PTA she thanked the Superintendent for his incredible leadership in raising the bar for all of us
- 3) she also thanked the Personnel Department for the wonderful sense of customer service as they hire and train new employees for district service; she is especially grateful for the departments' willingness to accept and act upon suggestions and concerns of the PTA members.

F. Malibu Youth Coalition Report

Laure Stern, Executive Director - reported that

1) the first annual Celebration of Malibu Youth, September 15, was wildly successful; a copy of the organization press release is attached hereto and made a part hereof these original Minutes

- 2) organizational goals for this include program building, possible affiliation with the Boys and Girls Club of America, increasing hours at the Teen Center to encourage and ensure academic support and creative exploration for Malibu children
- 3) building school-community education through a series of evening forums open to the community. The first forum is scheduled for November 7; the topic will be "How Do We talk to Kids About Crises?" The Foundation is looking for administrative support from appropriate district staff to serve as panel members.

X Superintendent's Report

The Superintendent and/or Assistant Superintendents may report on items not requiring action by the board but are of interest to the Board and public.

- √ State of the Schools
 - a.. Back-to-School nights have been tremendously successful with large turnouts at all schools
 - b. the district and City of Santa Monica are working diligently execute the shared use agreement (playgrounds) and to have the playgrounds opening late fall (November or December); it is anticipated that, due to construction at some sites, the openings will be on a staggered basis
 - c. Mr. Deasy requested direction from the Board regarding the water fluoridation issue pending in the Santa Monica City Council;
 NOTE: Board member Brenda Gottfried spoke in favor of supporting it; all five Board members present agreed. A resolution will be brought forward.
 - d. there is heavy construction on Pacific Coast Highway at this time; the Transportation Department is working around it as well as possible however, sometimes the buses are late which interrupts class schedules. Mr. Deasy thanked everyone for their patience and understanding.
 - e. Mr. Deasy thanked Rick Bagley and his staff for the terrific work they've done in securing highly qualified candidates for the two senior administrative positions that are currently vacant, Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services and Assistant Superintendent of Business and Fiscal Services. The process is nearing completion with second round visitations at the work cites of bonafide candidates are scheduled for the week of November1.
 - f. three-fourths of students eligible to take the high school exit exams did so; a great percentage passed, which means the tests do not need to be taken again. Staff is pleased across both cities. The Board can expect a staff report at the next Board meeting.
 - g. the Board can definitely expect a report on asbestos abatement at Pt. Dume (see "Public Comments")
- √ Strategic Planning Update The Superintendent noted that Item NoA.29a had been added to the agenda and publicly noticed. He also stated that the culmination of the Design Team's work would be the Strategic Plan, which the Board could expect to receive by the end of this academic year.
- √ Financial Oversight Committee Update none.

A total of \$ 3,192,666 is budgeted for all Non-Public School/Agency, Instructional Consultants, Legal Fees and Due Process Case Settlements. Even though the Instructional Consultant account indicates a negative balance, the unaudited total fund balance, after adjustments, remains positive in the amount of \$ 257,969.

COMMENT: According to the Education Code SEC.21 Section 56342, prior to recommending a new or continued placement in a non-public, non-sectarian school, the Individualized Education Program (IEP) Team must submit the proposed recommendation to the local governing board for its review and recommendation regarding the cost of such placement.

The recommendation for these severely handicapped students are made by the District IEP Teams in accordance with State and Federal laws. The mandates of IDEA require non-public school services be provided at no expense to parents if there is not an appropriate public school program available. Funding to come from a SELPAwide non-public school/non-public agency reserve account.

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the open recruitment process for a vacancy on the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School Districts' Personnel Commission.

BACKGROUND:

Nominating and Appointment Procedures. The Superintendent of Public Instruction wants to ensure that all appointments reflect district needs, interests, and priorities; and equally important, that nominations be arrived at through an open logical process. Those most closely involved in local operations are in the best positions to nominate personnel commissioners.

To make the best appointment, districts are encouraged to follow these basic steps in their recruitment and nomination process:

- 1. Open recruitment, including at a minimum public announcement of the vacancy through:
 - a) board of education/personnel commission agendas,
 - b) press release and
 - notice to employees organizations and community, handicapped, minority, and women organizations.
- 2. The district governing board is encouraged to select a nominee following an open interview process, in which up to three representatives of the classified employees association, selected by the classified employees association, are allowed to participate.
- 3. The district governing board and the classified employees organization should submit their re-commendations to the Superintendent of Public Instruction in rank order, together with each candidate's resume.

Appointment decisions shall be in accordance with Education Code Section 45244 and take several factors into account; the most important of which is that each commissioner "be a known adherent to the principle of the merit system." This and other factors are outlined below for consideration in nominating commissioners:

1. The candidate shall be a known adherent to the principle of the merit system. Known adherent to the merit system means a person who by the nature of their prior public or private service, has given evidence that they

support the concept of employment, continuance in employment, in-service promotional opportunities, and other related matters on the basis of merit and fitness.

With respect to a candidate seeking reappointment, known adherent to the merit system shall mean a commissioner who has clearly demonstrated through attendance at meetings and prior actions that he or she, in fact, support the merit system and its operations.

- 2. The candidate must be a registered voter and resident within the territorial jurisdiction of the school district.
- 3. The candidate shall not be a member of the nominating governing board or of any other district governing board or county board of education, nor shall he or she be an employee of the district (relatives of employees of the district are acceptable).

In addition to the requisite factors it is also recommended that:

- 4. The candidate demonstrates an ability to assess the relative importance of personnel issues and make decisions which enhance merit principles, effective employer-employee relations, and equal employment opportunity. This should not be interpreted to require prior personnel experience. The requisite skills and abilities can be acquired in many ways.
- 5. The candidate possesses personal characteristics that promote the maintenance of rapport with other commission members; promote open communications with the governing board, classified employees, and other interested parties; and improve the commission's decision making by adding new creative viewpoints.
- 6. The candidate's membership on the commission reflects a diversity of interest within the community, such as business, labor, education, taxpayers, parents, students, handicapped, women, and ethic minority groups.
- 7. The candidate is willing to attend and participate in commission meetings.

- The candidate demonstrates an understanding of the district's and the commission's role.
- 9. The candidate is selected through an open process.

Actual Financial Report and the Revised Unaudited
Actual Financial Report are were attached to this

One of the most significant elements of information contained in the report is the Unaudited Actual Ending Balance for the General Fund - Unrestricted.

When the Board of Education adopted the 2001-02 Budget, it was estimated that the Ending Balance for 2000-01 (or the Beginning Balance for 2001-02) would be \$5,820,841. The Unaudited Ending Balance for 2000-01 is \$8,479,948. A comparison of the Forecasted Revenues, Expenditures, Transfers and Contributions with comparable Unaudited Actuals is as follows:

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.1

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Board Policy 5129, Beepers, Pagers, Cellular Phones and Other Electronic Signaling Devices

COMMENTS:

It is recommended that the Board adopt the attached policy, BP 5129 - Beepers, Pagers, Cellular Phones and Other Electronic Signaling Devices. This policy last appeared before the Board on April 5, 2001 and was subsequently pulled by secondary principals, due to their concerns regarding the practicality of creating and monitoring a system that would give students permission to have such devices while on campus.

At the Board's direction, the policy is being returned with the changes/modifications that had been proposed during original discussion of this item.

MEETING NOTE:

Among the concerns reiterated by staff were:

- 1) the "administrative nightmare" such a policy would be to regulate
- 2) the possible use of cell phones for drugs or other contraband
- 3) the probability of interruption of program or misuse of equipment
- 4) possible dangers inherent if the equipment were used during school transportation

Among points raised by the Board were:

- 1) the reality is the students have the equipment and, after 9/11 there is a real sense of emergency
- 2) at some sites, there is no adequate way for parents to contact students in an emergency
- 3) the policy and administrative regulations must be uniform and explicit throughout the district so enforcement would not be relegated to the site supervisor
- 4) any policy should make clear that there was a zerotolerance for abuse

- 5) the policy must really be for the learning community to understand so it can be followed and enforced
- 6) although unusual, when the item comes back before the Board, the administrative regulations should accompany it

Staff was directed to bring the policy and regulation back for further discussion at the end of November. Staff was further directed to receive additional input from all stakeholders, including response from parents, it being noted that the policy reflected input from all voices.

SMMUSD Board Policy Students

Beepers, Pagers, Cellular Phones and Other Electronic Signaling Devices

The Board of Education recognizes that beepers, pagers, cellular phones and other electronic signaling devices have become commonplace in our community and that many families have come to rely on these devices as a means of communication.

Nevertheless, California Education Code specifically prohibits the possession and/or use of any electronic signaling device that operates through the transmission or receipt of radio waves, including, but not limited to, paging and signaling equipment, by pupils of the school while the pupils are on campus, while attending school-sponsored activities, or while under the supervision and control of school district employees, without the prior consent of the principal or his or her designee. No pupil shall be prohibited from possessing or using an electronic signaling device that is determined by a licensed physician and surgeon to be essential for the health of a pupil and use of which is limited for purposes related to the health of the pupil.

The Superintendent shall establish procedures whereby the possession and/or use of these devices may be permitted, but only with the prior approval of the site administrator or designee. Under no circumstances shall the possession and/or use of any electronic signaling device be permitted if such possession and/or use is disruptive to the educational process.

While electronic signaling devices of all types may be useful for communication purposes, the Board of Education also recognizes the potential for distraction that these devices may cause in the classroom, on campus and at school activities. As a result, the Board highly discourages pupils from possessing and/or using electronic signaling devices, except where the use of such a device is essential for the health of a pupil.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D. 2

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Board Policy 6145, formerly numbered as BP 6146, Extracurricular and Co-Curricular Activities.

COMMENTS:

Current Board Policy (BP 6146) is being recommended for revision as Board Policy 6145, by the administration and athletic department of Santa Monica High School.

The primary difference between the current policy and the proposed revision, is the manner in which eligibility/ineligibility is determined. Current policy states that if a student's GPA for the prior grading period falls below 2.0 (on a 4.0 scale), he/she will be ineligible to participate until such time that the GPA for a grading period is 2.0 or above. The proposed revision would allow for the inclusion of a "probationary period" of not more than one grading period, before a student would become ineligible. This means that if a student's GPA were to fall below 2.0 for the prior grading period, he/she would still be allowed to participate during the current grading period. This would be considered his/her "probationary period" and if grades were not raised to a 2.0 or higher, the student would then become ineligible during the next grading period.

The inclusion of a probationary period is not mandatory, but is permitted under Rule 205.A.1 and 205.A.2 of the California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) "Blue Book". California Education Code 35160.5 also allows for Districts to grant up to one full semester as a "probationary period". It should also be noted that the proposed revision is in compliance with CSBA policy guidelines.

PUBLIC SPEAKER

Mike Griswold, Athletic Director, Coach, Samohi - Mr. Griswold stated that he had received input from 18 coaches and one principal. He believes that advancing such a policy would be beneficial for the following reasons:

the probationary period would allow the schools/teams to "keep the kids" with them because once they are not a part of the team they tend to disappear

2) more students would be encouraged to take advanced courses because there could easily be a system of tutoring (to include Saturday school and weekly academic updates) so ineligible students could improve

3) schools could institute shorter grading periods so students would have better chances of "making a comeback"

Harry Keiley, SMMCTA President - Mr. Keiley requested that, before the Board seriously considered this suggestion, a clear plan for any tutoring program and shorter grading periods be brought before his membership; he suggested that appropriate SMMCTA members be included in the planning.

MEETING NOTE:

The Superintendent stated that the real issue is not a matter of individual principal's discretion; the issue is matter of inequity. He further stated that he did not support the policy as written and that any such policy must be a part of the bigger challenge to wrap opportunity for success around kids at risk. Finally, Mr. Deasy suggested remanding the challenge to the Sports and PE District Advisory Committee for research and explicit direction. He suggested that he would prefer to see an universal application and other ancillary materials, as needed, as part of any future Board item.

The Board so directed Mr. Corliss and appropriate staff.

Extracurricular and Cocurricular Activities

A. GENERAL PROVISIONS

The Board of Education recognizes that extracurricular and cocurricular activities enrich the educational and social development and experiences of students. The district shall encourage and support student participation in extra/cocurricular activities without compromising the integrity and purpose of the educational program.

No student shall be prohibited from participating in extra/cocurricular activities related to the educational program because of inability to pay fees associated with the activity.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that disabled students have access, to the extent possible, to extracurricular and cocurricular activities, student organizations and school-related social events, regardless of the severity or nature of their disabilities.

Extra/cocurricular activities shall be supervised by district employees whenever they are conducted under the name of the district.

B. ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

In order to participate in extra/cocurricular activities, students in grades 7 through 12 must demonstrate satisfactory educational progress in meeting the requirements for graduation. The Superintendent or designee may exempt from eligibility requirements extra/cocurricular activities or programs which are offered primarily for the student's academic or educational achievement.

To encourage and support academic excellence, the Board requires students in grades 7 through 12 to earn a minimum 2.0 or "C" grade point average on a 4.0 scale in order to participate in extra/cocurricular activities. Students with any "F" grades must also maintain minimum progress towards graduation in order to meet eligibility requirements.

The Superintendent or designee may grant ineligible students a probation period of not more than one grading period.

The Superintendent or designee may revoke a student's eligibility for participation in extra/cocurricular activities when a student's poor citizenship is serious enough to warrant loss of this privilege.

NOTE: The Board directed staff that the above paragraph be included in the language of any future Extracurricular Policy.

The Board shall annually review this policy and implementing regulations.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.3

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Board Policy 4113, Assignment.

COMMENTS: BP 4113 (Assignment) is being recommended for adoption as part of the Board's on-going work to establish, revise and update Board policies. This particular policy, if adopted, would replace existing BP 4113 which was adopted by the Board on November 5, 1998. The attached policy is recommended by the California School Board's Association (CSBA) as meeting the current provisions of all new laws and regulations. The CSBA recommended policy was last updated in March, 2001.

This is a revised and MANDATED policy which includes language encouraging assignment of fully qualified teachers to the lowest performing schools, and a note regarding a NEW LAW that establishes incentives for teachers with National Board for Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS) certification to teach in low-performing schools for four years.

Education Code 35035 gives the Superintendent or designee the authority to assign personnel subject to Board approval.

The policy addresses the need to assign qualified teachers to the lowest performing schools with greatest needs. Education Code 44395 provides one-time \$10,000 merit awards to teachers who are employed by districts, including charter schools, and who have attained certification from the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards. SB 1666 (Ch. 70, Statutes of 2000) amended Education Code 44395 to provide an additional \$20,000 if the teacher agrees to teach for four years in a low-performing school, defined as one that is in the bottom half of all schools statewide based on the Academic Performance Index.

Education Code 44250-44279 addresses credential types and provides conditions under which specified teachers may be assigned outside the scope of their credentials. Among these statutes, Education Code 44258.3 allows the Board to assign the holder of a credential other than an emergency permit to teach any subjects in departmentalized classes in any of grades K-12, with the teacher's consent, provided that the Board first verifies that the teacher has adequate knowledge of each subject to be taught. If the district makes such assignments, Education Code 44258.3 mandates the Board to establish policies and procedures for verifying the adequacy of these teachers' subject knowledge; the following paragraph is provided for these districts.

Pursuant to Education Code 44258.9, the County Superintendent of Schools is responsible for monitoring teacher assignments and reporting to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC). In schools and districts likely to have misassignments based on past experience or other information, the County Superintendent must review assignment practices annually. In all other schools, he/she must review assignment practices on a four-year cycle. In counties in which there is a single school district, the CTC is responsible for monitoring teacher assignments. SMMUSD is reviewed on a four-year cycle with the next review scheduled for 2002-03.

Pursuant to Education Code 44258.9, the County Superintendent is required to notify any certificated administrator responsible for a misassignment and advise him/her to correct it within 30 calendar days. The County Superintendent is also required to notify the Superintendent of any district where five percent or more of the certificated teachers in the secondary schools are misassigned, advising him/her to correct the misassignments within 120 calendar days. Education Code 44258.9 also requires a teacher who believes he/she has been misassigned, after exhausting any

local remedies, to file a written notification with the County Superintendent, who must advise the teacher as to the legality of the assignment within 15 working days.

Education Code 44258.7 allows the use of a committee to approve, in advance, the voluntary assignment of full-time teachers to teach an elective course outside their credential authorization in an area for which they have special skills or preparation. Assignments approved by such a committee can be made for any percentage of a teacher's assignment.

CURRENT POLICY

Board Policy Personnel

BP 4113

Assignment

In order to serve the best interests of students and the educational program, the Superintendent or designee shall assign certificated personnel to positions for which their preparation, certification, experience and aptitude qualify them.

Teachers may be assigned to any school within the district in accordance with the collective bargaining agreement.

Teachers may be assigned outside the scope of their certificates or fields of study only as allowed by law and when so requited in order to meet the needs of the educational program.

The Superintendent or designee may assign holders of a credential other than an emergency permit, with their consent, to teach subjects outside their credential authorization in departmentalized classes, pursuant to Education Code 44258.3. The Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures to verify the subject matter knowledge of the teacher before any such assignment is made. These procedures shall be developed with the assistance of subject matter specialists and shall be submitted to the Board for approval.

Assignment

In order to serve the best interests of students and the educational program, the Superintendent or designee shall assign certificated personnel to positions for which their preparation, certification, experience and aptitude qualify them.

Teachers may be assigned to any school within the district in accordance with the collective bargaining agreement.

The Board of Education encourages the assignment of experienced and fully credentialed teachers, including those who have attained National Board for Professional Teaching Standards certification, to schools with the greatest need to improve student achievement.

Teachers may be assigned outside the scope of their certificates or fields of study only as allowed by law and when so required in order to meet the needs of the educational program.

The Superintendent or designee may assign holders of a credential other than an emergency permit, with their consent, to teach subjects outside their credential authorization in departmentalized classes, pursuant to Education Code 44258.3. The Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures to verify the subject matter knowledge of the teacher before any such assignment is made. These procedures shall be developed with the assistance of subject matter specialists and shall be submitted to the Board for approval.

The Superintendent or designee shall periodically report to the Board on any teacher misassignments.

COMMENTS: BP 3550 (Food Service/Child Nutrition Program) is being recommended for adoption as part of the Board's ongoing work to establish, revise and update Board policies. This particular policy, if adopted, would be new to our District policy manual. The attached policy is recommended by the California School Board's Association (CSBA) as meeting the provisions of all new laws and regulations. The CSBA recommended policy was last updated in March, 2001.

This revised policy clarifies that the district's food service program is required to satisfy all legal requirements, including nutritional standards and dietary guidelines. The policy also contains updated legal citations and deletes references to out-dated State Board of Education policy.

Pursuant to 7 CFR 210.12, districts participating in the National School Lunch Program are encouraged to promote activities to involve students and parents/guardians in the program. The following optional paragraph reflects this intent and should be revised to reflect district practice.

In order to qualify for reimbursements under the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs, districts must comply with the nutritional standards specified in 7 CFR 210.10 and 220.8. The following paragraph is for use by districts participating in the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs.

DISCUSSION ITEM D.4 Page 2 of 2

"Offer versus Serve" is an option which allows students to decline a certain number of meal items which they do not intend to consume while still allowing the meal to qualify for reimbursement under the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs. Pursuant to 7 CFR 210.10 and 220.8, this option applies to high school students. At the Board's discretion, this option may be extended to students in all grades to the extent permitted by law.

The Board of Education recognizes that students need adequate, nourishing food in order to grow, learn and maintain good health. To reinforce the district's nutrition education program, foods available on school premises shall be:

- 1. Carefully selected so as to contribute to students' nutritional well-being and the prevention of disease
- 2. Prepared in ways which will appeal to students, retain nutritive quality and foster healthful eating habits
- 3. Served in age-appropriate quantities and at reasonable prices

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the meals offered by the district's food service program meet all legal requirements for participation in the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies designed to encourage the participation of students and parents/guardians in the selection of foods of good nutritional quality for school menus. Parents/guardians are encouraged to support the district's nutrition education efforts by considering nutritional quality when selecting any snacks which they may donate for occasional class parties.

To the extent permitted under the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs, students in all grades shall be allowed to decline a certain number of meal items which they do not intend to consume.

This particular policy, if adopted, would be new to our District policy manual. The attached policy is recommended by the California School Board's Association (CSBA) as meeting the provisions of all new laws and regulations. The CSBA recommended policy was last updated in March, 2001.

This policy has been updated by CSBA to reflect a NEW LAW providing incentive grants to districts to recruit and retain credentialed teachers in schools that are ranked at the bottom half of the state's Academic Performance Index.

This policy reflects the purposes of the Teacher Recruitment Incentive Program established by Education Code 44735, added by SB 1666 (Ch. 70, Statutes of 2000). Under this program, districts may apply for incentive grants to attract and retain credentialed teachers in schools ranking in the bottom half of the Academic Performance Index. Funds may be used at the discretion of the district for the purpose of reducing the number of teachers with emergency permits. Possible incentives listed in Education Code 44735 are included in the policy.

Recruitment And Selection

Because an important factor in student achievement is the quality of the teaching staff, the Board of Education desires to employ the most highly qualified and appropriate person available for each open position.

The Superintendent or designee shall recruit candidates for open positions based on an assessment of the district's needs for specific skills, knowledge and abilities. He/she shall develop job descriptions that accurately describe all essential and marginal functions and duties of each position, and shall disseminate job announcements to ensure a wide range of candidates.

The Superintendent or designee may provide incentives to recruit credentialed teachers to teach in any district school ranked in the bottom half of the state Academic Performance Index. Such incentives may include, but are not limited to, signing bonuses, improved work conditions, teacher compensation or housing subsidies.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop selection procedures that identify the best possible candidate for each position based on screening processes, interviews, observations, and recommendations from previous employers.

No inquiry shall be made with regard to the age, gender, race, ethnicity, religion, national origin, medical condition, disability or sexual orientation of a person seeking employment. During job interviews, applicants may be asked to describe or demonstrate how they will be able to perform the duties of the job.

District employment practices shall not discriminate against legal noncitizen residents. Inquiries to assure employment eligibility shall be made in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulation.

For each position, the Superintendent or designee shall present to the Board one candidate who meets all qualifications established by law and the Board for the position. No person shall be employed by the Board without the recommendation or endorsement of the Superintendent or designee.

COMMENTS: BP 3551 (Food Services Operation/Cafeteria Fund) is being recommended for adoption as part of the Board's on-going work to establish, revise and update Board policies. This particular policy, if adopted, would be new to our District policy manual. The attached policy is recommended by the California School Board's Association (CSBA) as meeting the provisions of all new laws and regulations. The CSBA recommended policy was last updated in March, 2001.

This is a MANDATED policy which contain new note and text regarding the serving of meals to adults other than employees and Board members who are on campus during meal times. Revised option also clarifies that reimbursement for wages and benefits paid from the general fund may not exceed actual costs incurred.

Education Code 38082 authorizes the cafeteria to sell food only to students, district employees, Board members and employees of the fund or association maintaining the cafeteria. Districts that wish to provide meals to other persons are mandated to adopt a resolution authorizing the provision of meals to other persons. In Management Bulletin No. 00-111, the California Department of Education addresses the issue of serving of meals provided under the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs to persons other than those specified in Education Code 38082. The CDE recommends that the Board's policy or resolution specify the circumstances under which those other persons will be served and the means by which the district will ensure that costs of meals are not subsidized by federal or state reimbursements.

Pursuant to Education Code 45103.5, districts may contract with food service management companies only for consulting services for a period of one year. Such companies are not allowed to manage or operate food service programs on behalf of a district. However, it appears permissible under Education Code 45103.5 for a district to enter into a franchise agreement under which a school operates the food service as a fast food company franchise, paying the private company for training, recipes and the use of its logos. The food would be prepared at the school, and the franchise agreement would be subject to the competitive bidding requirements of the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs, as would the purchase of food products.

Food Service Operations/Cafeteria Fund

The Board of Education intends that, insofar as possible, school food services shall be a self-supporting, nonprofit program. Upon recommendation of the Superintendent or designee, the Board shall review and approve meal prices. Program financial reports shall be presented regularly to the Board.

Meals may be offered to employees and Board members as a matter of convenience. Since these meals may include federally donated food commodities, their price shall be set in accordance with state and federal guidelines.

Meals may be served to adults other than employees and Board members who are on campus during meal times for a legitimate purpose, such as serving as a classroom volunteer. Since these meals may include federally donated food commodities, their price shall be set in accordance with state and federal guidelines.

A. Cafeteria Fund

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a cafeteria fund independent of the district's general fund.

The wages, salaries and benefits of food service employees shall be paid from the cafeteria fund. (Education Code 38103)

To increase cost effectiveness, the Superintendent or designee shall centralize and direct the purchasing of food and supplies, the planning of menus, and the auditing of all food service accounts for the district.

B. Contracts with Outside Providers

With Board approval, the district may enter into a contract for management consulting services related to food service on a year-to-year basis.

With Board approval, the district may enter into a contract with a private company that enables a school to operate a franchise offering fast food items for sale to students. The franchise agreement and food purchases shall be subject to the competitive bidding requirements of the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs.

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Board Policy 3511, Energy and Water Conservation

COMMENTS: BP 3511 (Energy and Water Conservation) is being recommended for adoption as part of the Board's ongoing work to establish, revise and update Board policies.

This policy was first introduced on CSBA's web site in February 2001. The Policy was revised to reflect recommendations by the California Department of Education designed to help districts deal with power outages and to conserve energy. The Policy contains language regarding the development of an energy efficiency program and emergency action plan.

In the event that instructional time is lost as a result of an energy crisis, districts may request credit for the loss of ADA as detailed in the California Department of Education's Management Advisory 90-01.

The California Energy Commission administers the Bright Schools Program pursuant to Public Resources Code 25410-25421. This program offers specific services to help districts become more energy efficient by providing design and implementation assistance, conducting energy audit and feasibility studies, providing equipment bid specifications, assisting with installation and helping to secure loans for energy-related maintenance. In addition, CSBA administers the Smart Power Program which provides an independent evaluation of energy suppliers' for school districts and county office of education.

The attached policy is recommended by the California School Board's Association (CSBA) as meeting the provisions of all new laws and regulations. The CSBA recommended policy was developed in March, 2001 and would be a new policy for SMMUSD.

The Board of Education is committed to reducing the district's demand for electricity and water in order to help conserve natural resources and to save money to support other district needs. To that end, the Board shall establish goals to help reduce the district's energy and water consumption.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish an energy efficiency program which shall include specific strategies designed to help the district use energy more efficiently and to help ensure that funds intended for student learning are not diverted to cover energy costs.

As part of the energy efficiency program, the Superintendent or designee shall develop an emergency action plan to address actions to be taken in the event of power outages in schools, both during and after school operations. The action plan shall also address the role of staff, students and parents/guardians in helping to conserve resources and other activities to help the district meet energy reduction goals.

The Superintendent or designee shall analyze the effect of a utility rate increase on the district's budget. He/she shall develop and implement any necessary contingency plans.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly inspect district facilities and operations and make recommendations for maintenance and capital expenditures which may help the district reach its energy and water conservation goals.

The Superintendent or designee shall make every effort to identify funding opportunities and cost-reducing incentive programs to help the district achieve its conservation goals.

The Superintendent or designee shall periodically report to the Board on the district's progress in meeting energy and water use reduction goals.

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Board Policy 3580, District Records.

COMMENTS: BP 3580 (District Records) is being recommended for adoption as part of the Board's on-going work to establish, revise and update Board policies. This particular policy, if adopted, would replace existing BP 3589 (attached) which was adopted in October, 1988. The updated policy is recommended by the California School Board's Association (CSBA) as meeting the provisions of all new laws and regulations. The CSBA recommended policy was last updated in March, 2001.

CSBA updated this Policy to reflect NEW LAW which authorizes the participation of victims of stalking in the Secretary of State's confidential address program.

Although 5 CCR 16022 authorizes districts to store permanent records only on microfilm, Education Code 35254, as amended by AB 1600 (Ch. 646, Statutes of 1999), now authorizes electronic district records. It is likely that Title 5 regulations will be amended to reflect this new law.

Government Code 6207 provides that, when creating a public record, the district must not include actual residences of students, parents/guardians or employees who have been victims of domestic violence when a substitute address is designated through the Secretary of State's Safe At Home Program (formerly known as the California Confidential Address Program (Cal CAP)). As amended by SB 1318 (Ch. 562, Statutes of 2000), victims of stalking may also participate in this program pursuant to Government Code 6205.5.

DISCUSSION ITEM D. (Continued) Page 2 of 2

Districts are required to accept the program participation card issued by the Secretary of State and substitute a P.O. Box address as the participant's real address. According to the Secretary of State, a participant's confidential, actual address may only be used to establish district eligibility and for school emergency purposes. Pursuant to Government Code 6207, a participant's confidential, actual address is not a public record and should not be made available to anyone under any circumstances.
