Olympic High School is the Continuation High School for the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District (SMMUSD). Enrolled are 100-200 students who are behind on academic credits and who thrive in a smaller learning environment, benefitting from the use of alternative strategies in the delivery of course content. Students are provided individualized educational programs with a strong emphasis on curriculum, differentiated instruction, intensive guidance and counseling. Our aim is to provide effective, alternative educational opportunities to increase and develop student capacity and potential by teaching the building blocks necessary for lifelong learning and success. The schools' goals are established through a site culture regular data analysis to improve student achievement. "What" Olympic High School does is articulated through data collection and analysis: utilizing data, professional development, student growth, and improving attendance. "How" Olympic High School does this is seen through the planned development of school systems that ensure equity: weekly meetings of our Professional Learning Community, monthly meetings of our School Leadership Team, technology use, library development, concurrent enrollment, and professional development.

School Profile

Olympic High School is the continuation high school for the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District. Students enrolled thrive in a smaller school setting benefiting from the use of alternative strategies in the delivery of course content. Students are provided individualized educational programs with a strong emphasis on curriculum, intensive guidance, and counseling. The mission of Olympic High School is to provide effective, alternative educational opportunities increasing student potential by teaching the building blocks necessary for life-long learning and success.

California Basic Educational Data Systems (CBEDS) identifies 42 students at Olympic High School (SAMO students in the OCLC and ISP programs are considered Santa Monica High School students and though they recieve their services here, SAMO claims them as "enrolled"), though this fluctuates up to 130 students and combined with students :enrolled" at SAMO the number is considerably higher. Olympic High School has the highest minority population of the three high schools in the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District. 58% are Latino, 28% are white, 10% are African-American, and about 4% Asian. Special Education enrollment is 33%, which has doubled in three years and tripled over the past six years. Approximately 80% of our student body qualifies for the National School Lunch Program. Approximately 12% of the student population are English Learners. 33% are identified as students with disabilities.

2014 marked a year starting our implementation of Common Core State Standards in English and in Math. 2017-2018, we continued and expanded our use of the Expository Reading & Writing curriculum (ERWC) across grade level in order to focus on Literacy and college placement. We have reviewed our data and are working to identify areas of improvement.

SPSA Executive Summary with SLT Plan Narrative

Olympic High School's Goals:

Goal 1 - All students ready for college and careers.

Goal 2: English Learners will become proficient in English while engaging in a rigorous, standards-aligned curriculum in the Core content areas.

Goal 3: All students engage in schools that are safe, well maintained and family friendly.

Olympic school wide focus areas are Evidence Based Writing and communicating using precise Academic Language(developed within the Olympic PLC in tandem with our School Leadership Team). Staff conducts school wide literacy assessments (based on Common Core writing standards) twice a year that are graded according to a common rubric by the entire staff. Results are studied and evaluated for relevant data, staff then uses data to inform instructional modification. Creating school-wide common assessments in each specific content area was the focus in the Spring 2018 semester, and in fall of 2019 Teachers created and implemented school wide common assessments predicated on agreed upon Common Core Reading Standards using prompts from CC standards based Social Studies, NGSS Science and Math.

During the 2017 - 2018 school year Olympic High School also used the results of the previous Fair and Balanced or CAASPP assessment to inform instructional practices. While Olympic students posted significant gains in both the Math and Language Arts portions of the assessment, our PLC recognizes those results as a baseline for future student achievement. Roll out of the new state assessment led to numerous technical difficulties, which has, in turn, created a necessary focus on the lack of functioning technology The School Plan for Student Achievement 3 of 45 11/6/18

on our campus. Since the results are now being accepted for placement at Community Colleges, CSU and UC, the Olympic PLC is has focused it's efforts on increasing student outcomes through identifying specific widespread academic challenges and modifying existing curriculum to meet those challenges.


