February 21, 2008

A regular meeting of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education was held on Thursday, February 21, 2008, in the Santa Monica City Council Chambers, 1685 Main Street, Santa Monica, CA. The Board of Education called the meeting to order at 4:05 p.m. in the Board Conference Room at the District Offices: 1651 16th Street, Santa Monica, CA. At 4:25 p.m. the Board of Education moved to Closed Session regarding the items listed below. The public meeting reconvened at 6:01 p.m. in the Santa Monica City Council Chambers.

IV. BOARD OF EDUCATION – COMMENDATIONS / RECOGNITIONS

• African-American History Month Celebration

Superintendent Talarico introduced Peggy Harris, Director of Curriculum, and Irma Lyons, Principal of Will Rogers Learning Community. Ms. Harris explained that Black History Month dates back to 1929, and while Black History month is recognized in February, students are taught to research and acknowledge the contributions of minorities throughout the year. Ms. Harris stated that there is no such thing as Black History, but rather it is American History. The children from Will Rogers, who attended this meeting, embrace and live that notion.

Mrs. Marmolejo's and Mrs. Kleiser and Mrs. Klein's classrooms summarized the history of the Underground Railroad. They explained that the Underground Railroad was a chain of escape routes from the southern states to the northern states and Canada during the Civil War. "Passengers" were runaway slaves and "conductors" were the white and black individuals who guided the slaves during their escape. The Underground Railroad operated for ninety years before and during the Civil War. The students then sang The Train is a-Comin', a slave spiritual. A group of students then shared their reflections on the short story Amazing Grace, which they had read in class. In the story, the main character is told she cannot play the part of Peter Pan in the school play because she is a girl and black. Her family told her that she could be anything she wanted if she put her mind to it. Each of the Will Rogers students shared elements of his/her own life that reflected the message of the story. They learned that regardless of the color of their skin, they could reach their dreams if they were willing to work hard. Ms. Harris concluded that the struggles of African Americans are really a human struggle – all people have dreams and all people contribute to the United States of America.

• National Board Certified Teachers

Superintendent Talarico introduced Dr. Susan Samarge-Powell, Coordinator for Teacher Support. Dr. Samarge-Powell introduced SMMUSD's newest National Board Certified Teachers. She summarized the history of the National Board and the requirements for receiving certification. She explained that the district reimburses the candidates for their expenses, provides substitute teachers, and awards a stipend to those teachers who achieve certification. Currently, SMMUSD boasts fifty National Board Certified Teachers, of whom six are now administrators. Dr. Samarge-Powell named those recipients who could not make tonight's meeting: Anne Keller from Malibu High School and Judith Anderson from Lincoln Middle School. She then announced those teachers who were present and summarized their work experience and achievements: Martha Diaz Chacon from SAMOHI, Margot Dunn from Pt. Dume Marine Science School, Katie Jaroch from Lincoln Middle School, Laila Taslimi from McKinley Elementary School, and Geoff Tipper from SAMOHI.

President de la Torre, on behalf of the Board of Education, thanked the teachers for their achievements and contributions to the district.

• McKinley Elementary School

Principal Irene Gonzalez began her report by acknowledging McKinley's classified employees who were present at tonight's meeting. She then mentioned that during Public Schools Week, each school site was asked to compile a Top 10 Reasons to Attend Our School list. She was proud to announce that McKinley had so many wonderful qualities that they had to narrow their reasons down to ten. She focused on one of those reasons – McKinley teachers participate in an innovative professional development model. She introduced Assistant Principal Jessica Riche, teachers LaShawn Moore, Sarah Garden, and Mark Sanschagrin, and parent T. Michael.

Ms. Riche explained that professional development focused on improving student writing across the grade levels. The school is devoted to professional development and treating educators as the professionals they are. During professional development, teachers collaborate in cross-site district writing and the sharing of ideas. McKinley has used districtwide intervention strategies as models; for example, teachers and parents work together to help students, math teachers participate in "SMARTBoard play dates," and all grade levels use LessonLink planning. The teachers and parent explained that all general education teachers participate in LessonLink with a focus on writing. Special Education staff members have time set aside to work on issues that affect their students. They described the team environment that exists among the teachers and that the school has used grant money in past for such programs, but not all of these grants are available for next year. They explained how teachers share assessment strategies with each other. Special Education staff members meet weekly to review IEP goals and ways to integrate strategies throughout the school day. Students at all levels are participating in a writer's workshop.

Board President de la Torre inquired as to professional development for integrating technology into the curriculum. Ms. Gonzalez explained that the EETT grant provides them with a SmartBoard trainer. The school also addresses technology professional development in learning walks to determine how technology is being used in math and how that can be improved for next year. Superintendent Talarico thanked Ms. Gonzalez and her staff for presenting in a creative fashion. She also thanked them for their leadership. She congratulated McKinley's certificated and classified staff for collaborating and contributing to the success of the children.

Student Board Member Reports

Alec Richker – Santa Monica High School

Student Board Member Richker reported that the Heal the Bay Club showed up at the Santa Monica City Council meeting to rally support for the plastic bag ban. Mr. Richker showed up as Bag Monster. The track team made it to finals, the cheer squad traveled to Florida for Nationals, and the Pep Rally is next Friday. Bye Bye Birdie is being performed this weekend. Next week is Black Ribbon Week to celebrate Black History Month. A blood drive will be held on the campus next Tuesday and Bike to School Day is next Wednesday. Valentine grams were sent out last week on Valentine's Day.

Superintendent Talarico mentioned that she saw Mr. Richker as the Plastic Bag Monster on the news last night. Mr. Richker explained that the monster is a reclusive being made up of 600 plastic bags. The purpose of the monster is to bring attention to the proposed ban on plastic bags and to encourage people to use reusable bags.

Kristen Lambert – Malibu High School – *no report* John Shippey – Olympic High School – *no report*

B. SMMCTA Update – Mr. Harry Keiley

Mr. Keiley began his report by congratulating the district on Measure "R" passing. He said that he would keep the board updated regarding the budget

updates in Sacramento. He reported that he joined teachers from the SCORE Committee for an initial discussion regarding the impact of declining enrollment on SAMOHI. Mr. Keiley said that the union would like to have a conversation with the Superintendent and staff regarding the standards-based elementary report card. He said that he looked forward to being part of the discussion regarding declining enrollment and the interdistrict permit policy.

C. S.E.I.U. Update – Ms. Keryl Cartee-McNeely

Ms. Cartee-McNeely said that classified employees have not received the same pay raises and benefits as certificated employees. She explained that by being here tonight, SEIU employees are saying that they are an important part of the district. She introduced Mr. Bill Lloyd, Executive Director of SEIU Local 99, who explained the reason behind the state budget cuts. He reported that polls show that education is the number one issue in California. A coalition has been assembled to inform the public of the consequences of the budget cuts. He said that the Governor's office is working on a multiyear solution.

D. PTA Council President Report – Rebecca Kennerly

Ms. Kennerly reported that it was wonderful to see the council come together for Measure "R." She brought "Yes on R" notebooks for the board members as a thank you from the PTA Council. She said that the benefits of Measure "R" could be seen in the wonderful presentation of the Will Rogers students tonight.

E. Financial Oversight Committee – no report

F. Measure "BB" Advisory Committee

Ms. Gleam Davis reported that every site has set up site committees that are now meeting with their site architects. The site committee meetings have been well attended, everyone seems enthusiastic, and the architects are well received. She said that the site architects were on target for having schematics ready by June, expect perhaps SAMOHI due to the possible joint use opportunities with the City of Santa Monica. Ms. Davis reported that at Monday's Measure "BB" Advisory Committee meeting two motions were passed. The first motion recommends that the board approve the following allocations of BB funds: \$16M to Lincoln Middle School, \$14 to Malibu High School, and \$12M to John Adams Middle School. The committee supports the acceleration of the bond program and capitalization of the redevelopment income stream. The second motion was to support a commitment to project quality and to the educational program.

X. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Superintendent Talarico decided to defer the update on Measure "BB" construction until later in the meeting.

She then introduced Maryanne Solomon from Art Meets Technology, who has been hired to redesign the district's website. Ms. Solomon began by thanking Superintendent Talarico, Assistant to the Superintendent Sarah Wahrenbrock, and CFO Jan Maez for helping to compile and correct information for the site. She then walked board members through the aspects of the newly designed website. She showed how to find the different departments, central office staff, District Advisory Committees, and email. To conclude her presentation, Ms. Solomon brought everyone's attention to the bottom section of home page, where the "What's New at SMMUSD" column will be updated regularly.

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the submission of *Request for Allowance of Attendance Due to Emergency Conditions* as a result of the fires that occurred in the Malibu area during the week of October 21, 2007, and associated Malibu schools closures on October 22 and October 23, 2007. It is also recommended that the Board Of Education execute the *Affidavit Of Governing Board Members* certifying the emergency listed.

It is additionally recommended that allowance conditions be given to Webster Elementary School for additional fire damage and clean up to take place on October 24, 25, and 26, 2007.

It is additionally recommended that the board approve the material decrease for Malibu schools (except Webster, was closed) for October 24, 25, and 26, 2007.

It is additionally recommended that the board approve the material decrease for Webster for October 29, 2007.

COMMENTS: Education Code §41422 states, "When one or more district schools have been closed due to emergency conditions, districts may request a waiver to allow the lost day(s) to be disregarded in the computation of ADA and obtain credit for the instructional minutes that would have been offered." Education code §46392 states, "When one or more schools are kept open but experience a material decrease in ADA, districts may request a waiver to allow the ADA from either the month of October or May be used to determine the ADA as if the emergency hadn't occurred."

<u>COMMENT</u>: At the September 27, 2007, board meeting, the board approved *Recommendation No. A.11* to award a contract to LFR. And while the original text below shows the correct dollar amounts, the paragraph at the top of the page showed an incorrect total (stricken out). Approval of this agenda item will correct the contract amount to reflect the accurate cost of \$57,500 (underlined).

> In order to continue the Facilities Master Plan process to completion, the Program EIR must be completed. PCR was selected by the Board of Education (July 12, 2007) to prepare the Program EIR. Part of this review process involves various stages of site evaluations. In working with PCR, LFR will complete the following tasks:

Task I - Screening Phase I Environmental Site Assessments (ESAs). This includes review of the sites both current and historically through historical photographs, maps and data bases for potential chemical and ground water contamination. A report is then submitted to the Department of Toxic Substance Control (DTSC). This report will determine if further Preliminary Environmental Assessments (PEAs) will need to be done prior to construction. \$33,500 Task II - California Department of Education (CDE) checklist - LFR will prepare Form 4.02, which is required by CDE to be completed and submitted for any potential school projects. It requires districts to report on site specific potential risk factors including: electronic transmission lines, hazardous air emissions, railroad easements, airport runways, busy traffic corridors, and hazardous water pipelines and reservoirs. \$20,800

<u>Task III</u> - EIR Support - Help craft writing of EIR with PCR as required. As this scope is unknown at this time, \$3,200 has been set aside for this task.

The Measure "BB" Advisory Committee reviewed this recommendation at its meeting on September 10, 2007.

COMMENT: California legislation mandates that the governing board of the school district discuss each school's Comprehensive School Safety Plan prior to approval and adoption.

> Board members must discuss how the school safety plan addresses the needs of the school and pupils within that school and how the school site council considered the three essential components. These components are:

- 1. Assuring each pupil a safe physical environment
- Assuring each pupil a safe, respectful, accepting, and emotionally nurturing environment
- 3. Providing each child resiliency skills

Board members have been provided with a written statement and an Action Plan from each school summarizing how their Comprehensive School Safety Plan addresses the needs of the school and its pupils. The Action Plan is based on the assessment of safety at each site, per Education Code 35294.2.

DETAIL

A. Although students generally must attend school in the district and school where their residence has been established, the Santa Monica-Malibu School District Governing Board recognizes justifiable reasons for interdistrict permits. Upon request, the Superintendent or designee may accept students from other districts and may allow students who live within the District to transfer to another school within the District or out of the District.

> Beginning with the 2005-06 school year permits will be issued on a year-to-year basis. Parents must reapply and be accepted for continued attendance each year. Students enrolled prior to the 2005-06 school year on a PERT or DERT permit will not be affected by this change.

Involuntary loss of housing resulting from: apartments being removed from the rental market (Ellis Act), buildings being red-tagged, or evictions to accommodate owner-occupancy should not interfere with a child completing his/her education in the Santa Monica Malibu Unified School District. The permit office will require the applicant to obtain verification from the Rent Control Department or other appropriate legal agency. These students will be allowed to remain in their schools for the remainder of the year in which their housing has been lost. In addition, they will be allowed to remain in SMMUSD as permit students in subsequent years provided they meet all the conditions of students attending SMMUSD on permit, and they reapply annually. The Ellis Act allows California apartment owners to evict tenants if the landlords intend to withdraw their units from the rental market.

SMMUSD students in good standing who were residents of Santa Monica or Malibu during the 2001-2002 school year, and subsequently move to another city, will be allowed to remain in the Santa Monica-Malibu School district as permit students, upon receiving a permit from their district of residence and meeting all the conditions of students attending Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District on a permit.

- B. Permits of this type are to be initiated by the student's parent or guardian who attests to the fact or shows evidence that the permit would be in the student's best interests. Cancellation of the permit shall occur if certain provisions are not adhered to by the student or parent/guardian, or if overcrowding should occur at the school of acceptance.
- C. The Board is committed to providing a quality education for all District students legally enrolled and will provide fair and consistent treatment for students and parent/guardians regardless of their residence or permit status. All applications for a permit will be treated in a fair and consistent manner.
- D. Final approval of permits for all students, including students needing specialized programs, such as GATE, special education, ELL, etc., shall rest at the District and shall be contingent upon space, budget and staff availability. The District will not pay excess costs to provide specialized services to students on permit.
- E. Except for the conditions listed below, effective September 2002, there will be a moratorium on the receipt of all new interdistrict attendance permits <u>for schools in the Santa</u> <u>Monica-Malibu Unified School District</u>. This moratorium shall continue through the <u>2008-2009</u> school year <u>with the following</u> <u>exceptions:</u>
 - 1. The District will accept applications for interdistrict permits to attend schools in the City of Santa Monica for grades K through 8 in order to stabilize the current number of interdistrict permit students in the District. Permits will be granted per the language of section D. above.
 - 2. Requests for new interdistrict permits will be accepted for all schools in the City of Malibu. Priority will be granted first to those individuals who are employees within the City limits of Malibu (based upon documentation of employment). Permits will be granted per the language of section D. above.
 - 3. No permits will be granted to attend Olympic High School.
 - 4. The total number of all new interdistrict permits that will be accepted and approved for the 2008-2009 school year will not exceed 200 for the District. Permits will be granted per the language of section D. above.
 - 5. All students currently attending on an interdistrict permit will be allowed to remain in the District until they leave or graduate, assuming that they: reapply for a permit annually and comply with all the application requirements;

uphold appropriate standards of behavior, and attendance, and academic effort, and that the conditions under which the current permit was granted have not changed.

- 6. Guidelines previously applied to SMASH, Edison, including the immersion program through Grade 8, and our preschools will remain in effect.
- F. Requests for new permits will be received (granted) in the following order (Based on the timelines identified in Administrative Regulations 5117):
 - Intradistrict permits allowing children who are residents of the cities of Santa Monica and/or Malibu to attend a school other than their neighborhood school;
 - The District guarantees It is the intention of the District to provide same-school placement for all siblings in a family once an intradistrict permit has been granted, except in cases where students need a specialized program which is only available on another campus.
 - 2. Interdistrict permits for children of employees of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District [certificated, classified, management, full and part-time (a minimum of 15 hours per week)];
 - The District guarantees It is the intention of the District to provide a seat in a District school to all children of District employees who have requested a new interdistrict permit, with the understanding that Section D. will be considered. staff will do its best to accommodate requests for a specific school but will not guarantee requested placement. On-going permit holders are not affected and will continue in the home school being currently attended.
 - 3. If space, staffing and budget permit, staff will do its best to accommodate requests for placement for siblings (of current interdistrict permit holders) who will be entering Kindergarten, 1st, 6th, or 9th Grade. If a permit is received (granted) there is no guarantee of same-school placement. On-going permit holders are not effected and will continue in the home school being currently attended;
 - 4. If space, staffing and budget permit, interdistrict permits for children of employees of the cities of Malibu or Santa Monica.
 - 5. If space, <u>staffing</u> and budget permit, interdistrict permits for children of full-time, permanent employees of Santa Monica College enrolling in grades K-8 for the 2008-2009 school year, up to:

- a) 50 students if the enrollment decline is less than 120.
- b) If the decline is more than 120, the number of additional students required to shrink the decline to 120.

No permits will be issued in this category at the high school level.

6. If space, staffing and budget permit, for those students "in good standing" who have been attending school/s within SMMUSD as a resident of the District, for a minimum period of three complete school years, and subsequently relocate outside the boundaries of SMMUSD. Permits will be granted per the language of section D. above.

DETAIL

Sexual harassment by any employee toward any other person shall not be tolerated in the work environment. The Board of Education considers sexual harassment to be a major offense which may result in disciplinary action or dismissal of the offending employee.

Pursuant to Education Code 212.5 "sexual harassment" means unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors and other verbal, visual or physical conduct of a sexual nature, made by someone from or in the work or educational setting, under any of the following conditions.

- A. When submission to the conduct is explicitly or implicitly made a term or a condition of an individual's employment, status or promotion.
- B. When submission to, or rejection of, the conduct by the individual is used as the basis of employment or academic decisions affecting the individual.
- C. When the conduct has the purpose or effect of having a negative impact upon the individual's work performance or of creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive work environment.
- D. When submission to, or rejection of, the conduct by the individual is used as the basis for any decision affecting the individual regarding benefits, services, honors, programs or other available activities.

An employee who feels that he/she is being harassed is encouraged to immediately report such incident to his/her immediate supervisor without fear of reprisal. The immediate supervisor shall take the following investigative/corrective actions:

A. All supervisors or managers shall immediately report any evidence of sexual harassment or complaints regarding sexual harassment made to them to the Director-Classified Personnel or Assistant Superintendent, Personnel.

- B. All supervisors or managers shall, within three working days, investigate any incident of alleged sexual harassment reported to them.
- C. All supervisors or managers shall immediately report in writing the results of any investigation of sexual harassment, including recommended corrective or disciplinary action to be taken, to the Director-Classified Personnel or the Assistant Superintendent, Personnel.
- D. Under no circumstances shall an employee of the district who believes that he or she has been the victim of sexual harassment be required to first report that harassment to a supervisor if the supervisor is the individual who has done the harassing. An employee who has a claim of sexual harassment to file against an immediate supervisor shall contact the supervisor's immediate supervisor or the Superintendent of Schools.
- E. All supervisors or managers are required to maintain confidentiality in investigating any claims of alleged harassment.
- F. All supervisors or managers shall follow up within one month any reported incident of sexual harassment to determine whether the victim has been subject to any further forbidden conduct.

Sexual Harassment

The Governing Board prohibits sexual harassment of district employees and job applicants. The Board also prohibits retaliatory behavior or action against district employees or other persons who complain, testify or otherwise participate in the complaint process established pursuant to this policy and administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee shall take all actions necessary to ensure the prevention, investigation, and correction of sexual harassment, including but not limited to:

- 1. Providing training to employees in accordance with law and administrative regulation
- 2. Publicizing and disseminating the district's sexual harassment policy to staff
- 3. Ensuring prompt, thorough, and fair investigation of <u>complaints</u>
- 4. Taking timely and appropriate corrective/remedial action(s), which may require interim separation of the

complainant and the alleged harasser and subsequent monitoring of developments

All complaints and allegations of sexual harassment shall be kept confidential to the extent necessary to carry out the investigation or to take other subsequent necessary actions. (5 CCR 4964)

Any district employee or job applicant who feels that he/she has been sexually harassed or who has knowledge of any incident of sexual harassment by or against another employee, a job applicant or a student, shall immediately report the incident to his/her supervisor, the principal, district administrator or Superintendent.

A supervisor, principal or other district administrator who receives a harassment complaint shall promptly notify the Superintendent or designee.

Complaints of sexual harassment shall be filed in accordance with AR 4031 - Complaints Concerning Discrimination in Employment. An employee may bypass his/her supervisor in filing a complaint where the supervisor is the subject of the complaint.

Any district employee who engages or participates in sexual harassment or who aids, abets, incites, compels, or coerces another to commit sexual harassment against a district employee, job applicant, or student is in violation of this policy and is subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

DETAIL

The Board of Education prohibits sexual harassment of any student by any person. Teachers shall discuss this policy with their students in age-appropriate ways and students will be taught that they need not endure any form of sexual harassment.

Any student who engages in sexual harassment may be subject to disciplinary action up to and including expulsion. Any employee who permits or engages in sexual harassment may be subject to disciplinary action up to and including dismissal.

The Board expects students and/or staff to report incidents of sexual harassment as soon as possible to the principal or to a responsible member of the staff who will help the complainant make a formal complaint. The complainant will be given a copy of AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures. Complaints of harassment can be filed in accordance with these procedures.

The district prohibits retaliatory behavior against any complainant or any participant in the complaint process. Each complaint of sexual harassment shall be promptly investigated in a way that respects the privacy of all parties concerned.

The Governing Board is committed to maintaining an educational environment that is free from harassment. The Board prohibits sexual harassment of students by other students, employees or other persons, at school or at school-sponsored or schoolrelated activities. The Board also prohibits retaliatory behavior or action against persons who complain, testify, assist or otherwise participate in the complaint process established pursuant to this policy and the administrative regulation.

Instruction/Information

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all district students receive age-appropriate instruction and information on sexual harassment. Such instruction and information shall include:

- 1. What acts and behavior constitute sexual harassment, including the fact that sexual harassment could occur between people of the same gender
- 2. A clear message that students do not have to endure sexual harassment

- 3. Encouragement to report observed instances of sexual harassment, even where the victim of the harassment has not complained
- 4. Information about the person(s) to whom a report of sexual harassment should be made

Complaint Process

Any student who feels that he/she is being or has been subjected to sexual harassment shall immediately contact his/her teacher or any other employee. A school employee to whom a complaint is made shall, within 24 hours of receiving the complaint, report it to the principal or designee.

Any school employee who observes any incident of sexual harassment involving a student shall report this observation to the principal or designee, whether or not the victim files a complaint.

In any case of sexual harassment involving the principal or any other district employee to whom the complaint would ordinarily be made, the employee who receives the student's report or who observes the incident shall report to the nondiscrimination coordinator or the Superintendent or designee.

The principal or designee to whom a complaint of sexual harassment is reported shall immediately investigate the complaint in accordance with administrative regulation. Where the principal or designee finds that sexual harassment occurred, he/she shall take prompt, appropriate action to end the harassment and address its effects on the victim. The principal or designee shall also advise the victim of any other remedies that may be available. The principal or designee shall file a report with the Superintendent or designee and refer the matter to law enforcement authorities, where required.

Disciplinary Measures

Any student who engages in sexual harassment of anyone at school or at a school-sponsored or school-related activity is in violation of this policy and shall be subject to disciplinary action. For students in grades 4 through 12, disciplinary action may include suspension and/or expulsion, provided that in imposing such discipline the entire circumstances of the incident(s) shall be taken into account.

Record-Keeping

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a record of all reported cases of sexual harassment to enable the district to monitor, address and prevent repetitive harassing behavior in its schools. All complaints and allegations of sexual harassment shall be kept confidential except as necessary to carry out the

RE: INCLUSION OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENTS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.01

The Board of Education has requested a presentation on the variety of approaches used within our district to teach and reinforce social skills for students with special needs. Like reading and math, social skills are an integral component of all special education classrooms. The facilitation of social skills is embedded in instruction throughout the school day. In addition to in-classroom support of social skills, all sites also offer support during non-structured times through a variety of approaches, as determined by the needs of the students.

The board will hear a brief presentation on the methods used to address social skills, outside of the classroom, at each of the school campuses. Staff from Malibu High School, Santa Monica High School, and Cabrillo Elementary will discuss what models are used at their sites. An overview of what approaches are used at all other sites will be presented by Ruth Valadez, Director of Special Education.

RE: STAFFING ALLOCATIONS AND REDUCTIONS FOR THE 2008-2009 SCHOOL YEAR

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.02

Reductions in staffing are being considered for the 2008-2009 school year due to declining enrollment. The reductions are based upon all secondary schools being staffed at a student-to-teacher ratio of 31:1.

For the 2007-2008 school year, John Adams Middle School was staffed at a 29:1 ratio, while all other secondary schools were funded 32:1. In 2008-2009, grades K-3 will continue to be funded at 20:1. Grades 4-5 will be funded at 30:1, with the exception of Will Rogers Learning Community, Edison Language Academy, and SMASH, which have lower staffing ratios. Utilizing these staffing ratios and the enrollment projections provided by DecisionInsite, the initial recommendations for teaching reductions are as follows:

- 7 elementary school teachers
- 18 secondary school teachers

Staff continues to examine administrative and classified staffing ratios, and will be recommending reductions in those areas as well. Being considered are: reductions in central office administrators and staff; reducing Santa Monica High School by one "House"; and staffing school administrators and classified staff by a clear and consistently-applied ratio, which would result in a decrease of staff at some sites, while increasing staff at others.

Specific certificated staff reductions for the 2008-2009 school year will be brought to the Board of Education for action at the March 5, 2008, special board meeting. Recommendations regarding Classified staffing reductions will be brought to the board at a later date.

• Harry Keiley, President of SMMCTA, addressed the board regarding certificated staffing.

Ms. Talarico commented that the classification study might suggest possible reductions in classified staff. The board requested information regarding class sizes at SMASH. Dr. Escarce, Mr. Mechur, and Dr. Wisnicki supported the idea of reducing SAMOHI by one house for the 2008-09 school year. Ms. Pye expressed concern that a staff decrease at JAMS might lead to student discipline issues.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.03

It has been requested that staff present information and that the board discuss possible allocation of the additional revenues within the Measure "BB" program.

Background

At the January 17, 2008, meeting, staff presented information regarding additional revenues available to the Measure "BB" facility program. These additional revenue sources included accelerating the program, additional Redevelopment Agency funds, additional interest earnings, and the potential of State matching funds. Staff also presented the board with a summarized construction budget that included these new revenue estimates and reflected an unallocated balance in the Measure "BB" program of 62 million dollars. The board directed staff to bring this topic back for further discussion at the February 21, 2008, meeting after both staff and the Measure "BB" Advisory Committee had time to discuss the unallocated amount and prepare recommendations.

There has been considerable activity in the Measure "BB" program over the past month. Staff has been moving forward with our consultants and architects in the programmatic/schematic design phases of all projects. Much discussion and many meetings have occurred at both the site and district levels. Staff has continued to gather information that will assist the board in making the best, long-term decisions regarding the allocation of this valuable resource. Most significantly is information related to enrollment projections. As directed by the board, staff has contracted with DecisionInsite and conducted a thorough review of the district's enrollment projections. The report produced by DecisionInsite was presented to the board at the February 7, 2008, meeting.

The enrollment report clearly demonstrates that student enrollment in the district is expected to decline over the next 5 years. Two enrollment projections from DecisionInsite were presented for the board to consider. The first calculation was conservative and displayed the most dramatic drops in enrollment; the second more moderate projection reflected less decline. The differences between the two projections were due to assumptions used in each model. Generally, a conservative model is used for short-term budget and staffing decisions and the more moderate model is used when evaluating facility needs. On February 7, 2008, the board also discussed a renewed interest in evaluating policy decisions related to Inter-District Transfers. Staff is preparing an item on this subject for board consideration. A decision on Inter-District Transfers could potentially impact the enrollment projections presented by DescisionInsite.

Staff continues to be committed to allocation of Measure "BB" resources in support of facility needs at secondary schools in the district. Additionally, staff would recommend an action outlining the board's intention to support those programs. However, staff also feels that a complete analysis of the enrollment study is in order. This analysis should include the impact of reduced enrollment on the number of classrooms required. This analysis should compare the initial number of classrooms presented in the Facility Master plan with current projections. Staff anticipates that this review will be complete and ready for board discussion on March 13, 2008.

The Measure "BB" Committee is scheduled to meet on Tuesday, February 19, 2008. The agenda will have a place for discussion with possible action related to unallocated funds. Either district staff or Measure "BB" Committee members will communicate any discussion or recommendations from the Measure "BB" Committee meeting.

Dr. Wisnikci MOTIONED, Mr. Mechur SECONDED, to bring forward for approval at the board meeting on March 13, 2008, the Measure "BB" Advisory Committee's recommendations regarding site allocations and a commitment to quality construction.

Board Vice President Escarce reminded the board that the recommendations did not take into account the new enrollment projections from DecisionInsite. The Superintedent responded that HED should provide them with the revisions with those projections included.

Board Member Mechur asked if DecisionInsite's report would be updated in light of the board's revision to the interdistrict permit policy. Dr. Matthews said that it would.

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But this kind of collaborative work is especially crucial for teachers. There's such a culture of isolation in schools. Teachers are used to doing their work alone. They work very hard to do the best job they can within their range of knowledge. But their knowledge can be limited by many factors-by their

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professional opportunities, their access to materials, and the time they have for research, for example. By providing teachers time and space to work together and to go deeper into an area of instruction, you build opportunities for them to learn and grow on the job with one another, to create a synergistic kind of learning.

Ideally, as they work together, they will be able to examine new resources, talk about different teaching techniques, use action-research methods, and take a more reflective approach to instruction.

How are professional learning teams different from regular department or staff meetings?

Professional learning teams go beyond just focusing on procedures. In a typical department meeting the conversation might revolve around things like unit scheduling, classroom activities, or who's going to do the bulletin boards. Professional learning teams typically go a layer deeper than

During her 16 years as a middle school science teacher in Alabama, Anne Jolly always had the nagging feeling that there was something wrong with the way teachers were expected to do their work. Faced with dramatic changes in student demographics, academic requirements, and information technology, teachers were cocooned in their individual claceroome where it was





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that in that they identify and focus on a specific area of student need. They set a clear focus on delving into a particular instruction area and learning how to improve their practice.

Let me give you an example. Many schools identify reading comprehension as an area of student need. So teachers on professional learning teams will get together and work specifically on the area of reading comprehension for perhaps the entire year, trying to ratchet up their instructional knowledge and expertise in that area.

So it's not just a brush-fire-bybrush-fire approach to a meeting. It's a systematic, reflective, longterm approach that seeks to make lasting changes in instruction and student learning.

How have school administrators and school districts responded to the idea of teacher professional learning teams?

It varies, but districts are

becoming more supportive. In fact, professional learning teams are now mandated by many districts. They're being seen as an effective and common-sense strategy. For their part, I think school principals are generally supportive of professional learning teams, but they don't always know how to support them.

How can principals be more supportive? They need to keep the lines of communication open, but not micromanage. For example, they shouldn't necessarily attend the meetings, but they need to know what's happening in them. They need to set up ways for teams to communicate their work and ideas to the school—for example, by arranging e-mail groups, collaborative Web sites, or presentations at faculty meetings. In other words, principals need to keep the professional learning teams on the front burner and not just look at them as some extracurricular activity that teachers are engaging in. They need to keep the effort highly visible in the school community.

What sort of things do educators need to think about when creating professional learning teams? Are there common mistakes or pitfalls?

The first thing that can hurt a learning team effort is when the administration, primarily the principal, doesn't buy in or doesn't see the need. So if I were a teacher interested in forming a professional learning team, I would begin by touching base with my principal and explaining what it is we want to accomplish. I don't know many principals who would say no, but it's important to get buy-in from the start.

Another important thing is to make sure that the team provides all members the opportunity to grow and have leadership roles—for example, by using rotating facilitators. Within certain parameters, teachers on these teams should be able to determine the processes by which they're going to learn and the particular teaching techniques they're going to adopt. The decisions they make in team meetings should not be dictated to them although there need to be certain guidelines so that the effort doesn't get off course. The team projects should take place within a structured framework, but still give teachers flexibility.

difficult to acquire new professional knowledge and all too easy to fall into familiar teaching routines. "I wondered what it would be like to work in an environment that encourages teacher collaboration, support, and personal growth," says Jolly, who was Alabama's Teacher of the Year in 1994. "What would happen if teachers worked collectively to increase our expertise and change our teaching practices?"

That line of questioning led Jolly to undertake an extensive research project on the art of teacher-collaborative work and ultimately to write her book A Facilitator's Guide to Professional Learning Teams, published by the SERVE Center at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. Jolly defines professional learning teams as small, hyper-focused groups of educators working together to improve learning for both themselves and students in a particular academic area. She believes that these teams are schools' best bet to break down the traditional cultural of isolation in teaching and to help teachers expand their intellectual horizons and improve their practice.

Jolly is now project director for professional learning teams at SERVE.

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Finally, you need to believe strongly in what you are doing. Professional learning teams are research-based, and they do make a powerful difference. But you're going to find it tough going: You're going against the cultural norm and status quo in schools. To keep everyone enthusiastic, you need to have some good selling points, and you should start with some small, doable goals.

How do professional learning teams find time to meet regularly?

This is one reason why you have to have buy-in from the principal. Meeting time during the school day is not usually something teachers can create themselves. They have to work with the principal to find a way to make time.

Some schools have enough teachers' aides that they can rotate teachers off so they can meet at least once a week for an hour or so. (It helps if the aides are also meeting in learning teams, studying the same things teachers are, so that not much ground is lost when they take over a class.) Another way is to bring in volunteers—for example, parent teams to cover classes, or to have teachers in non-core subjects fill in on a rotating basis for core teachers.

Of course, many schools also have late-start or early-dismissal days where time is devoted to professional development. The trick is to get principals to see the need to allow teachers to use that time for learning teams.

Teamwork

Professional learning teams have a variety of shapes and structures, according to Jolly, but they tend to share these common characteristics.

• Teams serve as vehicles for teacher professional development and ongoing learning focused on instruction.

• Team goals are determined by student data and needs.

• Teams meet regularly throughout the school year and use a systematic approach to guide their work.

• Team activities revolve around an action-Inquiry cycle that engages teachers in questioning, studying, planning, experimenting, reflecting, and assessing.

• Team members rotate roles and share responsibilities equally.

• Teams keep documentation of their work and share this publicly.

An hour a week is about the least amount of time you can meet and still make progress. The ideal would be to meet every day, but that's usually not possible at this point.

How do you respond to educators who say they'd rather work independently, or that meeting with other teachers is just a waste of their time?

You'd have to acknowledge that you understand that sentiment but tell them you feel that not only would they benefit from the learning-team experience, but that others would benefit from their participation—from their own knowledge and input and experience. This is actually a fairly common situation. You just have to push through it. Rick DeFour, who's pretty much the grand guru of professional learning

communities, cautions that collaboration by invitation doesn't work, because isolationism is so deeply engrained in schools. There comes a time when you have to say to those who are reluctant, "We understand your feelings, but this is something that we think will make a difference for the kids." Generally you'll see changes in teachers' attitudes as the work progresses and they begin to see the value of working colleagues in a focused way. I've seen this happen even with some of the most outspoken skeptics.

In your book, you talk about the importance of data to a professional learning team's work? Can you explain what sort of data teams should be looking at? I generally see data as being much more than just student scores. It's really more a matter of looking at what experiences are taking place.

Of course, when a team starts out, in order to identify areas of student need and set some benchmarks, they need to look closely at whatever

summative data on students is available—for example, standardized test scores, report cards, portfolios. That can help them set clear goals and gauge a school's strengths and weaknesses. But as their work proceeds, teams should be looking more at what I call *formative* types of data basically evidence of whether teaching and learning is changing for the better as a result of the team's work. This might consist of customized classroom assessments, classroom observations, or videotapes of lessons. The process should become a real study of the art of teaching.

How are professional learning teams held accountable? How do schools evaluate the work teams are doing to see if they are adding value?

There are several levels to this. First of all, you want to look at how teachers are reacting—whether their attitudes toward their work or professional development are changing for the better. This is an important but often overlooked measure of success. Then you want to examine what teachers are learning in their team meetings and whether there is carryover to the classroom. As a principal or teacher leader, you can do this by looking at the materials teachers are using, by visiting classrooms, by asking team members to make presentations at faculty meetings, and by looking at meeting logs. You'd be surprised by what you can tell by looking at the logs. Over time, you should see substantial changes in the way the teachers are talking about their work and what's happening in the classroom. It starts to go beyond just "OK, now let's try this" and evolves into something more reflective, where the team is blending experience and research and really dissecting the steps in the teaching and learning process.

And then finally, of course, the biggest area of evaluation would be changes in student performance. You should expect to see these more slowly. It might take a whole year to see real growth. But if teams are really focusing on one area, you're going to see pretty substantial growth toward the end of a year.

Is there evidence that professional learning teams improve student performance?

Yes, there's some scientifically based research data, and quite a lot of literature that chronicles the value of this process for teachers and for students. SERVE Center has done some statistical analyses on student performance in the Edenton-Chowan school system in North Carolina. The student scores in reading there went up dramatically after teachers had been working in learning teams. They began to see increases after a year, and the gains were even greater after the second year.

Another way to document impact is to examine changes in classroom applications and teaching performance. But school districts these days pretty are harassed by a lot of different pressures, and they're trying to implement a lot of initiatives at once. It's hard to put enough focus on any one initiative to monitor and measure impact at the local level, but that's what we try to help districts do.

What's your outlook on the future of professional learning teams and teacher professional development in general?

I see this particular approach as being the only practical and viable professional development approach we'll have. We have a lot of data showing that one-shot workshops, if that's all there is, are not very effective. I'm not saying that we don't need workshops. We do. But once the workshop is over, what then? This is where working together to sustain good practices and ideas is going to be very valuable. If it's worth sending teachers to a workshop, then it's worth having teachers get together to figure out how to put what they've learned into practice. Otherwise, if you just leave everybody to their own devices, very little of it is going to be implemented.

We've got to have some way to keep the teaching profession as close as possible to societal needs. And right now society is changing so fast. Breaking through the culture of isolation in schools can help teachers

become more connected—to each other, to changes in student needs, to new instructional techniques.

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



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
Reasons for Proposed Staffing Reductions


- The combination of continued declining enrollment and the reduced state budget leaves us with a projected operating deficit of \$5 million in the 08-09 school year.
- · This could change
 - State allocations could worsen or improve
 - The Board of Education can make changes to the permit policy, but this is unlikely to affect the 08-09 operating budget.




Staff Recommendations

- Although there is a projected \$5 million operating deficit for the 08-09 year, staff is recommending a \$2.5 million target in budget reductions.
- Since 92% of the District's operating budget goes towards personnel, practically all of the proposed reductions will occur in personnel.







Anticipated Reductions


- Using the ratios on the previous slide, staff is making the following staffing allocation recommendations for certificated teachers:
 - A reduction of 17 FTE in Secondary Sites
 - A reduction of 7 FTE in Elementary Sites
 - A reduction of 1 FTE in Elementary Music (this was a temporary FTE granted for the 07-08 year only)

Other Reductions Being Considered

- Central Office Reductions will be Recommended
 - Administrative
 - Classified
- Staff continues to examine positions and will be making recommendations soon.
- District programs are being evaluated and will be considered in this process

Other Reductions Being Considered

- Based on declining enrollment in the past two years, the overwhelming majority of staffing reductions have been among the teaching staff.
- Staff will be recommending cuts for administrators and classified staff as well.
- Since there was already a planned reduction of 9.5 FTE in the budget, the additional cuts will save \$1.25 million, which amounts to half of the \$2.5 million savings target.



- Samohi enrollment has decreased from 3300 to a projected 2826 in 2008.
- Reducing Santa Monica High School from six houses to five houses would keep the house:student ratio the same as when the house system was created.
 - No teaching reductions would be included
 - Reductions would include two advisors, one house principal, one administrative assistant and one community out reach specialist.
 - A potential savings of nearly \$400,000



- Staff is carefully examining clerical staffing ratios at each site.
 - Applying formulas for each site based on the number of students in the site
 - This will result in a decrease in FTE
