DETAIL

The Food and Nutrition Services Policy for feeding students who come to the cafeteria without money is as follows:

- Students who are new or who require District assistance are to be fed a full meal for the first three days and marked as paid on the daily sales worksheet
- Parents who prepay will receive a written notice when the number of meals available reaches 5 (five), or cash equivalent (\$13.75). Only one notice will be sent as a reminder. The notice will be sent by the school office.
- Students will be allowed to owe for only three consecutive complete meals, a value not to exceed \$8.25 for the 2005/06 school year the cash equivalent of three full price meals.
- If a child comes through the serving line without money, the Cafeteria Lead will issue a notice to the School Office. The School Office will send this notice to the parent.
- If a child does not have money and has exceeded his/her three meal credit, a partial meal will be offered to the student. The partial meal will be a nutritionally adequate meal consisting of a cheese sandwich and nonfat milk. A written reminder notice will be sent home with the child on the first day when a partial meal is served. The notice will be sent by the school office.
- A Negative Balance Report will be printed on a weekly basis and sent to the school office. The school office staff will send a letter or contact all parents on the list. The school office staff will remind parents of the balance due and the fact that their child may be receiving a partial meal.
- Meal credits and cash balances may be transferred between household members only.

Unless otherwise agreed upon with the school office or school PTA, parents are solely responsible for ensuring that their child's account is active and not negative status.

There is no credit or partial meal service for secondary students.

DETAIL

The Board of Education believes that grades serve a valuable instructional purpose by helping students and parents/guardians identify the student's areas of strength and those areas needing improvement. Parents/ guardians and students have the right to receive course grades that represent an accurate evaluation of the student's achievement.

POLICY

Х

Teachers shall evaluate a student's work in relation to standards which apply to all students at his/her grade level, not in relation to the work of other students in one particular class. The Superintendent or designee shall establish and regularly evaluate a uniform grading system, and principals shall ensure that student grades conform to this system. Teachers shall inform students and parents/guardians how student achievement will be evaluated in the classroom.

Grades should be based on impartial, consistent observation of the quality of the student's work and his/her mastery of course content and objectives. Students shall have the opportunity to demonstrate this mastery through a variety of channels such as, but not limited to, classroom participation, homework, tests and portfolios. The Board recognizes that portfolios may be especially useful in assessing how skills, knowledge and thought processes have been combined from a number of different subject areas. The intent is to allow students to show mastery in a way that best matches their learning style and using a number of modalities. Behavior, effort and attendance shall be reported in separate evaluations, not in the student's academic grade.

A. Unexcused Absences

If a student misses class without an excuse and does not subsequently turn in homework, take a test or fulfill another class requirement which he/she missed, the teacher may lower the student's grade for nonperformance.

Students with excessive unexcused absences (10 absences per grading period) may be given a failing grade and not receive credit for the class(es). Teachers who withhold class credit for this reason shall so inform the class and parents/guardians at the beginning of the semester.

Proficiency standards adopted for regular general educational programs may be appropriate for special education students. Differential standards and/or assessments Instructional program modifications, including assessments may be appropriate for special education students who are not able to attain the district's regular proficiency standards.

The Individualized Education Program (IEP) team shall determine whether a student with exceptional needs has the abilities to attain the district's regular proficiency standards with appropriate educational services and support. When necessary, the IEP team may shall develop differential proficiency standards and/or assessments appropriate to the student's needs and potential modify the student's instructional program to allow the student to access the district's regular proficiency standards. Grades and evaluation of the student's achievement shall be based on the provisions made for differential standards and/or assessments modified program.

No student shall be classified as eligible for differential standards of proficiency a modified program for the purpose of circumventing the legal requirement to maintain academic eligibility for extracurricular or cocurricular activities. (Education Code 35160.5)

When reporting student grades to parents/guardians, teachers may add narrative descriptions, observational notes and/or samples of classroom work in order to better describe student progress in specific skills and subcategories of achievement.

DETAIL

The Board of Education desires students and staff to be free from the fear and danger presented by firearms and other weapons. The Board therefore prohibits students any person other than authorized law enforcement or security personnel from possessing weapons, imitation firearms, or dangerous instruments of any kind in school buildings, on school grounds or buses, or at a school-related or school-sponsored activity away from school, or while going to or coming from school.

Under the power granted to the Board to maintain order and discipline in the schools and to protect the safety of students, staff and the public, any school employee is authorized to confiscate a weapon, dangerous instrument or imitation firearm from any person on school grounds.

Students possessing or threatening others with a weapon, dangerous instrument or imitation firearm are subject to suspension and/or expulsion in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulations.

For instances involving a firearm, expulsion shall be for no less than one year.

The principal or designee shall notify law enforcement authorities when any student possesses a weapon or commits any act of assault with a firearm or other weapon. (20 USC 8922, 20 USC 7151,Education Code 48902, Penal Code 245, 626.9, 626.10)

A. Possession of Pepper Spray

The Board recognizes that students' age 16 or older may legally possess tear gas or tear gas weapons such as pepper spray for the purpose of self-defense. However, to prevent potential misuse that may harm students or staff, students are prohibited from carrying such items on campus or at school activities.

Reporting of Dangerous Objects

The Board encourages students to promptly report the presence of weapons, injurious objects or other suspicious activity to school authorities. The identity of a student who reports such activity shall remain confidential to the extent permitted by law.

6146.1 Instruction High School Graduation Requirements

SUBTOPICPOLICYREGULATIONEXHIBITCurriculumX

DETAIL

The Governing Board desires to prepare each student to obtain a diploma of high school graduation in order to provide students with opportunities for postsecondary education and/or employment.

In order to be graduated from high school, a student must meet the following requirements:

- Earn 220 semester credits in Grades 9-12; each course is valued at five credits, a year equals two courses (10 credits).
- Pass four (4) years of English in Grades 9-12 in an integrated reading and writing curriculum. This requirement is equal to 40 semester credits.
- 3. Effective with the 2007 graduating class, pass three (3) years of mathematics in Grades 9-12 with at least 2 years (20 credits) to be taken in Grades 9 10-12. Up to 10 semester credits for Algebra I taken in the 7th or 8th grade may be applied to meet this requirement. This requirement is equal to 30 semester credits.

Beginning in the 2003-04 school year, at least one mathematics course, or a combination of two mathematics courses, shall meet or exceed state academic content standards for Algebra I. If any student completes coursework in grades 7 through 12 that meets or exceeds state academic content standards for algebra, those courses shall apply toward satisfying this mathematics requirement. (Education Code 51224.5)

- Pass two (2) years of science in Grades 9-12; one (1) year must be a life science; one (1) year must be a physical science. This requirement is equal to 20 semester credits.
- 5. Pass three (3) years of social studies in Grades 9-12 including two (2) courses of World History, two (2) courses of U.S. History or its equivalent; one (1) course of Economics; one (1) course of U.S. Government. This requirement is equal to 30 semester credits.

- Pass one year of visual or performing arts, speech, debate, foreign language or American Sign Language. This requirement is equal to 10 semester credits.
- 7. Demonstrate Board approved technology proficiency by integrating word processing, electronic researching and other computer skills in at least one student/classroom project. (Graduation Class of 2002)
- Pass one (1) course of Health, to be taken in the 9th Grade, preferably. This requirement is equal to 5 semester credits.
- Pass four (4) courses of Physical Education, two (2) of which are to be taken in Grade 9. This requirement is equal to 20 semester credits.
- 10. All courses used to satisfy graduation requirements shall be approved by the Board, and reviewed and re-adopted at least every four years. Additional graduation requirements must be approved by the Board of Education.

Unless otherwise noted, these requirements are effective with the graduation class of 2000.

Because the prescribed course of study may not accommodate the needs of some students, the Board shall provide alternative means for the completion of prescribed courses in accordance with law.

* Graduation requirements listed above equal 155 semester credits. 65 semester credits are available for elective courses.

Standards of Proficiency for Classes Prior to 2004 To receive a high school diploma, district students also must achieve at least minimum proficiency in reading comprehension, writing and mathematics. The Board shall adopt proficiency standards in these areas and any others it deems appropriate. All adopted proficiency standards shall correspond with the goals of the course of study required for graduation.

Student progress toward proficiency in basic skills shall be assessed in English once during grades 7 through 9 and twice during grades 10 and 11. A separate assessment shall be made of the student's proficiency in each skill area.

Remedial instruction shall be provided to any student who does not show adequate progress toward mastery of basic skills. This instruction may be provided in summer school and shall offer the student numerous opportunities to achieve mastery. When a student does not show adequate progress, the Superintendent or designee shall inform a student's parent/guardian in writing that the student shall not receive a high school diploma unless the prescribed standards are met.

<u>High School</u> Exit Exam for the Classes of <u>2004</u> <u>2006</u> and Later Beginning in the <u>2003-04</u> <u>2005-2006</u> school year, each student completing grade 12 shall have successfully passed the state exit examination in language arts and mathematics as a condition of high school graduation. (Education Code 60851)

Supplemental instruction shall be offered to any student who does not demonstrate "sufficient progress," as defined in Board policy, toward passing the exit examination. (Education Code 37252, 60851)

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly report to the Board regarding the number of students who have fulfilled all local and state graduation requirements except for passage of the exit examination and the resources that have been offered to such students.

Certification of Completion

Students who have passed all the district's course requirements by the end of their senior year but are unable to pass the high school examination shall receive a "Certificate of Completion."

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly report to the Board regarding the number of students receiving a "Certificate of Completion" and the resources that have been offered to such students.

WHEREAS, the City Manager recommended to the Santa Monica City Council to approve the approximate \$530,000.00 of increased funding negotiated by the Master Facility Use Agreement Committee; and

WHEREAS, the City Council had concerns about transparency in the areas of finance and Special Education within the school district; and

WHEREAS, the City Council approved the increased funding, but imposed conditions that would need to be met by the school district; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education desires to work in a collaborative manner with the City Council while maintaining the responsibility for policy creation and decision making in matters within the jurisdiction of the school board; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education believes that the financial matters of the school district and the actions of the Board of Education in the area of finance have never been as transparent as they have been over the past year; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education has previously agreed to hire outside consultant/s to perform an independent audit of Special Education, including the financial, programmatic, policy and practice aspects inherent to this area; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education, at a board meeting on July 12, 2007, voted on implementing an immediate moratorium on the use of confidentiality clauses as a part of Special Education Settlement Agreements, unless requested by parents, until such time as the Special Education audit is complete and presented to the board; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education recognizes that controversy will continue to be present in the area of Special Education so long as this mandated program is not fully funded as promised by Congress back in 1975;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Education accepts the increased funding, and the conditions attached to the funding by the Santa Monica City Council, for this negotiation cycle only. The Board of Education expresses its concern related to the placement of conditions on the acceptance, or use, of funds associated with the Master Facility Use Agreement by and between the City of Santa Monica and the Santa Monica-Malibu USD.

The Board of Education hereby directs the Superintendent to initiate the hiring of consultant/s so the audit of Special Education can begin and contact the City manager and schedule a meeting of the committee to review paragraph 2.A of the *Conditions to Santa Monica City Council Approval of the City Manager's Recommendation for the Master Facilities Use Agreement with the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District.*

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.01

Incorporated within the district's Facility Master Plan (FMP) are defined projects based on current and future facility and curriculum requirements relating to the Measure "BB" bond. The purpose of the bond is "to enable the District to enhance the educational opportunities of all the students in the District and to achieve one of the Board's primary goals of providing comparable schools for all students throughout the District." During the development of the FMP, it was apparent that in order to achieve these goals, the need was to focus on technology, fire/life/safety, and sustainability. The purpose of this agenda item is to outline an initial list of potential projects in an effort to move the Measure "BB" project planning, design, and implementation process forward.

With a local bond of \$268 million, staff has identified approximately \$190 million in construction projects as follows:

RE: MEASURE "BB" PROJECTS - PHASE I - OLYMPIC HIGH SCHOOL

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.02

The purpose of the Measure "BB" bond is "to enable the District to enhance the educational opportunities of all the students in the District and to achieve one of the Board's primary goals of providing comparable schools for all students throughout the District." The purpose of this agenda item is to outline an initial list of potential projects at the Olympic High School site in an effort to move the Measure "BB" project planning, design, and implementation process forward.

With a local bond of \$268 million, staff has identified approximately \$190 million in construction projects that were presented at the July 28, 2007, Board of Education meeting for discussion. At that meeting, the board requested staff to increase the scope of construction at Olympic high School and to bring options back to the board for review and comment.

In developing the individual site plans, consideration must be given not only to programmatic needs, but classroom "swing space" while construction and demo work is done on the facility. At Olympic High School, the following initial concepts must be considered before beginning programmatic planning at the site.

What programs ultimately are to be housed at the Olympic site? The FMP has determined that a total population of around 400 is the maximum that would be feasible at this site.

Alternative Uses for the Olympic Campus

- If Olympic is used for a Continuation High School and Community Day school or Continuation High School and Small Learning Community from Santa Monica High School, the following issue must be considered:
 - A Continuation High School/Community Day or Continuation High School/Small Learning Community combination would require separate classroom facilities and the use of shared common areas scheduled for use at different times. Shared use facilities would include such buildings as Library, Cafeteria, Auditorium spaces.

- 2. If Olympic is used for a Small High School the following issues must be considered:
 - The Olympic campus is small in size and cannot sustain a small high school with all necessary facilities that would be standard for a high school of 400.
 - Due to the location of the site, it falls under the jurisdiction of the Coastal Commission and will require review for any new construction. Traffic and parking limitations will be paramount in this review. The current population on the site which houses Olympic Continuation High School, Adult Education, Pine Street Pre-School and Special Ed programs requires 168 parking spaces by the Coastal Commission. Should an increase in driving population increase, so will the parking requirements.
- 3. If the Olympic site is used to create a small High School with Career/Tech/College pathway, the following items need to be considered:
 - The campus could be designed and developed for a population of 250-400 students.
 - The campus could sustain the higher level of students due to the flexibility of such programs which include work study alternatives and longer operational hours (8:00 am-8:00 pm) and requires fewer students on campus at one time.
 - A program such as this would offer alternate educational opportunities to students which are not currently available to them.
- 4. Design the Olympic Facility to meet current programmatic needs of the current Continuation High School (125 students). If this were done the following would need to be considered:
 - Design new classroom facilities to include 10 new classrooms, Science Lab, office space and a vocational education rooms in addition to a library, auditorium and outdoor eating spaces.
 - 250 students would be the ideal population and require more classroom space than the 10 spaces listed above.

Background information:

Based on the FMP assessment, in order to begin developing the Olympic site for other uses or expansion of existing programs, Washington West would need to be developed into the Special Ed/Preschool facility. This would allow the rooms used by these two programs at Olympic High School to be used as "swing space" once vacated. (The Washington West project was taken to the Board of Education with a list of other projects for consideration as a Measure "BB" project on July 28, 2007. The Washington West site development is estimated at \$16 million dollars).

The Measure "BB" Advisory Committee is scheduled to review this recommendation at its meeting on August 6, 2007.

RE: SMALL SCHOOLS TASK FORCE

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.03

It is recommended that the Board of Education form a task force to study the feasibility of creating an additional High School and/or Middle High School within the Santa Monica Malibu Unified School District.

The secondary schools in Santa Monica, particularly Santa Monica High School, are larger than optimal size. Current research on school reform validates the success of "small learning communities," specifically, schools of approximately 500 students. These research findings, along with several grant opportunities, enabled the district to implement the current house design at Santa Monica High School. This design resulted in substantial and significant gains in student achievement since its inception along with providing access and opportunity for more students to gain entrance into rigorous courses. While the current structure at SAMOHI offers many advantages to students, not all students desire or will succeed in a large comprehensive high school. Therefore, it seems evident that reducing the number of students at SAMOHI would significantly improve the teaching and learning conditions on that campus while also providing another learning opportunity for students in Santa Monica and Malibu.

Further, during the 2003/2004 academic year, the former Superintendent, several Board of Education members, and the SMMCTA President had the opportunity to visit several small school models throughout the country. Based on the board's desire to create additional and optimal learning environments for students, the board established the study of the small schools concept and proposals for SMMUSD as a performance target for that year. Due to a myriad of other challenges that occurred, this target was set aside for that year with the intention to bring it back should funding for such a concept become available. With the completion of the Facilities Master Plan and the passage of Measure "BB," now is the opportune time to undertake this initiative.

The committee shall study and research small High Schools and or Middle High Schools, examine the feasibility of this concept for SMMUSD. The committee will also explore models other than a comprehensive high school that would attract students with different interests and provide an additional educational opportunity for secondary students. Further, in conjunction with proposed Measure "BB" projects, the committee will examine the feasibility of creating a smaller high school campus on existing district property, such as Olympic High School. The committee will also examine the proposed K-8 model for the existing Edison site.

The committee shall be appointed by no later than October 1, 2007, and shall update the Board of Education in December 2007, Spring 2008, and present their findings in June 2008. This proposed timeline corresponds to the tentative timeline for the CEQA review. It is anticipated that recommendations from this committee will assist the board in determining project priorities based on educational goals.

The committee shall include the following members: district senior staff, teacher(s), secondary school administrator(s), an SMMCTA representative, a parent, student(s), and a member(s) of the Board of Education.

- RE: PROGRAM-LEVEL ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT (PEIR) TIMELINE

DICUSSION ITEM NO. D.04

Agenda Informational Item #I.01 dated June 13, 2007, provided a detailed explanation of the CEQA and EIR process, the impact on the Facility Master Plan, and the anticipated schedule for the review process.

In review:

California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)

CEQA requires that public agencies assess the potential effects of development projects on environmental resources. The California Legislature intended that long-term protection of the environment be considered in public decisions, that governmental decision makers and the public be informed about the potential environmental effects of a proposed project, and that ways be identified to avoid or significantly reduce environmental damage.

Project-Level EIR Analysis

Certain campus improvement recommendations presented in the Master Plan are well defined and are being considered by the District for implementation in the near-term, therefore, the PEIR will also include project-level analysis for certain schools.

Goal of Program EIR (PEIR)

The goal of the PEIR will be to provide project-level approval for near-term projects, and to only provide the level of analysis warranted for other projects, understanding they will be subject to change and refinement overtime and will be implemented at a point in time when environmental conditions are likely to have changed. An additional goal of the PEIR will be to assist the District in the development of project commitments or design practices, which if adopted as part of the Master Plan, will serve to avoid or reduce impacts on the environment that might otherwise occur as a result of school construction and operation.

Opportunities for Public Input

In addition to on-going public participation related to development of the Facilities Master Plan, the process for the PEIR will provide several opportunities for public input. In the early stages of the environmental review process a Notice of Preparation (NOP) will be issued to notify agencies and the public that an EIR will be prepared. The NOP, which is circulated for a 30-day period (September 14-October 14, 2007), will solicit input from agencies and public regarding their views on the scope and content of the EIR.

Following this scoping period a Draft PEIR will be prepared. After District review, the Draft Program EIR will be circulated for public review and comment for a period of 45-days or more (April 14-June 13, 2008).

Following the circulation period for the Draft Program EIR, the District will respond to comments and prepare a Final PEIR for the Board to consider along with approval of the Master Plan at a public hearing (August 18-22, 2008).

A timeline of the schedule is attached for review.

The Board of Education recognizes the importance of taking appropriate action whenever an emergency threatens the safety, health, or welfare of a student at school or during schoolsponsored activities.

The Superintendent or designee (Health Services personnel) shall develop procedures to ensure that first aid and/or medical attention is provided as quickly as possible when student accidents and injuries occur and that parents/guardians are notified as appropriate.

The Superintendent or designee shall require parents/guardians to provide emergency contact information in order to facilitate communication in the event of an accident or illness.

District staff shall appropriately report and document student accidents.

Assistive Devices

Students who are required to temporarily use assistive devices at school such as casts, splints, canes, walkers, crutches, wheelchairs, etc. shall first present a letter from the prescribing doctor to the principal or Health Services designee that states the necessity for the student's use of the device, any restrictions and the length of time that the restrictions and devices will be necessary.

DETAIL

The Governing Board recognizes that students may need to take prescribed medication during the school day in order to be able to attend school without jeopardizing their health.

When_the district has received written statements from the student's physician and parent/guardian, designated personnel shall assist the student in taking the medication. In addition, upon written request, designated personnel may assist the student in monitoring, testing or treatment of an existing medical condition. (Education Code 49423) Upon written request by the parent/guardian and with the approval of the student's physician, a student with an existing medical condition that requires frequent monitoring, testing or treatment may be allowed to self administer this service. The student shall observe universal precautions in the handling of blood and bodily fluids.

A. Anaphylactic Injections (EPI-PEN) The Board recognizes that some students have allergies of such severity that they may require an emergency anaphylactic injection during the course of the school day. Parents/guardians who are aware of this foreseeable need may ask the district to provide such injections in accordance with administrative regulations.

School staff who may be required to administer anaphylactic injections shall receive training from qualified medical personnel. They will be authorized to administer the injections in accordance with administrative regulations and will be afforded appropriate liability protection.

B. Automatic External Defibrillator (AED)

The Board recognizes the importance of taking appropriate action whenever an emergency threatens the safety, health or welfare of a student at school or during school-sponsored activities. Automatic External Defibrillators may be installed at school sites for use in the case of sudden cardiac arrest. School staff who may be required to administer external defibrillation using the AED shall receive training from qualified medical personnel. They will be authorized to administer the AED in accordance with administrative regulations and will be afforded appropriate liability protection.

C. Insulin

The Board of Education recognizes that in order to achieve the optimal control of blood sugar, the diabetic student may need to use insulin during the school day. Insulin may only be administered by a licensed nurse, the parent, the diabetic student or a trained parent designee not employed by the district. Trained Diabetic Personnel can supervise the student who is competent to self-administer insulin. Written orders for insulin administration signed by the doctor and the parent must be submitted to the site prior to any administration of insulin to/by the student.

DETAIL

GENERAL PRINCIPLES

The Board of Education recognizes its dual responsibility to protect the health of students from risks posed by infectious diseases and to uphold the right of students to a free and appropriate education. The Board recognizes that prevention and education are the most effective means of limiting the spread of infectious diseases.

The Superintendent or Health Services designee shall collaborate with parents/quardians and local health agencies and organizations to develop a comprehensive approach to disease prevention that promotes preventative measures and education of students and staff.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly review resources available from health experts to ensure that district programs are based on the most up-to-date information.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district's comprehensive health education program provides information about the prevention of infectious diseases, including the nature of bloodborne pathogens and their transmission, as well as information to help prevent the spread of contagious diseases, such as a pandemic influenza. He/she shall also ensure that each school has sufficient infection prevention supplies that are easily accessible to staff.

For purposes of this policy, infectious diseases shall include all those listed by the State Department of Health Services and the County Health Department.

The admission of a student with an infectious disease shall be determined by the Superintendent/Health Services designee in consultation with the student's parent/quardian, the student's physician and the County Health Department.

It shall be the responsibility of the District Health Services to institute and conduct a program of communicable disease control and prevention. This program shall include all district employees having regular contact with pupils and shall properly advise them of overt symptoms of communicable diseases.

Students with Infectious Diseases

The Superintendent or Health Services designee shall exclude students only in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. Because bloodborne pathogens such as hepatitis B virus, hepatitis C virus, and human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) are not casually transmitted, the presence of infectious conditions of this type is not, by itself, sufficient reason to exclude students from attending school.

Parents/guardians are encouraged to inform the Superintendent or designee if their child has an infectious disease so that school staff may work cooperatively with the student's parents/guardians to minimize the child's exposure to other diseases in the school setting. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that student confidentiality rights are strictly observed in accordance with law.

EVALUATING STUDENTS WHO ARE INFECTED WITH HIV

HIV is not spread by casual, everyday contact. Students who are infected with HIV shall attend the school and classroom to which they would be assigned if they were not infected. They are entitled to all rights, privileges, and services accorded to other students. Decisions about any changes in the education program of a student who is infected with HIV shall be made on a case-by-case basis, relying on the best available scientific evidence and medical advice.

A program of on-going education about HIV for students shall be conducted to ensure that all are informed in a consistent manner about the nature of HIV infection, including how it is and is not transmitted and how to prevent its spread.

CONFIDENTIALITY

The people who shall know the identity of a student who is infected with HIV shall treat all information as highly confidential. No information shall be divulged, directly or indirectly, to any other individuals or groups. All related medical information and written documentation of discussions, telephone conversations, proceedings, and meetings shall be kept by the superintendent/designee in a locked file. Access to this file will be granted only to those persons who have the written consent of the infected student's parent or guardian. To further protect confidentiality, names will not be used in documents except when this is essential. Any document containing the name, or any other information that would reveal the identity of the infected person, will not be shared with any person, not even for the purposes of word processing or reproduction.

DETAIL

The Board of Education recognizes the necessity and value of parent involvement to support student success and academic achievement. The Board also recognizes that parents/guardians are their children's first and most influential teachers and that sustained parent involvement in the education of their children contributes greatly to student achievement and a positive school environment. The Board believes that respectful collaboration between parents and teachers is essential and supports the implementation of strategies to assure that collaboration. The Superintendent or designee shall work with staff and parents/guardians to develop meaningful opportunities at all grade levels for parents/guardians to be involved in district and school activities; advisory, decision-making, and advocacy roles; and activities to support learning at home.

Parents/guardians shall be notified of their rights to be informed about and to participate in their children's education and of the opportunities available to them to do so. In order to assure collaborative partnerships between parents and schools, the Board, working through the administration, is committed to:

- a. involving parents as partners in school governance including shared decision making.
- b. Establishing effective two-way communication with all parents, respecting the diversity and differing needs of families.
- c. Developing strategies and programmatic structures at schools to enable parents to participate actively in their children's education.
- d. Providing support and coordination for school staff and parents to implement and sustain appropriate parent involvement from kindergarten through grade twelve.
- e. Utilizing schools to connect students and families with community resources that provide educational enrichment and support.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly evaluate and report to the Board on the effectiveness of the district's

parent involvement efforts, including, but not limited to, input from parents/guardians and school staff on the adequacy of parent involvement opportunities and barriers that may inhibit parent/guardian participation.

Title I Schools

Each year the Superintendent or designee shall identify specific objectives of the district's parent involvement program for schools that receive Title I funding. He/she shall ensure that parents/guardians are consulted and participate in the planning, design, implementation, and evaluation of the parent involvement program. (Education Code 11503)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district's parent involvement strategies are jointly developed with and agreed upon by parents/guardians of students participating in Title I programs. Those strategies shall establish expectations for parent involvement and describe how the district will carry out each activity listed in 20 USC 6318. (20 USC 6318)

The Superintendent or designee shall consult with parents/guardians of participating students in the planning and implementation of parent involvement programs, activities, and regulations. He/she also shall involve parents/guardians of participating students in decisions regarding how the district's Title I funds will be allotted for parent involvement activities. (20 USC 6318)

Each school receiving Title I funds shall including the following in the Parent Involvement Plan:

- 1. Provide meaningful consultation with the parents of students served.
- 2. <u>Plan and implement programs, activities, and procedures, as</u> required under Title I, that involve parents in the education of their children.
- 3. Develop a parental involvement policy with the participation of parents. This policy becomes a part of the Local Educational Agency (LEA) Plan and establishes the District's expectations for parental involvement. The parental involvement policy describes how the LEA will:
 - Involve parents in helping to develop the LEA Plan.
 - Involve parents in the process of school review and improvement.
 - <u>Provide schools with the assistance necessary to plan and</u> <u>implement effective parental involvement activities that</u> <u>will improve student academic achievement and school</u> <u>performance.</u>

- Build a school's capacity for strong parental involvement by:
 - Helping parents understand the state academic content standards and state assessments
 - Providing materials and training to help parents work with their children to improve their children's academic achievement
 - Involving parents in school activities, especially academically related ones
- Educate teachers and other staff, with the assistance of parents, about:
 - Recognizing the value and usefulness of parents' <u>contributions</u>
 - Reaching out to, communicating with, and working with parents as equal partners
 - Implementing and coordinating parent programs
 - Building ties between parents and the school
- Coordinate the parental involvement program with other programs, such as Head Start, Reading First, and public preschools.
- Provide reasonable support for parental involvement activities under Title I as parents may request.
- Conduct, with the help of parents, an annual evaluation of the parental involvement policy and its effectiveness in improving the academic quality of Title I schools.
- Identify barriers to greater participation by parents in activities authorized by Title I.
- Submit parents' comments to the California Department of Education if the LEA Plan is not satisfactory to parents.
- 4. Reserve one percent of the Title I funds for parental involvement activities if the LEA receives more than \$500,000, District shall:
 - Involve parents in the decisions regarding how the parental involvement funds are spent.
 - Distribute 95 percent of the parental involvement funds to Title I schools.
- 5. Provide opportunities for full participation to parents with limited English proficiency, parents of migrant children, and parents with disabilities.
- 6. Include parents, when possible, as a part of school support teams designed to assist the District and schools in increasing student achievement.
- 7. <u>Give parents an easy-to-understand annual District</u> <u>Accountability Report Card.</u>
- 8. Notify parents when a teacher who does not meet the teacher requirements of NCLB has taught the child for four or more consecutive weeks.

- 9. <u>Provide parents with timely information about schools in a</u> <u>language and format they can understand. The information shall</u> include annual notification of:
 - The level of achievement of their child in each academic assessment required by state and federal laws
 - The names of schools identified by the state as Program Improvement (PI) schools
 - The parental option to transfer a child from a PI school to a non-PI school (Transportation is to be paid by the LEA according to local policy. If demand exceeds available funds, priority for this service goes to the lowestachieving students.)
 - The supplemental educational services available in PI schools:
 - Eligibility requirements for students to obtain supplemental educational services
 - Names of approved providers and their qualifications
 - Help available to parents in selecting a provider, if requested
 - Assurance of fair and equitable procedures for serving students
 - Privacy policies that protect the identity of the student
 - Information about English learners (if Title I funds are used to provide an educational language-instruction program):
 - The reasons the child is identified as an English learner and where he/she will be placed
 - The child's levels of English and academic achievement and how the levels were assessed
 - A description of the programs available, the differences between them, and the methods of instruction
 - The ways in which the programs will meet the child's educational strengths and needs
 - The ways in which the programs will help the child learn English and grade-level standards for promotion and graduation
 - The exit requirements of the program, including the expected rate of transition to an English-language mainstream classroom, and the expected rate of graduation from high school
 - The ways in which the programs will meet the objectives of an individualized education program for a child with disabilities
 - The right of the parent to decline enrollment, request the child be moved from the program offered, or receive help in choosing another one
 - The right to request the professional qualifications of their children's classroom teachers, including:
 - The teacher's qualifications to teach the subject matter

- The type of credential held
- The degree or graduate certificate held
- If services are provided by a paraprofessional, what type of services and the paraprofessional's qualifications

In order to meet individual student needs and encourage all students to complete their high school education, the Board of Education desires to provide flexibility in the completion of prescribed courses in accordance with law. <u>The Board shall</u> <u>actively involve parents/guardians, administrators, teachers,</u> <u>and students in helping the district develop alternative means</u> <u>for students to complete the prescribed course of study required</u> <u>for graduation.</u> As an alternative to completing the course requirements for high school graduation and with prior approval by the principal or designee, students may fulfill one or more of the course requirements through the following:

- 1. Practical demonstration of skills and competencies
- 2. Supervised work experience <u>or other outside school</u> <u>experience</u> up to 40 semester periods in accordance with <u>Education Code 51760.3</u> and 5 CCR 1635, or other outside school experience
- 3. <u>Career technical education</u>, Vocational education and/or Regional Occupational Program (ROP) classes offered through our high schools district.
- Courses offered by regional occupational centers or programs (ROP)
- 5. Interdisciplinary Study
- 6. Independent study
- 7. Credit earned at a postsecondary institution (Pursuant to 5 CCR 1630)
- 8. Private instruction in accordance with (Pursuant to 5 CCR 1631)
- 9. <u>Credit for private school foreign language instruction in</u> accordance with 5 CCR 1362)
- 10. Military service and training in accordance with 5 CCR 1634
- 11. Correspondence instruction from a California university or college accredited for teacher training <u>in accordance with</u> 5 CCR 1633 (Pursuant to EC 51740)
- 12. To satisfy the district's driver education and training requirement, a program approved by the Department of Motor Vehicles which offers drivers education and behind-thewheel instruction through a driving school or licensed independent driving instructor in accordance with Vehicle Code 12814.6
- 13. For credit toward the district's physical education

requirement, participation in district interscholastic athletic programs carried on wholly or partially after regular school hours when such participation entails a comparable amount of time and physical activity

The district shall accept for credit any coursework satisfactorily completed by students while detained in a juvenile court school or county or state-operated institution. District students who successfully complete district graduation requirements while so detained shall receive a diploma from the school they last attended. (Education Code 48645.5)

Students may receive physical education credit for participation in district interscholastic athletic programs carried on wholly or partially after regular school hours when such participation entails a comparable amount of time and physical activity.

Students using interscholastic athletics participation to fulfill physical education requirements may be graded on this participation, provided that a teacher credentialed to teach physical education supervises this participation and assigns the grade. (Reference BP 6145 <u>Extracurricular and Cocurricular</u> <u>Activities</u>)

The Superintendent or designee shall determine whether a student has satisfactorily met course requirements through any of the above alternative means.

A. Concurrent/Dual Enrollment

Concurrent/Dual enrollment means enrollment in any non-SMMUSD course during the school year or during the summer by a regularly enrolled SMMUSD student. Concurrent/Dual enrollment is an alternative means by which students may obtain credit toward graduation while being simultaneously enrolled in both the school district and another approved educational program. Students must obtain signed pre-approval for any concurrent/dual enrollment course or program from the school principal or designee.

Concurrent/Dual enrollment may be approved for "make-up", "acceleration", and/or "enrichment" purposes.

Courses eligible for concurrent/dual enrollment include:

- 1. Any course offered by Santa Monica High School, Malibu High School, Olympic High School or the SMMUSD Adult School, either during the school year or during the summer.
- Courses offered by any community college, public or private college/university
- 3. Courses offered by the UC Extension Program

Students who demonstrate that the courses they want to take are not available at their high school, may, with the pre-approval of the principal, take courses at accredited high schools other than the schools mentioned above.

Nothing in this policy is construed to permit web-based or online courses either as alternative credits toward graduation or as a course eligible for concurrent enrollment for "make-ups", "acceleration" and/or "enrichment."

B. Online Courses

Online courses are delivered over the Internet or provided through a set curriculum via software. Students may participate in web-based or online courses either as alternative credits toward graduation or as a course eligible for concurrent enrollment for "make-ups", "acceleration" and/or "enrichment." Students must obtain signed pre-approval for any online course or program from the school principal or designee.

For the 2007-2008 school year, the principal shall evaluate the quality and effectiveness of online course offerings and determine which online courses shall be accepted for high school credit. No student shall earn more than twenty (20) high school credits in any given school year.

Beginning July 1, 2008, only District approved online providers and/or courses listed in the accompanying Administrative Regulation shall be eligible for high school credits.

The Superintendent or designee shall determine whether a student has satisfactorily met course requirements through any of the above alternative means.
