COLLEGE ADMISSIONS TEST INFO

 This is the official site for the SAT tests. You can look at dates and deadlines, register for the tests, and there is a preparation section with practice questions and tests.

One or more of the following tests are required for college admissions:

- ACT with writing OR SAT Test
- SAT Subject Exams are required for some schools. See individual admissions requirements from specific universities to find out.

Taking Both Tests

We recommend taking a MOCK version of the SAT and ACT to better gauge which test is best for you. You can get more information on Mock Exams through <u>www.revolutionprep.com</u>. While we emphasize the differences between the two tests, studying for both tests is always key. Both the ACT and the SAT ultimately test your ability to think, and both cover the basics of a high school education.



SAT SUBJECT EXAMS

Subject Exams are not required for all colleges so please check admissions requirements for each school you are thinking of applying to. Information can be found at www.collegeboard.com.

Notes about the Subject Tests

- Students may take up to three SAT Subject Tests on a single test date.
- Students cannot take the SAT Subject Tests and the SAT Reasoning Test during the same test administration.
- Students must indicate which Subject Tests they plan to take when they register for a test. However, they may change which tests they take up to the test date—except for Language Tests with Listening. This applies to center testing only (not school-based testing, which involves specialized materials that may not be available).
- Calculators may only be used on the Mathematics Level 1 and Level 2 Subject Tests. Students may not use calculators for other Subject Tests and must put them away when not taking a mathematics test.
- The Language Tests with Listening are always given in the first hour of testing. Only one listening test can be taken per test date.

JUNIOR YEAR ACTION PLAN

Fall

- Take the PSAT/NMSQT[®] in October
- Take a MOCK SAT or ACT Exam
- Naviance: Start college search
- Start with you: Make lists of your abilities, preferences and personal qualities.
- List things you may want to study and do in college.
- Jump-start your college planning by reading about majors and careers.
- Begin thinking about Financial Aid
- Talk to your counselor about your college plans.
- Attend college night and financial aid night at your school.
- Use financial aid calculators to estimate your aid eligibility and college costs.

Winter

- Get Ready for the SAT, ACT and/or Subject Exams

Spring

- Explore Colleges
- Start visiting local colleges: large, small, public and private.
- Develop an initial list of 15-20 colleges that interest you.
- Sign up and prepare for AP[®] Exams.
- Plan Ahead for the Summer & Senior Year and challenge yourself with honors and AP classes
- Select your classes for senior year with your Advisor.
- Plan summer activities early. Enrich yourself by volunteering, getting an interesting job or internship, or signing up for special summer learning programs.

Summer

- Keep Up Your Momentum
- Visit colleges. Take campus tours and, at colleges you're serious about, schedule interviews with admission officers. Be sure to bring your campus visit checklist.
- Check important dates; some colleges have early dates or rolling admission.
- Think about essay topics and start writing.
- Start working on your Brag Sheet



SENIOR ACTION PLAN

- Naviance: Scholarship search
- Narrow your list of colleges to approximately 9-12 colleges, and review it with your counselor.
- Visit as many colleges on your list as possible to help narrow.
- Make a master calendar and note: Test dates, fees and deadlines, college application due dates, required financial aid applications and their deadlines, recommendations, transcripts and other necessary materials, your high school's deadlines for application requests, such as your transcript
- Ask for recommendations. Give each person your brag sheet and any required forms. Follow up with a thank you card.
- Write application essays and ask teachers, family members and friends to read for final revision.
- Decide Whether to Apply Early Action or Early Decision
- November 1: For early admission, colleges may require test scores and applications in early November. Send your SAT[®] scores.
- Ask if your college offers an early estimate of financial aid eligibility.
- Get Financial Aid Info
- Attend financial aid info events in your area.
- Talk to your college counselor about CSS/Financial Aid PROFILE® and learn about completing the PROFILE.
- Search for scholarships, review scholarship books, and ask your college counselor about local and state funding sources.
- Complete all your testing requirements, if necessary.

Winter

Fall

- Review Application Details
- Most regular applications are due between January 1 and February 15. Keep copies of everything you send to colleges.
- Have your high school send your transcript to colleges.
- Check college portal to make sure they've received all application materials.
- Attend Cash for College
- Apply for Financial Aid
- You and your family should save this year's pay stubs to estimate income on aid forms that you'll file early next year.
- Submit your FAFSA as soon after January 1 as possible. Men who are 18 years of age or older must register with Selective Service to receive federal financial aid.
- Many priority financial aid deadlines fall in February. To get the most attractive award package, apply by the priority date. Keep copies of everything you send.

Spring

- Review Acceptance Letters
- You should get acceptance letters and financial aid offers by mid-April.
- Use Compare Your Aid Awards to compare awards from different colleges. Talk to financial aid officers at your college if you have questions about the award offered.
- If you haven't already, visit your final college before accepting.
- Make Your Final Choice by May 1
- Notify every college of your acceptance or rejection of offers of admission or financial aid by May 1. Send a deposit to the college you choose.
