Following the public comments, the Board of Education declared a moratorium on the policy of partial meal service until the item could be agendized for Board discussion. A review of how other sites handle accounts that are in arrears will be investigated and nutritional guidelines will also be addressed.

A. Student Board Members Reports

Ms. Kitty Smith, Malibu High School - filed the following report:
 Malibu Middle School Events:

Sleepy Hollow, the middle school play, is running on the 28th, 29th, and 30th at 7 and on the 31st at 2.

The middle school newspaper is finally a stable project. They are looking to get out their first issue the first week of November.

Malibu High School Events:

Clubs have started up again: Operation Smile has already had two missions, one to India and one to China. Both girls are back now. Project Iraqi Children is a major club looking for fundraising, donations of clothing and food to be sent to the suffering people of Iraq.

Homecoming was a huge success. The football team won, and the dance had the best turnout Malibu has seen in years. All fall sports are doing well. Boys water polo took the lead in the league last night (10/20) in a game against Oaks Christian.

Parents Concerns: lockers-- instead of lockers on our high school campus, there are class and home sets of books. with budgeting tight, there are not enough books, and with students taking on heavy courses, as well as carrying sports equipment and SAT guides, backpacks are getting too heavy. Parents, administration and students are all looking for ways to solve these problems.

The New Drug and Alcohol Policy: to enforce the policy, Malibu created several committees to oversee the important aspects of the policy.

SMMUSD split still a concern to parents and students still with years left at Malibu.

Administrative concerns: tardies are a major issue with the administration. Though scheduling conflicts are now all fixed, students still are not making it to class on time. Consequences are being discussed.

• Ms. Mari Sahba, Olympic High School - filed the following report:
Student council meetings have begun. The team has worked very well together these past couple of meetings. The students have been discussing and organizing on how to reach out to the students in helping them with their questions or concerns with school. The student council is working on ways to let the students know where to begin when getting prepared for college. Also, the council is putting together a Halloween party for students and staff next Friday on the 29th. It's a pirate theme since the school's mascot is the Buccaneers. The students have been working very hard on making fun games and events for the students and staff. There will be a photo booth, several pie involved games, bobbing for apples, and a costume contest. Everyone is excited to see what the student council will be put together.

As you might remember me telling you the Olympic students were supposed to join with the Ocean Park Community in painting a mural of the historical Ocean Park neighborhood, but it was canceled due to rainy weather. We plan on painting it tomorrow so we all hope for good weather. Olympic students have been looking forward to this and are very enthusiastic for tomorrow.

- Ms. Naomi Vasquez, Santa Monica High School filed the following report: Samohi's Homecoming game and dance were very successful.

 Today, October 21, district office administrators filled in for House principals so that they could work altogether with their coach. (Dr. Deasy noted that district office administrators will be doing this once a month.) AVID students are holding a car wash on Saturday on campus enter at 7th and Michigan. The end of the first grading period has arrived and grades will be mailed out next week thanks to the PTSA. Mock elections will be held on Friday, October 28. Also on Friday, October 28, the Day of the Dead art exhibit at Roberts Art Gallery will be open. During November 1-4, students will work as camp counselors with Will Rogers 5th grade students. In the spring, students will do the same at Grant Elementary School. The fall play, "Play it Again Sam" opens on November 12. Lastly, students and staff are working on the cell phone policy. A copy will be provided to the Board when it is complete.
- B. SMMCTA Report Harry Keiley thanked Dr. Matthews for a letter he sent to all staff to assist employees with health benefits by getting them correct information and timely responses to questions. Mr. Keiley reported that he attended a conference with Dr. Escarce, Ms. Bloomfield and Dr. Deasy on education reform and looking at large urban high schools in New York city. He talked with six leaders in New York city and he looks forward to sharing his experiences with the Board of Education and his Board of Directors and the teachers. He hopes to be able to continue the dialogue with Stanford who put this conference together. (Dr. Deasy noted that the conference participation was made possible by funding from First Federal Bank of California.)

One of the goals of the union this year is to have more presence on school

campuses to get feedback from members. He has visited a number of elementary schools and noted that testing is of great concern. Redesign at Santa Monica High School is of key concern.

- C. SEIU Report Keryl Cartee thanked district staff for working to improve staff morale at the district office. A monthly breakfast and a weekly newletter have helped to bring about positive change. Ms. Cartee noted that negotiations have been completed and noted that that D.1 addresses that issue. Work continues on SEIU's 10 year vision plan. Ms. Cartee encouraged everyone to be sure to vote on November 2.
- **D. Santa Monica Malibu Council PTA Maria Rodriguez** reminded everyone that today, October 21, 2004 is the beginning of Red Ribbon Week. She introduced Mr. Barry Snell who presented the Board with red ribbons and a copy the California State Resolution supporting the observance and celebration of Red Ribbon Week. This is the 13th anniversary of this observance.

Ms. Rodriguez reported that PTA Council has taken action to support local Measure N, (Transiency Occupancy Tax- TOT) and Santa Monica College Measure S. At the state level, PTA Council is supporting propositions 63 (Mental Health service expansion) and 61 (Children's Hospital project) and is opposed to proposition 68 (non-tribal gambling expansion).

PTA Council report card will go out to 42,000 homes in the District.

PTA Council thanks Dr. Deasy and Dr. Muncey for the presentation on district data made to PTA presidents and parents. Dr. Deasy and Ms. Rodriguez attended the 33rd district conference regarding parent leadership academy.

Council is working on summer school programs with the SMM Education Foundation and exploring the possibility of expanding the program to middle school. A survey has gone to middle school teachers for feedback. Lastly, Ms. Rodriguez reported that those students in Malibu needing intervention during the summer must travel to Santa Monica because there is not intervention program in Malibu. She was asked to share that information with the Board.

E. Special Education District Advisory Committee Report - Tricia Crane
Ms. Crane, on behalf of the Special Education DAC, requested that adoption of
the plan be uncoupled from the Superintendent's Performance Targets. The DAC
thanks the Board for making Special Education and the Special Education
Strategic Plan a high priority, but feels that the plan should not be tied to the
performance targets.

X SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

- The Superintendent noted that Mr. Winston Braham immediately sought to remedy the problems with health benefits and is also working to have productive discussions with the Personnel Commission to move the reorganization forward.
- Proposed Agenda Modification Dr. Deasy suggested that items of particular interest to the public be "time stamped" for a particular time. That way the public would have an indication when certain items come before the board.
- Financial Oversight Committee Application Period Extended to 10/27/04 to provide time for the FOC to meet to review the applications and then make a recommendation to the Board.
- Dr. Deasy thanked Peggy Harris who has had the table of contents for the agenda translated into Spanish as well as certain items included in the agenda that may be of particular interest to our Spanish speaking parents.

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt the attached Revised Attendance Calendar for the 2004/2005 school year.

COMMENTS: Education Code §73201 allows us to build an attendance school calendar to maximize ADA by strategically positioning the start and end of the P2 Apportionment period. Historically, our secondary enrollment drops from the seventh month onward. Since P2 is computed as the average attendance from the beginning of the school year through the last full attendance month ending on or before April 15, the earlier we count the ADA, the more apportionment we will generate. This can be accomplished by excluding either the winter break or the spring break and filing P2 through the 7th school month rather than the 8th school month, as is currently depicted in the regular school calendar.

This will not, in any way, change the current adopted school calendar. It is for attendance accounting purposes only.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.1

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the Tentative Agreement reached with the Service Employees International Union (SEIU), Local 660 during the collective bargaining process. AB 1200 requires that this Agreement be sunshined to the Board of Education using our routine notification process, and that the Los Angeles County Office of Education approve the financial impact of the Agreement ten (10) days in advance of full Board approval.

COMMENT: The District's negotiators and the SEIU Negotiation Team reached a Tentative Agreement which will go into effect January 1, 2004, with a one percent (1%) salary increase effective July 1, 2004, and a one percent (1%) salary increase effective February 1, 2005.

Health and welfare benefits will be maintained at current District levels, except for those employees choosing the single insured, who will no longer be able to receive Blue Cross PERS Care unless they choose to pay the differential between the Kaiser rate and the Blue Cross PERS Care rate. Those who choose a single insurance package will be able to choose Blue Cross PERS Choice at no additional cost. Open enrollment will be continued through October 28, 2004, so that SEIU employees may have time to switch insurance if necessary. During the 2004/05 school year, a joint committee including certificated and classified bargaining units and other key stakeholders will be formed to review health care options.

A Tentative Agreement has been reached on a calendar issue. Less than twelve-month employees must schedule 14 days vacation during the winter and spring recesses. Employees earning less than 14 days vacation may use necessity days, floating holidays, or may request a District work assignment up to three days to avoid unpaid days. Exceptions to the above shall not occur without prior written approval from the Assistant Superintendent, Human Resources.

It is agreed that the District will form a committee with SEIU during the 2004/05 school year to examine the Professional Growth Program.

The Length of the Contract will be from January 1, 2004 through December 31, 2005. Contract negotiations will reopen no earlier than May 1, 2005, with reopeners of Salary, Benefits and Professional Growth.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.2

As the Board of Education and community are well aware, a shooting incident took place on Tuesday, September 28, at 4:30 p.m. on Virginia Avenue, adjacent and behind Edison Elementary School. The response to this violent act consisted of immediate on-site support by the principal, staff and superintendent. The district has provided support and counseling for the Edison faculty and students, CREST staff, parents, immediate family of the intended victim and administration. Site administrator and district office continued to maintain daily contact with the policy for updates and information. Immediate safety adjustments to the Edison campus were made including locking gates between 8:30 a.m. and 3 p.m., using the entrance gate at the Kansas Office only, maintaining a strict sign-in and identification badge process when arriving on campus, and locking the main doors at the Kansas entrance after 4 p.m. Student pickup took place in the southwest lot only. This year, Edison began its Cool Tools training which is a safe school system to prevent violence.

On October 4, a community meeting was held at Edison Elementary School. As a direct result of the incident and community meeting, the district will explore a number of requests made at the meeting including:

- 1) researching code requirements for and the installment of push-gates (November 18, 2004).
- 2) initiating a safety and threat assessment study of Edison Elementary School (November 18, 2004).
- 3) releasing assessments to the public by the second Board meeting in November (November 18, 2004). The report will be made available to the Edison school office in both English and Spanish.

It is anticipated that the results of the assessments will determine further enhancements to the safety and security of the students and staff at Edison Elementary School.

A summary of emergency supports provided to Edison Elementary School are attached.

To open this item for discussion, Dr. Deasy thanked the community partners who participated in the community meeting held on October 4 at Edison Elementary School, including Chief of Police, James T. Butts and City Manager, Susan McCarthy. He also thanked the parents and community members who attended the meeting and provided input.

The superintendent noted that Julie Rusk, City of Santa Monica, Lt. P.J. Guido, SM Police Department and principals from the John Adams' pathway (Mr. Leon, Edison; Ms. Irene Ramos, John Adams; Dr. Ilene Straus, Samohi) were present at this Board meeting and thanked them all for attending.

Dr. Deasy reported that the City of Santa Monica has organized a neighborhood/school community meeting for November 16, 7 p.m. at Edison Elementary School to get feedback on various traffic circulation patterns in the area. This meeting is sponsored by City of Santa Monica and all are welcome to attend.

Further, the superintendent reported that since the shooting incident, the number of police officers deployed to patrol the Pico Neighborhood has increased by a total of 10 overtime officers spanning a 15-hour period. The officers' shifts are staggered so that there is a maximum of six officers on duty during evening/nighttime hours. During the day, two of the officers are focused specifically on Edison Elementary School. The beat car and Pico bicycle officers provide extra patrols at Edison beginning at 7:30 in the morning. These efforts have increased police presence and visibility at and around the school. Patrol service hours have increased in the neighborhood and more so in the Edison Elementary School area especially during drop-off and pick-up times. The service enhancements will be evaluated after 30 days.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.3

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt revisions to Board Policy 5123 to bring the policy into compliance with current legislation.

COMMENT: Board Policy 5123 has been revised to accurately reflect the district's philosophy about insuring student success by providing appropriate, timely, adequate interventions to support students at risk of retention. The assessment information has also been updated to accurately reflect the measures used to determine promotion and retention.

In the interests of coherence, BP 5123.1 Retention has been subsumed into BP 5123. The old policy on retention (BP5123.1) had not been revised since 1981.

Principals and staff of the Education Services Department are currently refining the Administrative Regulations to accompany this policy. The Administrative Regulations will:

- Indicate the criteria for identification of students at risk of retention
- Outline procedures for notifying parents
- Describe Academic Improvement Plan that must be developed
- Provide the timeline for supports
- Institute a multi-level process for making a final decision on retention
- Insure a process for hearing parent appeals.

5123 Students Promotion/Acceleration/Retention

<u>SUBTOPIC</u> <u>POLICY</u> <u>REGULATION</u> <u>EXHIBIT</u>

Progress and Student Records

DETAIL

The Board of Education expects students to progress through each grade level within one school year. To accomplish this, instruction should accommodate the varying interests and growth patterns of individual students and include strategies for addressing <u>academic support</u> when needed.

Promotion

Students shall progress through the grade levels by demonstrating growth in learning and meeting grade-level standards of expected student achievement.

Progress toward high school graduation shall be based on students' ability to pass the subjects and electives necessary to earn the required number of credits and, <u>beginning in the 2003-2004 school</u> year, on their ability to pass the state high school exit examination.

Acceleration

When high academic achievement is evident, the Superintendent or designee may recommend a student for acceleration into a higher grade level. The student's <u>maturity level</u> shall be taken into consideration in making a determination to accelerate a student.

Retention

As early as possible in the school year and in students' school careers, the Superintendent or designee shall identify students who may be at risk of retention or recommended for retention in accordance with law, Board policy, administrative regulation and the following criteria.

Students shall be identified on the basis of a combination of multiple measures. The following indicators of academic achievement shall be used:

(1) Teacher grades.

- (2) State-wide achievement test scores (e.g. California Standards Tests)
- (3) Other performance-based assessments designed by the district
- (4) In the case of English Language Learners, student progress toward proficiency in use of the English language.
- (5) In the case of Special Education students, individual progress toward completion of Individualized Education Program (IEP) objectives.

When a student in grades 2 through 9 is retained or recommended for retention, the Superintendent or designee shall offer programs of direct, systematic and intensive supplemental instruction in accordance with Education Code 37252.2, to assist the student in overcoming his/her academic deficiencies. Such opportunities may include but are not limited to tutorial programs, after-school programs, Saturday school programs, weekend school programs and summer school programs.

When a student is identified as being at risk of retention or recommended for retention, the Superintendent or designee shall so notify the student's parents/guardians in writing early in the school year. The student's parent/guardian shall be provided an opportunity to consult with the teacher(s) responsible for the decision to promote or retain the student. (Education Code 48070.5).

The Superintendent/designee shall also provide a copy of the district's promotion/retention guidelines to those parents/guardians who have been notified that his/her child is eligible for retention.

Before retaining a student, the principal or designee shall determine that:

- (1) The student has not met standards of expected student achievement.
- (2) Remedial help has been provided consistently but has not sufficiently prepared the student for advancement.
- (3) Appropriate support targeted to the student's needs and maturity will be provided in addition to retention.

Parent agreement with the decision is suggested but not required except at the kindergarten level.

Retained students may be given the opportunity to attend a different district school.
