A regular meeting of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education was held on Thursday, June 5, 2008, in the District Administrative Offices: 1651 16th Street, Santa Monica, CA. The Board of Education called the meeting to order at 4:20 p.m. in the Board Conference Room at the District Offices: 1651 16th Street, Santa Monica, CA. At 4:21 p.m., the Board of Education moved to Closed Session regarding the items listed below. The public meeting reconvened at 5:55 p.m. in the Board Room.

A. Student Board Member Reports

Alec Richker – Santa Monica High School

Student Board Member Richker reported that the Senior Gala was being tonight at 7:00pm, and the Pops Concert would be Saturday night at 2:00pm. The Film Festival last night made \$900 and fourteen films were picked. The cheerleaders are holding a car wash fundraiser this Sunday from 10:00am-4:00pm; the funds will support their trip to Nationals in Florida. Graduation and Grad Night are June 19th. Dona Davoodi was elected to be the ASB President for 2008-09. The Choral Concert will be held on June 6th at 7:00pm, while UN Day is on the 9th. Yearbooks will be distributed Tuesday and Wednesday next week. Seniors have their class finals this week. Mr. Richker finished his report by introducing SAMOHI's 2008-09 Student Board Member, Jamie Black. Since Mr. Richker arrived late to the meeting, Board President de la Torre presented him with his end-of-year plaque and thanked him for his service.

Kristen Lambert - Malibu High School

Student Board Member Lambert reported that juniors went on a field trip to UCLA, while the seniors went to yesterday's Dodger game; a handful of seniors took a filed trip to the Griffith Park Observatory. The Choral Concert Masterwork Concert was today, while the general choir concert will be held on June 9th, the band performance will be on June 10th, and the orchestra will perform on June 11th. The middle school Talent Show will be held tomorrow. Seniors took their finals this week. Graduation will be held on June 19th, and 8th Grade Promotion will be held on June 20th. The Journalism group will sponsor a Coffee House gathering on June 13th. Ms. Lambert said that Ms. Thomas and Mr. Bennet, both of whom are retiring at the end of this school year, would be missed greatly. She concluded by saying that her experiences as a student board member have been invaluable. She thanked the Board of Education for the opportunity to serve. Mr. de la Torre said that if Ms. Lambert needed assistance next year as ASB President to contact the board.

John Shippey - Olympic High School

Student Board Member Shippey reported that a USC study had been conducted on campus by the Keck School of Medicine. The study examined why students use tobacco, alcohol, and drugs, and practice unsafe sexual behaviors. The campus had a very successful comedy night last month. This semester, SMC provided for a Counseling 1 Class for Olympic students. They are hoping to have two classes next year. A film by student Adrian Villasenor was viewed in a screening in the Santa Monica Main Library. The film will be entered in the Santa Monica Film Festival. SMDP Chief Tim Jackman spoke to the Criminal Justice Class last month. Olympic's Mentoring Project is underway, in which former students who have gone on to successful careers come to mentor current students. The RGK Foundation is providing the campus with \$10,000 to help establish a science lab on campus, thanks to the efforts of the Education Foundation. Science teachers Anthony Fuller and Barry Cowan took eight students on an overnight astronomy trip to Mt. Pinos in Frazier Park. This spring, a boys' yoga class was established. Artwork generated by Olympic students was included in a gallery showing of the Venice Arts group last month. SMPD held a DUI day on campus, in which officers showed videos to students and simulated drunk driving with special goggles. Student digital artwork was displayed at Virginia Ave. Park in an art show last month. Two Olympic students, Daniel Tea and Mr. Shippey himself, performed with Jackson Browne, VENICE, and HEART last weekend.

Mr. Shippey concluded his report by thanking Principal Janie Gates for her dedication. He said he understands that Olympic High School sometimes gets a bad rap for being a continuation high school, but the wonderful things that happen and the great opportunities are due to Ms. Gates. Mr. de la Torre said the perception of Olympic was changing into something very positive, thanks to Janie Gates and the successes of the students.

The PTA Council also supports the establishment of a communications program that would address communications strategies, the district hiring a communications specialist, and a parent contact database. Ms. Kennerly then addressed the recent situation at Lincoln Middle School. She also mentioned that in preparation for next school year, PTA Council would meet with the Health and Safety DAC regarding emergency preparedness. To conclude her report, Ms. Kennerly stated that the incredible accomplishments of the district's students are visible in end-of-year activities and performances.

III <u>Recommendations</u>:

DELAC is aware that there are budgetary limitations, however the parents want to make certain that the district continues to implement the strategies, interventions, and programs that have been successful in accelerating the achievement of our English Learners. Many of our English Learners meet the percentage of achievement required by the state in the AMAOS. However, there are a number of English Learners who do not. Therefore, there remains a need to refine our ability to provide effective service to each English Learner; particularly those who have yet to meet the state target levels of achievement.

In order to do this, DELAC views the following recommendations as fundamental to the success of their children, and in fulfillment of the charge that they have been given by the state of California as reflected in the California Educational Code urges the district to:

1) <u>Continue to offer high quality English Language Development secondary</u> (ELD) at the:

The achievement level of SMMUSD's Reclassified Fluent English proficient students as measured by performance on standardized measures such as CST and CAHSEE has historically been remarkable. Parents and staff feel that this directly attributable to the comprehensive services that English Learners receive in district programs. A fundamental component of these services are ELD classes that are targeted, utilize high quality materials and instructional methodologies, and sequentially provide for the linguistic needs of students acquiring English. There is a need to continue to provide the current scope, sequence and structure of District ELD programs.

2) Continue offering Sheltered content classes at the secondary level:

Sheltered content classes provide grade level academic instruction that gives English Learners access to the core curriculum while teaching English vocabulary and English grammatical structures. Secondary sites need to evaluate the need of providing their ELs with access in the various content areas and create sheltered classes offerings according to the identified need. Currently offered at JAMS and Samohi.

3) Continue appropriate placement of English Learners:

The district's design for delivering services to ELs requires that ELs be grouped in classrooms according to their English proficiency levels. Grouping ELs of no more than 2 contiguous English proficiency levels facilitates the delivery of appropriate instructional services in the elementary classrooms.

4) Continue ELD summer school and intervention classes:

Summer and intervention programs are seen as one of the best ways to support student learning. They especially give ELs the opportunity to receive additional support needed in their acquisition of English and accessing the core curriculum which leads to academic achievement.

IV Budgetary Implications/Recommendation:

The district receives state and federal funds to provide supplementary support to English Learners. DELAC urges the board to use the additional funds that English Learners generate to continue implementing the recommendations outlined above.

• Margarita Gonzalez, a parent in the district, addressed the board regarding parent support groups.

Mr. de la Torre requested information regarding the number of English Learners and bilingual staff at each site. Ms. Diaz said that she could provide him with that information, as well as a copy of the parent handbook.

Dr. Escarce expressed his concern that English Learners often times do not apply for four-year colleges because they are deterred by the concept of student loans. He suggested an aggressive plan to educate students and families regarding the benefits of student loans for colleges. Ms. Diaz explained that during workshops staff does emphasize the benefits of financial aid as well as explain the college application and financial aid process.

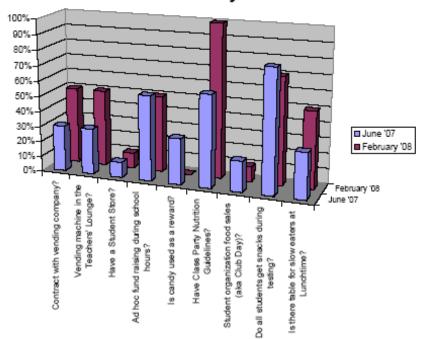

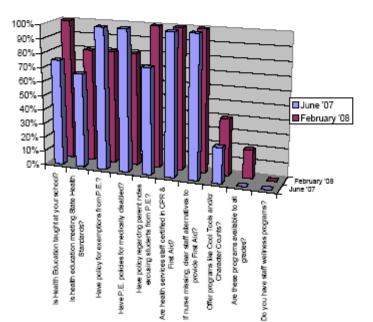




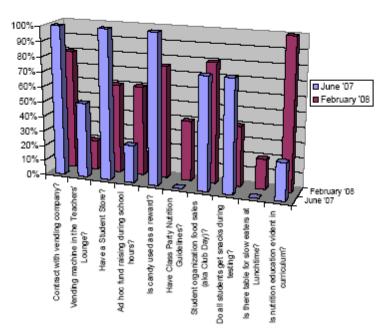
8-month changes in nutrition policies elementary schools

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.22

It is recommended that the Board of Education amend the Charge for the Financial Oversight Committee, as delineated in the following document: *Statement of Purpose*, to remove resident taxpayer oversight committee responsibilities for the rescinded Measure S, and assign similar new responsibilities to review the district's administration of and compliance with the terms of Measure R, as approved by the voters of Malibu and Santa Monica in the February 5, 2008, Special Election.

COMMENTS: On February 5, 2008, district voters overwhelmingly approved Measure R, which consolidated and modified two parcel taxes and rescinded the prior parcel taxes approved as Measures Y and S. Measure R, like the previous Measure S, requires an Independent Citizens Oversight Committee to monitor proposed and actual parcel tax expenditures each year. It is appropriate that the Financial Oversight Committee be charged with the Measure R expenditure oversight task, as stated above, which would replace the FOC's similar responsibilities under the now-rescinded Measure S. The Charge for the Financial Oversight Committee was last updated on November 18, 2004. The only change being recommended by this action is due to the passage of the Measure R parcel tax.

Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District FINANCIAL OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE Statement of Purpose

I. <u>Committee Composition</u>

The Financial Oversight Committee (FOC) of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District shall consist of 9 members, appointed by the Board of Education. Appointments will be for three-year terms, such terms to be staggered so that one-third of the members (3) will have terms that expire in any given calendar year.

The Committee will select a chair and vice-chair, which will each serve for a one-year term.

The District's Assistant Superintendent for Fiscal & Business Services will serve as the staff liaison to the FOC, and will be assisted by other District staff as needed. District consultants may be needed to assist in the work of the FOC, depending on data and/or issues being analyzed.

Prior members of the FOC may serve at the request of the Committee as emeritus members of the FOC at the expiration of their term. Such emeritus members are advisory, non-voting members.

II. Criteria for Selection of Committee Members

- 1. Broad perspective
- 2. Financial and/or management and/or legal expertise/experience
- 3. Residing, employed or working within the geographic boundaries of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District
- 4. Business process orientation
- 5. Communicates clearly the information resulting from the FOC's work
- 6. Not currently serving as an elected official

In appointing members, the Board will attempt to have the composition of the FOC reflect the composition of the student population.

III. <u>Application Process</u>

The Board will seek applications to fill vacancies on the Committee on an annual basis. All applications received will be reviewed by the FOC, and recommendations regarding FOC members will be forwarded from the Committee to the Board. The Board appoints members to the Committee.

Applications will be considered valid for a period of one year from the date of receipt, unless withdrawn by the applicant.

All applicants will be asked to provide their professional resume, together with the application form and any other information they may deem relevant. Application forms will be available at the switchboard of the District's administrative offices, 1651 16th Street in Santa Monica, and upon request from the Superintendent's Office.

IV. FOC Roles and Responsibilities

- 1. Assist the District in educating the general public concerning school finance issues.
- 2. Assist the District in creating reader friendly budget information.
- 3. Review any matters potentially having a significant impact on District finances before the Board of Education takes action.
- 4. Serve as the Measure S Resident Taxpayer <u>**R Independent Citizens</u>** Oversight Committee charged with reviewing the District's administration of and compliance with the terms of the Measure, including:</u>
 - a) Ensuring that the revenues raised by Measure **S R** are used for the following purposes:
 - i) To restore preserve programs ands replace funds lost or reduced due to State budget cuts inadequate state funding;
 - ii) To sustain achievement in reading, writing, and mathematics for all students at all grade levels and to fulfill the District's core curriculum which includes music, arts, and athletics; and,
 - iii) <u>To attract and retain highly qualified teachers and</u>,
 - iv) To protect the taxpayers' investment in education and ensure District accountability by providing for resident taxpayer <u>special citizen financial</u> oversight and independent annual audits of revenues and expenditures.
 - b) Overseeing the District's accounting for revenues raised by Measure $\underline{S} \underline{R}$, including placing Measure $\underline{S} \underline{R}$ revenues in a separate account;
 - c) Consulting with the District in the preparation of an Annual Plan for Measure $S \underline{R}$ expenditures for Board action;
 - d) Reviewing the District's annual report to the Board and the Financial Oversight Committee identifying the actual amount of Measure $S \underline{R}$ funds collected and expended, and how these expenditures relate to the Annual Plan approved by the Board; and,
 - e) Reviewing the District's annual independent audit of Measure S $\underline{\mathbf{R}}$ revenues and expenditures.
- 5. Provide monitoring and oversight of the City of Santa Monica joint-use agreement with the District, as per the terms of that contractual agreement.
- 6. Provide monitoring and oversight of any City of Malibu contributions to the District.
- 7. Review the District's annual audit and accompanying management letters, and submit any comments or recommendations to the Board of Education.
- 8. Review the annual budget, enrollment projections, revenue and expenditure forecasts, and the District's capital program, and submit any recommendations to the Board of Education.
- 9. Serve as liaison to other District committees regarding financial implications of proposed program or policy changes at the direction of the Board.

V. <u>Conflict of Interest</u>

Financial Oversight Committee members shall sign the Conflict of Interest pledge.

VI. FOC Meetings and Procedures

The FOC will meet regularly during the school year. The annual schedule of meetings will be determined at the first meeting of each year. Additional meetings will be scheduled as needed. FOC meetings are subject to State open meeting laws, including timely agenda posting and participation by the public.

The FOC will annually report to the Board on Measure R and other oversight activities.

At the beginning of each fiscal year the FOC will consider and select several objectives related to its purpose, which will serve as the FOC's focus during that year, subject to concurrence by the Board of Education.

The FOC may, as needed, form subcommittees to provide an opportunity for in-depth review.

The FOC may adopt other rules and procedures to govern its operations, including bylaws, subject to review and approval by the Board of Education.

RE: ADOPT RESOLUTION 07-28 - TEMPORARY INTERFUND CASH BORROWING

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.24

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Resolution No. 07-28 - Temporary Interfund Cash Borrowing.

COMMENTS: Education Code §42603 allows school districts to use cash reserves in one Fund to meet short-term cash deficiencies in another Fund. The amount of such transfers is limited to 75% of available resources in a Fund. With the possibility that the District Revenue Limit apportionment will be delayed until September 2008, it may be necessary to use this authority in the 2008-09 fiscal year. It is common that school districts adopt a Resolution of this nature on an annual basis to facilitate District operations. Board adoption of this Resolution will allow for inter-fund cash borrowing between District Funds.

3.1 Approval of Special Education Local Plan Area Service and Budget Plan (Nondistrict Function)

In compliance with IDEA, as amended in 2004, and California Education Code (EC) Section 56205(b)(2) and EC Section 56601(a), the Board of Education of the Administrative Unit of Tri-City SELPA will receive public input regarding the SELPA Annual Budget and Service Plan. The Tri-City SELPA member Districts are Culver City Unified School District, Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District and Beverly Hills Unified School District.

SPECIAL EDUCATION LOCAL PLAN AREA LOCAL EDUCATION AGENCY (LEA) ASSURANCES

1. FREE APPROPRIATE PUBLIC EDUCATION (20 USC § 1412 (a)(1))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that a free appropriate public education is available to all children residing in the LEA between the ages of three through 21 inclusive, including students with disabilities who have been suspended or expelled from school.

2. FULL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY (20 USC § 1412 (a)(2))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that all pupils with disabilities have access to educational programs, nonacademic programs, and services available to non-disabled pupils.

3. CHILD FIND (20 USC § 1412 (a)(3))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that all children with disabilities residing in the State, including children with disabilities who are homeless or are wards of the State and children attending private schools, regardless of the severity of their disabilities, and who are in need of special education and related services are identified, located and evaluated. A practical method is developed and implemented to determine which students with disabilities are currently receiving needed special education and related services.

4. INDIVIDUALIZED EDUCATION PROGRAM (IEP) AND INDIVIDUALIZED FAMILY SERVICE PLAN (IFSP) (20 USC § 1412 (a)(4))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that an Individualized Education Program (IEP) or an Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) is developed, reviewed and revised for each child with a disability who requires special education and related services in order to benefit from his/her individualized education program. Special class, separate schooling, or other removal of a student with disabilities from the general educational environment, occurs only when the nature or severity of the disability of the student is such that education in general classes with the use of supplemental aids and services cannot be achieved satisfactorily.

6. PROCEDURAL SAFEGUARDS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(6))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that children with disabilities and their parents shall be afforded all procedural safeguards throughout the provision of a free appropriate public education including the identification, evaluation, and placement process.

7. EVALUATION (20 USC § 1412 (a)(7))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that a reassessment of a student with a disability shall be conducted at least once every three years or more frequently, if appropriate.

8. CONFIDENTIALITY (20 USC § 1412 (a)(8))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that the confidentiality of personally identifiable data information and records maintained by the LEA relating to children with disabilities and their parents and families shall be protected pursuant to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).

9. PART C, TRANSITION (20 USC § 1412 (a)(9))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that a transition process for a child who is participating in Early Intervention Programs (IDEA, Part C) with an IFSP is begun prior to a toddler's third birthday. The transition process shall be smooth, timely and effective for the child and family.

10. PRIVATE SCHOOLS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(10))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to assure that children with disabilities voluntarily enrolled by their parents in private schools shall receive appropriate special education and related services pursuant to LEA coordinated procedures. The proportionate amount of federal funds will be allocated for the purpose of providing special education services to children with disabilities voluntarily enrolled in private school by their parents.

11. LOCAL COMPLIANCE ASSURANCES (20 USC § 1412 (a)(11))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that the local plan shall be adopted by the appropriate local board(s) (district/county) and is the basis for the operation and administration of special education programs; and that the agency(ies) herein represented will meet all applicable requirements of state and federal laws and regulations, including compliance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, the Federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, Section 504 of Public Law and the provisions of the California Education Code, Part 30.

12. INTERAGENCY (20 USC § 1412 (a)(12))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that interagency agreements or other mechanisms for interagency coordination are in effect to ensure services required for FAPE are provided, including the continuation of services during an interagency dispute resolution process.

13. GOVERNANCE (20 USC § 1412 (a)(13))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to support and comply with the provisions of the governance bodies and any necessary administrative support to implement the Local Plan. A final determination that an LEA is not eligible for assistance under this part will not be made without first affording that LEA with reasonable notice and an opportunity for a hearing through the State Educational Agency.

14. PERSONNEL QUALIFICATIONS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(14))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to ensure that personnel providing special education related services meet the highly qualified requirements as defined under federal law, including that those personnel have the content knowledge and skills to serve children with disabilities.

It shall be the policy of this LEA to comply with the requirements of the performance goals and indicators developed by the CDE and provide data as required by the CDE.

It shall be the policy of this LEA that all students with disabilities shall participate in state and district-wide assessment programs. The IEP team determines how a student will access assessments with or without accommodations, or access alternate assessments, consistent with state standards governing such determinations.

17.SUPPLEMENTATION OF STATE/FEDERAL FUNDS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(17))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to provide assurances that funds received from Part B of the IDEA will be expended in accordance with the applicable provisions of the IDEA; will be used to supplement and not to supplant state, local and other Federal funds those funds.

18. MAINTENANCE OF EFFORT (20 USC § 1412 (a)(18))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that federal funds will not be used to reduce the level of local funds and/or combined level of local and state funds expended for the education of children with disabilities except as provided in Federal law and regulations.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.01

In June 2003, voters approved a qualified special property tax known as Measure S, which authorized the levying of a special per parcel tax within the boundaries of the Cities of Santa Monica and Malibu for (6) years. A significant provision of this particular Measure was the formation of a Board-appointed "resident taxpayer oversight committee to review administration of and compliance with Measure S. The Financial Oversight Committee (FOC) was charged by the Board of Education with those Measure S responsibilities.

Furthermore, Measure S also required that, the FOC review the independent financial audit of all Measure S expenditures and financial activities for the immediately preceding fiscal year and review spending projections for the upcoming fiscal year. The FOC reports its findings on these matters as part of its annual report to the Board. This will be the final year for the report on Measure S as the voters approved a new parcel tax, Measure R, on February 5, 2008. This Measure combined and replaced the previous Measure S and Measure Y parcel taxes. Beginning with fiscal year 2008-09, the FOC will assume the oversight responsibilities associated with Measure R. (Action appointing the FOC as the oversight committee for Measure R is expected during the major action item portion of this Board Meeting.)

Therefore, in compliance with the foregoing, the Board of Education will convene a joint session with the Financial Oversight Committee on June 5, 2008 at 7:00 p.m. for the purpose of addressing the following items:

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Public Comments:

• Gleam Davis, a member of the community, voiced her support for the FOC suggestions.

CFO Jan Maez introduced the FOC members. Chair Paul Silvern summarized the FOC report, which can be found at the end of these minutes under Attachments.

Dr. Escarce said he disagreed with the FOC's phrase "persistent deficit spending." He said that during this budget crisis, the district is having to make large budget cuts, and should draw on the reserve funds to support programs that are valuable to students. Ms. Maez suggested that the district might want to evaluate its budgeting practices and that the FOC could assist in that process. Mr. de la Torre proposed SMMUSD examine best practices for budget planning in other districts. Dr. Wisnicki suggested the district could receive budget planning and deficit spending advice from a group like FCMAT. She expressed her confidence in the district's financial health. Ms. Hoffman said the district has a reserve due, in part, to measures such as aggressive hiring freezes and approving interdistrict permits. Mr. Silvern warned against including large, one-time funding sources in the budget planning process, considering they can be unreliable from year to year. Ms. Leon-Vazquez commented that a school district needs to find a balance between the needs of the children and teachers with fiscal responsibility. Mr. Snell suggested examining existing models to gradually reduce budget deficits. He and Mr. Mechur welcomed FOC involvement regarding cost reductions in Special Education, while maintaining programs. Ms. Pye asked for more analysis addressing where the district is historically regarding carryover, managing student attendance, and a deliberate approach to spending reserves. Ms. Hoffman suggested the district not use one-time money to fund ongoing programs. Mr. de la Torre suggested the idea of a model to incentivize teachers who teach in places of greatest need. Mr. Silvern clarified for Mr. de la Torre that he has never opposed future raises for labor groups, but has expressed concern regarding the percentage of an increase.

The board unanimously supported having the FOC review the district budget prior to the onset of labor negotiations. The board also agreed to the FOC assisting in developing a financial model for the Special Education program.

Mr. Snell suggested the district examine how to finance a small school. Mr. Mechur stressed the need to be realistic about when the district could start the high school. He requested that staff come back with estimated costs and a proposed timeline. Ms. Pye suggested the district examine other models to determine how SMMUSD could implement a small high school sooner.

As next steps, staff will come back with a discussion item, and then later an action item, regarding a plan and budget for a planning year; the plan should address the goals of the planning year, what would be needed to get the project up and running, and analysis regarding one theme-based house at SAMOHI.

Introduction

The Board has had several opportunities to discuss the development of the 2008-09 District Budget. In a workshop held on April 7, 2008, staff outlined the impact of the Governor's January Budget and made several budget reduction recommendations for the budget year. At the regular Board of Education held on May 15, 2008, staff described in detail a preliminary budget for the District. Additional budget reductions were proposed, as directed by the Board at the earlier April workshop. Staff also incorporated a very early analysis of the Governor's May Revise and made a series of suggestions for budget reinstatement. Prior to final adoption of the budget staff has prepared a revised preliminary general fund budget for Board review.

Listed below are the revised assumptions used to develop the SMMUSD budget:

REVENUE ASSUMPTIONS

5.66% statutory COLA for 2008-09 Revenue Limit funding

The Base Revenue Limit for Santa Monica-Malibu USD will be \$6,208.84 per ADA (2007-08 P2 ADA - 11,087). A **<5.36% >** deficit factor is applied to the Revenue Limit. The total Revenue Limit is \$65,779,658.

The hourly rate for Supplemental Instructional Programs are: Grade 7-12 CASEE \$4.08/hr Grade 2-9 Retained \$3.37/hr Grade 2-6 At Risk \$2.60/hr K-12 Core \$2.33/hr

The projection of 2008-09 District Enrollment is 11,364. The current CBEDs count is 11,652, thus a potential reduction of <288> students that translates to approximately (\$1.6 M) reduction in our revenue stream.

The Lottery allocation will be \$131.50 per annual ADA, of which \$115 is for unrestricted expenditures and the remaining \$16.5 is for Proposition 20 - Mandated for Instructional Materials.

The District will participate in the K-3 Class Size Reduction Program and receive \$1,001 per pupil (\$1,071 in 2007-08).

No COLA and restored <6.5 %> cut of Special Educations Funding in May Revision. Special Education transfer from the Revenue Limit is \$1,916,348.

Special Education Mandate Settlement at \$4.52 per 1999-2000 ADA is \$52,328.

The 07-08 Mandated Reimbursement is not included in the 2008-09 budget.

The Measure "R" parcel tax at \$346 per parcel is estimated to generate \$10,296,960, after processing senior exemptions, which are anticipated to number 2,767 out of 32,527 parcels. The Measure "R" will begin in 2008-09 to replace the Measure "Y" and Measure "S".

The District will receive \$7,443,913 (including 3% prevailing COLA) of financial support from the City of Santa Monica.

The District will receive \$139,835 of Joint Use Agreement from the City of Malibu.

The combined lease revenue is \$2,642,412, which is from Double Tree Hotel, Madison Site, 9^{th} & Colorado and 16^{th} Street properties.

The Instructional Materials Funding Realignment Program (IMFRP) will be funded at \$64.67 per pupil per 2008-09 CBEDS enrollment.

The Supplemental School Counseling Program will be funded at \$70 per pupil, based on the 2007-08 grades 7 to 12 enrollment.

The Arts and Music Grant will be funded at \$14.25 per enrolled K-12 pupil.

A \$1 million transfer from Fund 21 to the Ongoing Maintenance Program (Fund 01) was approved by the Board (May 3, 2007).

A \$75,000 transfer from General Fund to the Child Development Fund is budgeted in 2008-09 for the extra costs incurred by the minimum days of elementary schools.

RESERVE for ECONOMIC UNCERTAINTIES

Under the State Criteria and Standards, the District budget should reflect a 3% reserve of the total General Fund Budget for 2008-09, 2009-10 and 2010-11.

Ms. Pye asked about ways to promote World Class Public Schools to help combat declining enrollment. She requested information regarding the cost of hiring a part-time communications specialist or grant writer.

Mr. Mechur asked how the district determined classified and certificated reductions. Dr. Matthews explained that classified staffing is done using formulas. He added that at the district office, certain positions were cut or vacant positions were not filled.

Dr. Escarce asked when staff incorporated the projected 150 permit students. Ms. Maez replied that the agenda item for last meeting and this meeting reflected that projection.

The board gave direction to Ms. Maez to bring this information forward in the final budget for approval at the June 26^{th} board meeting.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.04

It is recommended that the Board of Education revise Board Policy 5141.4 - Child Abuse Prevention and Reporting [formerly "Child Abuse and Neglect (Reporting Procedures)"]. These revisions are recommended by CSBA, the California State Department of Education, and the California Attorney General's Office, Crime and Violence Prevention Center.

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Public Comments:

• Michael Chwe, a member of the community, addressed the board regarding student safety. Dr. Matthews clarified the difference between a child abuse report and a complaint form.

Dr. Mike Matthews summarized the proposed changes to the policy. (The draft minutes from the Ad Hoc Policy Review Committee meeting can be found under Attachments at the end of these minutes.) Dr. Wisnicki supported the inclusion of the last bullet point from the Ad Hoc Policy Review suggested changes.

Dr. Matthews clarified that when the authorities determine there are no findings regarding a complaint, the district keeps a record of the complaint, but it does not go in the employee's file. He explained that the district is looking into hiring an independent investigator for instances of allegations. While the district cannot interfere with an investigation by the authorities, it can follow up after the authorities' investigation is complete.

Dr. Matthews explained that all new employees attend training, and their administrators sign off that those employees have received training materials. He added that beginning on July 1st, an employee would not attend the first day of work without having first been trained by district office staff. He said the forms are on the website and the information is printed in the parent handbook. It was suggested the PTA could help communicate this information to the community.

Dr. Escarce requested the student sexual harassment policy come forward for review. Dr. Matthews said the district is waiting on a contract with CSBA to review and offer updates to all SMMUSD policies.

Mr. de la Torre suggested the word "protect" be incorporated into the beginning of the policy language.

This policy will return for approval on June 26, 2008. On June 12th, the Ad Hoc Policy Review Committee will review the legality of the suggested language changes.

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DETAIL

Child Abuse Prevention

The Governing Board recognizes the district's responsibility to educate students about the dangers of child abuse so that they will acquire the skills and techniques needed to identify unsafe situations and to react appropriately and promptly.

The district's instructional program shall include ageappropriate and culturally sensitive child abuse prevention curriculum. This curriculum shall explain students' right to live free of abuse, inform them of available support resources, and teach them how to obtain help and disclose incidents of abuse. The curriculum also shall include training in selfprotection techniques.

The Superintendent or designee shall seek to incorporate community resources into the district's child abuse prevention programs. To the extent feasible, the Superintendent or designee shall use these community resources to provide parents/guardians with instruction in parenting skills and child abuse prevention.

Child Abuse Reporting

The Board recognizes that child abuse has severe consequences and that the district has a responsibility to protect students by facilitating the prompt reporting of known and suspected incidents of child abuse. With concern for the total well-being of each student, the Board of Education directs the employees of the District to report known or suspected incidences of child abuse in accordance with state law and Administrative Regulations. District employees shall cooperate with the child protective agencies responsible for reporting, investigating and prosecuting cases of child abuse. The Superintendent <u>or</u> <u>designee</u> shall <u>develop and implement regulations for identifying</u> and reporting child abuse. establish procedures for the identification and reporting of such incidents in accordance with law.

Employees who are mandated reporters, as defined by law and administrative regulation, are obligated to report all known or suspected incidents of child abuse and neglect.

Mandated reporters shall not investigate any suspected incidents but rather shall cooperate with agencies responsible for investigating and prosecuting cases of child abuse and neglect.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training regarding the reporting duties of mandated reporters.

In the event that training is not provided to mandated reporters, the Superintendent or designee shall report to the California Department of Education the reasons that such training is not provided.

SUBJECT: Child Abuse and Neglect (Reporting Procedures)

ISSUED BY: Director Pupil/Administrative Services

I. EFFECTIVE DATE: November 14, 1988

II. AUTHORITY

Board of Education Policy 5141.4

III. PROCEDURES

A. Reportable Cases Under Child Abuse Reporting Law

1. Sections 11166 of the California Penal Code mandates the reporting to designated authorities of cases of suspected <u>or</u> <u>known</u> child abuse . A report, both by telephone and in writing, is required of any certificated school employee who in his/her professional capacity or within the scope of his/her employment has knowledge of or observes a child who can reasonably be suspected of having been a victim of child abuse.

2. For the purposes of this law, the following definitions apply:

a. "Child" means a person under the age of 18. Emancipation does not alter the responsibility for reporting abuse of a minor under the California Penal Code.

b. "Child abuse" means:

Definitions

Child abuse or neglect includes the following:

1. A physical injury or \underline{death} inflicted by other than accidental means on a child by another person

2. Sexual abuse of a child, including sexual assault/molestation and/or sexual exploitation, of a child; as defined in Penal Code 11165.1

3. Neglect of a child as defined in Penal Code 11165.2

4. Willful harming or injuring of a child or the endangering of the person or health of a child as defined in Penal Code 11165.3

3) Any act or omission proscribed by Section 273a (willful cruelty or punishment of a child) or 273d (corporal punishment or injury) of the California Penal Code;

5. Unlawful corporal punishment or injury as defined in Penal Code 11165.4

Child abuse or neglect does not include:

1. A mutual affray between minors (Penal Code 11165.6)

2. An injury caused by reasonable and necessary force used by a peace officer acting within the course and scope of his/her employment (Penal Code 11165.6)

3. An injury resulting from the exercise by a teacher, assistant principal, principal, or other certificated employee of the same degree of physical control over a student that a parent/guardian would be privileged to exercise, not exceeding the amount of physical control reasonably necessary to maintain order, protect property, protect the health and safety of students, or maintain proper and appropriate conditions conducive to learning (Education Code 44807)

4. An injury caused by a school employee's use of force that is reasonable and necessary to quell a disturbance threatening physical injury to persons or damage to property, to protect himself/herself, or to obtain weapons or other dangerous objects within the control of the student (Education Code 49001)

5. Physical pain or discomfort caused by athletic competition or other such recreational activity voluntarily engaged in by the student (Education Code 49001)

Mandated reporters include, but are not limited to, teachers; instructional aides; teacher's aides or assistants; classified employees; certificated pupil personnel employees; administrative officers or supervisors of child attendance; administrators and employees of a licensed day care facility; Head Start teachers; district police or security officers; licensed nurse or health care provider; and administrators, presenters, and counselors of a child abuse prevention program (Penal Code 1165.7)

Reasonable suspicion means that it is objectively reasonable for a person to entertain a suspicion, based upon facts that could cause a reasonable person in a like position, drawing when appropriate on his/her training and experience, to suspect child abuse or neglect. (Penal Code 11166)

Reportable Offenses

A mandated reporter shall make a report using the procedures provided whenever, in his/her professional capacity or within the scope of his/her employment, he/she has knowledge of or observes a child whom the mandated reporter knows or reasonably suspects has been the victim of child abuse or neglect. (Penal Code 11166)

Any mandated reporter who has knowledge of or who reasonably suspects that a child is suffering serious emotional damage or is at a substantial risk of suffering serious emotional damage, based on evidence of severe anxiety, depression, withdrawal, or untoward aggressive behavior toward self or others, may make a report to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166.05)

Any person shall notify a peace officer if he/she reasonably believes that he/she has observed the commission of a murder, rape, or lewd or lascivious act by use of force, violence, duress, menace, or fear of immediate and unlawful bodily injury, where the victim is a child under age 14. (Penal Code 152.3, 288)

Responsibility for Reporting

The reporting duties of mandated reporters are individual and cannot be delegated to another person. (Penal Code 11166)

When two or more mandated reporters jointly have knowledge of a known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect, the report may be made by a member of the team selected by mutual agreement and a single report may be made and signed by the selected member of the reporting team. Any member who has knowledge that the member designated to report has failed to do so shall thereafter make the report. (Penal Code 11166)

No supervisor or administrator shall impede or inhibit a mandated reporter from making a report. (Penal Code 11166)

Any person not identified as a mandated reporter who has knowledge of or observes a child whom he/she knows or reasonably suspects has been a victim of child abuse or neglect may report the known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166)

Reporting Procedures

1. Initial Telephone Report

Within 24 hours of knowing or observing suspected child abuse or neglect, a mandated reporter shall make an initial report by telephone to any police department (excluding a school district police/security department), sheriff's department, county probation department if designated by the county to receive such reports, or county welfare department. (Penal Code 11166) Please call the LA County Child Protection Hot Line first.

When the initial telephone report is made, the mandated reporter shall note the name of the official contacted, the date and time contacted, and any instructions or advice received.

2. Written Report

Within 36 hours of knowing or observing the information concerning the incident, the mandated reporter shall then prepare and either send, fax, or electronically submit to the appropriate agency a written follow-up report, which includes a completed Department of Justice form (SS 8572). (Penal Code 11166, 11168)

Mandated reporters may obtain copies of the Department of Justice form from either the district or the appropriate agency.

Reports of suspected child abuse or neglect shall include, if known: (Penal Code 11167)

a. The name, business address, and telephone number of the person making the report and the capacity that makes the person a mandated reporter

b. The child's name and address, present location and, where applicable, school, grade, and class

c. The names, addresses, and telephone numbers of the child's parents/guardians

d. The information that gave rise to the reasonable suspicion of child abuse or neglect and the source(s) of that information e. The name, address, telephone number, and other relevant personal information about the person(s) who might have abused or neglected the child

The mandated reporter shall make a report even if some of this information is not known or is uncertain to him/her. (Penal Code 11167)

Information relevant to the incident of child abuse or neglect may also be given to an investigator from an agency that is investigating the case. (Penal Code 11167)

3. Internal Reporting

Employees reporting child abuse or neglect to an appropriate agency are required, to notify the principal as soon as possible after the initial telephone report to the appropriate agency. When so notified, the principal shall inform the Superintendent or designee.

The principal so notified shall provide the mandated reporter with any assistance necessary to ensure that reporting procedures are carried out in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. At the mandated reporter's request, the principal may assist in completing and filing the necessary forms.

The mandated reporter shall not be required to disclose his/her identity to the principal. (Penal Code 11166)

He/she may provide or mail a copy of the written report to the principal or Superintendent or designee without his/her signature or name.

Reporting the information to an employer, supervisor, principal, school counselor, co-worker, or other person shall not be a substitute for making a mandated report to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166)

Training

Training of mandated reporters shall include child abuse and neglect identification and mandated reporting. (Penal Code 11165.7)

Training shall also include guidance in the appropriate discipline of students, physical contact with students, and maintenance of ethical relationships with students to avoid actions that may be misinterpreted as child abuse. Whenever a representative of a government agency investigating suspected child abuse or neglect or the state Department of Social Services deems it necessary, a suspected victim may be interviewed during school hours, on school premises, concerning a report of suspected child abuse or neglect that occurred within the child's home or out-of-home care facility. The child shall be given the choice of being interviewed in private or in the presence of any adult school employee or volunteer aide selected by the child. (Penal Code 11174.3)

A staff member or volunteer aide selected by a child may decline to be present at the interview. If the selected person accepts, the principal or designee shall inform him/her of the following requirements: (Penal Code 11174.3)

a. The purpose of the selected person's presence at the interview is to lend support to the child and enable him/her to be as comfortable as possible.
b. The selected person shall not participate in the interview.
c. The selected person shall not discuss the facts or circumstances of the case with the child.
d. The selected person is subject to the confidentiality requirements of the Child Abuse and Neglect Reporting Act, a violation of which is punishable as specified in Penal Code 11167.5.

If a staff member agrees to be present, the interview shall be held at a time during school hours when it does not involve an expense to the school. (Penal Code 11174.3)

Release of Child to Peace Officer

When a child is released to a peace officer and taken into custody as a victim of suspected child abuse or neglect, the Superintendent or designee and/or principal shall not notify the parent/guardian, but rather shall provide the peace officer with the address and telephone number of the child's parent/guardian. It is the responsibility of the peace officer or agent to notify the parent/guardian of the situation. (Education Code 48906)

Peace officers shall be asked to sign an appropriate release or acceptance of responsibility form.

Parent/Guardian Complaints Regarding Suspected Child Abuse

Upon request, the Superintendent or designee shall provide parents/guardians with a copy of the district's administrative regulation that describes how to report suspected child abuse occurring at a school site to appropriate agencies. For parents/guardians whose primary language is other than English, such procedures shall be in their primary language and, when communicating orally regarding those procedures, an interpreter shall be provided.

To file a complaint against a district employee or other person suspected of child abuse or neglect at a school site, parents/guardians may file a report by telephone, in person, or in writing with any appropriate agency identified above under "Reporting Procedures." If a parent/guardian makes a complaint about an employee to any other employee, the employee receiving the information shall notify the parent/guardian of procedures for filing a complaint with the appropriate agency. The employee also is obligated pursuant to Penal Code 11166 to file a report himself/herself using the procedures described above for mandated reporters.

In addition, if the child is enrolled in special education, a separate complaint may be filed with the California Department of Education pursuant to 5 CCR 4650.

Notifications

The Superintendent or designee shall provide to all new employees who are mandated reporters a statement that informs them of their status as mandated reporters, of their reporting obligations under Penal Code 11166, and of their confidentiality rights under Penal Code 11167. The district shall also provide these new employees with a copy of Penal Code 11165.7, 11166, and 11167. (Penal Code 11165.7, 11166.5)

Before beginning employment, employees shall sign the statement indicating that they have knowledge of the reporting obligations under Penal Code 11166 and that they will comply with those provisions. The signed statements shall be retained by the Superintendent or designee. (Penal Code 11166.5)

Employees who work with dependent adults shall be notified of legal responsibilities and reporting procedures pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code 15630-15637.

The Superintendent or designee shall also notify all employees that:

1. A mandated reporter who reports a known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect shall not be held civilly or criminally liable for making a report and this immunity shall apply even if the mandated reporter acquired the knowledge or reasonable suspicion of child abuse or neglect outside of his/her professional capacity or outside the scope of his/her employment. Any other person making a report shall not incur civil or criminal liability unless it can be proven that he/she knowingly made a false report or made a report with reckless disregard of the truth or falsity of the report. (Penal Code 11172)

2. If a mandated reporter fails to report an incident of known or reasonably suspected child abuse or neglect, he/she may be guilty of a crime punishable by a fine and/or imprisonment. (Penal Code 11166)

3. No employee shall be subject to any sanction by the district for making a report. (Penal Code 11166)

AR 5141.4 (b)

4) Neglect of a child

(a) Severe neglect (situations where any person having care or custody of a child willfully causes or permits the child to be in a situation that the child's health is endangered.

(b) General neglect (negligent failure of a person having the care or custody of a child to provide adequate food, clothing, shelter, or supervision where no physical injury to the child has occurred).

c. "Reasonable suspicion" means that it is objectively reasonable for a person to entertain such a suspicion, based upon facts that could cause a reasonable person in a like position, drawing when appropriate on his/her training and experience, to suspect child abuse.

B. Procedures for Reporting Child Abuse

1. Suspected instances of child abuse are to be reported to the school nurse. He/she is the contact person at each school site. The nurse will assume responsibility for completing the Suspected Child Abuse Report (11166PC) form, secure the initials of the school principal on this form and contact the Santa Monica Police Department (458-8943) or Malibu Sheriff's Department (456-6652, ext. 235).

2. In the absence of the school nurse, the contact person at each site is the school principal.

3. The identity of all persons who report known or suspected child abuse is confidential as indicated in Penal Code Section 11167 subdivision (c).

Dear Board Members:

This memo is a follow up to SMMCTA's initial communication regarding the budget.

State Budget

Earlier this spring CTA implemented our Protect Proposition 98 strategy across California. Specifically, the campaign involved the following:

- 1. A media campaign to educate Californians about the impact that the proposed cuts to education would have on children and classrooms.
- 2. Intensive lobbying efforts aimed to secure the votes of eight Republicans.
- 3. A statewide president's Lobby Day in Sacramento.
- 4. Partnering with our allies in PTA, the Ed Coalition and labor organizations to pool financial resources and human capital in communicating a common message to law makers.
- 5. Intensive lobbying efforts by CTA leaders and the Office of the Governor.

Our efforts to protect Proposition 98 have proven to be successful, as evidenced by the recently released May Revise. Although the May Revise is not perfect, it's an improvement from the Governor's initial budget proposal. Most elected officials in Sacramento, including the Governor are willing to protect Proposition 98. Moreover, there is growing number of legislators willing to find additional revenues for k-14 funding.

There remains one final hurdle in the budget process, the final adoption of the 2009 state budget. This will be a complicated and intense political battle, which may not be resolved until later this summer. CTA and the Ed Coalition are committed to protecting k-14 funding. If history is any indicator, we will be successful.

Local Budget

Despite the ongoing challenges of the state budget and the planned declining enrollment, there is positive news about SMMUSD's budget.

Specifically, the current level of Unrestricted Reserves exceed \$18 million, well above the legally required 3%. There has been a steady increase of the Unrestricted Reserve levels during the past 4-5 years.

In addition, you have set aside revenues for Other Post Employment Obligations. As reported recently in the LA Times, most public agencies have not yet be able or willing to set aside funds for these obligations. Also noted in the recent article, California teachers do not earn Social Security benefits and the average teacher retirement benefit is well below other public employees, including, police and firefighters.

The Joint Use Agreement with the city of Santa Monica and the passage of Measure R, with no sunset clause and an annual inflationary factor, provides a guarantee of ongoing local revenues for our district. These revenues will continue to grow in the years ahead, regardless of the state economy. Please note that one of the goals of Measure "R" and used widely during the campaign, is to "attract and retain" qualified teachers. Unfortunately, some in the education

community fail to remember that a leading priority voters gave for supporting our Parcel Tax Measures is to provide teachers with better compensation. With a reserve level of more than \$18 million (\$3.5 required by law), we should be able to make continued and consistent progress to the Certificated Salary Schedule.

During the past several years the district has reduced the number of teachers by more than thirty and the 2008-09 budget further reduces the teaching staff by twenty-one. However, during the same time period, there have not been comparable reductions in the number of district level administrators. As the Board plans for the outer years,

SMMCTA strongly recommends a reduction in the number of district administrators.

The following are some issues to consider as you plan for the adoption of the 2008-09 budget and multi year planning:

- In the planning of district budgets, staff historically has underestimated revenues and over estimated expenditures.
- The trend is for the ending balance to be higher then estimated in the First or Second Interim Report.
- The May Revise protects Proposition 98 and there are proposals in the Capitol to identify new k-14 revenue streams.
- The current budget does not assume any teacher retirements. As of June 1st, (12) teachers have submitted their retirement documents. The final number will be between 15 and 20.
- The current budget for Ed Services increases from \$2.8 to \$3.2 million.
- The current budget projects an ending balance of more than \$10 million in 2009 and more than meets the 3% requirement in the 3 subsequent years.
- The current budget includes Indirect Costs in excess of 6% for 2009.
- The current budget includes a 2.2% increase to Step and Column costs. Historically, the actual cost is between 1% and 1.5%.

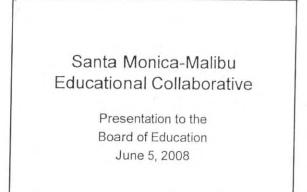
Conclusion

The Board should be applauded for your ability to build the Unrestricted Reserves; decreases the numbers of students on permits (24% to 14%) and provide all employees with salary increases. During the most recent past, we have been able to provide teachers with reasonable and responsible salary increases. The current economic climate, especially the rise in the cost of oil and food, is having a real impact on teachers and their families. It's essential for our teachers and their families that we do not lose ground on the progress we've made in recent years. Looking ahead, we will have some challenges, however, SMMCTA is confident that if we maintain our collaborative relationship, we will be able to provide our teachers with the compensation they deserve, protect programs and preserve the fiscal solvency of the district.

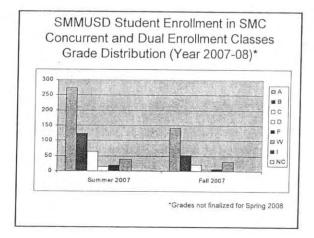


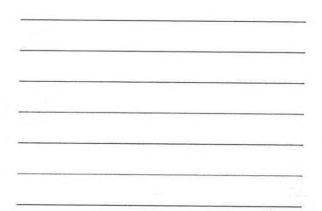












Presentation to the Board of Education by the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Financial Oversight Committee Paul J. Silvern, Chair June 5, 2008

Good evening Members of the Board of Education. On behalf of your Financial Oversight Committee (FOC), we welcome this opportunity to review the FOC's work during the past year and to offer our observations about certain District financial matters.

Introduction

The Financial Oversight Committee, now in its seventh year of operation, is a ninemember committee of professional and community members appointed by the Board to provide you and District management with advice and counsel on a variety of financial matters. According to the charge you gave us, our responsibilities include:

- Reviewing and commenting on the District's annual financial audit, the interim financial reports to the Los Angeles County Office of Education, the proposed annual budget and annual enrollment projections;
- Assisting in the development of a long-term financial plan for the District;
- Reviewing issues that could have a significant impact on District finances before the Board makes decisions about them, including proposed labor settlements;
- Serving as the Taxpayer Oversight Committee charged with reviewing the District's administration of and compliance with the terms of Measure S, the 2003 parcel tax approved by District voters in June 2003 (and, pending Board action, an equivalent new responsibility for the replacement Measure R);
- Monitoring and advising about the funding agreements between the District and the City
 of Santa Monica and the City of Malibu; and
- Assisting the District to educate the general public about school finance issues.

We believe that the District is on a relatively firm financial footing as it approaches the adoption of its budget for FY 2008-09, but there are, as usual, many significant financial challenges that the Board will need to confront. On the positive side, the District has received independent confirmation from municipal bond rating agencies that its general financial condition is improving. In October, the District received an upgraded rating for the Measure "BB" facilities bonds from Moodys Investors Service. Even more impressively, in April 2008, Standard & Poor's upgraded its rating on all District debt instruments by two notches, to AA from A+. In doing so, Standard & Poor's highlighted voter approval of Measure "R," the District's funding contract with the City of Santa Monica, growth in its unreserved fund balance, and the general strength of the Santa Monica, Malibu and general Los Angeles metro area economies.

On the other hand, the State's \$15 billion (and growing) budget deficit, and the protracted debate that is likely to occur this summer between the Governor and the Legislature about how to close the fiscal gap, raise significant concerns about the fate of funding for K-12 education in California. More specific to the District, the Los Angeles County Office of Education continues to raise concerns about the District's deficit financing practices, funding of labor settlements by drawing down reserves, the expiring term of the contract with the City of Santa Monica, and the budgetary impacts of the continuing decline in student enrollment.

Against that general backdrop, the topics we want to discuss with you tonight include the following:

- 1. A brief summary of FOC's activities during FY 2007-08;
- 2. Our report on audited Measure S expenditures during FY 2006-07, which is our final report on this subject due to the replacement of this parcel tax with Measure "R."
- 3. Comments about the proposed plan for use of revenues from the new Measure R parcel tax for FY 2008-09;
- 4. Comments on the current draft of the FY 2008-09 District budget; and
- 5. Recommendations on several specific District financial issues.

FOC's Activities During FY 2007-08

This year has been another busy one for the FOC, during which we accomplished the following:

- Participated in two series of interviews with candidates for the permanent CFO position, culminating in the selection of Jan Maez in September 2007;
- Met with the District's auditor to review the FY 2006-07 audit of District finances and Measure S expenditures;
- Reviewed the 1st and 2nd Interim Reports, the P-1 and P-2 enrollment counts, District staff projections of enrollment and Average Daily Attendance (ADA), and various proposed budget transfers;
- Reviewed, discussed and provided comments to the Board on a variety of other financial matters, including three labor settlements and their associated AB 1200 analyses; the Barber & Associates Report on the District's Special Education program; and the new DecisionInsite enrollment forecast.
- Monitored the implementation of the Measure "BB" facilities bond program, including participation of a subcommittee that advises the CFO and Program Manager on the overall financial strategy for the program; and

 Reviewed and discussed the initial draft of the District's FY 2008-09 budget, including plans for expenditures from Measure "R" revenues;

In addition, several of our members were actively involved in recommending a strategy to replace the two previous parcel taxes (Measures "S" and "Y") and the successful campaign for Measure "R."

The FOC's work this year benefited from a productive working relationship with the Superintendent, former Interim CFO Dr. Steve Hodgson, new CFO Jan Maez, the District's outstanding fiscal staff, and other senior District staff. Once again, we want to acknowledge Dawn Smithfield, in particular, who provides administrative support to the FOC and who continues to handle the parcel tax senior exemption program with unusual diligence and tact.

We were again very fortunate to have active participation in our meetings by our Board liaisons, Maria Leon-Vazquez and Kelly Pye, who provided valuable insights about Board policy. Other members of the Board also attended our monthly meetings from time to time. Although our meetings this year did not attract quite as many members of the public and press as last year, public knowledge about our work was enhanced by regular posting of our agendas and minutes on the Board's Web site.

Measure "S" Expenditures

The Quality Public Education Preservation Act of 2003, more commonly known as Measure "S," was the parcel tax approved by District voters in June 2003. Measure "S" imposed a \$225 tax on each parcel of land in Santa Monica and Malibu within the District's boundaries, with exemptions for qualifying seniors. The tax was rescinded in February 2008 as part of voter approval of Measure "R." As such, this is the FOC's final report on Measure "S."

With a total of about 32,400 property parcels in the District, and after deductions for the estimated number of senior exemptions and tax payment delinquencies, Measure "S" generated about \$6.5 million annually for the District. Under the terms of Measure "S" these funds were to be used to:

- Restore/replace programs cut due to State funding reductions;
- Sustain student achievement and fulfill the District's core curriculum, including music, arts and athletics; and
- Provide independent expenditure accountability.

The Board assigned the independent expenditure accountability role to the FOC. Each year we reviewed the proposed annual expenditure plan for the following year, and reviewed the actual, audited expenditures from the prior year, all in terms of their consistency with the Measure's purposes.

Inasmuch as Measure "S" has now been rescinded, our final review is limited to actual Measure "S" expenditures for last year (i.e., FY 2006-07). The District's auditor concluded that actual expenditures were consistent with the Board's adopted expenditure plan that was included in the FY 2006-07 budget, both as to dollar amounts and distribution by category. That spending plan included the allocations shown in Table 1.

Accurate tracking of these expenditures was made possible by assigning them the specific account code number 91221. There were no audit exceptions or recommendations from the auditor for changes to Measure "S" accounting procedures or practices. Thus, the Board and public can be assured that, once again, last year's expenditures were consistent with what the expenditure purposes that District voters approved in 2003. Proposed expenditures from Measure "S" for this year (i.e., FY 2007-08) were reviewed by FOC last June and included in the adopted budget.

Two issues with respect to administration of Measure "S" arose in FY 2007-08. First, the Board agreed to waive the parcel tax on those properties that sustained 50 percent or greater damage to property as a result of the winter fires in Malibu. The number of such cases was expected to be small. Second, a communication error between the District and the Los Angeles County Assessor's Office caused some seniors who were eligible for the Measure "S" exemption to be incorrectly charged for the parcel tax. The District promptly made refunds to property owners as warranted. Again, the number of parcels involved was very small.

Table 2 provides an historical overview of actual Measure "S" expenditures since the FOC has been reviewing them. It shows that since FY 2004-05, Measure "S" provided a total of about \$19.8 million to support District classroom programs (not including unaudited expenditures in FY 2007-08), including class-size reduction, music and the arts, physical education and the library program. This enabled the District to provide the kinds of high-quality programming that District voters expect, but for which there is insufficient State funding.

Proposed Measure "R" Expenditures for FY 2008-09

In anticipation of Board action to assign the FOC with independent oversight responsibilities under Measure "R," the FOC also reviewed the District staff's plan for expenditures of those revenues next year.

Measure "R" is a replacement parcel tax for the previous Measure "Y" and Measure "S" parcel taxes, which were rescinded with the adoption of Measure "R." The Measure "R" tax amount is \$346 per parcel this year. Like the previous Measure "Y" (but not Measure "S"), it will be adjusted in future years for inflation by the change in the local Consumer Price Index. Like Measure "S" (but not Measure "Y"), it provides an exemption for qualifying seniors, but has no sunset date.

Revenues from Measure "R" are to be used for the following purposes:

- To preserve programs and replace funds lost or reduced due to inadequate state funding;
- To sustain achievement in reading, writing, and mathematics for all students at all grade levels and to fulfill the District's core curriculum which includes music, arts, and athletics;
- To attract and retain. highly qualified teachers; and
- To protect the taxpayers' investment in education and ensure District accountability by providing for special citizen financial oversight and independent annual audits of revenues and expenditures.

Measure "R" also requires that funds be deposited into a separate account, that a "citizen financial oversight committee" review District administration of and compliance with Measure "R," provides for public review of the expenditure plan, and requires an annual audit of expenditures.

The proposed Measure "R" expenditure plan for FY 2008-09 totals \$10.3 million and is shown on the following page. It funds 71.3 FTE teacher positions at all grade levels, and provides \$1.1 million for the Art & Music Program, about \$580,000 for the Physical Education Program, \$1.3 million for the Library Program, about \$1.0 million for technology expenditures, and \$66,000 for administrative costs, including the annual audit. This expenditure plan was reviewed by the FOC at its regular meeting on June 3, 2008. The plan is very similar to the expenditure priorities applied to Measure "S" revenues, but also adds expenditures for technology management. This appropriately supports the technology capital investment being made through he Measure "BB" bond program. The FOC concludes that the expenditure plan is consistent with the stated purposes of Measure "R," and recommends that the Board approve it.

Proposed FY 2008-09 District Budget

The general financial context for considering the District's FY 2008-09 budget is unusually uncertain. As noted above, the \$15 billion State deficit, and the budget debate that will take place this summer, forces all California school districts to plan for next year without a complete understanding about State revenues and program requirements. Although the Governor's May Revision of the proposed State budget retracted some of the more draconian cuts that were initially proposed in January, guidance from the Los Angeles County Office of education is to expect no growth in Revenue Limit funding and zero Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) funding for next year, assume reductions in some categorical program revenues, to shy away from using some of the cost reduction options discussed in the May Revision because they are simply poor financial practice (e.g., reducing the Reserve for Economic Uncertainty and the Routine Restricted Maintenance set-aside), and to be very cautious about assuming any COLAs for the next couple of years. Whether the Legislature will accept the Governor's latest proposals, including the State lottery securitization strategy that is central to the financing plan, or move in the direction recommended by the Legislative Analyst's Office which is more favorable to K-12 education funding, or pursue some completely different approach, is all very much in question. It will undoubtedly be a long, hot summer of budget negotiations in Sacramento.

Nevertheless, the District must adopt its budget by the end of this month. The FOC's ability to provide comment to the Board on the proposed budget is aided by the excellent work of Ms. Maez and the fiscal staff, who work diligently to keep up with ever-changing circumstance in Sacramento, and the fact that the Board continued its recent practice of discussing the draft budget at several Board meetings and special workshops. This is a significant improvement in the budget preparation process.

The FOC applauds the District staff's continuing effort to analyze staffing ratios and the Board's support for making the staffing reductions that are needed to correspond with the continued decline in student enrollment, most of which is related to Board policy to limit out-of-District permits. And, in light of the negative revenue impacts from declining enrollment and State funding uncertainty, we also support the Board's decision to add additional student permits for next year.

We remain very concerned, however, about the projected scale and growth of the operating deficit in the Unrestricted General Fund, which is the District's primary operating account. The three-year projection shows a deficit of about -\$2.6 million next fiscal year and a cumulative total deficit over the three-year projection period of -\$4.7 million. This is at odds with the Board's very first adopted budgeting principle, which is to maintain balance between current and future year income and expenditures so as to ensure the long-term financial integrity of the District. The Los Angeles County Office of Education has routinely cautioned the District about the need to reduce its projected operating deficit. As we noted in our report last year, new research by School Services of California shows that persistent deficit spending may be a better indicator of future fiscal difficulty than an inability to meet the minimum three percent reserve benchmark. We urge the staff and Board to continue searching for ways to reduce costs, increase revenues, or both, including the identified, but not fully quantified "budgetary solution strategies" list initiated last year.

The deficit is, in part, a result of generous labor settlements approved this year with all three of the District's bargaining units, but without any commensurate reductions in expenditures or identification of new on-going revenues. Instead, the operating deficit is financed by drawing down reserves. While the proposed budget indicates that the District will be able to fund the minimum required three percent reserve for economic uncertainties throughout the projection period, there will be steady erosion of the unallocated fund balance at a rate that is between \$2 million and \$3 million each year. In addition to being poor financial practice, this trend threatens to undermine one of the key reasons that Standard & Poor's upgraded its rating on District debt instruments.

Further, it should also be remembered that the proposed District budget is a best case scenario. It assumes, for example, <u>no</u> additional cost increases resulting from future labor negotiations with any of the District's bargaining units over the next three years, and assumes renewal of the City-District contract, which is far from a certainty for many reasons. The Board will need to be vigilant about maintaining District reserves, controlling costs and aggressively searching for new revenues in order for the District to remain financially sound.

Although we are mindful of the time pressure that staff faces each year in preparing the budget, we want to reiterate several suggestions about the budget process that have not yet been acted on:

- Budget to Meet Specific District Objectives. We continue to recommend that the budget be
 presented in the context of the educational and management objectives and priorities for the
 coming year. We believe that doing so will assist the Board to better align expenditure
 decisions with its planning objectives, and provide more clarity to the public.
- Show Information on All Funds. We continue to recommend that the budget presentation include a summary of all District funds, and not just the Unrestricted General Fund. While the General Fund, including both its unrestricted and restricted funds is clearly the most significant component of the total budget, we believe the Board and public should see a more complete picture of the District's total budget.
- Improve Public Communication. Finally, we once again recommend that the budget presentation make better use of graphics to help explain the proposed District budget. School district finance in California is particularly complicated and difficult for the average citizen to grasp. Although the school- and program-based budgets have been useful, the agenda reports to the Board do not explain the budget structure as clearly as it could. We should be using every opportunity to educate voters and the public in general about the condition of District finances.

Specific Recommendations for Future Action

In our joint meeting with the Board last year, we made six specific recommendations for your consideration. We are pleased to report that progress has been made on four of them:

 Redouble Efforts to Identify and Select a Highly Qualified CFO. We urged the District to continue its search for a highly-qualified CFO, a search made more difficult by the controversy surrounding Mr. Braham's resignation. Some of our members participated in

two rounds of selection interviews and we were pleased with the selection of Jan Maez last September. The FOC has had a very good working relationship with Jan in the intervening months.

- Reconcile Conflicting Enrollment Forecasts. Because the short-term enrollment projection prepared for the District by FCMAT in 2007 was at serious odds with the more optimistic projection prepared for the draft Facilities Master Plan, and because the District's financial and facilities strategies depend heavily on an accurate picture of future enrollment changes, we urged more careful attention to this matter. The District commissioned a new enrollment forecast from DecisionInsite, which confirmed FCMAT's concerns about continuing future enrollment declines. Although we have some reservations about certain aspects of this new forecast, we believe it provides a better basis for District financial and program planning.
- Initiate a Financial Evaluation of the Special Education Strategy. We have consistently recommended that the District initiate a complete evaluation of the plan that was put in place a few years ago to slow the rate of increase in the costs of Special Education. The recently completed B arber & Associates Report sheds important new light on the historical pattern of program revenue and costs and that will assist the District to achieve a better balance between service delivery and the cost of services.
- Minimum Analysis Required for Future Labor Negotiations. We recommended that, at minimum, the Board require staff or other experts to prepare multi-year financial projections for a range of settlement scenarios using either the AB1200 process and/or FCMAT's Budget Explorer software to project financial impacts before reaching a tentative agreement. Although the FOC is not privy to exactly what information is provided to District negotiators and union representatives, Jan Maez reports to us that multi-year scenarios are being considered.

On the other hand, not much progress was made on the other two FOC recommendations:

- Plan to Eliminate the Operating Deficit Within Five Years. We recommended that the Board set this objective and fashion its budget strategy around it. Instead, the District continues to spend more than it receives in revenue, and balances its books by drawing down reserves. This is an unsustainable practice and should be ended in a planned manner.
- Strengthen the "Accountability" Provisions in the City-District Agreement. Finally, we
 recommended that the "accountability" provision in the Master Facilities Use Agreement
 between the City and the District should be strengthened. No progress was made on this
 issue. In light of events during this school year, movement on this issue will be essential
 to win renewal of the City-District contract.

For FY 2008-09, the FOC proposes to focus on the following two issues, in addition to the other responsibilities assigned by the Board:

- Explore an Appropriate FOC Role in District Financial Condition Evaluation Prior to the Commencement of Labor Negotiations. Salaries and benefits now account for 91 percent of the Unrestricted General Fund. Thus, settlements with the bargaining units are among the most sign i ficant financial decisions the Board makes each year. Yet the FOC plays no role in this process until after settlements have been reached. As FOC Vice Chair Cynthia Torres has observed, this is financial "hindsight," not "oversight." The FOC believes there is a constructive role it can play in developing neutral analytic information that will assist the parties in their deliberations without interfering with the Board's responsibilities or the rules that govern the collective bargaining process. We propose that the Board, District staff and FOC consult with experts in the field to identify options for constructive roles that the FOC can play to inform the front end of this process.
- Assist in the Development of a Financial Management Plan for Special Education. As noted above, the Barber & Associates Report shed important new light on the costs and revenues associated with the District's Special Education program. Consistent with the direction articulated by Superintendent Talarico in mid-March, the FOC proposes to play a constructive role in helping to develop a financial management plan for Special Education. This may involve, for example, working with District staff and any outside consultant retained by the District to develop a work plan and schedule for this task so that it is coordinated with the development of the program plan, developing quarterly program revenue and expenditure reporting that can serve as both a useful information and management tool, and continuing to clarifying the overall picture of Special Education revenues and costs.

Ad Hoc Policy Review Committee June 2, 2008; 4:30 PM Minutes

The committee determined to expand the committee to include other schools and other grade levels, union representation, and members of the Health and Safety DAC.

The committee revised the purpose of the committee to be the following:

The purpose of the Ad Hoc Policy Review Committee is to examine current board policies, administrative regulations and safeguards that discuss staff responsibilities and accountability pertaining to the protection of students from child abuse or sexual misconduct by staff, and to provide feedback for staff as staff brings those revised or newly created policies to the Board of Education for review and approval.

The Committee examined the proposed Board Policy 5141.4, "Child Abuse Prevention and Reporting." The following suggestions were made:

- The Governing Board recognizes the district's responsibility to educate <u>administrators, staff and</u> students about the dangers of child abuse so that they will acquire the skills and techniques needed to identify unsafe situations and to react appropriately and promptly. <u>The Governing Board also recognizes the district's responsibility to provide and maintain a safe physical environment that will minimize unsafe situations for children.</u>
- The district's instructional program shall include age-appropriate and culturally and linguistically sensitive child abuse prevention curriculum. <u>Students who are</u> new to the District will receive an orientation which will include this curriculum.
- <u>The Superintendent shall annually inform the public that the training for all</u> <u>mandated reporters has been provided</u>. In the event that training is not provided to mandated reporters, the Superintendent shall report to the California Department of Education <u>and the public</u> the reasons that such training has not been provided.

The Committee also examined the proposed Administrative Regulation 5141.4, "Child Abuse Prevention and Reporting." The following suggestions were made:

• Employees reporting child abuse or neglect to an appropriate agency are required to notify the principal <u>or designee</u> as soon as possible after the initial telephone report to the appropriate agency.

• The principal shall complete a confidential incident report form. The written report of the child abuse shall be attached to the report and submitted to the Superintendent's office. Incident Report Forms must be safeguarded by keeping a separate school and District file for the retention of those records. Access to these confidential records is restricted to individuals who have a legitimate need for such access. The records much be kept for five years from the school year in which the incident occurred.

The meeting adjourned at 6:30 PM. The next meeting will be on Thursday, June 12 at 4:30 PM in the District Office.
