October 2, 2014

A regular meeting of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education was held on Thursday, October 2, 2014, in the District Administrative Offices: 1651 16th Street, Santa Monica, CA. The Board of Education called the meeting to order at 4:35 p.m. in the Board Conference Room at the District Offices. At 4:36 p.m., the Board of Education moved to Closed Session regarding the items listed below. The public meeting reconvened at 5:47 p.m. in the Board Room. National Hispanic/Latino Heritage Month Celebration (postponed from 9/18/14) Dr. Edeburn explained that during National Hispanic/Latino Heritage Month, we celebrate the sharing of stories, histories, cultures, and contributions of those who have come from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean, and Central and South America. For this year's celebration, Dr. Deloria presented Mr. Jaime Cruz, who shared his personal story growing up in the Pico neighborhood. His parents came to the U.S. from a small village called Oaxaca, similar to many immigrants who left the area due to economic distress and found a hub in the Pico neighborhood. Social changes had occurred in the U.S. during the 1960s, and court cases had been decided preceding Brown vs. The Board of Education. Mr. Cruz attended schools in Santa Monica, enrolled at SMC, and then transferred to UCLA. He was affected by social unrest in Santa Monica in 1998, but overcame the odds and became a professor at SMC and CSUN. Mr. Cruz remarked that his story is a reflection of many others' stories. He found inspiration at SMC, where he was introduced to mentors who shared a similar life story to his own, as well as similar histories in literature. He stressed the importance of people's histories and a communal approach to impacting the lives of youth.

Student Board Member Mokhtari reported that the panoramic senior class photo was taken on Wednesday in the Greek Theatre. Seniors have been selling seniors sweaters and T-shirts to help promote class spirit and raise funds for their class. ASB held a rally on Monday in the Science Quad. The rally included a hula hoop competition among

the houses. ASB is currently celling Homecoming tickets. In honor of National Hispanic/Latino Heritage Month, the morning announcements include trivia questions and facts about the month. Students who answer the questions correctly participate in a raffle. ASB held a UCLA blood drive on September 23 in the South Gym. There was an amazing turnout. Students will be voting for Homecoming King and Queen during lunch on October 3 in front of Barnum Hall. The Homecoming rally will be on October 6, during which the Homecoming Court will be announced and there will be activities for students. Spirit Week begins next week; the daily themes are: Jersey Monday, Twin Tuesday, Workout Wednesday, Throwback Thursday, and Blue & Gold Friday. The Homecoming football game will be on October 10 at 7pm at SMC. Leading up to the game, there will be pre-game food trucks and henna face painting. The Homecoming dance will be on October 11 at 6:30pm in the Greek Theatre. Bike It!/Walk It! Day will be on October 8. Students who bike, walk, or bus it to school will receive a free Diddy Reese cookie during lunch. Football is playing Pomona today, girls' tennis had a varsity match against Palisades High School yesterday, and boys' water polo had a game Tuesday. Ms. Mokhtari reported that students remember hearing about a magnetic door system last year and wondered if that had been put into place. Staff confirmed that it had.

Student Board Member Joseph updated the board on the change to the start time for school, which is now 9:15am, to help ensure students are receiving a full night of sleep. There is still an 8:30am class to accommodate students who arrive early. Mr. Suminksi's Career Exploration class had a quest welder visit to show the students how to use the welding machine that was donated by Kathy Ito of the Morris Architectural Firm. Mr. Suminski is hosting a Hispanic Heritage Month potluck tomorrow. The campus will be participating in Bike It!/Walk It! Day. Ms. Liaw is collaborating with the Virginia Ave. Park Project on a playwriting class from October 6-17. A student teacher from CSUN has been and will continue to observe Ms. Liaw's English class. The Broad Stage donated tickets to see The Magic Flute on October 8. The Principal of Del Mar High School and a School Board Member and the Superintendent of San Gabriel Unified School District visited the campus on Monday to observe the programs. Dr. Shini Somara, an engineer with a doctorate in computational fluid dynamics from London's Brunel University, spoke with female students on Wednesday regarding STEM.

Ms. Braff reported that teachers have asked for storage options during the summer. She also reported about the warm classrooms during the most recent heat wave. Regarding class sizes, Ms. Braff was pleased to see that elementary school class sizes were down. Malibu Middle and High School have only a few classes over. Lincoln Middle School and John Adams Middle School have more classes over the ratio, specifically in science classes at JAMS. At Santa Monica High School, science and math classes tend to be over the ratio. Ms. Braff thanked the district for the excellent professional development occurring throughout the district.

D. PTA Council - Ms. Rochelle Fanali (5)

Ms. Fanali reported that the SMC Board of Trustees and SMMUSD Board of Education candidates participated in a forum last night, which was sponsored by the League of Women Voters and PTA Council. It will air on City TV. Earlier this week, the council held its annual retreat, during which they heard from Board Member Mechur regarding Professional Learning Communities (PLCs), from Dr. Deloria regarding Measure ES technology, and from Board Member Lieberman regarding the districtwide approach for PCB management as well as an update regarding the Malibu split unification process. Ms. Fanali appreciated Ms. Lieberman's comments that while the unification process is being understood, everyone is working together as a district. Ms. Fanali said she was committed to this respectful approach throughout the PTA. The parent engagement surveys are still coming in; the response rate has been overwhelming.

IX. SENIOR STAFF REPORTS (25 minutes)

A. Asst. Supt., Educational Services – Dr. Terry Deloria (5)

Dr. Deloria reported that the superintendent and Educational Services staff attended the state's Second Annual STEM Conference. Sessions addressed how to include English learners, students with disabilities, and even preschoolers in STEM curriculum. Staff would like to bring some of these things forward next school year. At the next board meeting, staff will be presenting information on Response to Instruction and Intervention (RTI²), specifically literacy coaches and professional development.

B. Assoc. Supt., Business & Fiscal Services/CFO – Ms. Janece Maez (5)

Ms. Maez reported that sixty employees from the custodial staff will be attending professional development to learn more about green cleaning products, BMP training, etc. All new five-hour custodial positions have been selected and will be on board once they have been cleared by Human Resources. Leadership has developed work schedules that will assist staff at each site to complete BMP cleaning. As part of the EPA plan, HEPA cleaners will replace older models. As of yesterday, four-man crews have started cleaning the school sites. The crews will begin at Samohi, and the custodial supervisors will work with principals to determine the primary projects that need to be addressed. Ms. Maez reported that a lawsuit has been filed against the district regarding the Malibu athletic field lights. The case will be heard before the court on October 17. Ms. Maez explained the details of the process. The same group that filed the suit appealed the Coastal Commission's decision about lighting issues. The district has provided a lighting plan to the City of Malibu that meets the lighting code requirements. Ms. Maez explained the next steps in the process.

C. Asst. Supt., Human Resources – Ms. Debra Moore Washington (5)

Ms. Washington reported that HR provided a BTSA induction support training last week. She also reported that this is the third year the district has offered training for substitute teachers. The Admin Assembly for new and aspiring administrators is continuing. The Health Fairs in Santa Monica and Malibu were well received. Open enrollment closes on October 10.

Dr. Kelly reported that he and the superintendent attended a Samohi PTSA meeting at which a representative from the Big Blue Bus explained how the routes could change as they integrate with the EXPO Line. Parents and community members were able to ask questions and receive information, and Big Blue Bus said it will continue to work on and tweak proposals. The Student Services Department will continue to serve as liaison to the Big Blue Bus. Mr. Allen asked Big Blue Bus could make a presentation to board. Dr. Kelly said that, given the responses they have had to the surveys, Big Blue Bus is still making changes to the proposed route changes, so a presentation now would be premature.

Public Comments is the time when members of the audience may address the Board of Education on items not scheduled on the meeting's agenda (the following rules apply to both

general public comments as well as comments about a specific agenda item). The Brown Act (Government Code) states that Board members may not engage in discussion of issues raised during Public Comments, except to ask clarifying questions, make a brief announcement, make a brief report on his or her own activities, or to refer the matter to staff. Individual members of the public who submit a public speaking card prior to the Board hearing an agenda item or general public comments shall be allowed three (3) minutes to address the Board on each agenda or nonagenda item, depending on the number of speakers. If there are ten or more speakers on an agenda or nonagenda item, the Board shall limit the allowed time to two (2) minutes per speaker. Individual speakers who submit a public speaking card after the Board begins to hear an agenda item or general public comments shall be allowed one (1) minute to address the Board. A public speaker may yield his/her time to another speaker, but must be present when his/her name is called. The donor would then give up his/her opportunity to speak. The public speaker who receives the donated minutes shall speak for no more than four (4) minutes maximum. The president may take a poll of speakers for or against a particular issue and may ask that additional persons speak only if they have something new to add. Individuals represented by a common point of view may be asked to select one individual to speak for the group. The president may, at his/her discretion, allow five (5) minutes for those who are serving as a spokesperson for a group or organization. The Board may limit the total time for public input on each item to thirty (30) minutes. If the number of persons wishing to address the Board of Education exceeds the time limit, additional time will be provided in Section XVI. CONTINUATION OF PUBLIC COMMENTS.

RE: COLLEGE AND CAREER READINESS: ACCESS TO AP PROGRAMS

STUDY SESSION ITEM NO. S.01

As a part of our efforts to ensure college and career readiness for all students, SMMUSD is investigating a number of new approaches to increase enrollment and success in Advanced Placement courses for under-represented students.

This discussion item will explore the AP potential reports provided by the College Board. These reports help to identify students, based on their performance of the PSAT, that may be successful in particular AP courses.

In addition, the AP/IB Equity and Excellence Project will be discussed. This project is a collaborative effort between the Equal Opportunity Schools (EOS) and SMMUSD and is supported by the Google Global Impact Awards and Harvard Ed Labs. EOS addresses the disproportionality of students of color and economically disadvantaged students who enroll in honors and AP coursework. The EOS project will provide SMMUSD staff with specific strategies to identify and support under-represented youth in rigorous and challenging academic coursework.

Drs. Bradford and Edeburn's presentation can be found under Attachments at the end of these minutes.

Ms. Mokhtari asked if students had access to AP Potential endorsements. Dr. Bradford replied that the data is on the state's website and advisors use it during counseling session with each student. Dr. Escarce wondered if the state offered professional development for advisors/counselors regarding methods for using these reports during student conferences. Dr. Deloria explained that the College Board has been providing training for administrators. counselors, advisors, and teachers for counseling students about enrolling in rigorous courses. Dr. Escarce wondered if AP Psychology could serve as a highly engaging class that could encourage more students, including minority students, to take AP science classes. Ms. Mokhtari shared that one roadblock to taking the AP Psychology class is that it is an elective, and many seniors do not have room in their schedules. He asked about an AP class for computer science. Mr. Mechur requested a list of all AP courses that exist and which MHS and Samohi offer. Dr. Bradford shared with Mr. de la Torre strategies that will be shared with high school staff to engage minority students in AP courses. Dr. Deloria added that one of the LCAP goals is to address the disproportionality of minority students enrolled in rigorous courses. Ms. Leon-Vazquez wondered how students could use social media to share information about AP course opportunities.

DEFINITION

Under the direction of the Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services, the Director of Educational Technology is responsible for guiding and overseeing the district's educational technology program. Primary functions will be to develop, direct, and oversee the district's educational technology program, to integrate technology into the PreK-12 curriculum and teaching practices, to develop and recommend technology strategies to enhance student learning and to develop, monitor and evaluate professional development related to technology. Additional duties as assigned.

DISTINGUISHING CHARACTERISTICS

This position classification requires technical expertise and knowledge in all areas of educational technology, as well as general knowledge of all aspects of a school district operation. Directly-related experience in current technology trends is necessary to assure success in this complex leadership role. Incumbent must be exemplary in use of technology for both the classroom and the workplace. Decisions are made by the incumbent that have a critical impact on the goals, organization and educational programs and services of the district. Frequently meets with a broad range of management, certificated and classified staff, board members, students and community members to influence, motivate and monitor the objectives of the district and the operation of the Educational Services Department. An earned doctorate from an accredited institution is desirable, but not required.

EXAMPLES OF DUTIES

- Direct, manage, and evaluate the operations related to the district's technology plan/vision;
- Provide and implement recommendations for the integration of educational technology into the curriculum;
- Direct and oversee the allocation of educational technology funds to ensure appropriate resources and technology are available and are effectively utilized in support of the district's educational technology plan requirements, and recommend future proposals relating to technological advances;
- Participate in the development and implementation of policies, procedures and programs regarding educational technology systems;

- Participate in the development of specifications and the negotiation, administration, and evaluation of contracts for equipment and services;
- Meet with vendor representatives to evaluate products and services and to negotiate the timely and cost-effective delivery of hardware, software, and contract services;
- Make presentations to the Board of Education, special committees, district representatives, and vendors regarding identified needs, proposed solutions, business strategies, and project status;

- Maintain current knowledge of contemporary educational technology in support of district applications;
- Train and evaluate the performance of assigned staff;
- Assist in the formulation and development of policies, procedures and programs;
- Advise the Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services of unusual trends or problems and recommend appropriate corrective action;
- Analyze and review budgetary and financial data, and control and authorize expenditures in accordance with established limitations;
- Communicate with other administrators, personnel and outside organizations to coordinate activities and programs, resolve issues and conflicts, and exchange information;
- Develop policies and procedures to encourage effective and efficient management controls;
- Perform related duties as assigned.

CONSIDER ADOPTING BP AND AR 0460 - LOCAL CONTROL

ACCOUNTABILITY PLAN

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.02

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider adopting BP and AR 0460 – Local Control Accountability Plan.

COMMENTS: CSBA recommends this new policy to reflect the requirements of new law (AB 97 and SB 97, 2013) related to the development of a three-year local control and accountability plan (LCAP) by July 1, 2014, and an update of the LCAP on or before July 1 of each subsequent year. The policy addresses the importance of comprehensive planning, optional local priorities to add to the state priorities specified in law, requirements for consultation with specified groups on plan development, board adoption of the LCAP, submission of the approved LCAP to

the county superintendent, the board's role in monitoring district progress, and circumstances under which the district may receive technical assistance or intervention to improve student outcomes.

The new administrative regulation reflects the requirements of new law (AB 97 and SB 97, 2013) regarding the contents of the LCAP and the annual update to the LCAP, consistency with existing collective bargaining agreements, and posting of the LCAP on the district's web site.

This item will return for action at the next board meeting.

LOCAL CONTROL AND ACCOUNTABILITY PLAN

The Governing Board desires to ensure the most effective use of available state funding to improve outcomes for all students. A community-based, comprehensive, data-driven planning process shall be used to identify annual goals and specific actions aligned with state and local priorities and to facilitate continuous improvement of district practices.

The Board shall adopt a districtwide local control and accountability plan (LCAP), using the template provided by the State Board of Education, which addresses the state priorities specified in Education Code 52060. The LCAP shall be effective for three years and shall be updated on or before July 1 of each year. (Education Code 52060)

In addition, the LCAP shall address any local priorities adopted by the Board.

The LCAP shall focus on improving outcomes for all students, particularly those who are "unduplicated students" and other underperforming students.

<u>Unduplicated students include students who are eligible for free or reduced-price meals, English learners, and foster youth and are counted only once for purposes of the local control funding formula. (Education Code 42238.02)</u>

To minimize duplication of effort and provide clear direction for program implementation, the LCAP and other district and school plans shall be aligned to the extent possible.

The Superintendent or designee shall review the single plan for student achievement (SPSA) submitted by each district school pursuant to Education Code 64001 to ensure that the specific actions included in the LCAP or the annual update are consistent with strategies included in the SPSA. (Education Code 52062)

Any complaint that the district has not complied with legal requirements pertaining to the LCAP may be filed pursuant to AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures. (Education Code 52075)

Plan Development

The Superintendent or designee shall gather data and information needed for effective and meaningful plan development and present it to the Board and community. Such data and information shall include, but not be limited to, data regarding the numbers of students in various student subgroups, disaggregated data on student achievement levels, and information about current programs and expenditures.

The Board shall consult with teachers, principals, administrators, other school personnel, employee bargaining units, parents/guardians, and students in developing the LCAP. (Education Code 52060)

Public Review and Input

The Board shall establish the following committee(s) to review and comment on the LCAP: (Education Code 52063)

 A parent advisory committee including at least one parent/guardian of unduplicated students as defined above 2. An English learner parent advisory committee whenever district enrollment includes at least 15 percent English learners and at least 50 students who are English learners

The Superintendent or designee shall present the LCAP or the annual update to the committee(s) before it is submitted to the Board for adoption, and shall respond in writing to comments received from the committee(s). (Education Code 52062)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify members of the public of the opportunity to submit written comments regarding the specific actions and expenditures proposed to be included in the LCAP or the annual update to the LCAP. The notification shall be provided using the most efficient method of notification possible, which may not necessarily include producing printed notices or sending notices by mail. All written notifications related to the LCAP or the annual update shall be provided in the primary language of parents/guardians when required by Education Code 48985. (Education Code 52062)

The Board shall hold at least one public hearing to solicit the recommendations and comments of members of the public regarding the specific actions and expenditures proposed to be included in the LCAP or the annual update. The public hearing shall be held at the same meeting as the public hearing required prior to the adoption of the district budget in accordance with Education Code 42127 and AR 3100 - Budget. (Education Code 42127, 52062)

Adoption of the Plan

Prior to adopting the district budget, but at the same public meeting, the Board shall adopt the LCAP or the annual update. This meeting shall be held after the public hearing described above, but not on the same day as the hearing. (Education Code 52062)

The Board may adopt revisions to the LCAP at any time during the period in which the plan is in effect, provided the Board follows the process to adopt the LCAP pursuant to Education Code 52062 and the revisions are adopted in a public meeting. (Education Code 52062)

<u>Submission of Plan to County Superintendent of Schools</u>

Not later than five days after adoption of the LCAP or the annual update to the LCAP, the Board shall file the LCAP or the annual update with the County Superintendent of Schools. (Education Code 52070)

If the County Superintendent sends, by August 15, a written request for clarification of the contents of the LCAP or the annual update, the Board shall respond in writing within 15 days of the request. If the County Superintendent then submits recommendations for amendments to the LCAP within 15 days of receiving the Board's response, the Board shall consider those recommendations in a public meeting within 15 days of receiving the recommendations. (Education Code 52070)

Monitoring Progress

The Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board, at least annually in accordance with the timeline and indicators established by him/her and the Board, regarding the district's progress toward attaining each goal identified in the LCAP. Evaluation data shall be used to recommend any necessary revisions to the LCAP.

Technical Assistance/Intervention

When it is in the best interest of the district, the Board may submit a request to the County Superintendent for technical assistance, including, but not limited to: (Education Code 52071)

- Assistance in the identification of district strengths and weaknesses in regard to state priorities and review of effective, evidence-based programs that apply to the district's goals
- 2. Assistance from an academic expert, team of academic experts, or another district in the county in identifying and implementing effective programs to improve the outcomes for student subgroups
- 3. Advice and assistance from the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence established pursuant to Education Code 52074

In the event that the County Superintendent requires the district to receive technical assistance pursuant to Education Code 52071, the Board shall review all recommendations received from the County Superintendent or other advisor and shall consider revisions to the LCAP as appropriate in accordance with the process specified in Education Code 52062.

If the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI) identifies the district as needing intervention pursuant to Education Code 52072, the district shall cooperate with any action taken by the SPI or any academic advisor appointed by the SPI, which may include one or more of the following:

- Revision of the district's LCAP
- Revision of the district's budget in accordance with changes in the LCAP
- 3. A determination to stay or rescind any district action that would prevent the district from improving outcomes for all student subgroups, provided that action is not required by a collective bargaining agreement

LOCAL CONTROL AND ACCOUNTABILITY PLAN

Content of the Plan

The district's local control and accountability plan (LCAP) shall include, for the district and each district school: (Education Code 52060)

- 1. A description of the annual goals established for all students and for each numerically significant subgroup as defined in Education Code 52052, including ethnic subgroups, socioeconomically disadvantaged students, English learners, students with disabilities, and foster youth. The LCAP shall identify goals for each of the following state priorities:
 - a. The degree to which district teachers are appropriately assigned in accordance with Education Code 44258.9 and fully credentialed in the subject areas and for the students they are teaching; every district student has sufficient access to standards-aligned instructional materials as determined pursuant to Education Code 60119; and school facilities are maintained in good repair as specified in Education Code 17002
 - b. Implementation of the academic content and performance standards adopted by the State Board of Education (SBE), including how the programs and services will enable English learners to access the Common Core State Standards and the English language development standards for purposes of gaining academic content knowledge and English language proficiency
 - c. Parent/guardian involvement, including efforts the district makes to seek

 parent/guardian input in district and school site decision making and how the
 district will promote parent/guardian participation in programs for unduplicated
 students, as defined in Education Code 42238.02 and Board policy
 - d. Student achievement, as measured by all of the following as applicable:
 - (1) Statewide assessments of student achievement
 - (2) Academic Performance Index
 - (3) The percentage of students who have successfully completed courses that satisfy the requirements for entrance to the University of California and the California State University, or career technical education sequences or programs of study that satisfy specified requirements and align with SBE-approved career technical education standards and frameworks, including, but not limited to, those described in Education Code 52302, 52372.5, or 54692
 - (4) The percentage of English learners who make progress toward English proficiency as measured by the SBE-certified assessment of English proficiency
 - (5) The English learner reclassification rate
 - (6) The percentage of students who have passed an advanced placement examination with a score of 3 or higher

- (7) The percentage of students who participate in and demonstrate college preparedness in the Early Assessment Program pursuant to Education Code 99300-99301
- e. Student engagement, as measured by school attendance rates, chronic absenteeism rates, middle school dropout rates, high school dropout rates, and high school graduation rates, as applicable
- f. School climate, as measured by student suspension and expulsion rates and other local measures, including surveys of students, parents/guardians, and teachers on the sense of safety and school connectedness, as applicable
- g. The extent to which students have access to and are enrolled in a broad course of study that includes all of the subject areas described in Education Code 51210 and 51220, as applicable, including the programs and services developed and provided to unduplicated students and students with disabilities, and the programs and services that are provided to benefit these students as a result of supplemental and concentration grant funding pursuant to Education Code 42238.02 and 42238.03
- h. Student outcomes, if available, in the subject areas described in Education Code 51210 and 51220, as applicable
- 2. Any goals identified for any local priorities established by the Board.
- 3. A description of the specific actions the district will take during each year of the LCAP to achieve the identified goals, including the enumeration of any specific actions necessary for that year to correct any deficiencies in regard to the state and local priorities specified in items #1-2 above. Such actions shall not supersede provisions of existing collective bargaining agreements within the district.

For purposes of the descriptions required by items #1-3 above, the Board may consider qualitative information, including, but not limited to, findings that result from any school quality reviews conducted pursuant to Education Code 52052 or any other reviews. (Education Code 52060)

For any local priorities addressed in the LCAP, the Board and Superintendent or designee shall identify the method for measuring the district's progress toward achieving those goals. (Education Code 52060)

To the extent practicable, data reported in the LCAP shall be reported in a manner consistent with how information is reported on a school accountability report card. (Education Code 52060)

Annual Updates

On or before July 1 of each year, the LCAP shall be updated using the template developed by the SBE and shall include all of the following: (Education Code 52061)

- A review of any changes in the applicability of the goals described in the existing LCAP pursuant to the section "Content of the Plan" above
- 2. A review of the progress toward the goals included in the existing LCAP, an assessment of the effectiveness of the specific actions described in the existing LCAP toward

- achieving the goals, and a description of changes to the specific actions the district will make as a result of the review and assessment
- 3. A listing and description of the expenditures for the fiscal year implementing the specific actions included in the LCAP and the changes to the specific actions made as a result of the reviews and assessment required by items #1-2 above
- 4. A listing and description of expenditures for the fiscal year that will serve unduplicated students and students redesignated as fluent English proficient

Availability of the Plan

The Superintendent or designee shall post the LCAP and any updates or revisions to the LCAP on the district's web site. (Education Code 52065)

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider revising BP 6176 and deleting AR 6176 – Weekend/Saturday Classes.

COMMENTS: CSBA recommends this update to reflect new law (AB 97), which redirects

funding that could be used for Saturday programs, including supplemental instruction programs and intensive reading and algebra programs funded through the Pupil Retention Block Grant, into the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF). The policy also adds material regarding the assignment of teachers to weekend

classes and provision of meals during Saturday session.

The regulation has been deleted and contents moved to policy.

This item will return for action at the next board meeting.

Instruction BP 6176

WEEKEND/SATURDAY CLASSES

Pursuant to Education Code 44824, a teacher cannot be assigned to work on a Saturday or Sunday if he/she objects in writing that the assignment would conflict with his/her religious beliefs or practices. In addition, Education Code 44824 provides that full-time teachers employed by the district prior to the implementation of weekend classes cannot be required to teach for more than 180 full days during a school year or for more than the number of full days that district schools were maintained during the year preceding implementation of weekend classes, whichever is greater. See AR 4113 - Assignment.

The Governing Board desires to increase educational opportunities outside the regular school week in order to meet student needs and promote academic achievement. When staffing, facilities, and other resources are available, the Board may approve the provision of classes on Saturday and/or Sunday that support and are integrated with other learning opportunities.

The Board of Education may provide classes on Saturday and/or Sunday in order to meet the academic needs of students.

Any class offered on a Saturday or Sunday pursuant to Education Code 37223, except in regional occupational centers or programs (ROC/Ps), shall be offered Monday through Friday during the regular school week. (Education Code 37223)

Weekend classes may include but are not limited to: (Education Code 37223)

- 1. Continuation classes (Education Code 37233)
- 2. Special day classes for mentally gifted minors (Education Code 37233)
- 3. Makeup classes for unexcused absences occurring during the week (Education Code 37233)
- 4. The programs of a regional occupational center or regional occupational program (ROP/C) (Education Code 37233)
- 5. Supplemental instruction for students who need additional assistance to meet academic standards or requirements
- 6. Enrichment classes in core academic subjects

Saturday classes also may be used to provide supplemental instruction for students who are failing to meet academic requirements and/or students who desire enrichment in core academic subjects in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulation. (Education Code 37252, 37252.2, 37252.8, 37253, 41505-41506)

Except in ROC/Ps, weekend attendance shall not result in crediting any student with more than five days of attendance per week. (Education Code 37223)

Attendance at weekend classes offered pursuant to Education Code 37223 shall be voluntary, except that truants, as defined in Education Code 48260, may be required to attend classes on one day of a weekend in order to make up lost instructional time. (Education Code 37223)

A student shall be excused from a weekend class if such attendance would be in conflict with his/her religious beliefs. Such students shall be given priority for enrollment in any other available supplemental instruction offered at a time other than during the weekend.

<u>Unless the requirement is waived by the California Department of Education, the district shall provide at least one nutritionally adequate meal during the weekend session in accordance with Education Code 49550.</u>

Any class offered on a Saturday or Sunday pursuant to Education Code <u>37223</u>, except in regional occupational centers or programs, shall be one offered Monday through Friday during the regular school week. (Education Code <u>37223</u>)

Except in regional occupational centers or programs, weekend attendance shall not result in crediting any student with more than five days of attendance per week. (Education Code 37223) Attendance at weekend classes offered pursuant to Education Code 37223 shall be voluntary, except that truants, as defined in Education Code 48260, may be required to attend makeup classes on one day of a weekend in order to make up lost instructional time. (Education Code 37223)

A student shall be excused from a weekend class if it is held on a day when such attendance would be in conflict with his/her religious beliefs. (Education Code 37252-37253, 48205)

RE: CONSIDER REVISING BP 6179 AND DELETING AR 6179 – SUPPLEMENTAL

INSTRUCTION

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.04

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider revising BP 6179 and deleting AR 6179 – Supplemental Instruction.

COMMENTS: This is a mandated policy update from CSBA to reflect new law (AB 97), which redirects funding for supplemental instruction programs into the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF). The policy also clarifies which programs are still required by law and which are discretionary, and reflects new law (AB 484), which establishes a new state assessment system, thereby affecting the criteria

that may be used to determine student eligibility for supplemental instruction based on lack of sufficient progress toward passing the high school exit exam.

The regulation has been deleted, since funding for supplemental instruction programs was redirected into the LCFF pursuant to new law (AB 97). Some concepts have been moved from the AR to the BP.

This item will return for action at the next board meeting.

Instruction BP 6179

SUPPLEMENTAL INSTRUCTION

The Board of Education recognizes that high-quality supplemental instructional programs can motivate and support students to attain grade-level academic standards, overcome academic deficiencies, and/or acquire critical skills. The district shall offer programs of direct, systematic, and intensive supplemental instruction to meet student needs.

Supplemental instruction may be offered outside the regular school day, including during the summer, before school, after school, on Saturday, and/or during intersessions. It may also be provided during the regular school day provided it does not supplant the student's instruction in the core curriculum areas or physical education.

Required Supplemental Programs

<u>Supplemental instruction shall be offered to:</u> The district shall offer direct, systematic, and intensive supplemental instruction for:

- Eligible students from low-income families whenever the district or a district school receiving federal Title I funds has been identified by the California Department of Education for program improvement for two or more consecutive years (20 USC 6316)
- 2.1. Students in grades 2-9 who have been retained or recommended for retention at their current grade level or are at risk of retention pursuant to (Education Code 48070.5) (Education Code 37252.2)
- 2. Students in grades 7-12 who do not demonstrate "sufficient progress" toward passing the state exit examination required for high school graduation in order to help them pass the exam (Education Code 37252, 60851)

For purposes of determining students' eligibility for supplemental instruction, "sufficient progress" toward passing the high school exit examination shall be determined by students' grades and other indicators of academic achievement designated by the Board including performance on district and State assessments and the California Standards Test.

In addition, sStudents who do not possess sufficient English language skills to be assessed shall be considered students who do not demonstrate sufficient progress towards passing the exit exam and shall receive supplemental instruction designed to help them succeed on the exit exam. (Education Code 37252)

The curriculum of the supplemental instructional program shall reflect state academic content standards to the extent that the district curriculum is aligned with those state standards, and shall be designed to assist students to succeed on the exit exam. (Education Code 60851)

 Students who have not passed one or both parts of the exit exam by the end of grade 12, for up to two consecutive school years after the completion of grade 12 or until they have passed both parts of the exit exam, whichever comes first (Education Code 37254) 4. Eligible students from low-income families whenever the district or a district school receiving federal Title I funds has been identified by the California Department of Education for program improvement for two or more years (20 USC 6316)

Optional Supplemental Programs

In addition, contingent on the district budget and local control and accountability plan (LCAP), supplemental instruction may be offered to students who:

- Based on state assessment results, grades, or other indicators, demonstrate academic deficiencies in core curriculum areas that may jeopardize their attainment of academic standards
- 2. Students who have not passed one or both parts of the exit exam by the end of grade 12
- Are in targeted student groups identified in the district's LCAP as needing increased or improved services to succeed in the educational program
- 4. Desire enrichment in core academic areas, visual and performing arts, physical education, or other subjects as approved by the Board

As appropriate, supplemental instruction may be provided through a classroom setting, individual or small group instruction, technology-based instruction, and/or an arrangement with a community or other external service provider.

As funding, facilities, and staffing permit, supplemental instruction may be offered to:

- 1. Students in grades 2-6 who have been identified as being "at risk" of retention pursuant to Education Code 48070.5 (Education Code 37252.8)
- 2. Students in grades 2-6 who have been identified as having a deficiency in mathematics, reading, or written expression based on the results of the Standardized Testing and Reporting Program (Education Code 37252.8)
- Students in grades K-12 who seek enrichment in mathematics, science, or other core academic areas designated by the Superintendent of Public Instruction (Education Code 37253)
- 4. Students in grades K-4 who need or desire intensive reading opportunities that meet standards for a research-based comprehensive reading program, including appropriate support to address the needs of English language learners (Education Code 41505-41508)
- 5. Students in grades 7-8 who need or desire intensive opportunities to practice skills in algebra and/or pre-algebra (Education Code 41505-41508)

Required Student Participation

The Superintendent or designee may require participation in a supplemental instructional program for: (Education Code 37252.2, 37254.1)

 Students in grades 7-12 who demonstrate insufficient progress toward the exit exam required for high school graduation pursuant to Education Code 37252

- Students in grades 2-9 who are retained or recommended for retention pursuant to Education Code 37252.2
- Students in grades 2-6 who are "at risk" of retention pursuant to Education Code 37252.8
- Students in grades 2-6 who are deficient in mathematics, reading, or written expression pursuant to Education Code 37252.8
- Students in grades K-12 participating in enrichment programs in core academic subjects pursuant to Education Code 37253

When determined to be necessary by the principal or designee, a student may be required to participate in a supplemental instruction. The Superintendent or designee shall obtain written parent/guardian consent for a student's participation in the supplemental instructional program.

SUPPLEMENTAL INSTRUCTION

Supplemental instructional programs shall be offered outside the regular school day. Such programs may be offered during the summer, before school, after school, on Saturday, and/or during intersessions. (Education Code 37252, 37252.2, 37252.8, 37253)

Priority for enrollment in supplemental instruction offered at a time other than Saturday shall be given to any student whose parent/guardian has informed the Superintendent or designee that the student is unable to attend a Saturday school program for religious reasons. (Education Code 37252, 37252.2, 37252.8, 37253)

Supplemental Instruction Based on Retention or Academic Deficiencies

Students in grades 2-9 who have been retained or recommended for retention shall be eligible for supplemental instruction under the following circumstances: (Education Code 37252.2)

- 1. For the purposes of this program, a student shall be considered to be enrolled in a grade immediately upon completion of the preceding grade.
- 2. Students who were enrolled in grade 6 or 9 during the prior school year shall be eligible for summer school instruction.

To the extent that the district provides supplemental instruction to students in grades 2-6 who are identified as being at risk of retention or as having deficiencies in mathematics, reading, or written expression, those students also shall be subject to the provisions set forth in items #1 and #2 above. (Education Code 37252.8)

The Superintendent or designee shall seek the active involvement of parents/guardians and classroom teachers in the development and implementation of supplemental instructional programs. (Education Code 37252.2, 37252.8)

An intensive remedial program in reading or written expression shall, as needed, include instruction in phonemic awareness, systematic explicit phonics and decoding, word attack skills, spelling and vocabulary, explicit instruction of reading comprehension, writing, and study skills. (Education Code 37252.2, 37252.8)

Supplemental Instruction Based on Progress Toward Passing Exit Examination

Students in grades 7-12 who do not demonstrate "sufficient progress," as defined in Board policy, toward passing the state exit exam required for high school graduation shall be eligible for supplemental instruction under the following circumstances: (Education Code 37252)

- 1. For purposes of this program, a student shall be considered to be enrolled in a grade immediately upon completion of the preceding grade.
- Students who were enrolled in grade 12 during the prior school year may be eligible for supplemental instructional programs.

The curriculum of the supplemental instruction program shall reflect state academic content standards to the extent that the district curriculum is aligned with those state standards, and shall be designed to assist students to succeed on the exit exam. (Education Code 60851)

Supplemental Instruction Based on Failure to Pass Exit Exam by End of Grade 12

Intensive instruction and services designed to help students pass the high school exit exam after they have failed to pass one or both parts of the exam by the end of grade 12 shall be provided as follows: (Education Code 37254)

- Each eligible student shall receive an appropriate diagnostic assessment to identify his/her areas of need.
- Each student shall receive intensive instruction and services based on the results of the diagnostic assessment and his/her prior results on the exit exam.
- 3. The intensive instruction and services shall be based on strategies that are most likely to result in the student passing the part(s) of the exit exam that he/she has not yet passed and may include, but not be limited to:
 - a. Individual or small group instruction
 - b. The hiring of additional teachers
 - c. Purchasing, scoring, and reviewing diagnostic assessments
 - d. Counseling
 - e. Designing instruction to meet specific needs of eligible students
 - f. Appropriate teacher training to meet the needs of eligible students
 - g. Instruction in English language arts and/or mathematics that eligible students need in order to pass those parts of the exit exam not yet passed, including employing different intensive instruction and services aligned to the needs and circumstances of students who have not passed one or both parts of the exit exam by the end of grade 12 compared to other district students in grade 12 with similar needs
 - h. Instruction and services by a public or nonpublic entity as determined by the Superintendent or designee
- 4. English language learners shall have the opportunity to receive intensive instruction and services as described in item #2 above that also shall include services to improve English proficiency as needed to pass one or both parts of the exit exam not passed by the end of grade 12.

The intensive instruction and services may be provided during the regular school day provided that they do not supplant the student's instruction in the core curriculum areas defined in Education Code 60603 or physical education. Eligible students may receive intensive instruction and services on Saturdays, evenings, or at a time and location deemed appropriate by the Superintendent or designee in order to meet the needs of these students. (Education Code 37254)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify, in writing, all students who have not passed one or both parts of the exit exam by the end of grade 12, or the parents/guardians of such students if under age 18, of the availability of intensive instruction and services each term for the next two consecutive school years. Eligible students also shall be notified of their right to file a complaint

regarding the intensive instruction and services in accordance with Education Code 35186 (Williams Uniform Complaint Procedures).

The notice shall include the name and phone number of a contact person designated by the Superintendent or designee who can assist students who have questions, concerns, or complaints regarding the availability of the additional instruction.

The notification shall be sent to the last known address before the end of each school term in sufficient time for eligible students to register for or avail themselves of those services. The notice shall also be posted in the school office, district office, and on the district's Internet web site, if any. (Education Code 37254)

RE: CONSIDER REVISING BP AND AR 6184 – CONTINUATION EDUCATION

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.05

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider revising BP and AR 6184 – Continuation Education.

COMMENTS: The mandated policy reflects new law (AB 570, 2013), which mandates that the district adopt policy with specified provisions if it allows students to voluntarily enroll in continuation education and new law (AB 97, 2013), which eliminates the Pupil Retention Block Grant. The policy also adds material on alignment of the program with goals in the LCAP, student enrollment in a regional occupational center/program in lieu of continuation education, and program evaluation.

The mandated regulation updates sections on "Voluntary Enrollment" and "Intake and Orientation" to reflect new law (AB 570, 2013), which mandates procedures governing identification, placement, and intake of students who voluntarily enroll in continuation education. The regulation adds optional program components related to parent/guardian communication, parent and community involvement, professional development, support services, and safety and school climate. The regulation also reflects new court decision concluding that districts are not required to exhaust <u>all</u> other means of correction to bring about student improvement before involuntarily transferring a student to a continuation education program.

This item will return for action at the next board meeting.

Instruction BP 6184

CONTINUATION EDUCATION

The Board of Education shall provide a continuation education program <u>as an option for at-risk students who may need a flexible educational environment</u> to meet the educational needs of district students who are not attending a high school or other appropriate educational institution and who are not legally exempted from compulsory continuation school attendance. <u>The continuation education program shall be designed to meet the educational needs of each student, provide an opportunity for participating students to complete the required course of instruction necessary to graduate from high school, emphasize occupational orientation or a work study schedule, and offer intensive guidance services.</u>

The continuation education program shall be aligned with the goals identified in the district's local control and accountability plan, designed and implemented in collaboration with other high schools within the district, and coordinated with other educational options available to district students.

The Superintendent or designee shall appoint a Principal of continuation education who shall be responsible for the organization and administration of the district's continuation education program and guidance, placement, and follow-up services for participating students. (5 CCR 11000, 11003)

The Board shall establish a plan to coordinate instruction and training in the school with the home, employment and other agencies and shall designate one or more persons as coordinators. (5 CCR 11003)

The continuation high school shall be conducted for not less than 175 days during a school year. The Board may maintain continuation classes during the district's regular school hours, during special school hours for these classes established by the Board, or during such hours and for such length of time during the day or evening that adult education classes are maintained. (Education Code 48434; 5 CCR 11004)

Students eligible for continuation education classes shall be age 16 or 17 years at the time of their enrollment and shall not have graduated from high school. (Education Code 48400, 48413)

The Superintendent or designee shall develop administrative regulations governing the involuntary transfer of students into the continuation education program. (Education Code 48432.5)

A student may be involuntarily transferred into a continuation education program in accordance with law and administrative regulation. (Education Code 48432.5)

With the consent of ∓the Superintendent or designee, a student may voluntarily enroll in continuation classes in order to receive special attention such as individualized instruction. (Education Code 48432, 48432.3, 48432.5) may allow the voluntary enrollment of students in the continuation education program as space permits and when it is determined to be in the best interests of the student.

Priority for voluntary enrollment in continuation classes shall be given to students who need credit recovery in order to graduate with their peers and to students who, due to employment, pregnancy, parenting responsibilities, or other circumstances, are unable to attend a

comprehensive high school. A student with a disability shall be admitted only if his/her individualized education program specifically states that a continuation high school setting meets his/her needs.

Enrollment criteria shall be applied consistently throughout the district. (Education Code 48432.3)

Students may be enrolled in a regional occupational center or program within the county in lieu of, or in combination with, continuation education. (Education Code 48432)

<u>Students Minors</u>-otherwise subject to compulsory attendance in continuation education classes may be exempted if they meet any of the conditions specified in Education Code 48410 <u>and AR 5112.1 – Exemptions from Attendance</u>.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly evaluate the effectiveness of district continuation education programs and report these evaluation results to the Board. Indicators may include, but not be limited to, disaggregated data on student enrollment, student assessment results, and graduation rates.

The Board may maintain continuation classes during the district's regular school hours, during special school hours for these classes established by the Board, or during such hours and for such length of time during the day or evening that adult education classes are maintained. (Education Code 48434)

CONTINUATION EDUCATION

Program Components

The district's continuation education program shall include the following components:

 The Ccurriculum that prepares students to meet the course requirements for offered by the continuation high school shall enable students to meet requirements for high school graduation prescribed in Education Code 51224-51225.3 (5 CCR 11004)

- 2. A plan to coordinate instruction and training in the continuation education program with students' parents/guardians, employment, and other agencies (5 CCR 11003)
- 3. Instruction based on individual student needs as determined by counseling and coordination services (5 CCR 11002)
- 4. Personal guidance in matters affecting students' personal, social, and educational adjustment (5 CCR 11001)
- Occupational guidance to prepare students for future employment opportunities (5 CCR 11001)
- 6. Placement in suitable employment whenever students can benefit from such employment (5 CCR 11001)
- 7. Regular home contacts and parent conferences when students are not succeeding in the continuation program (5 CCR 11001)
- 8. Regular contacts with students enrolled for only four hours per week and all students suspended from continuation education, with the intent of eventually returning them to the full-time continuation education program (5 CCR 11001)
- 9. Regular communication with all parents/guardians regarding their child's progress in the educational program
- 10. Opportunities for parent/guardian and community involvement in school activities and program planning
- 11. Student support services that may include, but are not limited to, academic support services, health services or referrals, and development services for the children of enrolled students, and/or prevention and intervention services for alcohol or substance abuse
- 12. Professional development that includes opportunities for teachers to continually improve their instructional and classroom management skills
- 13. Efforts to ensure school safety and promote a positive school climate

In order to receive a high school diploma, students in continuation education must pass the high school exit examination. (Education Code 60850)

Instruction in continuation education classes shall be based on individual needs as determined by the findings of the counseling and coordination services. (5 CCR 11002)

The Superintendent or designee shall provide to all minors in the district subject to compulsory continuation education a program that includes: (Education Code 48431; 5 CCR 11001)

- Personal guidance
- Occupational guidance
- 3. Placement in suitable employment whenever the student can benefit from such employment
- Follow-up services including:
 - a. Visitations at places of employment to determine the effectiveness of the guidance and placement services
 - Regular home contacts and parent conferences when students are not succeeding in the continuation program
 - c. Regular contacts with students enrolled for only four hours per week and all students suspended from continuation education with the intent of eventually returning them to the full-time continuation education program

The continuation high school shall be conducted for not less than 175 days during a school year. (5 CCR 11004)

Program Administration

The director of continuation education shall be responsible for the organization and administration of the district's continuation education program and guidance, placement and follow-up. (5 CCR 11000)

Involuntary Transfer

Students eligible for continuation education classes shall be age 16 or 17 at the time of their enrollment and shall not have graduated from high school. (Education Code 48400, 48413)

A decision to transfer a student involuntarily into continuation education classes shall be based on a finding that the student meets either of the following conditions: (Education Code 48432.5)

The student committed an act enumerated in Education Code 48900.

Involuntary transfer to a continuation school shall be made only when other means fail to bring about student improvement. However, a student may be involuntarily transferred the first time he/she commits an act enumerated in Education Code 48900 if the principal determines that the student's presence causes a danger to persons or property or threatens to disrupt the instructional process. (Education Code 48432.5)

2. The student has been habitually truant or irregular in legally required school attendance from instruction he/she is lawfully required to attend.

Involuntary transfer to a continuation school shall be made only when other means fail to bring about student improvement. However, a student may be involuntarily transferred the first time he/she commits an act enumerated in Education Code 48900 if the principal determines that the student's presence causes a danger to persons or property or threatens to disrupt the instructional process. (Education Code 48432.5)

Prior to an involuntary transfer, the student and parent/guardian shall be given written notice that they may request a meeting with the Superintendent or designee. (Education Code 48432.5)

At the meeting, the student or parent/guardian shall be informed of the specific facts and reasons for the proposed transfer. The student or parent/guardian shall have the opportunity to inspect all documents relied upon, question any evidence and witnesses presented, and present evidence on the student's behalf. The student may designate one or more representatives and witnesses to be present with him/her at the meeting. (Education Code 48432.5)

A written decision to transfer, stating the facts and reasons for the decision, shall be sent to the student and parent/guardian. It shall indicate whether the decision is subject to periodic review and the procedure for such review. (Education Code 48432.5)

The persons making the final decision for involuntary transfer shall not be members of the staff of the school in which the student is enrolled at the time. (Education Code 48432.5)

No involuntary transfer to a continuation school shall extend beyond the end of the semester following the semester when the acts leading to the involuntary transfer occurred. (Education Code 48432.5)

However, at the request of a student or parent/guardian, the Superintendent or designee shall conduct an annual review of the involuntary transfer.

Voluntary Enrollment

As space permits, students who meet the eligibility criteria specified in Board policy may voluntarily enroll in a continuation school. A student may be considered for placement in the continuation school whenever his/her parent/guardian submits a written request to the Superintendent or designee or the student is referred by a counselor or school administrator.

Approval of a student's voluntary transfer shall be based on a finding that the placement will promote the educational interests of the student. (Education Code 48432.3)

<u>Voluntary enrollment shall be subject to the following conditions: (Education Code 48432.3, 48432.5)</u>

- A student's voluntary placement in continuation education shall not be used as an alternative to expulsion unless alternative means of correction have been attempted pursuant to Education Code 48900.5.
- The district shall strive to ensure that no specific group of students, including a group based on race, ethnicity, language status, or special needs, is disproportionately enrolled in continuation education within the district.
- 3. A copy of this administrative regulation and accompanying Board policy shall be provided to a student whose voluntary transfer to a continuation school is under consideration and to his/her parent/quardian.

- 4. Before a student is transferred and upon request by his/her parent/guardian, the parent/guardian may meet with a counselor, principal, or administrator from both the school that the student is currently attending and the continuation school to determine if transferring is the best option for the student.
- 5. To the extent possible, voluntary transfer to a continuation school shall occur within the first four weeks of each semester.
- 6. A student who is voluntarily enrolled in continuation education may return to the regular high school at the beginning of the following school year, or at any other time with the consent of the Superintendent or designee.

With the consent of the Superintendent or designee, a student may voluntarily enroll in continuation classes in order to receive special attention such as individualized instruction. Students so enrolled may return to the regular high school at the beginning of the following school year, or at any time the Superintendent or designee gives consent. (Education Code 48432.5)

Intake and Orientation

Upon voluntary or involuntary transfer to a continuation education program, an intake meeting shall be conducted with each student and his/her parent/guardian. At this meeting, the principal or counselor shall provide information about each course and number of credits that the student needs to complete in order to graduate and shall develop an individualized academic plan for the student. The student, and his/her parent/guardian as appropriate, shall sign a contract indicating their commitment to these objectives.

In addition, at the beginning of each school year, the district coordinator for continuation education, school counselor(s), or other designee(s) shall provide an orientation session for all incoming students and their parents/guardians in order to help them understand the credit recovery process and establish expectations for student conduct and participation. As appropriate, extended orientation sessions may be provided to assist students in developing academic, social, communication, anger management, or other skills necessary to success in school.

Minimum Attendance Requirement

<u>In continuation high schools and classes, a day of attendance shall be at least 180 minutes.</u> (Education Code 46170)

Each student shall attend classes for not less than 15 hours per week. However, if a student gives satisfactory proof of regular employment, he/she may attend classes for not less than four hours per week for the regular school term. These requirements may be met by any combination of attendance in a continuation education class and/or regional occupational center or program. (Education Code 46170, 48402, 48400)

Each student in the continuation education program shall attend classes for not less than four 60-minute hours per week for the regular school term. The requirement may be met by attendance in a continuation education class and/or regional occupational center or program. (Education Code 48400)

If a student subject to compulsory attendance in continuation education classes cannot give satisfactory proof of regular employment, the student shall attend continuation education classes and/or a regional occupational center or program for not less than 15 hours per week during the period of unemployment. (Education Code 48402)

Leaves of Absence

A student enrolled in compulsory continuation education classes may take a leave of absence for up to two semesters for the purpose of supervised travel, study, training or work in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulation. (Education Code 48416)

Reenrollment

Any person age 16 or 17 who left school after obtaining a certificate of proficiency may reenroll in the district without prejudice. If the student leaves a second time, the Superintendent or designee may deny reenrollment until the beginning of the next semester. (Education Code 48414)

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.06

This discussion item will address facility issues at Edison Language Academy. Staff will present to the Board of Education information regarding the building, its systems, how those systems are operating, what projects are complete, what are incomplete, and actions that staff are currently undertaking regarding the facilities. Topics addressed in this discussion item will include, among other things, the operation of the solar chimneys, the use of fans and air movement systems in classrooms, questions about filtration, the operation of the windows system and staff's ability to control the windows manually. Staff will also present the timeline for the demolition of the old building and construction of the playground. It is the district's goal to communicate to the Board of Education and the public what has been done, what is currently underway, and what approach will be taken for short- and long-term objectives.

Public Comments:

 Bradley Green, Peter Kuhns, Glenda Puga, Maria Loya, and Jerry Ruben addressed the board regarding this item.

Ms. Maez's presentation can be found under Attachments at the end of these minutes.

Mr. Sam answered board members' questions regarding the temporary A/C units and how the passive air system works in cooler weather. Ms. Maez answered board members' questions regarding the timeline for the demolition of the older building and construction of the new playground. Mr. de la Torre asked staff to examine the contract with the architect to determine accountability. At the October 16 board meeting, staff will have data on classroom temperatures as well as recommendations regarding short-term plans for Edison. Staff will provide information on the differences between the passive air system at Edison ES versus the system at JAMS.

SETTLEMENT INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS FUNDS

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.17

In May 2000, the American Civil Liberties Union filed a lawsuit against the State of California claiming that the state had failed in its duty to provide students with equal educational opportunity. That lawsuit, known as Williams v. State of California, was settled in August 2004. SMMUSD has engaged in several accountability measures in order to comply with the Williams lawsuit settlement. Among the measures is the requirement to inventory all Board of Education-adopted core materials, including: English, Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, Foreign Languages, Health, and laboratory science materials.

Assembly Bill 831, Chapter 118, Statutes of 2005, took effect July 25, 2005. AB 831 modified the annual public hearing requirement in Education Code (EC) Section 60119 and modified the expenditure requirements related to Williams instructional materials funds. Under EC Section 60119, the governing board of every local educational agency (LEA) that receives state instructional materials funds must hold an annual public hearing before the end of the eighth week from the first day pupils attend school for that year. At the public hearing, the governing board must make a determination as to whether each pupil in each school has sufficient textbooks or instructional materials, or both, that are aligned to the content standards and are consistent with the content and cycles of the curriculum framework adopted by the State Board of Education in reading/language arts, mathematics, science, and history-social science. In addition, the definition of sufficiency now provides that each pupil, including each English learner, must have a standards-aligned textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home.

Tonight we will hold the annual public hearing of sufficiency, present our resolution on the adequacy of materials for all students, which includes our compliance and non-compliance with legal guidelines, and propose remedies for our areas of non-compliance. We request that the Board of Education adopt the resolution on the adequacy of materials for all students in the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District.

Education Code Section 60119

Certification of Provision of Standards-Aligned Instructional Materials

WHEREAS, the governing board of Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District, in order to comply with the requirements of Education Code Section 60119 held a public hearing on October 2, 2013 at 5:30 p.m., which is on or before the end of the eighth week of school and which did not take place during or immediately following school hours, and;

WHEREAS, the governing board provided at least 10 days notice of the public hearing posted in at least three public places within the district that stated the time, place, and purpose of the hearing, and;

WHEREAS, the governing board encouraged participation by parents, teachers, members of the community, and bargaining unit leaders (if the district or county office has a bargaining unit) in the public hearing, and;

WHEREAS, the definition of "sufficient textbooks or instructional materials" means that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home to complete required homework assignments, and;

WHEREAS, all elementary students have sufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials in the following areas of study: English Language Arts, Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, and Health.

WHEREAS, secondary students at John Adams Middle School, Lincoln Middle School, Olympic High School and Malibu High School have sufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials in the following areas of study: English Language Arts, Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, Foreign Language, and Health.

WHEREAS, sufficient laboratory science equipment was provided for science laboratory classes offered in grades 9-12, inclusive, and;

THEREFORE, it is resolved that for the 2014-2015 school year, the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District has provided each pupil with sufficient textbooks and instructional materials consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum framework, as specified in Education Code section 60119.

AP Potential Reports

- Free, web-based tool provided by the College Board
- Generates rosters of students likely to score 3 or better on a given AP exam
- Based on students' Fall PSAT scores from prior year
- Correlations established between students' PSAT scores in Critical Reading, Writing and/or Math and likelihood of passing specific AP exams
- Individual students can access their own AP Potential reports online

AP Potential

Use of AP Potential Reports

- Identify students who would potentially be successful in specific AP courses and counsel them toward enrollment
- Calculate potential AP course loads in order to develop master schedule
- Develop new AP courses to meet students' potential needs
- Note: The College Board strongly cautions against counseling students out of AP enrollments based on PSAT scores and/or AP Potential Reports.

PSAT

More about the PSAT

- Preliminary-SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test
- Assesses critical reading, mathematics, and writing skills needed for college and beyond
- Voluntary and fee based
- Provides feedback to students on their college readiness
- Students can sign up for and take the PSAT beginning in 8th grade
- Results of the PSAT for 11th graders are used in determining some significant scholarship opportunities (e.g. National Merit Scholars)

- Malibu High (Taken on a School Day)
 - 166 10th Graders (90% of all 10th graders)
 - 132 11th Graders (87% of all 11th graders)
- Santa Monica High (Taken on a Saturday)
 - o 205 9th Graders (29% of all 9th graders)
 - 295 10th Graders (37% of all 10th graders)
 - 320 11th Graders (43% of all 11th graders)

A Retrospective Look at AP Potential Reports from Fall 2013

- Looking back at 10th and 11th graders PSAT results from Fall 2013
- Comparing AP Potential indicators with current 11th and 12th graders' AP course enrollments
- Research Question: Are students identified as having AP Potential for specific AP courses actually enrolled in those courses this year?

Some Examples

Course	Grade Level	# Indicated as AP Potential for Course	# Enrolled in AP Course
English Language	11	191	184
US History	11	177	84
Chemistry	11	108	23

Cautions:

- Relatively small set of Samohi students who took PSAT
- 12th grade students may have *already* taken the AP course in a prior year
- 11th grade students may plan on taking the course next year
- Students must balance the number of AP courses they take with other considerations (e.g., sports, activities, jobs, etc.)

AP Potential

Disaggregating the Data

- Of the under-represented students who took the PSAT and demonstrated AP Potential, the great majority ARE enrolled in one or more AP courses.
- Students tend to have more AP Potential endorsements than course enrollments.
- Often there is a mismatch between the courses for which they received AP Potential endorsements and the AP courses in which they are actually enrolled.

For Example

- Based on their PSAT scores, 15 African American students received AP Potential endorsements for one or more courses.
- Of this group, all 15 were enrolled in one or more AP Courses.
- Several were enrolled in courses for which they had not received AP Potential scores and had opted not to enroll in courses for which they had received AP Potential scores.

AP Potential

Another Example

- 79 Latino students took the PSAT and received one or more AP Potential scores.
- 69 of these students were enrolled in one or more AP courses.
- Again, for many students there is a mismatch between course enrollments and AP Potential scores.

Finally

- 76 socio-economically disadvantaged students took the PSAT and received one or more AP Potential scores.
- 70 of this group were enrolled in one or more AP courses.
- And, many of these students also had a mismatch of course enrollments and AP Potential scores.



E & A

Strategies to Identify Students for AP

- When AP Potential reports are released in December, the data will be provided to counselors, advisors, and House Principals
- Counselors and advisors will use the data in planning for parent/student scheduling requests meetings that take place in the spring
- Students will be encouraged and assisted in reviewing their own AP Potential reports.

E & A

Strategies to Identify Students for AP

- Offer PSAT during school day at both Malibu and Samohi for 2015-16.
- Use intensive, multi-media, multilingual campaign to get ALL 10th graders registered to take the exam.
- 9th and, of course, 11th graders would also be highly encouraged to participate.
- Cost for full 10th grade participation at Samohi would be \$11,200.

E & A

Strategies to Recruit Samohi Students for AP

- Encouragement by teachers currently teaching targeted students, capitalizing on student/teacher relationship and trust.
- Teacher encouragement followed by advisor and House Principal encouragement – multiple sources of same message, "You can do this!"

E&A

Strategies to Recruit Samohi Students for AP

- Teacher assessment early in the school year to redirect strong students to more rigorous courses.
- Parent education regarding the importance of Honors and AP courses for their students, with strategies for dealing with students who are reluctant to stretch themselves.
- Short but powerful multi-media, multilingual blasts to parents about the importance of the PSAT.

E & A

Strategies to Support Under-Represented Samohi Students

- Focus on English Language AP.
 - Develop support team of retired former AP or college teachers.
 - Support team moves into EVERY AP English Language class once EVERY week.
- Provide similar support to AVID 11 courses.
- Drop-in workshop at lunch with all outside support teachers present to assist students.
- Funding for AP teachers and support teachers to meet monthly to discuss student progress, student needs, and action plans to support students on upcoming work.

Site-Based Staffing Decisions



Principals work with site staff to create a master schedule that accommodates site needs. Philosophies and strategies used include:

- 1. Give preference to placement at school of residency
- 2. Counselors and management run simulated schedules
- 3. Students select courses
- 4. Teachers provide preferences for subjects and grade levels taught
- 5. Grade level or subject area meetings held to determine initial student placements
- 6. Consideration of singleton, elective and combination classes
- 7. Consideration of Core, looping and special programs
- 8. Balancing of classes

The SMMUSD contract with SMMCTA reads, in part:


"Whenever administratively practical and whenever the District's financial resources allow and facilities permit, the District shall make every effort to maintain elementary classes at thirty (30) or less...maintain middle school classes at thirty-four (34) or less, and high school classes at thirty-five (35) or less..." (Article VIII.A.1, 2)

"Schools will have three (3) weeks to balance their classes and conform to the above class-size standards. The District will make every effort to do this within two (2) weeks. At any time during the school year when new students enroll, every effort will be made to provide an equitable distribution of students." (Article VIII.A.5)


"In those situations where, after classes have been balanced pursuant to Paragraph A.3, the administration has found it necessary to exceed the above limitations for reasons other than financial and/or facility limits, the Administration shall, upon request of the affected teacher(s), meet with them and the Association Representative to discuss the reasons, and then, upon request, put the reasons for the final decision in writing. Possible solutions could include but not be limited to the use of instructional aide time. Other approaches of equivalent cost that reduce the adult to student ration are acceptable." (Article VIII.A.6-6a)

























OVERALL SUMMARY - UPDATE



- · Class loads, especially at elementary level are lower this year
- Staffing was enhanced due to Board and staff initiatives
- Staffing ratios at primary and secondary were based on moderate enrollment projections, progress towards CSR, rounding-up, staffing level increase
- District was 99% staffed by June
- Great strides were made this year; balancing is not always administratively practical
- 233 students entered SMMUSD via interdistrict permit in Fall 2014
- Staffing is a jigsaw puzzle. School teams of administrators, teachers and counselors
 create master schedules to best serve the needs of all students.

Measure BB Building Priorities

- Measure BB projects were designed with sustainability as a priority.
- The District provided limited guidelines and requirements to design teams.
- A thermal comfort range was not established for passive cooling objectives.



Passive Cooling at Edison

- The system was designed as a passive system – using natural mechanical processes to cool.
- Relies on evening temperature drops/cooling and extracting heat during the day through an exhaust system (Solar Chimney).
- The goal is to start the day with low temperatures that will be sustained throughout the day.



Passive Cooling at Edison

- It is <u>not</u> air conditioning that achieves a specific, desired temperature level.
- Why are some spaces at the school air conditioned:
 - These spaces are not connected or part of the solar chimney system.
 - They are not cooled by the lower evening temperatures.



Passive Cooling at Edison

- Prior to move-in, the architect, DSA, the inspector (IOR), and the district agreed that the building was constructed and completed as designed and properly operating (December 2013).
- The school was occupied in January 2014 and construction and design teams began working to fix "bugs" identified by the site.



Building Management System (BMS)

- Technology that monitors and controls the operational segments of the passive cooling system.
- Climatec is the contractor responsible for the programming based on instructions provided by the architect.
- The system controls the operation of the classroom windows, and fans and louvers in the solar chimneys.



May Heat Episode

- Excessive outdoor temperatures put stress on the passive system.
- Uncomfortable temperature were experienced in classrooms.
- The District began evaluating the effectiveness of the system.
- District staff met with teachers and parents to explain how the system works and what we were attempting to do to achieve more comfortable conditions.
- Developed plans for summer monitoring and testing.



What happened over the summer

- Worked with design/construction team and contractor to reprogram the building management system (BMS).
- Daily monitoring of temperatures.
- Extensive air flow testing including fog tests identifying effectiveness of different fan configurations.
- Researched options to improve effectiveness of the system.



Who were involved in the summer investigation

- District architect Stuart Sam

Actions resulting from summer testing

- BMS was reprogrammed to achieve maximum advantage of night cooling.
- •Installed in every classroom:
 - 1 large oscillating ceiling fan
 - 2 fan/filtration units
- Fans installed in solar chimneys to assist pulling hot air out of classroom.



Actions resulting from summer testing

- Air flow testing showed pendant ceiling fans as suggested by the project architect would not lower room temperatures; in fact, temperatures would be elevated.
- Goal was to supplement the system and move hot air toward and out the solar chimneys.
- Pendant ceiling fans moved hot air away from solar chimneys and onto student seating areas.



Effectiveness of summer changes

- Temperatures rose again in September and outdoor temps were at or above 90 degrees.
- Interior classroom temperatures at Edison ranged from 83 to 86 degrees.
- Classrooms throughout the district experienced similar or even higher temperatures.



Did the changes work

- YES the operation of the system improved.
- YES the goal to maintain interior temperatures at or below outdoor levels was achieved.
- YES the system is doing what it was designed to do.
- NO the system did not achieve staff and parent expectations.



What is the District doing now

- Engaged a new mechanical engineering firm, SGJ.
- SGJ is a nationally recognized firm specializing in investigating rehabilitation of building enclosures.
- Their charge is to identify changes or modifications to achieve the best case cooling using the existing system.
- SGJ have experienced experts that have designed many of these systems.



What is the District doing now

- SGJ will review all documentation, conduct additional computer modeling of air flow, and make recommendations.
- Recommendations are expected by early December 2014.
- This will most likely be a long term solution.



What are short term solutions

- Temporary air conditioning units located on the roof that use the existing ventilation system are being considered.
- These units would not require DSA approval as they would be temporary.
- Roof weight loads and unit specifications would need to be analyzed and established.
- Using A/C is a larger district policy question that will need to be carefully considered.



Other options

- The use of small donated portable A/C units; but this is difficult as we continue to maximize the existing systems.
- Developing a more comprehensive monitoring system and make the operation more automated.
- Additional training for maintenance and operations staff.
- Training for site staff on the system and how to maximize cooling by use of open windows and fans.



Demolition of old site and construction of new playground

- Plans for demolition of the old site have been submitted to the EPA for comments on PCB disposal.
- Once EPA comments are received, the process will begin and is expected to take 5 months.
- At the conclusion of process, the construction of the playground is expected to take 8 months.
- Scheduling of these activities will be dependent upon the school schedule.



Other Edison Issues

- The presence of paid protesters at the campus has been very disturbing to the entire school community.
- The District agrees that the conduct of the picketers and the use of inappropriate images have no place at an elementary school site.
- At issue is a contract dispute between a subcontractor (Superior Wall Systems), the contractor (Swinerton), and the District.



Other Edison Issues

- Payments for subcontractor's original contract have been made to Swinerton.
- In question is a claim or change order made by the subcontractor.
- The District has requested documentation that to date has not been completely or adequately provided.
- A meeting of all parties is scheduled for Friday, October 4th.



Final Thoughts

- The District recognizes that the students, staff, and parents have endured a lengthy and trying process of construction that is not completed yet.
- We hope that the Edison community will continue to support our efforts to resolve issues.
- We respect and value all input, no matter how critical.
