Los Angeles County Arts Commission

Dr. Chou introduced Sofia Klatzker, Senior Advocacy and Research Manager for the Los Angeles Arts Commission. Ms. Klatzker thanked the board, on behalf of Arts for All and the LA County Arts Commission, for its recognition and support of the arts. She said that as an Arts for All district, SMMUSD is a partner in a dynamic, county-wide collaboration working to create vibrant classrooms. schools, communities, and economies through the restoration of all arts discipline in to the core curriculum for each of the county's 1.6 million public K-12 students. Arts for All stresses the collaboration of general education teachers, art specialists, and professional artists. The National Endowment for the Arts, the Jewish Community Foundation of Los Angeles, The Sheri and Les Biller Family Foundation, and the LA County Arts Commission also share in the Arts for All vision and generously make this grant possible to SMMUSD. Arts for All districts are eligible for competitive matching grants, and SMMUSD's Visual and Performing Arts Coordinator, Tom Whaley, designed a program to support the district's partnership with Contra Tiempo to provide ten session artist residencies for all fourth-grade classrooms. Students will explore salsa's history, technique,

and music to build community in their classrooms, and the program will serve 560 students, 16 teachers, and is possible because the Santa Monica-Malibu Education Foundation's matching commitment of \$20,000 to provide dance residency in the schools. Ms. Klatzer commended SMMUSD for maintaining its commitment to artist residencies that deepen students' learning through the arts. She said the Arts Commission, as part of Arts for All, looks forward to continuing working with SMMUSD to support quality arts education.

Mr. Snell presented Ms. Klatzker with a certificate and expressed the district's appreciation for the Arts for All grant. On a related note, Mr. Allen commented on the student artwork decorating the board room walls. Mr. Cuneo replied that the work belonged to students of Samohi art teacher Dave Jones.

A. Student Board Member Reports (15)

Tanya Choo – Santa Monica High School

Student Board Member Choo reported that the UCLA/ASB blood drive was held last Friday. It was successful and well-organized; so many donors signed up that some were deferred to the December Red Cross Blood Drive. The School Site Council meeting was held this past Tuesday. They announced new Co-Chairs: Maria Silvestri and Richard McKinnon. The council discussed upcoming allocations for the equity fund monies. The Supper Serenade was successful and brought together Choir members, the community, parents, and board members. The college fair was held last Tuesday, and 165 colleges participated. Malibu students also attended the fair at Samohi. Ms. Choo thanked the city council, PTSA, and civic auditorium for working together to provide students the opportunity to learn more about these colleges. The AIDS

Walk occurred this past Sunday. Three teams, consisting of fifty students, participated.

Homecoming activities are in full swing. This week is Spirit Week, and tomorrow is the Hollywood-themed pep rally. The Homecoming Game against Beverly Hills will be at SMC at 7:00pm. The Homecoming Queen will be crowned during half-time. The King will be crowned at the Homecoming Dance, which will be at the Women's Club on Saturday.

Boys water polo beat El Segundo, Cross Country will be competing in the *Mt.* Sac Invitational, and the Marching Band will be competing.

Mr. Snell asked how Bike It!/Walk It! Day went last week. Ms. Choo said it was successful; there was a quad rally and DJ at lunch and free brunch for all participants. Mr. Snell suggested keeping data on how many students participate each year.

Elizabeth Wilson – Malibu High School

Ms. Emma Lundin delivered Student Board Member Wilson's report. ASB reported a successful homecoming, with a tailgate party on Friday leading up to the football game. The football team lost, but there was a lot of fan support. ASB supported activities during Homecoming week, including a pie eating contest and bead hunt. On Friday there was a pep rally, which included performances by the dance team, cheer team, and drumline. The various sports teams performed skits.

The school has completed the magazine and cookie dough drive, and is now planning for a winter blood drive. Middle school and high school students are working together in campus beautification efforts. The seniors are excited that off-campus lunch passes will begin November 1.

Mr. Snell asked if parents participated in the tailgate party. *Ms.* Lundin said two parents came and helped cook the hamburgers. *Mr.* Allen asked about the new off-campus lunch process. *Ms.* Lundin said the biggest controversy was about liability. The school will be testing it out with the seniors.

Billy Foran – Olympic High School

Board President Snell wished Mr. Foran a happy birthday. Student Board Member Foran reported that the state's Model Continuation High School review team visited Olympic on Tuesday. Of the 525 continuation high schools in the state, only 56 are considered model schools. The site learned that it is being considered as a model school. Mr. Foran thanked Mr. Cuneo, Mr. Mechur, Mr. Allen, Mr. de la Torre, Dr. Chou, Ms. Freedman, Ms. Harris, and Ms. Gross for attending the visit.

Once a week, the school holds Sober Living, during which a panel of speakers talk to the students about their own experiences with drug and alcohol use. The goal is to have the students learn from the mistakes of others. The school's music program has started. The Guitar and Drum classes are packed with eager students. Mr. Foran thanked Linda Gross and the Education Foundation for their support of the music program. The students appreciate it very much. Two UCLA public health graduate students have developed a health-promoting, suicide prevention program and will be piloting a health class at Olympic. This program was covered in the Santa Monica Daily Press, the UCLA Daily Bruin, and and on Channel 13.

The K9 program summer school follow-up sessions were held this week. Students were matched up with dogs and spent three weeks training them to prepare for adoption. The experience also provided students the opportunity to hone their own career skills. Mr. Foran reported that the students and dogs both performed well. He also reported a new after school program provided by Sojourn Services and the OPCC. The program, TELA (Teen Education in Liberation Arts, aims to offer creative arts training and experience to teens, to teach quality and perspective, and to impart training in social liberation. Earlier today, the school held an earthquake drill. Every student followed instruction and waited outside the building patiently. Mr. Foran reported that the students were cooperative and the drill went smoothly.

B. SMMCTA Update – Mr. Harry Keiley (5)

Mr. Keiley reported that the union is circulating survey to its members about teacher evaluations, class sizes, collaboration time, etc. He recently asked a nurse how the year was going so far; he encouraged her to email him her feedback and comments. As Measure BB projects roll out, the union is looking forward to sitting down with senior staff to determine how construction is affecting the learning environment.

Mr. Michael Felix said was pleased to see student artwork on the walls. He shared what is going on at Samohi, saying that recent budget cuts have brought many of the teachers together. Last spring, some of the teachers discussed re-establishing a faculty committee to discuss issues concerning faculty. Mr. Keiley met with the group of teachers to explain how the committee could function most effectively. The group will have its first meeting with Dr. Pedroza on Monday after school.

Mr. Snell requested that the faculty committee return as a discussion item at a future board meeting. Dr. Escarce suggested Mr. Cuneo and Mr. Keiley meet to discuss the most effective way the board could learn more information about this.

C. S.E.I.U. Update – Ms. Keryl Cartee-McNeely (5)

Ms. Cartee-McNeely said SEIU is concerned about the reduction in nursing staff and how it impacts the union members and students. Ms. Cartee-McNeely and Dr. Young have started discussing a new possible classification called Health Clerk to help with the nurse workload. SEIU is concentrating on getting members and staff out for precinct walks for Props Y and YY.

D. PTA Council – Shari Davis (5)

Ms. Davis announced upcoming community walks for Props Y and YY: October 23, 24, 30, and 31, from 10:00am-3:00pm. There is also phone banking every day from 11:00am-8:30pm. Campaign literature is being sent out to voters. Ms. Davis said all this was possible due to the generous support from coalition members. Additionally, the city coalition members are helping out with the precinct walks. Police officers and firefighters are also getting out the word.

The PTA Council Special Ed committee had a terrific meeting last night. The board candidates came and spoke about issues related to Special Ed. On October 27, Special Ed committee's meeting for Spanish-language families will be held at Grant from 6:00-8:00pm. Child care will be provided. The PTA Council held its October meeting this Tuesday. The council discussed the proposed calendars for next year. Ms. Davis said the PTA Council voted unanimously to support calendar that begins Aug 23 and finishes June 8. The council believes this is the best option for secondary students, who have so many expectations and obligations to meet. The State of Our Schools event will be held on Monday in Santa Monica and Tuesday in Malibu. The PTA Council is involved with two communitywide efforts: the Santa Monica Youth Collaborative and the City of Santa Monica's Youth Violence Prevention Initiative. There will also be a PTA Council rep at the Middle School Initiative meeting on Saturday.

Mr. Allen asked about the PTA's resolution regarding the 2011-12 calendar. *Ms.* Moore Washington said SMMCTA will be surveying its membership about the 2011-12 calendar and providing staff with that feedback leading into negotiations. *Mr.* Allen encouraged public input regarding a possible change to the school calendar. *Dr.* Escarce suggested eliciting parent input via a survey. *Mr.* Mechur agreed with getting input about calendars, but stressed the importance of protecting the collective bargaining process regarding the adoption of a school year calendar. *Ms.* Pye thanked the PTA for its efforts for Props Y and YY. She encouraged volunteers to help on Election Day.

7:23 pm X. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT (5)

Superintendent Cuneo reported that today was the statewide Great Shakeout. Staff and students evacuated the district office and schools after ducking and covering at 10:21am to practice dealing with emergencies and crises. There will be another drill here at the district office next month to practice and improve the coordinated response efforts. The district is in the process of aligning its response efforts with federal standards, which will allow the district to apply for federal funds to purchase equipment for emergency situations.

City council members from Japan are here in Santa Monica visiting Will Rogers Learning Community. They are interested in our food program and Farmer's Market salad bar. While they enjoyed lunch, they watched our students dance, which was part of the Arts for All program. Also at Will Rogers will be an all-day Meth Festival on October 26 in the cafeteria.

Students from the Point Dume Learning Garden visited the Figueroa Street Elementary School to teach them how to put a learning garden on their campus. There was a celebration and gardening demonstration. The Measure BB construction design plans for Malibu High School are featured on the cover of American School Board Journal. The architectural firm is being recognized for its design and focus on "green" construction. Olympic High School has been recommended to be named a Modal Continuation High School. Mr. Cuneo directed the board to read the back of the Olympic News & Views, where they will read the jokes Student Board Member Foran delivers during improv performances. He said they are very humorous.

The Santa Monica Chamber of Commerce held their annual New Heroes Celebration on Tuesday. The district's new teachers were highlighted. The chamber also recognized the late Norm Lacy and his contributions to the students and district.

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.09

It is recommended that the Board of Education authorize the District to use the Federal GSA contract awarded to Simplex Grinnell, to purchases fire and security equipment and appropriate services specified under contract #GS-07-0396M as applicable to the District's Maintenance Department and Measure BB project requirements.

COMMENT: The GSA contract allows for both fire alarm, security, and emergency disaster equipment purchases and all services necessary to install the equipment from design to start-up, including maintenance and training at the lowest offered pricing. The contract period is from July 1, 2007, through June 30, 2012. By using the contract, it will allow District projects to be completed in as expeditious manner as possible, without having to publically bid the equipment and services for each individual project. Furthermore, by using the direct pricing structure in the contract, it eliminates going through a General Contractor who would mark-up the products and services, charging retail pricing instead of the Federal contract rates, thus saving the District considerable money.

> All orders using this contract must comply with GSAM Construction clauses, Davis-Bacon and Federal Acquisition Regulations (FAR).

The Los Angeles County Department of Ed allows Districts to "piggy back" off of the GSA contracts with no restrictions other than standard Public Works contracting requirements. GSA limits the contract to \$750,000 per project.

COMMENTS: The bidding opportunity for the Cabrillo Elementary School Safety project was advertised in the Malibu Surfside News and The Daily Breeze on 8/19 & 8/26; bid solicitations were emailed and fax blasted and published in The Bluebook of Construction. Direct invitations were solicited to multiple local and non-local contractors. Fourteen (14) contractors attended the mandatory job walks held on August 31st and September 2, 2010. Pre-Qualifications were received from ten (10) contractors of which six (6) were qualified to bid. Four (4) submitted bids, all four (4) were responsive as follows:

APW Construction	\$158,200
H.C. Olsen Construction	\$147,644
C&W Construction Specialties	\$139,632 (pending apparent low bidder conference)
South Bay Landscaping	\$95,725 (withdrawn)

A post bid interview was conducted with South Bay Landscaping to review their bid and the scope of the project. At that time they indicated that they had made a technical error in the preparation of their bid. The District has received a letter formally withdrawing their bid due to technical error.

A post bid interview was conducted with C&W Construction Specialties to review their bid and the scope of work of the project. The team is currently evaluating the bid submitted by C&W Construction Specialties to ensure that the project scope is as intended at the job walk and that all prevailing labor rates are being adhered to.

Notice to Proceed will be issued to the lowest responsive responsible bidder so the project schedule is not impacted.

RE: REINSTATE LIBRARY POSITIONS FOR 2010-11

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.23

At the October 7, 2010, board meeting, the Board of Education directed staff to bring this item back for action in order reinstate the following positions: 3 FTE library assistants, .5 FTE librarian using Education Jobs and Medicaid Assistance Act funds.

<u>COMMENTS</u>: As a result of the 2010-11 budget process, the board reduced all elementary library coordinators, 1 FTE librarian, and 3 classified library assistants. In August, the board was able to reinstate the elementary library coordinators as a result of Save Our Schools Campaign funding. Staffing of the elementary libraries was one of the three goals of the campaign. The chart below, which was included in the October 7 agenda, compares the library staffing levels at the district's schools for the 2009-10 and 2010-11 years.

During Discussion Item No. D.02 on October 7, board members requested that this item return for action in order to reinstate the 3 FTE librarian assistants and .5 FTE librarian at Santa Monica High School. The board suggested an additional .5 FTE librarian be approved as permissive in case a .5 FTE librarian could not be hired and a full-time equivalent was necessary to fill the need. The board directed staff to fund these reinstated positions using anticipated monies from the federal Education Jobs and Medicaid Assistance Act. The budget adjustment for salary and benefits would be \$180,000 for the three Library Assistants and \$95,000 for a 1.0 FTE Librarian for a total of \$275,000. Because these are one-time funds, staff does not recommend reinstating these positions.

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.24

In May 2000, the American Civil Liberties Union filed a lawsuit against the State of California claiming that the state had failed in its duty to provide students with equal educational opportunity. That lawsuit, known ad Williams v. State of California, was settled in August 2004. SMMUSD has engaged in several accountability measures in order to comply with the Williams lawsuit settlement. Among the measures is the requirement to inventory all Board of Education-adopted core materials, including: English, Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, Foreign Languages, Health, and laboratory science materials.

Assembly Bill 831, Chapter 118, Statutes of 2005, took effect July 25, 2005. AB 831 modified the annual public hearing requirement in Education Code (EC) Section 60119 and modified the expenditure requirements related to Williams instructional materials funds. Under EC Section 60119, the governing board of every local educational agency (LEA) that receives state instructional materials funds must hold an annual public hearing before the end of the eighth week from the first day pupils attend school for that year. At the public hearing, the governing board must make a determination as to whether each pupil in each school has sufficient textbooks or instructional materials, or both, that are aligned to the content standards and are consistent with the content and cycles of the curriculum framework adopted by the State Board of Education in reading/language arts, mathematics, science, and history-social science. In addition, the definition of sufficiency now provides that each pupil, including each English learner, must have a standards-aligned textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home.

Tonight we will hold the annual public hearing of sufficiency, present our resolution on the adequacy of materials for all students, which includes our compliance and non-compliance with legal guidelines, and propose remedies for our areas of non-compliance. We request that the Board of Education adopt the resolution on the adequacy of materials for all students in the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District.

Board of Education Meeting MINUTES: October 21, 2010

TO: BOARD OF EDUCATION

FROM: TIM CUNEO / CHIUNG-SALLY CHOU

RE: GUIDANCE AND COUNSELING SERVICES AT SANTA MONICA HIGH SCHOOL

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.01

The Superintendent has requested that a discussion be held with the Board of Education regarding the guidance and counseling program services offered at Santa Monica High School.

School staff and representatives will be present to answer board members' questions regarding the scope of the program services and responsibilities of the advisors, the college counselors, and the student outreach specialists. They will also discuss how overlapping of responsibilities reinforces the services provided to all students.

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Dr. Pedroza, Ms. Baxter, and Samohi's counseling and advising staff presented to the board. Their presentation can be found under Attachments at the end of these minutes.

Mr. Allen asked about graduation rates. *Dr.* Bradford said the official numbers have not yet been released. She said if a student leaves SMMUSD, but is not reported at another school, they are considered a drop-out. *Dr.* Pedroza said CAHSEE passage is also a factor. *Mr.* Allen asked if the district had the capability of tracking whether or not a student succeeds once in college. Ms. Baxter said there is not a systematic way for gathering that data. *Mr.* Allen asked about counseling special needs and gifted students. For special needs students, the counselors work closely with the teachers on IEPs and adapting the curriculum. Gifted students are directed toward SMC classes.

Dr. Escarce asked what could be done to increase the number of students applying to four-year universities. The counselors said they will be holding more workshops during weekends in addition to week nights. They are also actively seeking out and supporting those students who are eligible for applying to four-year universities. They also educate the families of students about the benefits of college.

Ms. Leon-Vazquez commented on how some seniors wait to apply to SMC, and then are unable to sign up for classes. The counselors said they encourage students to apply for SMC in January in case they decide to attend SMC rather than a four-year university.

Mr. Mechur asked how the counselors, college counselors, and advisors are divided among the houses. Dr. Pedroza explained the staffing matrix. Mr. Mechur asked how communication between teachers and counselors and students/parents could be improved. Dr. Pedroza said communication is improved by systematizing the outreach process.

Ms. Pye asked if there has been an increased need for crisis counseling during these difficult economic times. The counselors said there has been an increase for students and families. The PTSA and Alumni Association are also helping with donations to families. Ms. Pye asked about the approach for students who do not qualify for a university. The counselors said they focus on post-secondary options, including finding and building on career interests, such as digital arts, auto mechanics, etc.

Mr. Snell asked if the bullet points listed under Measurements for Success could be quantified. *Ms.* Baxter said they have much of that data. *Dr.* Pedroza added that the WASC accreditation process will also help to produce that data. *Mr.* Snell asked for the data to be broken out by gender and race/ethnicity. He asked the advisors if they have a way of identifying potential at-risk students and a plan to address their needs. *Dr.* Pedroza said as they assemble the master schedule, administration determines how to focus on tutorial students. The advisors work closely with these students and their families. They also collaborate with the middle schools to gain more insight into these students.

The board thanked the staff for its work and presentation.

RE: 2010 SUMMER PROGRAMS UPDATE

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.02

A number of innovative and intensive summer school programs for SMMUSD students were held from late June through August 2010.

This presentation will report on the programs offered, including the enrollment figures, results from students' pre- and post-assessments, grades received, and survey data.

2010 summer program data, follow-up data for prior years' summer programs, as well as reflections and considerations from summer program teachers and administrators, will provide the basis for discussion of the 2010 IISS program and implications for future development and improvement of summer programs for 2011.

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The presentation can be found under Attachments at the end of these minutes.

Mr. Snell asked how the summer school teachers are chosen. Dr. Bradford said, according to the union agreement, teachers submit a written application and there is a selection process.

Mr. Mechur asked about follow up for IISS students. Dr. Bradford said the summer school assessments are included in the student's file for the next year's teacher to review.

Dr. Escarce asked about staff's budgetary recommendations for IISS for next summer. *Dr.* Chou said senior staff has not yet discussed this, but would after the November 2 election.

Ms. Pye asked what made the Connect for Success parent night such a success. Ms. Serratore said the teachers called each of the parents to invite them and some of the parents were simply curious about visiting the Samohi campus for their children who would be in ninth grade in the fall.

Mr. Allen asked why Cohort 1 seemed to struggle more in the Young Collegians program. Ms. Serratore said it could have been due to a lack of communication between student and professor – the students may not have been aware of their grades until the end of the program.

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider revising board policy 9320 – Meetings and Notices in order to adjust the start time for Board of Education meetings.

COMMENTS: The current policy states that Board of Education meetings shall begin at 4:00pm. The board has requested that this be moved to 4:30pm. With this change, closed session would be from 4:30-6:00pm, and open session would start at 6:00pm (instead of 5:30pm).

The board agreed this item would come forward for approval under Consent at the next board meeting.

MEETINGS AND NOTICES

Meetings of the Board of Education are conducted for the purpose of accomplishing district business. In accordance with state open meeting laws (Brown Act), the Board shall hold its meetings in public and shall conduct closed sessions during such meetings only as authorized by law. To encourage community involvement in the schools, Board meetings shall provide opportunities for questions and comments by members of the public. All meetings shall be conducted in accordance with law and the Board's bylaws, policies, and administrative regulations.

A Board meeting exists whenever a majority of Board members gather at the same time and place to hear, discuss, or deliberate upon any item within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board or district. (Government Code 54952.2)

A majority of the Board shall not, outside of an authorized meeting, use a series of communications of any kind, directly or through intermediaries, to discuss, deliberate, or take action on any item that is within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board. However, an employee or district official may engage in separate conversations with Board members in order to answer questions or provide information regarding an item within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board, as long as that employee or district official does not communicate the comments or position of any Board members to other Board members. (Government Code 54952.2)

In order to help ensure participation in the meeting by disabled individuals, the Superintendent or designee shall provide appropriate disability-related accommodations or modifications upon request in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. (Government Code 54953.2, 54954.1)

Meeting notices and agendas shall specify that any individual who requires disability-related accommodations or modifications, including auxiliary aids and services, in order to participate in the Board meeting should contact the Superintendent or designee. (Government Code 54954.2) Each agenda shall also list the address(es) designated by the Superintendent or designee for public inspection of agenda documents that are distributed to the Board less than 72 hours before the meeting. (Government Code 54957.5)

Regular Meetings

The Board shall hold at least one regular meeting each month. Regular meetings shall be held at 4:00 p.m. 4:30 p.m. on the first and/or third Thursday of each month at the District Office, 1651 16th Street, Santa Monica, CA. Additionally, four or five regular Board meeting scheduled for the first Thursday of the month will be held in Malibu, for the purpose of uniting the communities. Actual dates and locations are to be determined yearly by members of the Board.

At least 72 hours prior to a regular meeting, the agenda shall be posted at one or more locations freely accessible to members of the public. (Government Code 54954.2)

Special Meetings

Special meetings of the Board may be called at any time by the presiding officer or a majority of the Board members. (Government Code 54956)

Written notice of special meetings shall be delivered personally or by any other means to all Board members and the local media who have requested such notice in writing. The notice shall be received at least 24 hours before the time of the meeting. The notice shall also be posted at least 24 hours before the meeting in a location freely accessible to the public. The notice shall specify the time and place of the meeting and the business to be transacted or discussed. No other business shall be considered at this meeting. (Education Code 35144; Government Code 54956)

Any Board member may waive the 24-hour written notice requirement prior to the time of the meeting by filing a written waiver of notice with the clerk or secretary of the Board or by being present at the meeting at the time it convenes. (Government Code 54956)

Every notice of a special meeting shall provide an opportunity for members of the public to directly address the Board concerning any item that has been described in the meeting notice, before or during the item's consideration. (Government Code <u>54954.3</u>)

Emergency Meetings

In the case of an emergency situation for which prompt action is necessary due to the disruption or threatened disruption of public facilities, the Board may hold an emergency meeting without complying with the 24-hour notice and/or 24-hour posting requirement for special meetings pursuant to Government Code <u>54956</u>. The Board shall comply with all other requirements for special meetings during an emergency meeting. (Government Code <u>54956.5</u>)

An emergency situation means either of the following: (Government Code 54956.5)

1. An emergency, which shall be defined as a work stoppage, crippling activity, or other activity that severely impairs public health and/or safety as determined by a majority of the members of the Board

2. A dire emergency, which shall be defined as a crippling disaster, mass destruction, terrorist activity, or threatened terrorist act that poses peril so immediate and significant that requiring the Board to provide one-hour notice before holding an emergency meeting may endanger the public health and/or safety as determined by a majority of the members of the Board

Except in the case of a dire emergency, the Board president or designee shall give notice of the emergency meeting by telephone at least one hour before the meeting to the local media that have requested notice of special meetings. All telephone numbers provided by the media in the most recent request for notification must be exhausted. If telephone services are not functioning, the notice requirement of one hour is waived and, as soon after the meeting as possible, the Board shall notify those media representatives of the meeting and shall describe the purpose of the meeting and any action taken by the Board. In the case of a dire emergency, the Board president or designee shall give such notice at or near the time he/she notifies the other members of the Board about the meeting. (Government Code <u>54956.5</u>)

The minutes of the meeting, a list of persons the Board president or designee notified or attempted to notify, a copy of the roll call vote, and any actions taken at the meeting shall be posted for at least 10 days in a public place as soon after the meeting as possible. (Government Code <u>54956.5</u>)

Adjourned/Continued Meetings

A majority vote by the Board may adjourn/continue any regular or special meeting to a later time and place that shall be specified in the order of adjournment. Less than a quorum of the Board may adjourn such a meeting. If no Board members are present, the secretary or the clerk may declare the meeting adjourned to a later time and shall give notice in the same manner required for special meetings. (Government Code <u>54955</u>)

Within 24 hours after the time of adjournment, a copy of the order or notice of adjournment/continuance shall be conspicuously posted on or near the door of the place where the meeting was held. (Government Code <u>54955</u>)

Study Sessions, Retreats, Public Forums, and Discussion Meetings

The Board may occasionally convene a study session or public forum to study an issue in more detail or to receive information from staff or feedback from members of the public.

The Board may also convene a retreat or discussion meeting to discuss Board roles and relationships.

Public notice shall be given in accordance with law when a quorum of the Board is attending a study session, retreat, public forum, or discussion meeting. All such meetings shall comply with the Brown Act and shall be held in open session and within district boundaries. Action items shall not be included on the agenda for these meetings.

Other Gatherings

Attendance by a majority of Board members at any of the following events is not subject to the Brown Act provided that a majority of the Board members do not discuss specific district business among themselves other than as part of the scheduled program: (Government Code 54952.2)

1. A conference or similar public gathering open to the public that involves a discussion of issues of general interest to the public or to school board members

2. An open, publicized meeting organized by a person or organization other than the district to address a topic of local community concern

3. An open and noticed meeting of another body of the district

4. An open and noticed meeting of a legislative body of another local agency

5. A purely social or ceremonial occasion

6. An open and noticed meeting of a standing committee of the Board, provided that the Board members who are not members of the standing committee attend only as observers Individual contacts or conversations between a Board member and any other person are not subject to the Brown Act. (Government Code <u>54952.2</u>)

Location of Meetings

Meetings shall not be held in a facility that prohibits the admittance of any person on the basis of ancestry or any characteristic listed in Government Code <u>11135</u>, including, but not limited to, religion, sex, or sexual orientation. In addition, meetings shall not be held in a facility which is inaccessible to disabled persons or where members of the public must make a payment or purchase in order to be admitted. (Government Code <u>54961</u>)

Meetings shall be held within district boundaries, except to do any of the following: (Government Code <u>54954</u>)

1. Comply with state or federal law or court order or attend a judicial or administrative proceeding to which the district is a party

2. Inspect real or personal property which cannot conveniently be brought into the district, provided that the topic of the meeting is limited to items directly related to the property

3. Participate in meetings or discussions of multiagency significance, provided these meetings are held within one of the other agencies' boundaries, with all participating agencies giving the notice required by law

4. Meet in the closest meeting facility if the district has no meeting facility within its boundaries or if it's principal office is located outside the district

5. Meet with elected or appointed state or federal officials when a local meeting would be impractical, solely to discuss legislative or regulatory issues affecting the district over which the state or federal officials have jurisdiction

6. Meet in or near a facility owned by the district but located outside the district, provided the meeting agenda is limited to items directly related to that facility

7. Visit the office of the district's legal counsel for a closed session on pending litigation, when doing so would reduce legal fees or costs

8. Attend conferences on nonadversarial collective bargaining techniques

9. Interview residents of another district regarding the Board's potential employment of an applicant for Superintendent of the district

10. Interview a potential employee from another district

Meetings exempted from the boundary requirements, as specified in items #1-10 above, shall still be subject to the notice and open meeting requirements for regular and special meetings when a quorum of the Board attends the meeting.

If a fire, flood, earthquake, or other emergency renders the regular meeting place unsafe, meetings shall be held for the duration of the emergency at a place designated by the Board president or designee, who shall so inform all news media who have requested notice of special meetings by the most rapid available means of communication. (Government Code <u>54954</u>) Teleconferencing

A teleconference is a meeting of the Board in which Board members are in different locations, connected by electronic means through audio and/or video. (Government Code <u>54953</u>) The Board may use teleconferences for all purposes in connection with any meeting within the Board's subject matter jurisdiction. All votes taken during a teleconference meeting shall be by roll call. (Government Code <u>54953</u>)

During the teleconference, at least a quorum of the members of the Board shall participate from locations within district boundaries. (Government Code 54953)

Agendas shall be posted at all teleconference locations and shall list all teleconference locations whenever they are posted elsewhere. Additional teleconference locations may be provided to the public. (Government Code <u>54953</u>)

All teleconference locations shall be accessible to the public. All teleconferenced meetings shall be conducted in a manner that protects the statutory and constitutional rights of the parties or

the public appearing before the Board, including the right of the public to address the Board directly at each teleconference location. (Government Code <u>54953</u>)

All Board policies, administrative regulations, and bylaws shall apply equally to meetings that are teleconferenced. The Superintendent or designee shall facilitate public participation in the meeting at each teleconference location.


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
Jump Start Teacher Survey and Reflections

- 75% of teachers reported that the current scheduling (just after school is out) is effective
- 25% reported that midway through summer would be more effective
- 0% reported that just before school begins would be more effective






- 100% responded that class size was about right

Credit Recovery Teacher Survey and Reflections

- Class Size (ranged from 8 to 31)
 - 27% reported class sizes too large
 - 9% reported class sizes too small
 - 64% reported class sizes about right
 - 82% reported class size is very important
 - 18% reported it is somewhat important

"These are students who did not do well in the large classes during the year. Most of these students need to work on skills and that is difficult when you have 26-30 students in a class."

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Credit Recovery Teacher Survey and Reflections

- Schedule Changes
 - 64% reported new schedule was very effective for most students
 - 27% reported it was mostly effective for most students
 - 9% reported it was not very effective for most students
- "Although the day was longer I think the shortened schedule was a benefit not only to the students but the teachers as well. I definitely felt more rested and recharged every Tuesday."
- "I think it gave the students a nice three day break and I believe there were less absences due to this schedule."
